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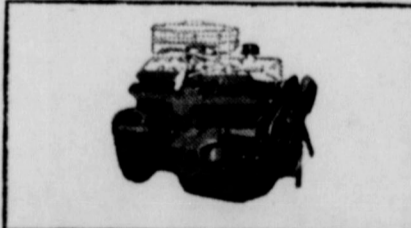

Editorials . . .

WAS LENIN RIGHT?

Reports from Washington have lately given the country an indication of how seriously the Administration views the fiscal problem. That problem, it is clear, is second in the President's mind only to the problem of avoiding a third world war.

And the President and his advisors are not alone in this. All manner of qualified people, in and out of the government, are convinced that unless government spending can be curbed, the budget balanced, and inflation checked, we may be heading for a disaster that could destroy us as a nation, and leave the free world, which depends so largely on American strength for survival, wide open to communism. The Kremlin, would win the ultimate victory without firing a shot.

This, in fact, is what Lenin, architect of Soviet communism, expected. Long ago, he wrote that capitalism would destroy itself from within. What government does to the people's money and savings will determine whether he was right or wrong.

ADVICE TO REA CO - OPS -

As the law now stands, the Rural Electrification Administration lends government money to REA co-ops at two per cent interest. But the government must pay twice that amount of interest on the money it borrows through the sale of bonds and Treasury notes. This simply means that REA co-ops are paying only about half of the true cost of the funds they use, and the taxpayers at large are ponying up the other half.

It has been proposed that the interest rates charged the co-ops be increased to the point where they would pay their own way. But numbers of REA spokesmen have howled to high heaven at this, protesting that it would be ruinous. In other words, they want to get their funds on a taxpayer - subsidized basis.

So, something said by David Hamil, the Rural Electrification Administration Administrator, is of high importance now. Speaking to regional meetings of REA groups, he made this forthright statement: "As long as the interest rate is not a more reasonable interest rate would ruin you, it will be difficult to convince the American people that rural electrification warrants their continued support . . . There is no long-term program in the Federal Government today which offers borrowers such a low interest rate as does the Rural Electrification Administration."

When an REA co-op can't or won't stand on its own feet, even in the matter of a fair and proper interest rate, it admits its inability to compete with other electric companies.

A person does not have to be a former teacher or college graduate to render their service for this cause. Anyone interested in substitute teaching for a day may phone 3459.

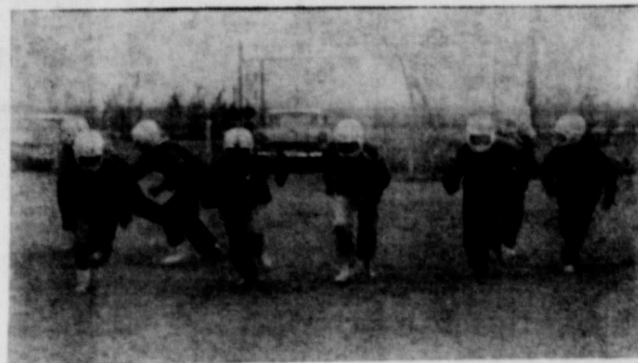

This was not a grade placing or promotion test set but one just to let us know how our pupils at that time stood with the stand-

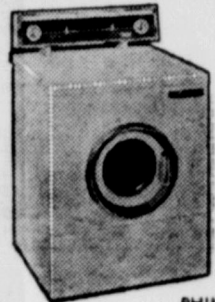

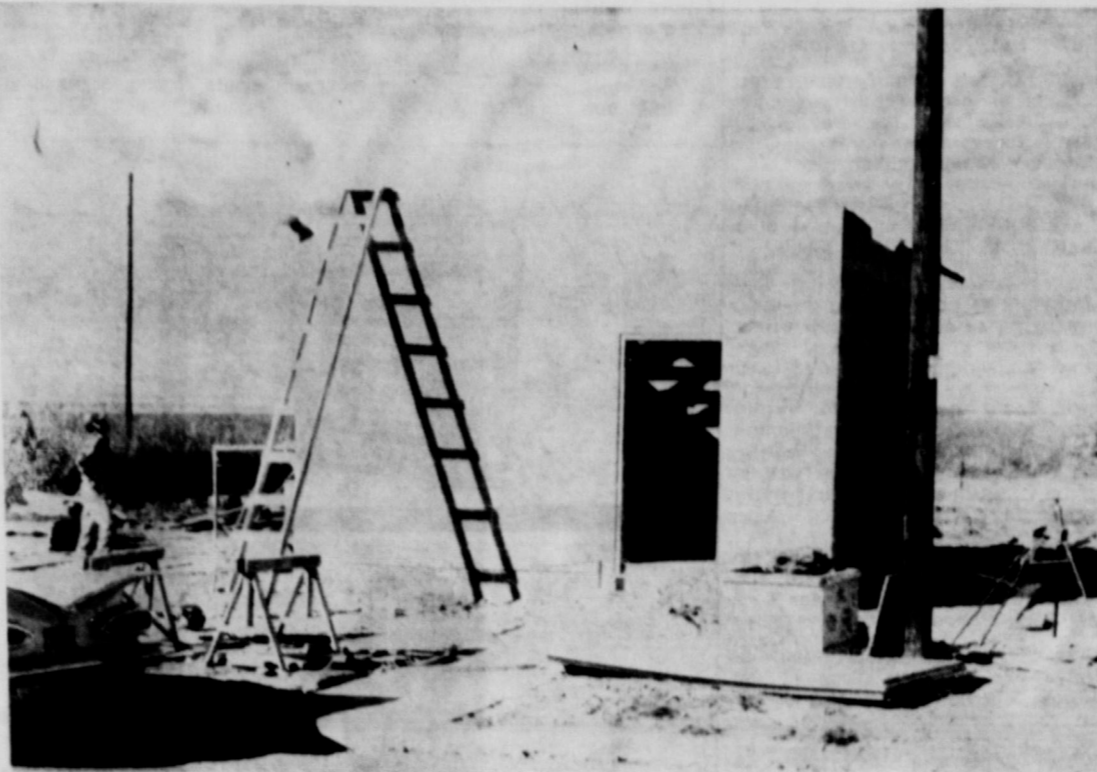

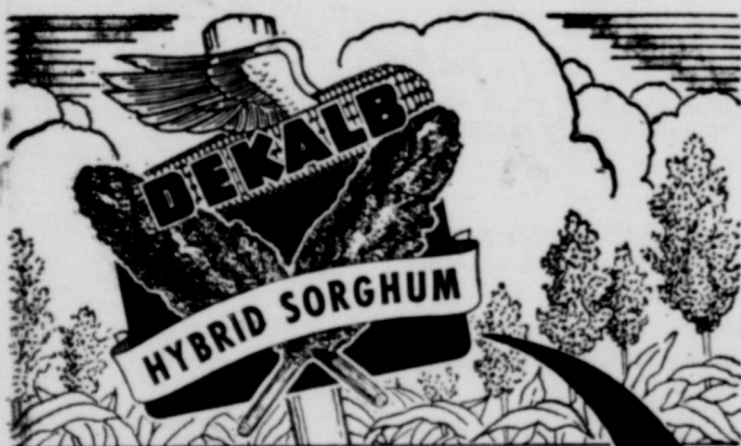
