that it be printed. Almost 5 years ago our daughter had a small cyst removed from her wrist, the routine examination on this cyst showed it to be a very rare type cancer that affects young people. She was 17 years old at the time. Our family doctor advised us to go to M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston be cause of the rarity of this cancer and the fact that there they are continually doing research on all types of cancer. We found that there was a new treatment available for her and that she was the 19th person to Society. More school children

In 1972 about 1 million people will be under medical care for cancer, 650,000 cases will be diagnosed for the first time. Of every 6 deaths in the U.S. from all causes, 1 will be from cancer.

"Of every six people who get cancer today, 2 will be saved and 4 will die. Numbers 1 and 2 will be saved, number 3 will die, but might have been saved had proper treatment been received in time. Number 4,5 and 6 will die of cancers which cannot yet be controlled. ONLY RESEARCH CAN SAVE THESE. PATIENTS. In other words, about 1 of those who get cancer should and could be saved by early diagnosis and proper treatment. Thus, the immedtate goal of cancer control in this county is the annual saving of 325,000 lives, or 1 those who develop cancer each year. This is a direct quote from Am-
