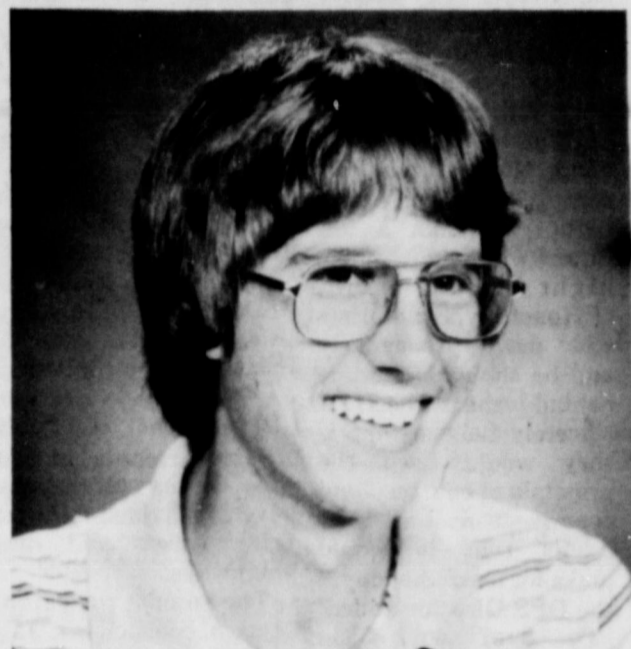
Mrs. E.C. Hudson set the tone of fun and nostalgia with an extensive list of humorous items of early days of the church, "Do you Remember When?"

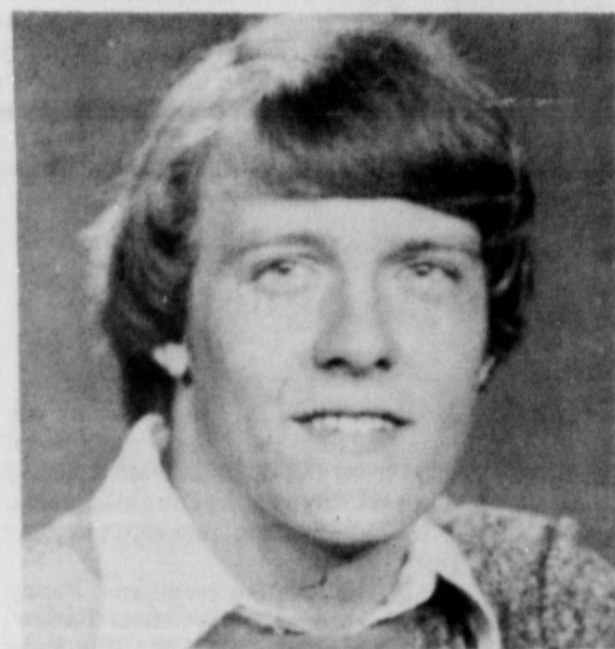
Bro. Charles Dunnam closed the afternoon meeting with a beautiful prayer that warmed the hearts of all present.

Girlstown at Whiteface received a check for a similar amount in a presentation June 12.

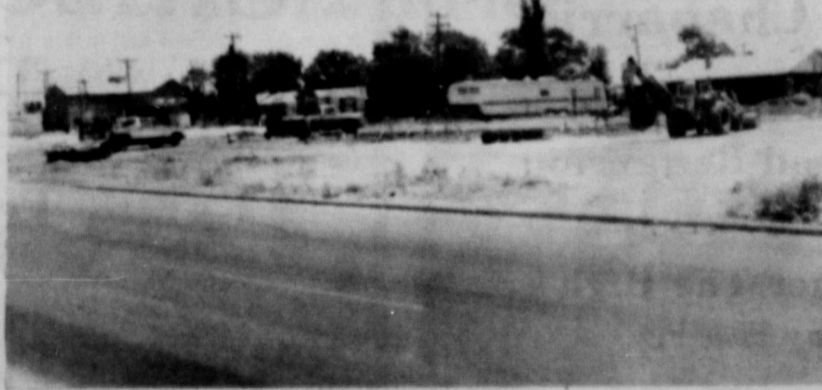
The money is the total of contributions presented Clayton by friends and employees at Speaker's Day observance during the recently concluded legislative session.

