Annual FFA Pig Sale Huge Success

Last Tuesday, October 27 at the FFA Show Barn, the second annual Springlake FFA pig sale was held. The 218 weaning size pigs were sold. The pigs were purchased by the approximately 300 people who attended. Some came from as far as Abilene to participate. The entire selling average price paid on the 218 pigs was \$25.35 per head. Ken Dawson's pigs averaged \$45.00 per head; Montgomery brothers averaged \$37.00 on theirs. The high selling pig was \$72.50, bought by Montgomery brothers. Henderson, and Doug Lewis; the clerks; Perry Martin and Don Watson; the FFA mothers who served at the concession stand (and who made \$70.00); to Lanny Tucker, Hart, Ag. Teacher, who judged the pigs for championship of each breed; to Jerry Jones, who had the champion barrow, at \$52.50; and to all who helped make the FFA Pig Sale a huge success.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Stockstill, Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Wheatley, and Mr. and Mrs. Morgan Lacker, Mulshoe, flew to Florida last weekend in a Comanche, six-place, twin engine plane. Richard made the return trip in eleven hours with a new plane.

President Lyndon Johnson was returned to the White House Thursday by a landslide victory. At noon Thursday, the National tabulation of popular votes cast gave 96% of the nation's total popular votes counted as Johnson 40,820,832 votes; Goldwater, 25,816,667 votes. In the state race, Texas elected Democrat Ralph Yarborough to another term in the U.S. Senate in a landslide vote. Also the race of George Malone was typical of the trend throughout the nation.

With winners in the Democratic Presidency, and a 2 to 1 majority in the Senate, indications point to little difficulty passing in the Democrat's passage of bills.

In Precinct 2, Earth, the total number of votes cast were 530. Lyndon Johnson, Hubert Humphrey, received 363 votes for President and Vice President. Democratic Party Barry Goldwater, William E. Miller, 148 votes for President and Vice President, Republican Party. Ralph Yarborough received 312 votes for U.S. Senator, Democratic Party. George Bush, 208 votes for United States Senator, Republican Party. Joe Pool received 390 votes for Congressman at Large, Democratic Party. Bill Hayes, 123 votes, Congressman at Large for Republican Party. George Malone received 410 votes for U.S. Representative, 19th Congressional District, Democratic Party. Joe B. Phillips received 108 votes for U.S. Representative, 19th Congressional District Republican Party. For Governor, John B. Connally received 420, Democratic Party; Jack Crichton received 88 votes for Governor, Republican Party. For Lieutenant Governor, Preston Smith received 412 votes, Democratic Party; Horace Houston received 92 votes for Lieutenant Governor, Republican Party; Joseph M. Rummier received 1 vote for Lieutenant Governor, Constitution Party. In the Attorney General's race, Waggoner Carr, Democratic Party, received 424 votes; John Trice, Republican Party, received 87 votes.

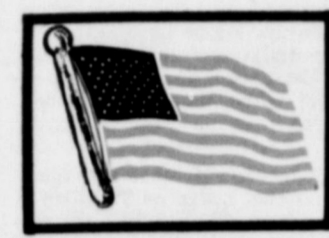
For Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White, Democratic Party, received 404 votes; John B. Armstrong, Republican Party, received 106 votes; Derek C. Bownds, Constitution Party, received 1 vote. In the Commissioner of General Land Office, Democratic Party, Jerry Sadler received 413 votes; John A. Matthews, Republican Party, 97 votes. In the Comptroller of Public Accounts, Democratic Party, Robert S. Calvert received 412 votes; Dallas Calmes, Jr., Republican Party, 92 votes; and Constitution Party, David R. Clark, 1 vote. For State Treasurer, Democratic Party, Jesse James received 420 votes; Republican Party,

Fred S. Neumann, 88 votes; Constitution Party, Bert Ellis, 1 vote. For Railroad Commissioner (Full term) Democratic Party, Ben Ramsey with 425 votes. For Railroad Commissioner (Unexpired term) Democratic Party, Jim C. Langdon received 414 votes; Republican Party, Don Flanagan, 89 votes. Jack Pope received 415 votes for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1, Democratic Party; T. E. Kennerly, Republican Party, received 89 votes. Ruel C. Walker received 456 votes for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2, Democratic Party. Robert W. Hamilton received 456 votes for Associate Justice,

