

Springlake School Board Calls For Bond Election On September 15

A bond election calling for the amount of one hundred ninety five thousand dollars (\$195,000.00) has been scheduled for Saturday, September 15, at the Springlake School library.

The election was called by the Springlake School Board of Trustees in response to a petition presented to the board, asking for needed improvements at the school.

Phil Raught will be the election judge. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m. on election day.

Absentee voting will begin August 27 and will continue through September 11. Voting place for those voters will be the County Clerks office in Littlefield.

Voters will find two propositions appearing on the election ballots. Both must pass in order for the bond election to carry, one cannot be valid without the other.

Proposition No. I. Will call for the bond issue of \$195,000.00.

Proposition No. II. Will call for the passing of a maintenance tax. The maintenance tax, Public Law, Article 2784E-1 is a bill authorizing money to be obtained by raising tax rates instead of raising tax values.

In explaining the reason for the maintenance tax proposition appearing on the ballot, one member of the school board said "The school board could have called the election without the maintenance tax proposition attached to the election, but after much deliberation, we found that area taxpayers could save money in the long run, by adopting the maintenance tax bill, and securing money by raising the tax rate, rather than raising the property values upward. He went on to say that several schools in the area, Olton and Dimmitt included in the group passed the maintenance tax bill in their last elections."

The bond issue scheduled to be brought to a vote in mid-September will raise taxes about 12 percent according to school trustees.

If the bond carries the money is earmarked to be used for three purposes:

1. To build a new lunchroom.
2. To build 7 additional classrooms and library to the elementary building.
3. Repair the old junior high building.

The proposed new lunchroom will seat approximately 300 persons and will be arranged to provide two serving lines. The building will be constructed of concrete tile with brick exterior.

All new appliances and equipment will be purchased for the kitchen, and a large dishwasher will be installed. However the usable cookwear, dishes and silverware will be salvaged for use in the new kitchen.

Location of the new cafeteria will be immediately north of the elementary building and tennis court.

The seven new additional classrooms to the elementary building would provide space for grades 1 through 6, which is considered the best organization for accreditation standards. (The present building houses grades 1 through 4).

A new library is also scheduled to be built for the elementary grades.

The ten room junior high building will undergo repairs. The extent of the repairs could not fully be determined, but restrooms and hall floors repair were on the agenda and point up repairs to the brick exterior. Six rooms is required for the seventh and eighth grade classes, one of the unoccupied rooms will be used for a music room. Two will then be converted into a laboratory.

Financial report on bond issue in a nutshell:

1. This bond issue will raise your taxes about 12 percent.
2. It will be necessary to vote for a Maintenance Tax in order for this bond issue to be valid.
3. By voting for a Maintenance Tax instead of raising values, the School District will save about forty eight thousand (\$48,000.00) over a period of fifteen (15) years.
4. By voting for the Maintenance Tax, (which lets the school collect money on higher rates instead of higher values). The State will bear a larger share of additional money that is required to operate the school in the coming years.
5. Because a larger bonded debt causes the school to pay less of the cost of a minimum program and the State a larger share a School District, in a measure, pays for additional buildings whether they have them or not, and for that reason the Springlake School District would not be paying the total cost of new buildings from Local Funds.
6. Several dollars would have to be spent on the existing lunchroom if it is maintained as such, and also on the present junior high building. To raise this money without Public Law, Article 2784E-1 (Maintenance Tax) it would require higher property values... this again would result in less State Aid.

Advantage of additional buildings:

1. A new lunchroom with two serving lines would seat more students and would permit pupils in the elementary grades to start eating at a later time. At present it is necessary for them to start eating before 11 o'clock in order to feed all the students. It should also result in less time waiting in line, hotter food.
2. The building that is now used as a lunchroom would be used as a playroom for the elementary students. This should be especially valuable in the winter and spring months when the weather is not conducive to outside activities. An inside place to play during these months when the weather is not reduction of colds and sore throats among our student body. An overhead protective sidewalk will be built from the elementary building to the playroom to prevent the students from getting wet in bad weather.
3. Additional classrooms would be available in the present junior high building for music teachers.
4. Additional classrooms would eliminate the use of temporary buildings for classrooms which is possible before the close of the 1962-63 school year.
5. Less traffic and a smaller number of students should help the present junior high with repairs to last a longer period of time.
6. Teachers can do a better job not being so crowded.

The meeting will begin at 2 p.m. with serving set at 6 p.m. Halwell Cattle Co. will furnish the barbecue this year.

The welcome address will be made by T. V. (Red) Murrell, president of the organization.