No stipulations as to use of the funds was made by Clayton, who indicated that it could either be used for general expenses or for special projects the homes might undertake.

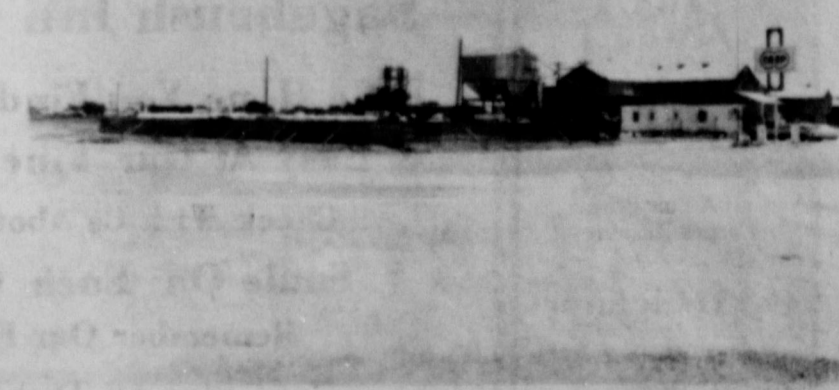

## Holiday Traffic Tips

The Texas Department of Public Safety today warned that an unusually high number of traffic accidents and fatalities are likely to occur during the July 4th holiday weekend.

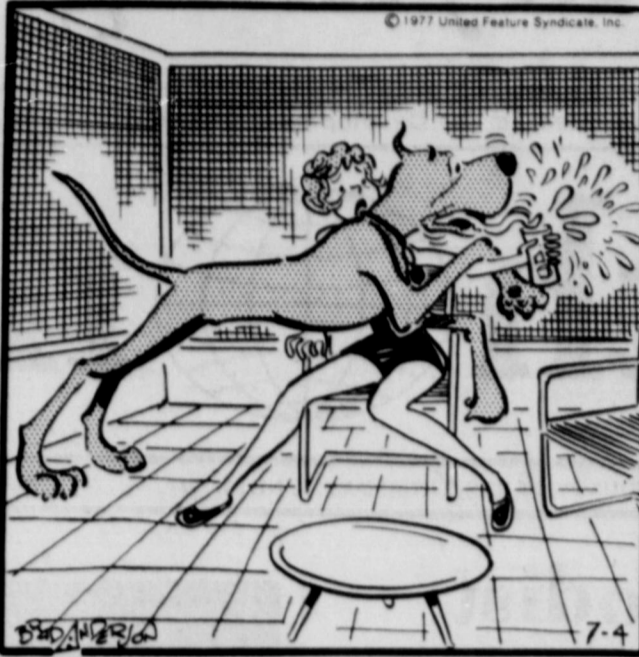
The head of the DPS, Colonel Wilson E. Speir, estimated that 51 persons would lose their lives in Texas traffic from 6 p.m. Friday, July 1, to midnight Monday, July 4.

"Based on past holiday experience, we believe many of the traffic accidents during the holiday period will involve either speeding or drinking. Also, it is likely that a high percentage will occur late at night or within a few hours after midnight," Speir said.

"Hopefully, motorists will drive defensively and be thoughtful while behind the wheel. I sincerely believe that is they would keep the principle of courtesy and concern utmost in their minds that it would make for a safe holiday," the DPS Director added.

To deal with the problem of reckless drivers, the DPS will be utilizing all its manpower in a strong enforcement program. In addition, Department of Public Safety Troopers will be working with local enforcement

agencies throughout the state, as well as the news media, trying to keep the public safety conscious.

During the July 4th weekend last year, 55 persons were killed in Texas accidents. Department of Public Safety records indicate the deaths were almost evenly divided between city streets and rural highways.

The most prevalent type of collision last July 4th involved only one vehicle.

