The students of the horse. Two riders have to be on horse coming across the finish line to win. If one falls off, they must start over.

7. Boy Steer Saddling: Team of 4 boys. One steer will be turned out for each team. Each team must furnish own saddle. Team saddles steer and one rides steer across line.

8. Calf tying: 2 boys and 2 girls per team. One team per class. Five calves will be turned out into arena, one with a ribbon on it's tail. Each team must rope and tie one calf; first team to rope ribbon calf wins. Must rope and tie calf #1 before roping and tying calf with ribbon.

Students participating must have a signed release form from their parents. Admission fee: \$1.50 for adults, \$1.00 students and 75 cents for pre-school children.

### Discription of Events

1. On-foot goat tying: (Girls), will run to goat and tie any three legs. Time stops as soon as legs are tied.
2. On-horse goat tying: will ride horse to goat, jump off and tie goat, any three legs. Time stops when legs are tied.
3. Goat dressing: (Girls and Women), one goat in arena for each team of three girls. Catch goat which will have a rope on it. Put panties on hind legs and pull goat to circle.
4. Chute dogging: steer will be in chute where boys will take hold of it. Time starts when chute opens and stops when all four of steer's feet are off the ground.
5. Greased pig race: two boys and girls make a team. Two pigs will be turned out into arena. The team that catches the pig wins.
6. Rescue Race: Boys or girls, or combination. One person stands on a barrel in arena center. The other rides his horse around barrel and the person on the barrel jumps on the back of

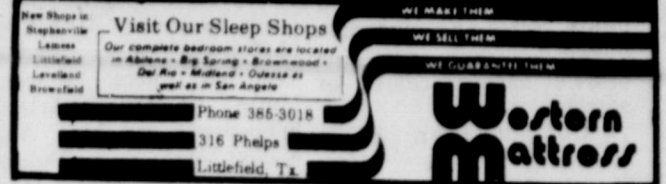

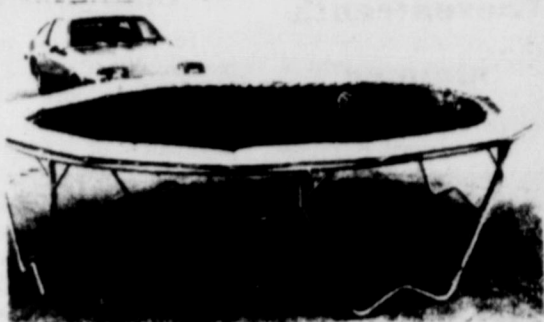

## Commissioner's Court Meets

In their regular meeting, the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County okayed the payment of bills and received the reports from the various departments; granted a request to AMOCO to cross five dirt roads near Anton with low voltage automation signal cable encased in 2-inch steel conduit and to cross one dirt road with an 8-inch fiberglass pipe encased in 19-inch steel conduit; okayed the specifications to be sent for the application for the landfill operation; hired Alvin Webb, certified public accountant to audit the general county and precinct books; and awarded seal coating bids for Precincts 1 and 4 roads to Jake Diel Dirt and Paving Inc.

Members of the commissioners' court were organized into the Equalization Board after the Commissioners' Court was adjourned.

Mary Beth Willey, county clerk, administered the oath of office to them and they will meet June 13th and again June 22.

After each commissioner presented detailed reports on his bills, and the court authorized payment of the bills,

reports from every department were studied and accepted.

In granting the request from AMOCO to cross county dirt roads with lines, the court decided to add the stipulation that if any of the roadways were ever to be widened by 50 feet on each side, or ditches lowered, cost of removal or replacement of the lines would be at the company's expense.

County Judge Don Joyner said the county is already facing another case where the county is having to pay for moving buried lines, and he wanted to avoid that in the future. The county is applying for Type 3 certification of the county dump-grounds, where a mixed type of landfill site will be maintained, and limited burning will be permitted. The application is to be sent to the Texas Department of Health Resources.

The commissioners are now working on dividing the dumpground into categories to meet state specifications.

James Tompkins, engineer with A.W. Harrison Engineering, Surveying and Planning of Andrews, was present to present the specifications.

## Grants Approved

The Senate Jurisprudence Committee today recommended approval of a bill which would provide assistance to persons who suffer personal injury or death as a result of violent crime. Senator Ron Clower (D-Garland), who sponsored SB 933, explained that the State goes to great expense to prosecute, incarcerate, rehabilitate, and supervise the violent criminal, but has no system to compensate his injured victim. Awards authorized by the bill cover medical and hospital care, funeral expenses, loss of earnings or support and child care, to a maximum of \$50,000. The Industrial Accident Board, which has expertise in determining injury and death claims, would administer the compensation system.

Funding would be provided by a \$5.00 court cost assessed for violations of certain laws of the State of Texas.

## Emergency Loans FHA

Emergency loan funds are available from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) county office in Littlefield, J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, announced recently.

The request for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration came as a result of losses sustained by local farmers hit by the recent drought. The disaster did not effect a large number of farmers, but those who were stricken have suffered severe losses.

in various periods, depending upon the purpose of the loan. The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is eight (8) percent.

Long-term loans are also being made at an interest rate of eight (8) percent.