Cotton John of Radio Station KGNC in Amarillo will be guest speaker for the occasion. Each community in Lamb County will provide entertainment on the program.

Members are asked to bring salads and desserts. The rest of the food will be furnished.

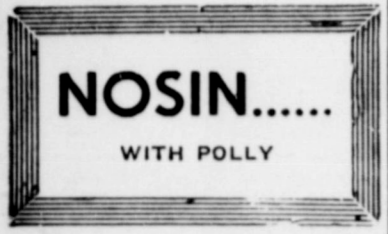

Youth in Critical Condition Following Auto-Scooter Accident

At 8:30 p.m. Thursday, Mike McClure was reported to have lived through surgery at the Methodist Hospital, but his condition was reported as grave.

Mike McClure, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Buck McClure of Springlake, was seriously injured about 11 a.m. (today) Thursday in a motor scooter-automobile accident about one mile south of the Springlake School.

Mike returning from football practice with the Springlake Wolverines, had parked his car along side of the road about a mile south of the school and borrowed a scooter from a friend, Jerry Anderson, to ride for a few minutes.

He rode the scooter to school and was returning to where Jerry Anderson was waiting at the spot he made a left turn across the highway to where Anderson was waiting at about the same moment Gary Cowley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Cowley, also traveling south had pulled out of the lane in an effort to pass the scooter.

Tire marks on the highway indicated Cowley tried in vain to keep from hitting the scooter.

The impact threw Mike across the hood of the '62 Chevrolet station wagon, where he remained until the car ceased moving, and the abrupt stop threw his body onto the ground.

Dean Foshee and Arboth Rylant administered artificial respiration and first aid. Upon the arrival of Dr. Holt, the boy was taken to the Littlefield Hospital and Clinic, where he was given emergency treatment and the rush on to the Methodist Hospital and 4 p.m. Thursday, the last report from the hospital was "No Hope."

