### City To Enforce Ordinance Prohibiting Fireworks Within The City Limits

Members of the City Commission, meeting in their regular monthly session Monday night, voted to more strictly enforce City Ordinance No. 16, approved Nov. 6, 1950, which prohibits the selling or shooting of fireworks within the City limits. The group decided to publish the warning in the Newspaper, so that citizens would be aware of the rigid enforcement.

Section I and Section IV of the Ordinance reads as follows:

#### ORDINANCE NO. 16

SECTION I  
It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation or any employee, agent or representative of any person, firm or corporation to light, throw, toss, cast, fire or explode any sparkler, squib, rocket, cracker, fire cracker, torpedo, grenade, gun revolver, pistol, cartridge or any other explosive or combustible material of any kind within the corporate limits of the City of Earth, Texas.

SECTION IV  
Any person who shall violate this ordinance or any part of same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00, and each separate sale, giving away, or disposition of any such fireworks or explosives, and each day that any

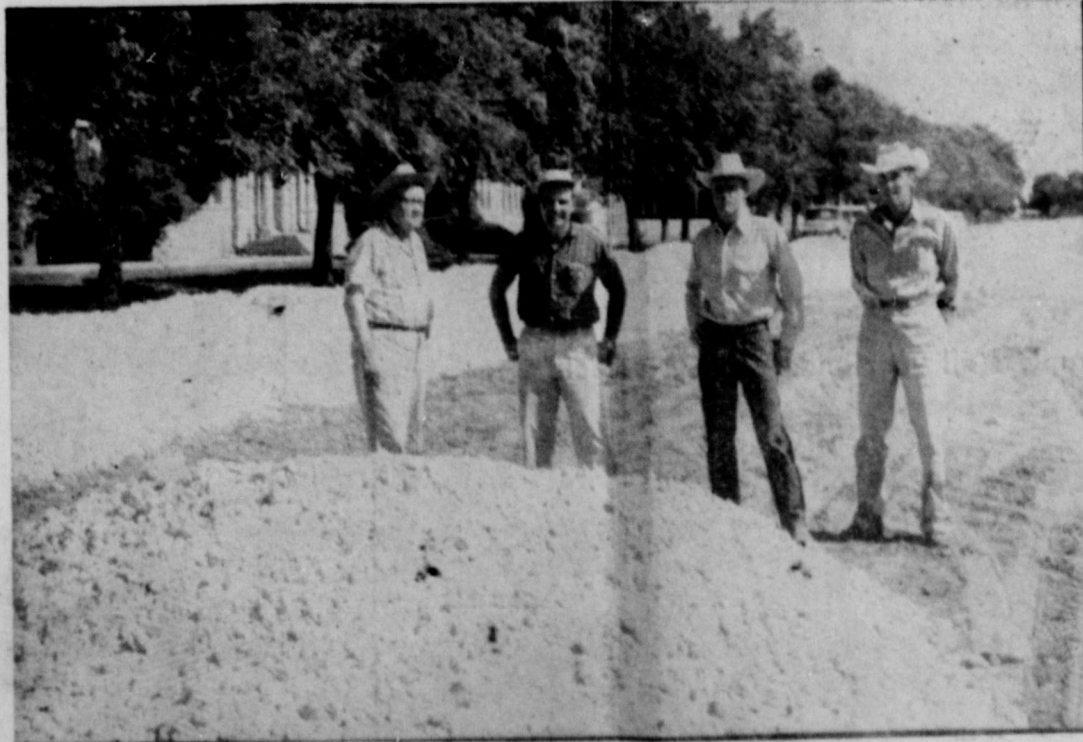

## Records List No Traffic Fatalities In Loving County In Twenty One Years

The battle against death on the highway is being waged vigorously in every Texas county except one. That one is Loving County in far West Texas, which has been immune to traffic fatalities for at least the past 21 years.

Governor Price Daniel quotes Department of Public Safety records as showing that traffic has never taken the life of a single person in Loving County since the DPS began compiling the annual death list in 1937.

Loving, the newest and last county to be organized in Texas, came into legal being in 1931. Its 1957 population was listed at

647, its automobile and truck registration totaled 195, and those cars traveled over 25 miles of state highways and an unlisted county road mileage. Menton, county seat and only city in the county, is located on Farm Road 302.

No other county in Texas even approaches the deathless record established by Loving County drivers, although nine other counties also reported no traffic deaths in 1957. They were Burleson, Culberson, Hartley, Jim Hogg, Mason, McMullen, Rains, Roberts and Zapata. Two of these counties, Burleson, of which Caldwell is the county seat, and Culberson, where

the county seat is Van Horn, turned in perfect improvement records from 1956 to 1957. Eight persons died in Burleson County in 1956, and 11 in Culberson County. These two counties alone accounted for 19 fewer deaths, or more than 26 percent of the motorist reduction for the entire State from 1956, with its record-breaking toll of 2611, to 1957, whose total was 2539.

Another 26 counties in Texas reported only one death each in 1957, according to the annual report of the DPS Statistical Division. They included Blanco, Borden, Brooks, Camp, Delta, Frio, Hall, Hardeman, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Knox, Lipscomb, Menard, Mills, Motley, Ochiltree, Real, Runnels, San Augustine, Sherman, Somervell, Sutton, Terrell, Throckmorton and Upton. In 1946, 31 counties had only one death.

Four of the ten counties reporting no motorist deaths in 1957 also had no such deaths in 1946, when the post-war highway death list began climbing again. These were Loving, McMullen, Roberts and Zapata Counties.

The pattern of lives saved in 1957 is continuing into 1958, the Governor reported. Through the close of the 19th week of the year, 81 more Texans were still alive than at the same time last year. Total motorist deaths through this week were estimated by the DPS, at 657, as compared with 738 at the same date in 1957.

This improvement continues in spite of the DPS estimate that Texans are increasing their automobile mileage by one per cent over last year. The death list after 19 weeks was 11 per cent smaller than last year at the same time.
