How It Looks From Here

We have had the dubious fortune of witnessing and hearing stories of irate citizens who gave what they feel are legitimate complaints, badgering several of the members of the now disbanded Board of Equalization. Since we watched these proceedings with more than a passing interest, we feel qualified to say that this board took a thankless job and did the best they knew how and it is our opinion that they handled the task with the utmost sincerity and fairness.

Possibly if some of the disgruntled individuals had been aware that the Board did not set the tax rate, only the property evaluation, they would have had less inclination to voice their disdain so vehemently. The Board chose to set up a simple formula and value each property separately under a set rate depending on property construction. Here are some of the rules under which they made their evaluation. Hiway 70 and 1055 property, \$15 per front foot. Streets with curb and gutter, \$12 per foot, those with strip paving, \$10 per foot, corner lots had an additional \$100 added to evaluation. Brick homes were valued at \$16 per square foot while stucco and siding homes were valued at \$15 per square foot and frame homes were valued at \$12 per square foot.

Percentage of good was also considered, but in no case was property figured less than 30 percent of good.

Now for the actual taxes. This is a task that falls to the City Council to set the rate of taxes and this determination is arrived at after careful study of what the city has to operate with and what is the projected needs for the coming year. Taking into consideration such things as the rate hike just announced by SWPS for the City of Earth (this rate is in effect for City utility rate only, not for the individual consumer) also considered is the reduced amount of revenue sharing money that the city receives, some \$3000 less this year than last year. Rising costs of payroll and supplies used by the City.

After listening to many complaints about the upcoming tax rate, we were fortunate to receive a list of the rates of many of the cities surrounding the Earth area. Some of those rates are charted below. Hopefully this will clear up some of the confusion, and the City Secretary has stated that if she can be of any help in clarifying any of the information for any taxpayer, she would be more than willing to offer her assistance.

Now for the most astonishing part of the whole story. We learned just this week that this is the first time that the City of Earth has convened a Board to equalize property evaluations. Therefore, this is the first time that the city has ever had the opportunity to set a tax rate that was of any degree of fairness to all property owners.

The new tax rate of \$1.20 per \$100 evaluation figured at 50 percent of property value seems to be quite a bargain in these days of inflation. Especially since the total property evaluation has been raised only 16 percent over previous years.

Earth Co-op Gin asked for assistance in determining feasibility of installation of new sewer lines from their new building. This was set aside until an engineer can make an evaluation.

Triple C Sanitation has proposed a contract to handle all of Earth's trash removal. This proposal has been tentatively accepted pending investigation of the firm's references and validity of the proposed contract.

Final plans for the Earth Housing Authority were approved by the Council.

SWPS presented plans to raise the utility rates to the City. This was set aside for further study by the council before acceptance.

The State of Texas Retirement fund for firemen was rejected by the council.

New tax rates for the City of Earth were set by the Council.

Wesley McDaniels Fund

The citizens of this area have always been compassionate and sensitive to the needs of others. A good example of this is manifested in the joint efforts of the Springlake, Sunnyside and Earth Lions Clubs in giving a benefit dinner for little Wesley McDaniels Friday, September 19 at the Springlake-Earth School Cafeteria, serving from 6 to 8 p.m. prior to the Dimmitt football game. The money from this dinner will be used to defray a portion of the medical expenses for Wesley.

Little Wesley and Richard were born to Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie McDaniels January 19, 1975 at St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock. They were kept in intensive care and at 8 days old Wesley left the hospital in Lubbock for the childrens hospital in Dallas where he had to undergo surgery and have seven inches of small intestines removed. At ten days old he had the second surgery with a by-pass for food directly to his stomach. This caused infection so the third surgery was performed so he could be fed without irritation to the intestines. He stayed there in Dallas for five weeks. Leaving Lubbock he weighed 3 lbs. 2 oz. and returning from Dallas he weighed 4 lbs. 14 oz. He was again kept in St. Mary's Hospital six weeks. He now has Cerebral Palsy and this has caused some brain damage. He can walk some with help. He is taken to Lubbock once a week for therapy.

All of this has caused much expense for the family. By making a special effort each family can have a part in this worthy cause. Little Wesley and Richard are the grandsons of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Sawyer of Earth and Mr. and Mrs. O.C. McDaniels of Clinton, Tennessee.

The first bale of cotton for Earth was stripped and ginned Saturday, September 3 at the Earth Coop Gin.

Mr. A.K. Shelby grew the cotton which was Growers GSA 71. The cotton was planted by May 1st on the L.T. Smith farm.

The dry land cotton was defoliated Tuesday, August 30 and then stripped the following Saturday by Roosevelt Houston. This is believed to be the first machine stripped cotton in Lamb County.

The bale weighed 515 pounds with a 20 percent turnout.

New Trash Collection Proposed

The Triple C Sanitation, a commercial trash collection firm, has offered a proposal to the City of Earth to contract for all the trash removal for the City.

Triple C claims that for a rate of no more than residents are now paying, they will provide large trash containers and pick them up and dump them once a week at a sanitary land fill in the Hale Center area.