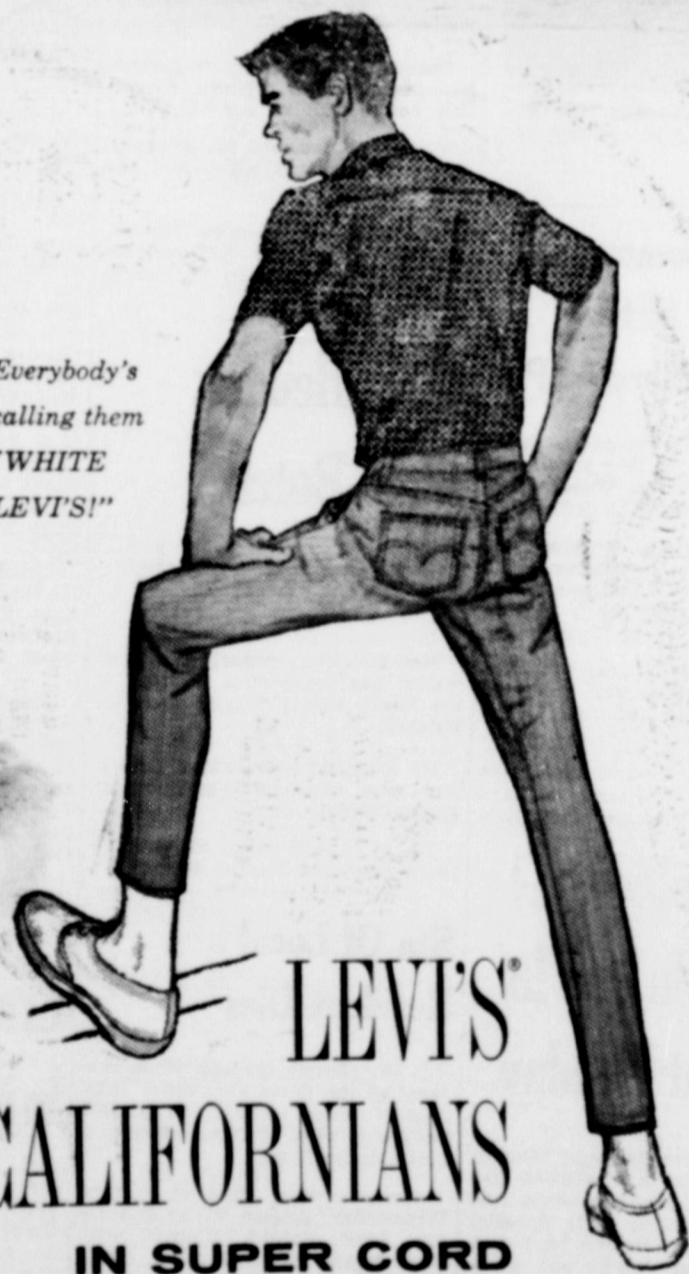

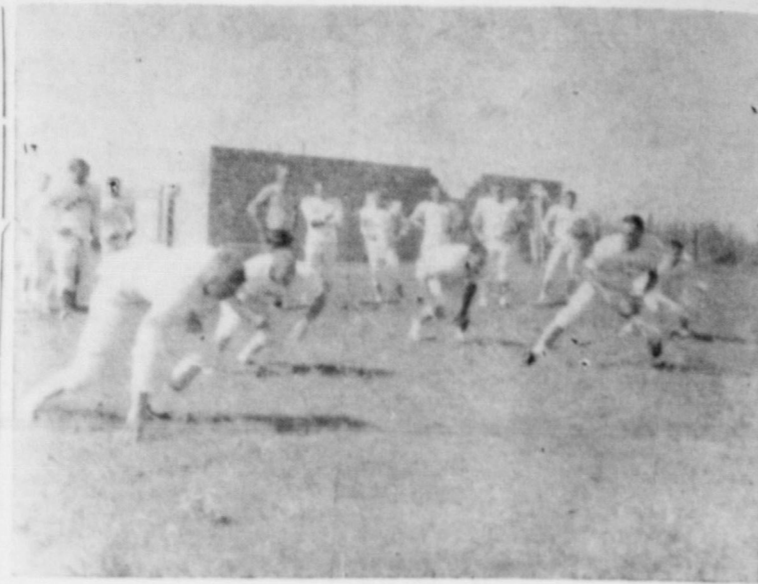
Spirits began to run high Monday morning at the Springlake campus. Football was in the air, and a large number of boys showed up for the first workout.