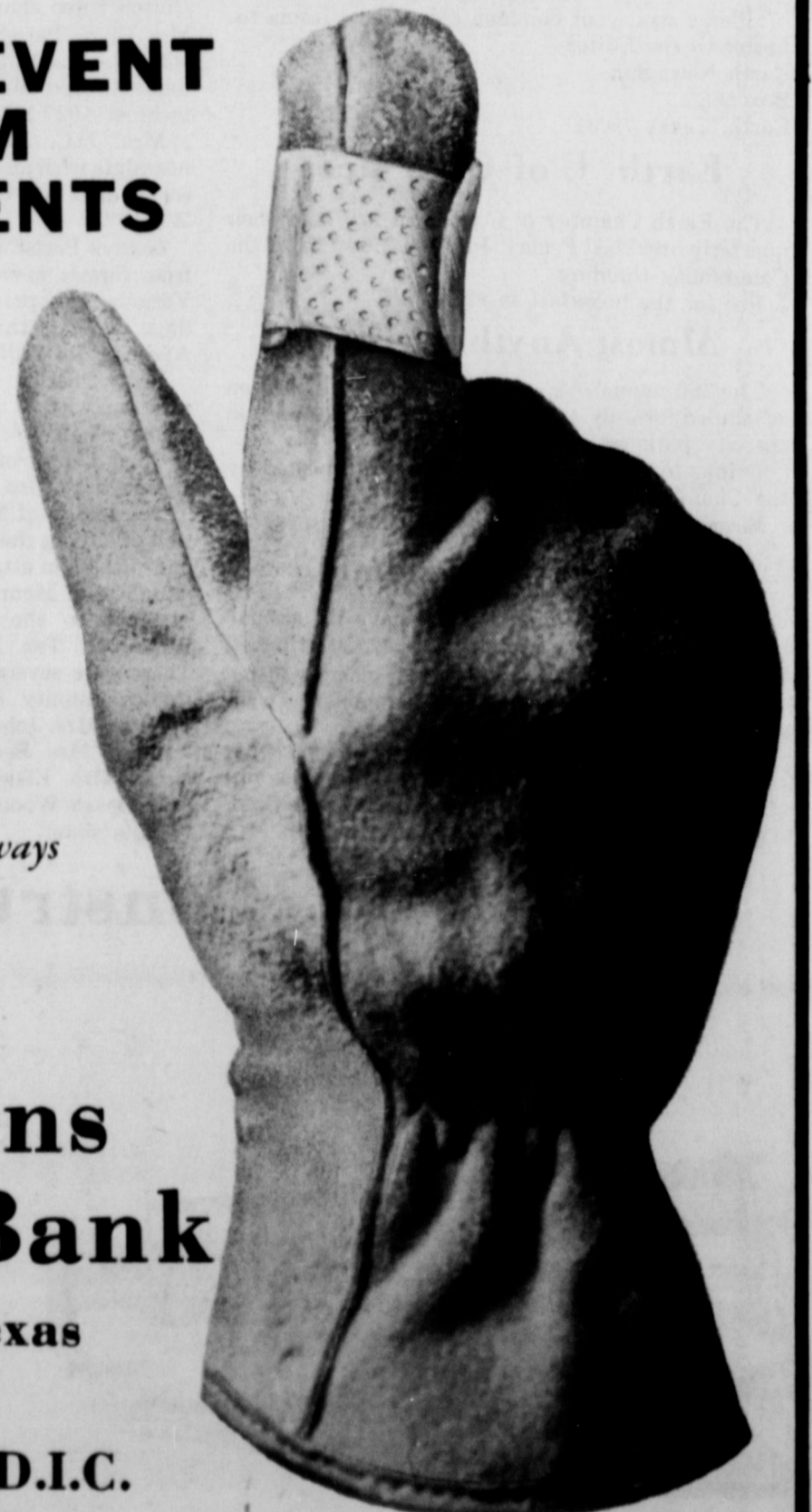

Serving the bride as maid of honor was Neshia

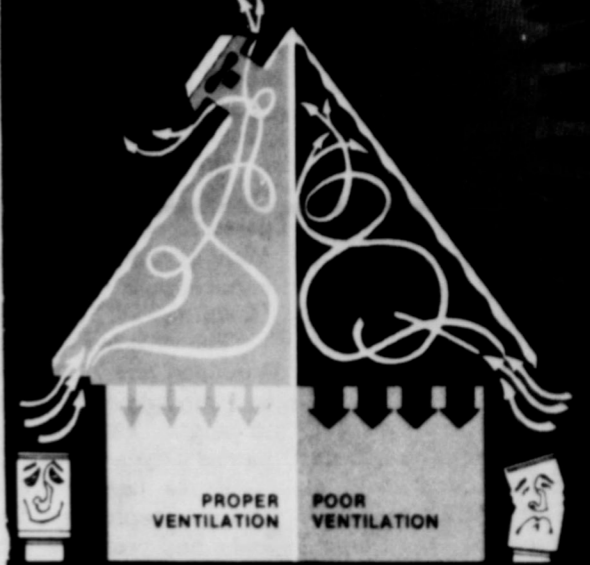

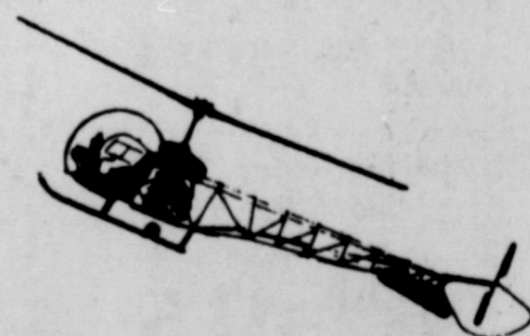

## Orange Juice Becomes Symbol Of Majority

(Editors Note: This Editorial is being reprinted with the permission of the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe, Amarillo, Texas)

Anita Bryant's in trouble, and she needs help from the millions of Americans for whom she's been waging a battle against homosexuality.

The Florida Citrus Commission is worried that Miss Bryant's anti-gay campaign has hurt her effectiveness as the orange juice queen, so it has filmed back-up commercials featuring two other noted personalities, just in case. The commission is also conducting a marketing survey to find out if she should be asked to leave her job as orange juice queen.

Ridiculous as it may seem, the commission's survey is supposedly designed to determine whether consumers have come to identify Miss Bryant more with the homosexual issue than with oranges.

We suggest orange juice could never in a million years receive better publicity than it has through Miss Bryant's campaign against homosexuals. We also suggest that orange juice has overnight become a symbol of morality and decency, a symbol of straight Americans who abhor homosexuality and want no part of it.

In effect, orange juice has, thanks to Miss Bryant, been propelled into the same category as apple pie, motherhood and the flag. And, if the Florida Citrus Commission removes Miss Bryant from its commercials because of the gays' protests, orange juice should be relegated to disgrace and oblivion.

Miss Bryant, whose husband is her business manager and who is the mother of four children, became outraged some months ago over a proposed "gay rights" ordinance in her resident Dade County, Fla. The ordinance was passed by the county commissioners, but protests from Miss Bryant and a group known as Save Our Children, Inc., forced a public referendum in Dade County. Earlier this month, residents there voted overwhelmingly against the ordinance.