Emergency loan funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. A farm can use the money for essential operating and living costs, Futch said.

Farmers can apply for assistance at the FmHA county office at 118 West 4th Street until September 30, 1977 for production losses. To be eligible for a loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability. Loans beyond actual losses can be repaid

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to make major adjustments in the farming operation for greater efficiency and productivity.

Robert M. Hicks, County Supervisor for Lamb County, states that his office day is Wednesday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. He advises that farmers in Bailey and Hockley counties may also receive assistance under this designation.

## Opposition to OSHA's Cotton Dust Standards

Strong opposition to far reaching Cotton Dust Standards proposed by the U. S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) was voiced by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce during testimony at a public hearing held in Lubbock Tuesday, May 10.

Testifying for the WTCC was Development Director Edward H. Coltharp who warned that "the OSHA proposals will create an unnecessary economic disaster in West Texas and throughout the nation." The WTCC urged OSHA to withdraw the proposed standards as they

would affect the West Texas cotton industry until such time as sufficient research proves beyond reasonable doubt that they are needed.

OSHA proposals as outlined in the Tuesday, December 28, 1976, issue of the Federal Register would require tremendous capital expenditures to equip cotton handling facilities including gins, crushers, mills, warehouses, seed processors and other enterprises connected with cotton to comply with dust abatement requirements for which no need has been justified in West Texas.

The proposed standards are based on the occurrence among workers engaged in

jobs using cotton primarily in southeastern textile processing mills, of a so-called occupational disease referred to as "byssinosis," a condition affecting the respiratory system that can cause irreversible damage in some cases and temporary damage in others.

William C. (Bill) Donnell of Marathon, Chariman of the WTCC Agriculture and Ranching Committee stated that "the WTCC recognizes the need for constant surveillance of working conditions in all industries with regard to employee health and safety and does not now and has not in the past opposed changes in working conditions proven to be in the best interest of the employee. He said that the WTCC does maintain the philosophy that such changes should be based on realistic, factual statistics produced by sufficient research so as to provide a sound basis showing clearly the need for change and that they not be brought about on the basis of supposition or possibilities so remote as to be almost fictional."

OSHA states the the majority of evidence relates to the textile industry with a low prevalence of acute byssinosis among cottonseed mill workers, statistics not included as to actual percentage of occurrences. Coltharp stated that "WTCC opposition to the proposed standards at the present time stands mute as related to their application to the textile industry."

Based on medical information secured from major cotton producing areas in West Texas, the

## Farm Bureau Seeks OSHA Repeal

The Lamb County Farm Bureau has asked Congressman George Mahon of 19th District of Texas to co-sponsor a bill that would repeal OSHA (Occupational Health and Safety Act).

Jerry Ray of Sudan, president of the local county Farm Bureau said Rep. Steven Symms of Idaho introduced H. R. 1348 which would repeal OSHA. County Farm Bureaus throughout the nation are contracting their respective Congressmen to ask that they co-sponsor the measure.

In his letter to Congressman Mahon, the county president said that Farm Bureau's policy on the matter reads:

"The Occupational Safety and Health Act is detrimental to the American farmer and the American public and is a usurpation of the federal government of state, local and individual rights. The Act does not fall

within the responsibilities assigned by our Constitution to the federal government. We therefore favor the complete repeal of this Act. Farm Bureau should take the lead in an all-out effort to achieve this important objective."

Ray said the one-sentence Symms bill was introduced at the request of Farm Bureau "as the only way to put an end to the ever-increasing number of regulations and the arrogant administration by this federal agency."

The county president said OSHA tactics violate the rights guaranteed under the Fourth Amendment to the U. S. Constitution against "unreasonable searches and seizures." He said that OSHA inspectors now enter private premises without a warrant, without probable cause to secure a warrant, and arbitrarily impose fines administratively without recourse to a trial by jury.

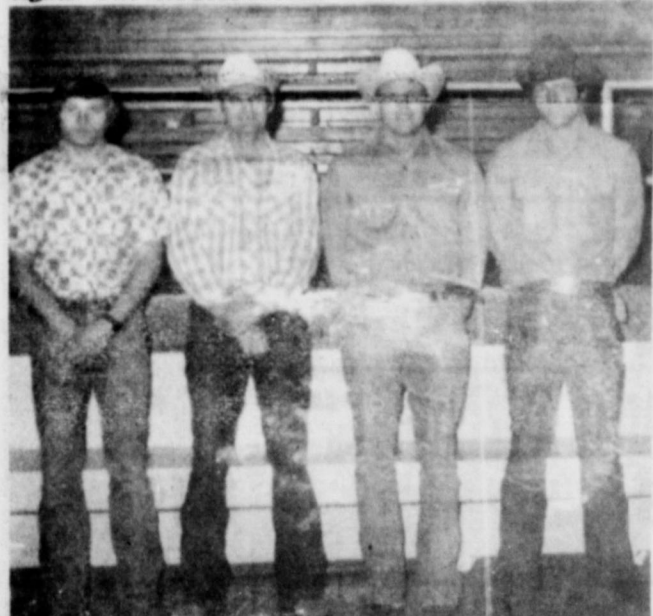