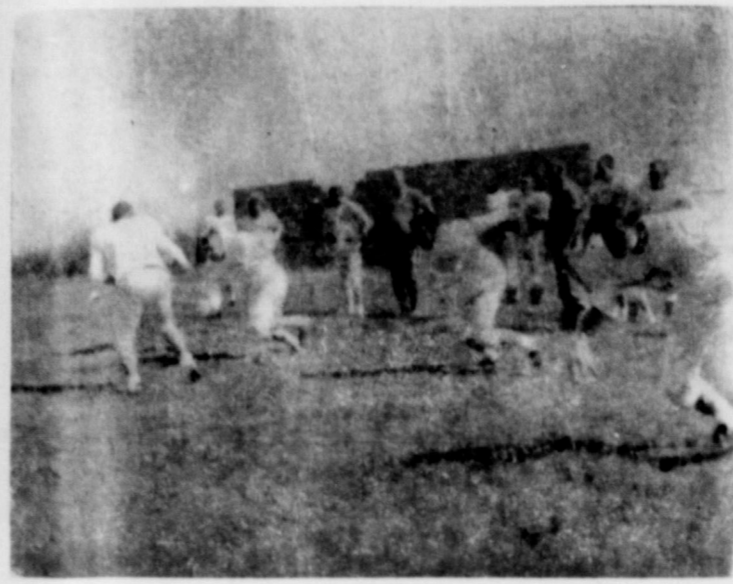

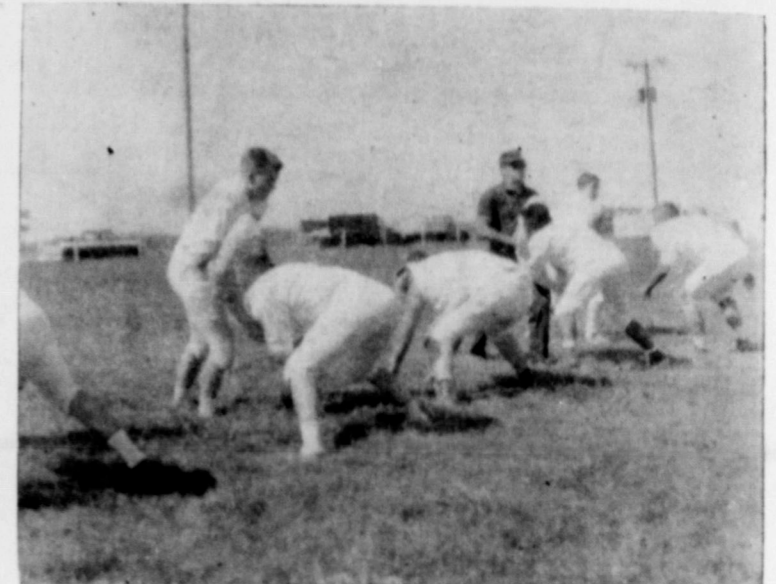

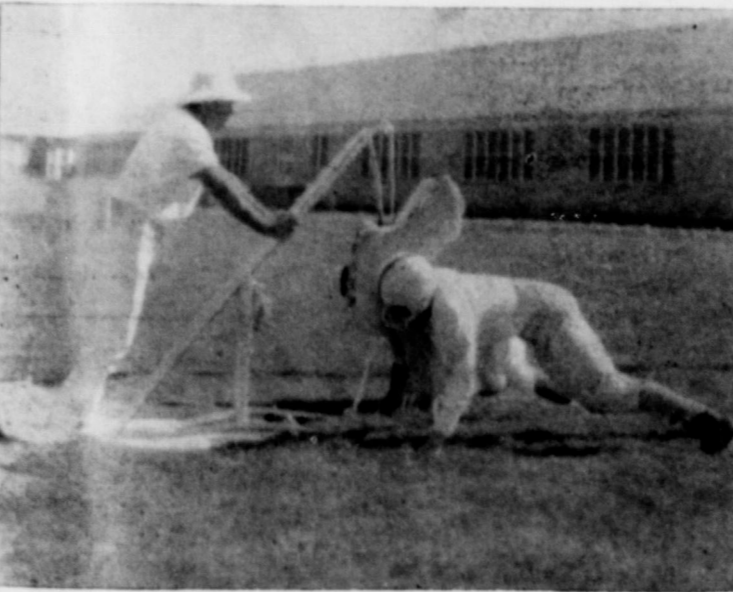

last season and that to Wink in the quarter-finals.

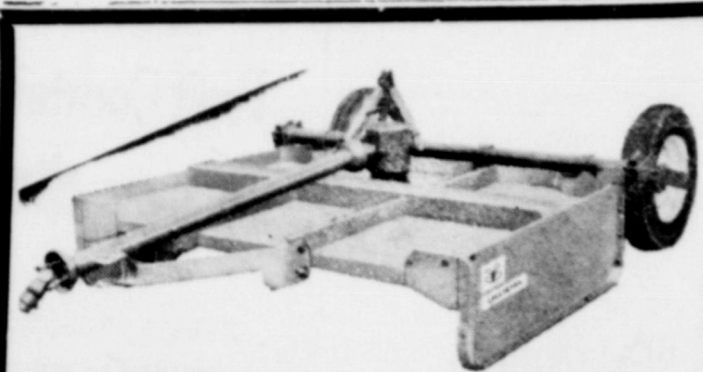

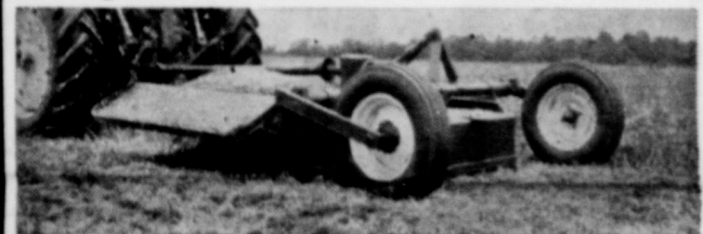

KNOW YOUR INSECT ENEMY COTTON LEAFWORM

Winter weather eliminates this cotton pest in the United States each year, according to entomologists. But every spring, hordes of migrating moths fly into our country from tropical areas. These unwelcome visitors deposit billions of egg clusters on cotton plants. Hungry leafworms soon emerge to virtually eat their way across most of the cotton belt.

Their collective appetites are fantastic. Leafworms can strip cotton plants so badly that fields may appear to have been scorched by fire. The worms themselves are discriminating; they eat only cotton plants.

First signs of cotton damage may be tiny worms eating beneath the leaves. Larger worms in mass attacks often devour leaves completely, and eat into squares, bolls and barks. On ragged plants, brown pupae are often found attached by silken threads to stems and leaf ribs.

Growers have found that early control is most economical. Young tender worms are more easily killed and population buildups are prevented. A new type insecticide now has been widely adopted for leafworm control. This new material, called Sevin, is a carbamate. It introduces an entirely new and safer-to-use chemical to the cotton pesticide field. Growers have used Sevin in both dust and spray for-



mulations for long-lasting protection against leafworm attacks. Entomologists give these tips for effective leafworm control. Check cotton fields regularly and often. Spray or dust early to prevent buildups. For economy, use a broad-range pesticide to control many pests in fewer applications. And plow down cotton stalks right after harvest to deny insects a food supply. FNS
