Earth Residents Injured in Accident Near Silverton

Mrs. J. O. Vaughn is reported to be slightly improved from serious injuries she suffered when the car in which she and Mr. Vaughn were riding was in a collision with a pickup Wednesday, July 25 on Highway 256 about 25 miles northeast of Silverton.

Mrs. Vaughn suffered shock, fractured forearms, fractured lower leg, fractured ribs and lacerations on chest and right side of face.

The accident occurred when the driver of the pickup attempted to turn off the highway into a cattle trail road in front of the oncoming Vaughn car.

Mr. Vaughn suffered shock and lacerations of both forearms, but the driver of the pickup, identified as F. Payne of Quitaque, was not injured.

Due to light travel on this highway, about one and half hours passed before help arrived in the form of a Texas Highway Dept. crew, who radioed for an ambulance. Mrs. Vaughn meanwhile had lost a lot of blood, so upon arrival at the Plainview Clinic, was given blood transfusions.

Farm Facts

In 1960, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, most animals accounted for 31.1% of the nation's agricultural receipts, and dairy products for 13.9%.

These, together with poultry and eggs (9.7%) and miscellaneous "livestock and products," made up 55.7% of the total cash receipts for agriculture. Crops accounted for the remaining 44.3%.

Cattle and calves brought in \$7,396 million of the \$18,938 million for "livestock and products" and accounted for 21.7% of the total cash receipts.

Other "livestock and products," their percentage of the total, and their value included: milk and butterfat, 13.9 and \$4,732 million; hogs, 8.4 and \$2,857 million; eggs, 9.7 and \$1,728 million; broilers, 3.0 and \$1,015 million; turkeys, 1.1 and \$377 million; sheep and lambs, 1.0 and \$329 million; wool, 4 and \$111 million.

