## JoAnn Coker Wins Three Firsts

JoAnn Coker did an outstanding job of representing S-E high school Saturday at the annual Friona Squaw Relays when she placed first in three events.

Coker won first place in the 60 yard dash with a time of 7.1, first in the 100 yard dash with a time of 11.1, and first in the 220 yard dash with a time of 26.2. She also placed

second in the triple broad jump and sixth in the broad jump with a jump of more than 15 feet.

## Cancer Society Plans Crusade

Plans were being made for organizing a cancer crusade during the months of March and April when the Lamb Co. Cancer Society met at Littlefield this week.

Mrs. C. L. Houchin, Mrs. M. E. Kelley, and Mrs. Thurman Lewis, all of Earth were present at the meeting where a representative from Lubbock showed a film concerning cancer.

The following personal letter was submitted to the group and the organization has requested that it be printed.

Almost 5 years ago our daughter had a small cyst removed from her wrist, the routine examination on this cyst showed it to be a very rare type cancer that affects young people. She was 17 years old at the time. Our family doctor advised us to go to M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston because of the rarity of this cancer and the fact that there they are continually doing research on all types of cancer. We found that there was a new treatment available for her and that she was the 19th person to

receive this type treatment. It was basically cobalt treatment, but handled in a special way to avoid harm to the healthy cells. We were informed many times during the 8 weeks that we were there of the importance of the fact that she had received treatment so soon after the cyst appeared, the people there place great importance on starting treatment as soon as possible. Today we feel very fortunate that she is happily married and going about her life in a normal manner. She does report to M. D. Anderson Hospital and her special doctor periodically for checkups and will continue to do so for the rest of her life.

The funds to support the research done there comes from the government and the donations that everyone of us gives to the American Cancer Society. I subscribe to a magazine for insurance men called "Life Association News". Let me give you a few statistics from their 1972 cancer report furnished by the American Cancer Society. More school children

will die of cancer this year than from any other disease, cancer will kill over 4000 youngsters under 15 this year. In 1972 about 1 million people will be under medical care for cancer. 650,000 cases will be diagnosed for the first time. Of every 6 deaths in the U.S. from all causes, 1 will be from cancer.

"Of every six people who get cancer today, 2 will be saved and 4 will die. Numbers 1 and 2 will be saved, number 3 will die, but might have been saved had proper treatment been received in time. Number 4, 5 and 6 will die of cancers which cannot yet be controlled. ONLY RESEARCH CAN SAVE THESE PATIENTS. In other words, about 1/3 of those who get cancer should and could be saved by early diagnosis and proper treatment. Thus, the immediate goal of cancer control in this county is the annual saving of 325,000 lives, or 1/3 those who develop cancer each year." This is a direct quote from Am-

Guest speaker for the evening was Craig Wallace of Littlefield. Wallace delivered an extremely interesting talk concerning learning disabilities in all children and how they might be overcome. He stated that nearly all children have some type of learning disability such as poor reading readiness or poor motor control which results in poor handwriting abilities. These children generally have average or above average intelligence and show very subtle signs of having such handicaps especially until they reach the third grade. Such handicaps result many times in the child having emotional conflicts which frustrate the child and lower his self-confidence. Therefore he will want to avoid his lack of learning skills by avoiding reading, writing and so forth.

Wallace stated that there are many new programs being designed within our public school system to aid the very large number of students who do have some type of learning disability and that it is estimated by 1975 nearly 35 to 40% of all school children will be participating in at least one of the new programs. At the present time nearly 700,000 students drop out of school annually because they suffer a learning disability that is not understood by persons around them.

Mrs. Larry Hausmann offered her sincere thanks to the many mothers who baked cakes to present to the teachers and other school administration personnel during Public School Week. She said that the staff at school really appreciated the

effort of gratitude from the parents of the school children.

Mrs. Larry Hausmann will attend the district P.T.A. spring conference in Lubbock April 21, as president of the local P.T.A. and Mrs. Dick Pierce will attend as a voting delegate. Mrs. Ray Joe Riley will attend as president of the Lamb-Bailey Bi-County P.T.A. Council. All other P.T.A. members are not only invited but urged to attend the conference where many new and interesting ideas will be presented.

