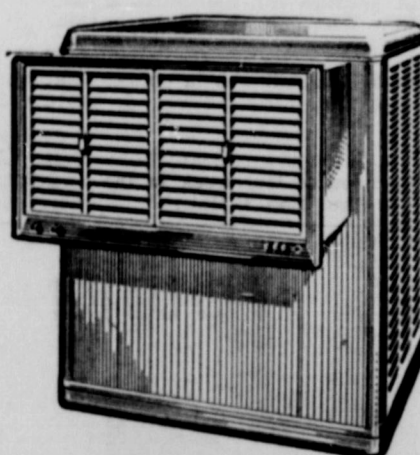
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Local Piano Pupils, Candidates For Membership In N. F. S. M.

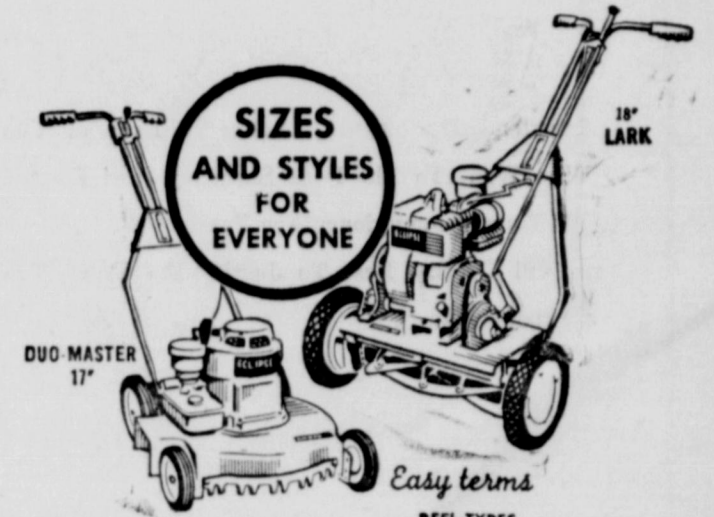

What Does The Bible Say About CONFUSION AND PEACE?

A man was walking along the highway in the cool of the evening and saw a big drove of hogs, with ears pricked up, running first one way and then another, and seeming to be terribly confused. He could not understand what was the trouble with them. Presently he came to a farmhouse and stopped to inquire of an old man who was sitting on the porch.

"Mister, are those your hogs up there in the wood pasture?"

"Yes, those are my hogs," replied the man.

"Well, there is something wrong with those hogs—they are running first one way and then another, with their heads and ears up."

"Oh, I'll tell you what is the matter," he said. "You see, it is about feeding time. Before I lost my voice, I would take a basket of corn up there and give a call or two and they would rush in to me, but since I've lost my voice, I just take a machine and knock on a tree, and when they hear me, they come rushing to eat. But for the last week or two the woodpeckers have been getting on a dry limb, and when the hogs hear them, they think it is my knock."

There is a moral to that story. People today are running in a different direction—they are hearing strange noises and they are confused. There are so many voices saying "This is the way" that the average person has just about forgotten the familiar ring in the Master's voice.

Confusion is nothing worse than confusion—it is bad enough in the community, in politics, in the home, but it is far worse when it enters into the field of religion. Jesus taught, "A house divided against itself cannot stand" (Matt. 12:25). He even said that if Satan be divided against himself, he will fall. If division will rob the devil of his power, what do you think it will do to the religious world? The heathen said to the mission-

ary, "Go home, get together with others in your own land, then come back and convert me." It is a fitting rebuke. It is one that the world justly deserves.

We are taught that "God is not the author of confusion, but of peace" (1 Cor. 14:33). Where you find confusion you cannot find God. But all peace is not peace. Some prophets of old cried, "Peace, Peace," but the Lord reminded them that there was no peace (Jer. 6:14). We cannot find religious peace in the creeds, and theories of men, Councils, Conferences, Conventions, and Synods cannot give peace to the troubled hearts of weary men. The world through its wisdom, learning, and philosophy has never been able to find God. In fact, God has chosen the foolish things of this world to confound the wise (1 Cor. 1:27). Peace can come only by hearing and obeying His will.

There can be no peace apart from gospel obedience. Good deeds are as "filthy rags" in the sight of the Lord when they stand against the righteousness of His will. Man cannot do enough good works to save himself, but when he works righteousness (Acts 10:34), he is not working his own work. He is working the works of God. He obeys the truth he is set free from sin, and becomes a servant of righteousness (Rom. 6:16, 17).

He is then added unto the Lord's Church (Acts 2:47) where there is peace (Eph. 2:15). He is now in position to follow the Master. He will not be led astray by every wind of doctrine that rocks overboard. He will put his trust in the Lord, follow him and no other, obey him and no other, accept the revealed will of God which is the word of God, and follow after things which make for peace that passeth all understanding (Rom. 14:23; Phil. 4:6-7).