Supreme Court, Place 3, Democratic Party. K. K. Woodley received 456 votes for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Democratic Party. Ernest O. Northcutt received 457 votes for Associate Justice Court of Civil Appeals, Democratic Party. Billy W. Clayton received 460 votes for State Representative 91st District Democratic Party. Jack Young received 460 votes for District Attorney 154th Judicial District, Democratic Party. Curtis R. Wilkinson received 460 votes for County Attorney, Democratic Party. Dick Dyer received 459 votes for County Sheriff, Democratic Party. Herbert Dunn received 462

votes for County Tax Assessor-Collector, Democratic Party. All three amendments passed. No. 1, 182 votes for, 94 votes against; No. 2, 172 votes for, 95 votes against; and No. 3 208 votes for, 80 votes against. O. B. Whitford was Presiding Judge. Election Precinct No. 17, at W Springlake Fire Station reports the total number of persons voting there were 118. In this box, Lyndon Johnson and Hubert Humphrey received 73 votes for President and Vice President, Democratic Party; Barry M. Goldwater and William E. Miller, 41 votes for President and Vice President, Republican Party.

Earth Youth Killed In Crash Sunday

Charles Ray Brown, fifteen year old Earth Negro resident, was killed Sunday, about 3:15 p.m., three miles northeast of Earth, in a traffic collision when an automobile driven by 14 year old Tim Ray Matthews went out of control and overturned on an unpaved road.

Highway Patrolman Weldon Parson, Littlefield, said Matthews, also of Earth was traveling along the country road when his car struck a dip and then a rise on the roadway. The auto went into the ditch; overturned several times; and rolled 50 feet.

Both of the teen-agers were thrown from the vehicle. Brown was pronounced dead at the scene. Matthews was taken to West Plains Hospital, Mulshoe, where his condition was listed as satisfactory later Sunday. Funeral arrangements for Brown will be by McCarty Funeral home, Littlefield.

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The Lamb County cotton harvest pace of the last week remained on about the same level as that of the previous week. 3,192 bales were turned in to the gin yards, hiking the season's bale count to 7,375.

The Texas Employment Commission reported things will remain approximately the same until after the first killing frost.

This year's bale total, as of Friday morning, was more than 3,700 bales ahead of the same time a year ago, nearly identical to the count in 1962, but about 13,000 bales behind the 1960 count. Ginning on November 1, 1963, 3,607 bales were listed, while the count totaled 7,659 bales on November 2, 1962 and 20,317 bales on November 4, 1960.

Most of the ginning activity remains in the area north of the sandhills, where the cotton crop is considered one of the finest in recent years.

On the overall Plains area, hail and rain temporarily slowed the pace of the cotton harvest, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of Lubbock's Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

George Mahon Receives "Knopp Porter Award"

Lubbock, (Sp.) Congressman George H. Mahon was honored here today by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for distinguished service to Texas agriculture.

Mahon received a plaque, known as the "Knopp Porter Award," as a part of Extension's celebration of its 50th Anniversary Year. Governor Connally had previously proclaimed this week as "Texas Agricultural Extension Service 50th Anniversary Week."

The award, one of two presented this week, honors men who have "projected the visionary aims of Dr. Seaman A. Knopp, originator of Extension teaching methods, and Walter C. Porter, pioneer farm demonstrator."

The other award was made to Congressman Olin E. Teague on the Texas A&M University campus earlier this week.

Agricultural Extension work was born sixty-one years ago on the Walter Porter farm near Terrell, Texas. The first cooperative farm demonstration ever was conducted on this farm under the direction of Dr. Knopp. With the success of this first demonstration proven, the U. S. Department of Agriculture was quick to adopt methods used on the Porter farm.

Called a highly selective award by Extension Director John E. Hutchison, the award was established this year. Hereafter the award shall be made only when an outstanding nominee is eligible to receive it and not necessarily on a regular basis. Hutchison said. Purpose of the award, he said, is to provide recognition to individuals who have made truly significant contributions to Texas agriculture and family living through support of informal educational programs for both adults and youth.