Their proposal claims that the system will clean up the alleys, relieve the tremendous dog problem of dumped trash cans, help keep the fly problem down and help reduce the possibility of grass fires along

with the fact that insurance rates for the city can be held static.

The trash would be removed at least once a week and if need be, more frequent trips would be made or more trash containers added to assure the sanitation of the trash storage areas.

Tentative proposals call for one large container for three or four households and enough containers for commercial property to handle whatever trash is accumulated.

This proposal comes at a somewhat opportune time, since at the end of this year, the city will be forced to adhere to a state law prohibiting burning of trash.

Items of discussion included selection of officers, selection of concessions workers, treasurer's report and the discussion of the need for a written constitution governing the actions of the Boosters.

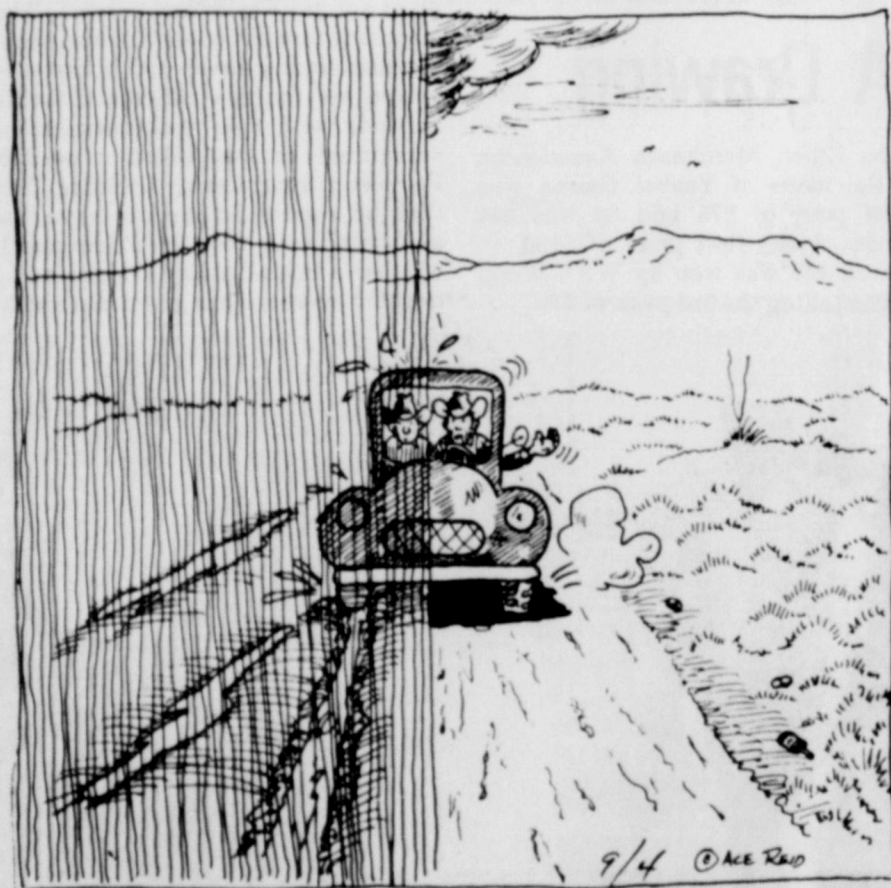

fumbled two of those times to be down 14-0 at the half.

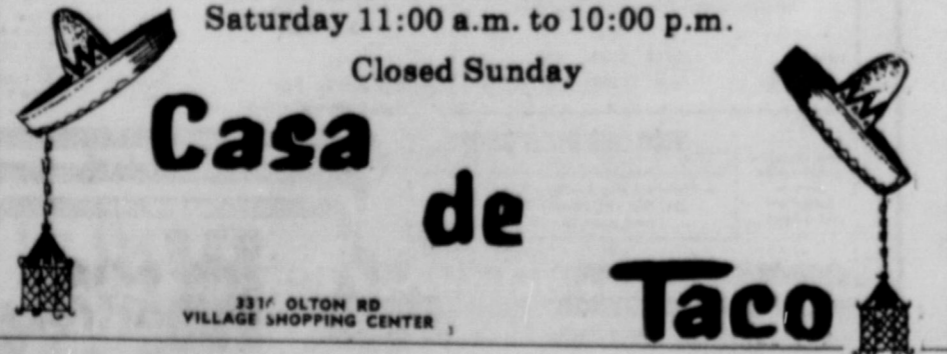
The second half saw the Crew fighting valiantly after losing their running backs in



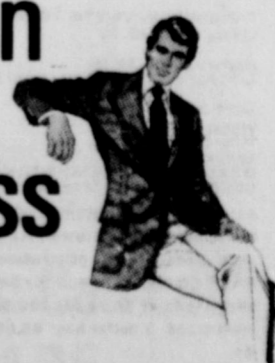
Award by having 7 unassisted tackles and 8 assisted tackles.