Yes we can have peace in the religious world. But it must come through the will of God, not the will of man. Let us hear His voice and follow Him, for He said: "He that followeth me shall not walk in darkness" (John 12:25).

State Auto Drivers
Condemn Insurance
Rate Law

Austin — A majority of Texas automobile drivers are against Texas' uniform insurance rate law and favor adoption of a competitive rate system in this state, an independent poll of the public pulse by Helden Associates shows.

The public opinion survey of Texas auto drivers in the State shows that 51 per cent of the drivers contacted favor a competitive rate system, such as used in most other states, while only 33 per cent are satisfied with the present uniform rate law. Sixteen per cent are undecided.

On another question the public is about evenly divided on whether it was satisfied with the mandatory merit rating plan that went into effect this year. Forty-two per cent said they were dissatisfied with the plan, and 43 per cent said they were satisfied. The rest were undecided.

This result was contrary to the claims of proponents of mandatory merit rating who have said the only opposition to the mandatory plan was coming from unsafe drivers who were penalized by higher insurance rates.

Helden interpreted the response on this point in this way: "It is noteworthy that opinion tends to lean in favor of a changeover to competitive rates even among people who express general satisfaction with the current merit rating plan . . ."

The poll further showed that nine out of ten automobile drivers in Texas were aware of merit rating under which drivers with good records pay less for their auto insurance and drivers with poor records pay more.

Only 24 per cent of the Texans surveyed who know about merit rating were aware that Texas is the only state that does not allow insurance companies selling automobile insurance to compete on prices or rates.

Drivers favor competitive rates by a bigger majority than non-drivers. The poll also showed that the more education a person had the stronger he was for the adoption of a competitive rate system.

The public opinion survey was conducted at the request of the National Association of Independent Insurers.

"This should prove once and for all that Texas automobile insurance buyers are overwhelming-

More Pools To Be In Operation For Swimmers This Year

They're some great times ahead for Texas' swimming enthusiasts. They've got 13,000 pools to choose from, and the season is right at hand.

And things stand to break even better for the wet set in days to come. According to the National Swimming Pool Institute, Texas will have some 5,000 pools in 1970, almost quadruple the present number.

But play for plungers means work for someone else, namely State Health Department engineers and local health department sanitarians who sponsor training courses for pool managers and personnel from border to border.

The Department began its voluntary program of training operators in 1956. Day-long courses are held at various points throughout the State, and cover such diverse subjects as chlorination, filtration and sanitation.

So far 1,216 pool operators have been certified by the Department through the medium of short schools. Others will be added to the certified list by summer's end.

It's all in the interest of healthful recreation.

Four Texas cities with suitable meat inspection ordinances and inspection programs meeting State specifications have qualified under the new joint municipal-State cooperative meat inspection program.

Several other cities have their acceptance pending. Thirty-nine meat and meat product processing establishments have been surveyed under the new procedure.

Cities seeking qualification are surveyed by inspectors from the Veterinary Public Health Division of the State Health Department for conformance to State specifications and regulations concerning meat product inspection approved by the State Board of Health.

Various establishments are also inspected for compliance. Meeting the requirements permits the establishment to affix the State approved meat label to their products.

The cooperative program became effective March 1, 1960.

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Sixteen varieties of corn were planted on April 21 in the 1960 corn variety test at the High Plains Research Foundation, Dr. E. H. Collister, chief agronomist, stated. Both white and yellow selections were included in the test.

This is the fourth year that corn variety tests have been conducted at the Halfway Research Farm. Each year the number of varieties has been reduced through the elimination of those found to be unsuitable for the area. As many as 147 different varieties have been tested in one year.

The date of planting experiment on corn is also being continued. Early, mid-season, and late maturing varieties include two yellow and one white. In previous tests on both white and yellow corn, the late April and early May plantings resulted in higher yields than corn planted at later dates. Mid-September harvest of the early planted corn has resulted in decreasing the loss from lodging (falling down) caused by the ravages of the Southwestern corn borer. Through these methods, the corn yields have been higher and labor cost lower than in later planted corn. These same varieties will be planted at three later dates to continue the study.

Program For Ground Water Recharge Told By Chief Hydrologist

The rapidly increasing uses of ground water for all municipal and industrial purposes and for large scale irrigation, together with the realization that the ground-water supply is being depleted, have emphasized the need for artificially recharging the underground reservoir in the High Plains of Texas. Although the practice of artificial recharge has become neither widespread nor generally accepted, significant progress has been made in the technique of salvaging muddy plpa-lake water which heretofore was lost through evaporation.

Greatest progress in artificial recharge has occurred since 1950 through use of the multi-purpose well, which consists of a large capacity production well constructed near a wet - weather lake to permit gravity flow of surface water through a pipeline into the well.

The suspended solids in the lake water tend to clog the aquifer. Although some of the mud can be dislodged and removed by periodic backwashing and pumping, it seems apparent that success of this method depends on clarification of the lake water before recharging. Recent experiments indicate that flocculation of the solids with new chemicals is economically practicable.