The miscellaneous livestock category accounted for 1% of

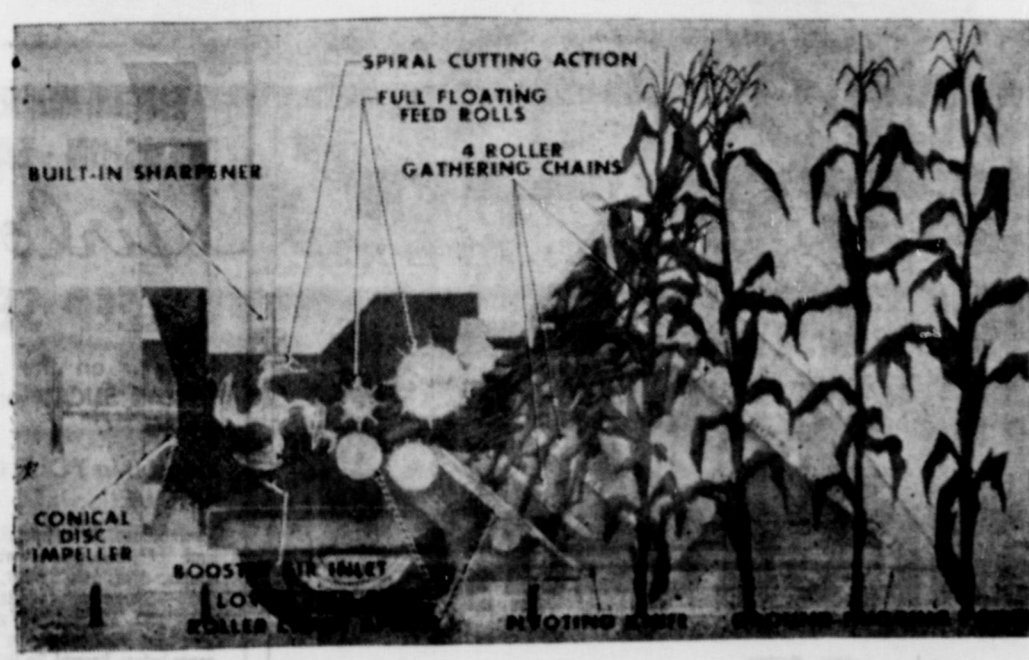

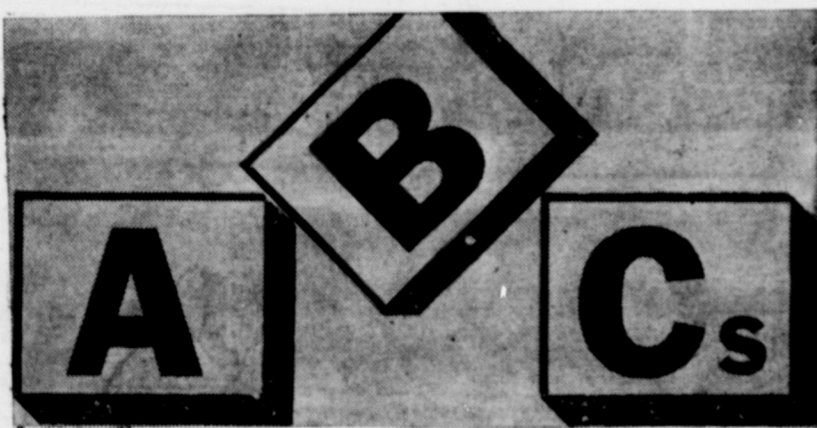

Tax On Wages Farmers' Responsibility

College Station — Farm and ranch operators who hire agricultural workers must deposit Social Security tax funds, when such tax amounts to \$100, reminds C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist.

The employer-employee tax rate in 1962 is 6 1/2 percent, an increase over the 6 percent levy of last year. Half of this amount, or three and one eighth percent can be deducted from the wages paid to farm employees.

Either of two tests apply, as previously to determine those wages subject to the tax. The first test is \$150 in wages paid to an individual in a calendar year. The second test is having hired the

same employee 20 days on a time basis, regardless of the amount of wages paid. So, when either of these situations apply, the tax is applicable and must be reported for the workers involved.

Federal regulations require that tax on agricultural labor be paid to the government whenever the amount due equals \$100. Bates explains. In other words, when a farm employer has paid out \$1600 in eligible wages he should deposit the Social Security tax due on that amount in any commercial bank qualified as a depository for federal taxes. The money is sent by the bank to the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas and a receipt showing amount paid is returned to the employer.

Farm employers then attach these receipts to their 1962 income tax return as evidence of payment of part of this year's tax obligation.

Bates urges farmers and ranchmen to pay their taxes on hired labor when it is due and avoid the

risk of paying a penalty. Good business records can be very helpful in keeping up with wages paid and taxes due, he concludes.

August School For Cotton Gin Operators Set In Lubbock

College Station — The one-day school for operators of cotton gins, scheduled for August 21 in Lubbock, is a part of the continuing industry-wide effort to improve the quality of American cotton. Specifically, the Lubbock school is designed to give cotton gin operators practical information to aid them in the ginning of the highest quality cotton consistent with efficient machinery operation, says B. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist.

Sponsors of the school are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Cotton Ginners' Association, Continental Gin Company, The Murray and John E. Mitchell Companies, Lammus Cotton Gin Company, Hardwick - Eiter

Company and Moss-Gordin Company.

Five schools will be held simultaneously on August 21 with each of the cooperating companies providing meeting rooms for their students, Reeves said. Participants will receive instructions on the operation, maintenance and repair of each piece of machinery used in the modern cotton gin, including stands, dryers, cleaners, bur-machines, extractor - feeders, lint cleaners, and other auxiliary equipment. Experienced factory engineers will serve as instructors, the specialist added.

There will be no enrollment fee but prospective students are asked to send either a letter or an advance registration to the company in charge of the school they expect to attend. The registration

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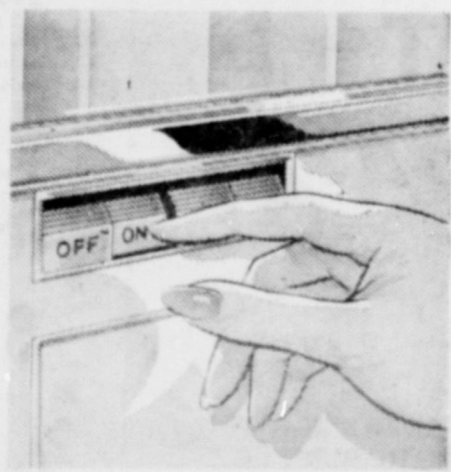
