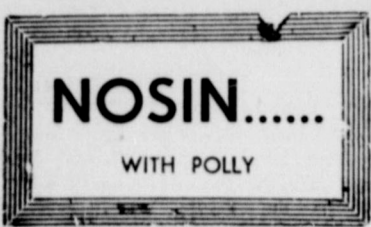

## Cecil Beavers Dies From Injuries Received In Accident



Bill Beasley (may or may not have a dime, confidently I haven't seen his bank book.) But Friday night at the party he looked like a Gambin Hall proprietor with a pocket full of gold nuggets.

Bud Irvine was just a wee bit afraid the "Tacky Party", Friday night would in all honesty be a torture party with himself as the main star in the performance. (It was he lost his shirt.)

I was real impressed when two fellows who attended the Holloween party came in. I thought surely they'll take the prize and was just ready to inquire as to where they had purchased such masks, when on second look, I realized it was Golden Green and Reed Yandell without masks.

I thought Clarence Kelley's sad masked face, Friday night showed favoritism to Chubby Dent (after he had failed to give the cash register in the store much exercise for a week.)

Americans throughout the nation will make their way to the Polls Tuesday to vote for their favorite leaders for our nation, along with 8 amendments to the state constitution, which will appear on the ballot.

1 grants power to the legislature to give aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or served prison sentences under Texas laws of which they were innocent. In order to do justice and provide some compensation for the present laws provide no aid. We think it should be approved.

No2 abolishes the present constitutional restriction on allocation of county funds, and allowing County Commissioners the right to use their own judgement in making these allocations. The amendment does not change the 80 cent limitations. This may provide a debatable answer, but we think it might permit commissioners to do legally without so much red tape.

No 3 and No 4 should both, without question be approved by Texas voters.

No 3 concerns our colleges and universities. In authorizing the investment of the permanent university fund in Corporation Bonds and Stocks. This will save the state money by lifting the complete dependence on state funds for the building of colleges.

No 4 provides our teachers with a more attractive retirement plan & provides more extensive benefits. If this does by some chance get defeated we will feel more keenly the arising demand for teachers for our youth, as each year teachers are reporting from this profession for other jobs that provide better pay and more attractive benefits. This should be passed without a doubt.

No 5 is to increase the veterans fund \$100,000,000 for the purpose of buying land to be sold to the Texas Veterans. Texas voters should follow Texas Veterans on this and steer away from such an amendment.

No 6 is providing different forms of Oaths of office for elective and appointive officers, but having the same meaning. This could not be to important either way, but probably should be approved since it seemed necessary to bring it up.

No 7 is one they may cause extreme embarrassment to have a jury trial for a person of unsound mind, but it should provide each voter with food for thought, as to whether the embarrassment involved in a hearing could possibly outweigh this safeguard for freedom. We personally think nothing could be so embarrassing as to slightly hinder individual freedom of individuals. The Constitution provides that no person be committed to a mental institution without medical testimony, but we still think it should be done in front of a jury to better safeguard people. We will vote to defeat this amendment.

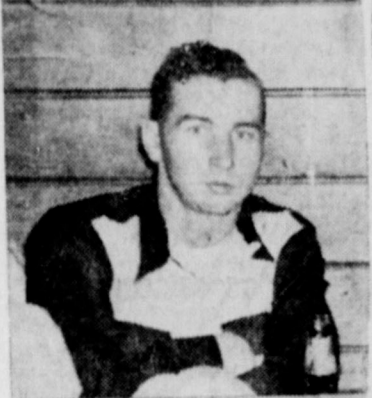
No 8 can be debated. In this amendment a Judge will be permitted to deny bail to a person accused of a felony who has been convicted twice previously.

Cecil Beavers, 37, died at 2:30 a.m., Sunday morning from injuries he received in a freak accident one-half mile east of Earth city Limits on Highway 70.

The accident occurred when Beavers stepped out in front of an oncoming car in order to stop them to get a push to start his stalled car. The car was driven by Latin Americans who stated they didn't see him in time to stop.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 p.m., Monday at the Earth First Baptist Church, with Rev. Cecil Meadows officiating. Beavers was a member of the Hart Baptist Church.

L. of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; and five sisters, Mrs. O. L. Scheller of Oklahoma City.

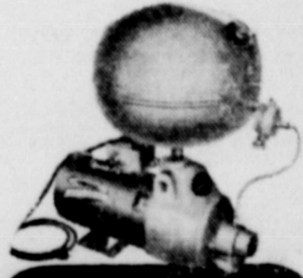

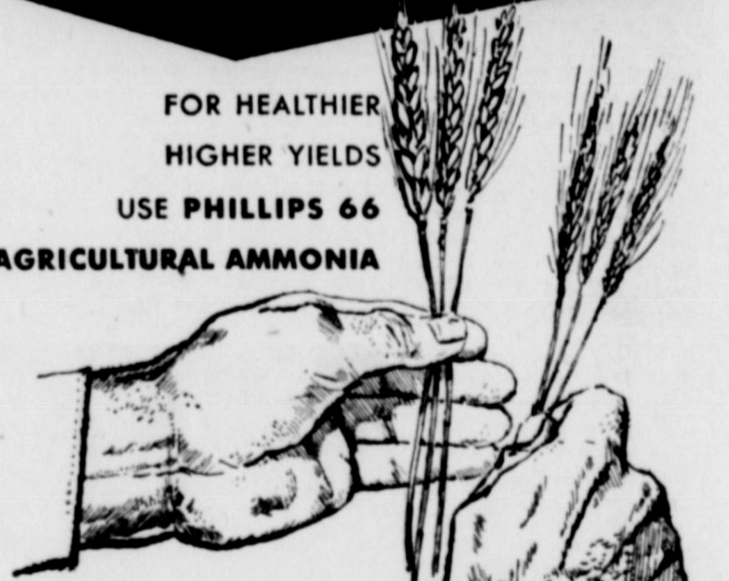

The Springlake Jr.-High Library has had years when it was not organized and a few years in which there was some sort of organization.