Mahon, chairman of the House

Appropriations Committee, has been a vital force behind the growth of both Texas and the U. S. agriculture. He was elected in 1934 to the 74th Congress and has been reelected to each succeeding Congress.

Born in 1900 near Haynesville, Louisiana, Mahon was raised on a farm and attended a rural school. He was graduated from Simmons University, Abilene, in 1920 and took his law degree at the University of Texas in 1925 and attended the University of Minnesota in 1925 also. He is the holder of three honorary degrees.

Married to Helen Stevenson of Lorraine in 1923, Mahon began his political career as elected county attorney for Mitchell county in 1926. He was appointed district attorney for the thirty second judicial district in 1927. He was elected district attorney in 1928, 1930, and 1932.

In 1963, Mahon received the American Political Science Association Congressional Dis-

tinguished Service Award. He was appointed to the chairmanship of the House Appropriations Committee last spring by President Johnson. For 17 years, he has headed the subcommittee handling money appropriations for the military services and was a member of it long before then.

Mahon's award was presented this morning at a coffee sponsored by the Plains Cotton Growers' Association.

Several cooperative marketing association leaders including Dan Davis of Lubbock, manager of the Plains Cotton Cooperative Assn.; David Gault of Austin, manager of the Mid-Tex Milk Producers Assn.; and Bob Cooper of Marlin, manager of the Tex Best Turkey Marketing Coop will discuss the roles of their cooperatives in narrowing the farm consumer price gap. Charles Baker of College Station, economist with Agricultural Extension Service will moderate a panel composed of the farm cooperative leaders.
 George Bickel, assistant to the President of Rocky Mountain Farmers Union, will address the Texas Farmers Union convention on the "Affect of Vertical Integration in Livestock Feeding on Producer Prices." Bickel, economist and researcher, was recently employed by market and producer groups in Colorado to document a complete study on the possibility of market manipulation by packer and chainstore owned feeding operations in the Denver, Colorado area.
 National Farmers Union President, James G. Patton, of Denver, Colorado will speak at the annual convention banquet session on Friday night. Patton who is considered "dean" of national farm organization leaders because of his long service at the head of Farmers Union, is an internationally famous farm leader and is past president of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers.
 Senator Ralph Yarborough will address the convention at the morning session on Saturday, and other speakers who will appear at the Texas Farmers Union convention will be National Farmers Union Secretary Tony T. Dechant of Denver, Colorado, Congressman Jake Pickel of Austin, President Hank Brown of the Texas AFL-CIO, and Ray Novak of Denver Colorado, manager of National Farmers Union Insurance, David Gault and Bob Barton,

and two lay members from each district, and the chairman of the TFB Young People's Committee, H. L. King of Brownfield, District 2 director, is vice chairman, and Glen Metrauer of Chireno, District 9 director is secretary.
 Local committee member attending will be Luke McGuire, Springlake.
 Selection of a new Texas Farm Bureau queen will be one of the highlights of the annual convention. The finals of the statewide queen contest will be held on the evening of November 9, in the Music Hall Thirteen winsome farm and ranch girls will be representing their respective districts in the final elimination. 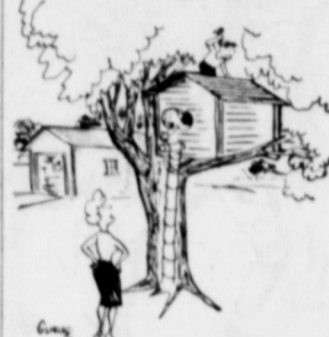

Wolverines Overpower Hale Center 51-20

The Springlake Wolverines took a giant stride toward the District Championship Friday night, downing Hale Center 51-20. Action started fast and furious with Doug Messer connecting on a pass to Thomas Gregory on the third play of the first quarter to send Thomas 87 yards to a Wolverine touchdown. Jerry Don Sanders' kick was good and Springlake took an early lead 7-0. Moments later Messer connected on another pass to Gregory which was good for 17 yards and a touchdown, but was called back on an offside penalty.