Miss Bryant won that fight, but the gays didn't stop. In fact, they have intensified their

efforts and gays across the nation have bombarded the Florida Citrus Commission with "Anita hate mail."

We suggest, as we've done before, that readers buy an extra can of orange juice on the next trip to the grocery store. More important, we suggest that letters of support for Miss Bryant be directed to Arthur Darling, publicity director, Florida Citrus Commission, P.O. Box 148, Lakeland, Fla. 33802.

Orange juice has suddenly become a symbol drink. Because of Miss Bryant and the fact that homosexuality is contrary to the belief of most Americans and is a threat to society, we suggest it become a symbol of the straights, not the gays. If Miss Bryant goes, we recommend orange juice for gays only.

### TWO EASY LID SEAL TESTS CAN ENSURE HOME CANNING SAFETY

Home canning is a safe, enjoyable and money-saving way to provide good food for friends and family, according to the Ball Corporation home economists. One of the most important things to keep in mind, they say, is to follow recipe rules to the letter—prepare and process foods by the right method and for the correct length of time. Once that's done, they suggest the home canner try one of two quick tests to make sure the two-piece lid on their home canned foods is sealed. The tests should be done after the jars of food are thoroughly cooled, 12 to 24 hours after canning. First, simply press the center of the lid; if the lid is down and does not move, the jar is sealed. At this point, remove the band, wipe the threads with a damp cloth and store the band for future use in other canning operations. The second means of checking for an airtight seal is to tilt the jar slightly. If there is no leakage, remove the band, wipe the jar clean and store it—and the separate bands—in a cool, dark, dry place. That's it! If the home canned food passes either of these simple tests, store the jars, sit down, relax, and plan all the wonderful ways to enjoy that food at future meals.