When school began this year it was very unorganized. We had around six hundred books. Approximately seventy-five of these had to be rebound and a few could not be used because many pages were missing.

The library does not have a well balanced selection of books. Three hundred twenty of these books are fiction. The rest are history and biography.

There are parts of twelve sets of reference books. Only five of these sets of encyclopedias are complete.

The books had no library cards or anything that is needed to check out a book or even to put a book in an organized library. We had to start from scratch. We just had books and lots of them.

It has taken us seven weeks to get the books repaired and ready to check out. The rest of the library is not complete. We have a lot more work to do and more supplies to get.

The School Board has set aside a Jr.-High Library Fund for us to use in getting our materials and books. Few of these books will be fiction. Our teachers need books they can use for outside references work for the students. We will purchase books on literature, biography, history and other non-fiction books to balance our library.

We have a very cooperative and enthusiastic group of student librarians working with us. They have worked hard to get our library in shape so we can use it. These librarians are: Eudene Roberson, Jane Goven, Peggy Stansell, Gaye Northcott, Karron Knight, Patti Mann, Charlotte Jordan, Ivy McGeath and Janice Cowley. Many others have helped.

When we finish, our Jr.-High Library will be a modern library. It will have a card catalog, accession book and the books will be numbered. All this will be done.

We have room for many books. There is a book drive sponsored by the P. T. A. We would appreciate and use any books you have that you like to give us. It will give our students more variety in their outside reading for their regular courses.

If you need a special book, feel free to call either Mrs. Marvin Sanders, High School Librarian, or Mr. Grady Davis, Jr.-High Librarian, we may have the book you need in either of our libraries.

You know how it is after a game in a small town, especially after the home team loses. Nearly every man in the crowd had a theory as to why we didn't win the game. Most of them, of course, blamed the coach. I couldn't help remembering that before we consolidated the county schools we didn't even have enough boys to make up a football team. And these same football experts who were saying what Rockne or Bud Wilkinson would have done, up until a few years ago they didn't know a football from a watermelon.

I guess we have a right, in this free country, to be self-appointed experts in any line we want to pick out. It seems to me that most people choose either football or politics.

Take this presidential election coming up next Tuesday: During the last few weeks I have heard so many different political experts that I nearly get confused sometimes. I have to stop and think that the fellow who is talking probably doesn't know any more about it than I do, and that helps me keep straightened out.

In fact, I guess I have had my mind made up all along. To make no bones about it, I like Ike. He's a man you can always look up to and respect—the kind of

man you'd be proud to point out to any person from any country on the face of the globe, and say: "That's our President!"

About Adlai, now, I'm not so sure. Of course, if he was elected, he would be my President, too, and I would hope he'd do a lot better than most people around here seem to think he would. This is something I don't think we need to worry about, because from all I can hear and read, Ike is going to win it again.

It seems to me that if Adlai ever had a chance around here, he threw it away when he came out with that H-bomb business. Now, the folks in our town don't know much about H-bombs, except that they don't want any personal dealings with them. Our scientific knowledge of H-bombs is about on a par with our football knowledge, I reckon. But we do know one thing: We don't want some misguided, inexperienced fellow fooling around with our national defense. When it comes to trusting what Bulganin says or what Eisenhower says, I'll take Ike. So will the rest of the country, if I don't miss my guess.

Just before we broke up the other night Doc Brown came into the drug store, and somebody asked him: "Hey, Doc, how's Ike doin'?" (Doc's a big Eisenhower man.) Doc said: "Well, it's a busy campaign for the medical profession. Last week Ike went and got his heart examined; and I understand that this week Adlai is going to get his head examined."

activeness of teaching as a profession, thus easing the task of teacher recruitment. It would also encourage teachers to stay on the job, despite the better pay, compared to the present maximum of five per cent. The stat would match the amount contributed by teachers.

Teachers retiring at 60, after 20 years of service, would qualify for a minimum monthly payment of \$100, compared to present amounts ranging much less than half that amount. Compensation for death or disability would be added.

Reciprocal privileges would attract teachers from other states, thus reversing the present flow of qualified teachers out of Texas to neighboring states with more to offer.

The present law would be clarified, streamlined, and brought up to date. Administration would be improved.

No new tax bill would be needed Mr. McCord made clear. Local school district taxes would not be involved. Teachers would increase their deposits 4-one-half million dollars per year and the state would match these deposits.

"This is the closest approach to a painless method of easing the teacher shortage," Mr. McCord stated.

The local school board president advised that the Texas Association of School Boards, composed of community leaders and substantial taxpayers from all over the state, gave unanimous endorsement to Amendment No. 4 in their convention in mid-October.

"It's good business for Earth to keep the experienced teachers we have for our children especially when the supply is scarce," Mr. McCord maintained. "An adequate retirement system will help us do that."

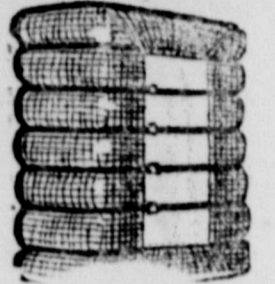