Everyone who attended the meeting wrote a personal letter to the chairman of the state nominating committee for state P.T.A. officers requesting that Mrs. Marvin Armstrong of Lubbock be considered for the office of president.

Mrs. Hausmann expressed her desire to thank each of her fellow officers in the past year for the help they had given her. She also urged everyone to vote in the upcoming city and school elections and to know what the candidates stand for. Refreshments of cookies and coffee were served following the meeting.

# To Contract Crop or Not To That is the Question

The choice of how to market a cotton crop is simply one decision in the overall management of a farming enterprise, but it is a darkly mysterious area for many producers.

"Many farmers contracted the crop last year and then saw the cash price exceed their contract price by six cents or more," says Marvin Sartin, Extension area economist at Lubbock.

Contracting is gaining acceptance in the cotton industry, with a large part of the 1972 Lower Rio Grande Valley crop already under agreement. Sartin cautions High Plains producers to base their decision about marketing a crop on their management and financial position.

"Your choice of markets—forward contracting, hedging or the cash market—is not totally unlike your choice of cottonseed or planting pattern," he says. Some farmers will use the same variety of planting pattern every year because of its relatively stable, although not spectacular, yields. Other farmers will base these decisions each year on current economic and climatic factors.

While a forward contract may seem risky, it is actually the method which will minimize risk the most; because once the contract is signed, the farmer knows the price he will receive for his crop. The cash market can be profitable or disastrous, depending on the situation at harvest time.

The economist says a farmer should decide on his method of marketing by considering factors such as his preconceived opinions, financial status and even goals and objectives in life.

Opinions enter the picture because of a farmer's past experience or the experiences of his neighbors with a certain type of marketing agreement. The influences of personality and emotion on the decision of which marketing path to take cannot be separated when a person's livelihood depends on the profitability of the cotton crop.

The financial position of the farm business is also a very important consideration. A farmer should look at his net worth position and determine if it is secure or if it is based primarily on inflated land values.

"Certainly, an important factor is the size of the operating or short-term debt," Sartin says. The effect of contracting for a guaranteed price on the financial status of a farm business should be compared with the potentially disastrous effects of a price dive on the cash market.

"Contracting is an individual management decision which must be faced by each cotton producer and evaluated relative to his own situation," the economist concludes.

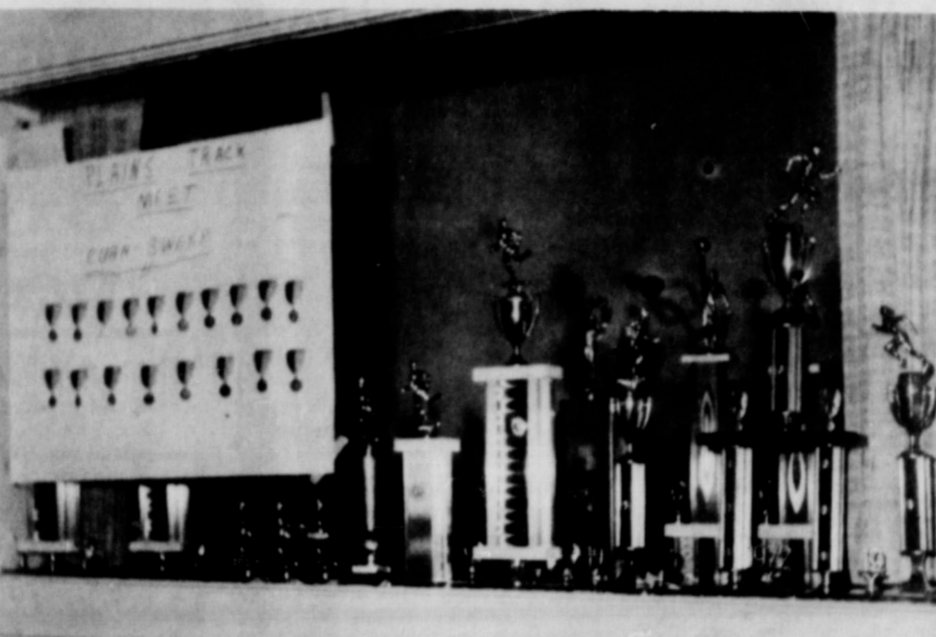