Hale Center held on downs and took over but was forced to punt late in the first quarter. Springlake moved the ball to the 30 yard line, and Jerry Don

tried his luck at a field goal, and sent it through the uprights from 38 yards out, putting the Wolverines out in front 10-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, Buddy Duke scored from the 3 yard line for Hale Center and a pass to Larry Weild was good for two points and the Owls trailed 10-8.

The Wolverines were not to be denied and came right back to march down the field with Jerry Don Sanders going over from the 6 yard line. Sander's kick was blocked, and the Wolverines led 16-8.

The Owls were unable to move the ball, and punted out of bounds on the 45 yard line. With time running out, Messer politely tossed another pass to Thomas

Gregory who covered the distance for a touchdown and the clock ran out during the play. Sanders kicked another extra point and at halftime the Wolverines led 23-8.

A fired up Hale Center crew came back after the halftime ceremony, and marched down the field as though they owned it, and scored on a 31 yard pass from Ronnie Sherrod to Wayne Ballard, a pass for the extra point failed.

Not to be outdone, on the kickoff, Jerry Don Sanders took the ball, but on a reverse play handed off to Thomas Gregory who went up the east side of the field for 90 yards and a Wolverine touchdown. Gregory was tired, but not too tired to run the ball over right tackle for 2 ex-

tra points.

After the kickoff to Hale Center, Ronnie Sherrod fumbled on the 20 yard line, and the ball was recovered by Joe Triana, a defensive guard for Springlake. On the third down Jerry Don Sanders broke to the right side and went over from 13 yards out, Sanders' kick was blocked, and at the end of the third quarter, Springlake led 37-14.

Early in the fourth quarter, Doug Messer hit Floyd Henderson on a perfect pass, and Floyd covered the remaining 31 yards with little difficulty, to start the Wolverines rolling once more. Sanders' kick was good this time, and the Wolverines held a 44-14 lead.

After the kickoff to Hale Center, the Owls tried in vain to get things rolling, on an attempted pass, Thomas Gregory took the ball out of the intended receivers hands and galloped 25 yards for another Wolverine touchdown. Sanders' kick, again was good.

The Owls came fighting back late in the fourth quarter scoring on a 3 yard run by Leroy Taylor. The attempted pass for the extra point was blocked, and moments later the Wolverines ran the clock out and took an important 51-20 decision from Hale Center to keep the Springlake squad tied with Farwell in District 3A competition.

This week the Wolverines will journey to Silverton, and next week they will host Farwell in the anticipated title showdown at Wolverine Stadium on Friday, November 13.

Number 1 (Beginning Sept. 15)	303,000 acres (Originally estimated 240,000 acres. Total includes Skip-row)	First application was hampered by rain, wind, etc. Migrating weevils caused increase in size of control zone. Extremely high adult and unemerged weevil populations encountered.
Number 2 (Beginning about October 4)	281,000 acres (Reduction due to acreage desiccated or harvested)	Field checks indicated effective kill of adult weevils but continuing emergence kept new weevil population up. Additional planes brought in to speed up sprayings.
Number 3 (Beginning about October 13)	230,000 acres (Continuing harvest and desiccation)	Field examination showed great reduction in number of adult weevils, with low occurrence of weevils in diapause stage. Also fewer unemerged weevils.
Number 4 (Beginning about October 21)	190,000 acres	Few unemerged and very young weevils left. Practically no weevils in diapause stage.

CONCLUSION: Remaining unemerged and young adult weevils will be kept from going into hibernation either by frost or a fifth spraying. Entomologists agree that hibernating weevils will have been reduced by more than 90 percent by end of this year's program.

Financial Arrangements

- Compresses to collect 50¢ per bale, and remit to a special boll weevil control fund in bank — no connection with P.C.G. regular funds.
- While compresses collect on all cotton, the contribution is voluntary for individual farmers who may request and receive refund.
- All funds are under direction of a Certified Public Accountant firm.
- Monthly financial reports by U.S.D.A. and Boll Weevil Steering Committee will be made — Complete audit will be published at the end of season.
- Any unexpended Steering Committee funds will be placed in interest bearing account for continuation of Boll Weevil Program next season. Unexpended U.S.D.A. funds must return to Treasury, as all appropriations are on annual basis only.
