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## Fertilizer Firm Under New Management

Norman Hinchliffe, Plainview and Sandy Sanders of Springlake have purchased the Armstrong Fertilizer Co. from Bob Armstrong effective Dec. 1. The firm will be known as the Farm Chemical Co. Hinchliffe will manage the firm assisted by Victor Nelms.

Mr. Hinchliffe grew up on a farm in Mexia in Central Texas, and is a graduate of Mexia High School. He received a degree in Agronomy from Texas A. and M. in 1949. He served 31 months in the Infantry in World War II, 26 months overseas in the South Pacific.

Hinchliffe was in the Soil Conservation Service, U.S.D.A. in Hamilton and Hempstead for eight years as Work Unit Conservationist. He was field representative for Olin Matheson Chemical Corp. for four years working one year in Livingston and three years in Hale, Lamb, Bailey, Farmer and Castro Counties doing field work in fertilization, insecticides and plant diseases.

Sanders operated a Chemical Company here several years ago and is owner of the Farm Chemical Company in Springlake. The Hinchliffes are residing in Plainview but will move to Earth as soon as housing is available. They have three children David, 5 years old, Camille, age 2, and Karen 1 year old.

## Sugar Beet Assoc. Receives Letter From Holly Sugar Corp.

The Earth-Springlake Sugar Beet Association recently sent a letter to each of the following companies, American Crystal Sugar Co., The Great Western Sugar Co., The National Sugar Manufacturing Co., all of Denver, Colo. and the Holly Sugar Co. of Colorado Springs, Colo.

At press time only one of the letters had been received. Though the letter showed lack of enthusiasm, the farmers still have hopes of getting a sugar beet crop started in this area. Lee Benefield, Hereford, stated at the first meeting when the Association was organized that the legislation would have to be changed before sugar beets grown and harvested in the area would be feasible.

Dear Mr. Bock:  
This will acknowledge your letter of November 28, relative to sugar beets.

We have no plants sufficiently close to your area to make shipment of beets feasible. You are familiar with the legislative situation as it now stands. Your area may be of some interest to us were a long term sugar act to be enacted which would establish a stable situation. Cost of construction are of such astronomical proportions that any new area would have to be carefully analyzed from all angles if the construction of a new facility is to be considered.

## Medical Board Does Not Act Against Local Doctor At Hearing

Dr. William DaCosta Holt of Earth was seemingly not bitter, at the group whom as he put it, acted in malice toward him, but appeared compassionate toward even those who had acted against him, when talking to an Earth News reporter, Wednesday concerning his hearing last week in Fort Worth on charges of violating professional ethics by his conduct at McCamey Hospital last year.

The State Board of Medical Examiners could have cancelled, revoked or suspended the 41 year old doctor's license to practice medicine. However after two days hearings in which Dr. Holt himself appeared before the board for two hours last Friday to deny charges that he had acted improperly before a group of nurses at the McCamey Hospital, the Board chose to take no action against him.

Ralph Brock of Lubbock, said he "viewed the decision as a complete victory for the doctor." The State Board of Examiners reached their decision Saturday after deliberating in a closed session for two and one half hours.

Friday some of McCamey's leading citizens and former employees of Dr. Holt rallied to his support, following an uncompromising testimony by Mrs. Louise Moellering, formerly an employee of the McCamey Hospital.

Dr. Holt was pictured Friday as a reserved man who conducted himself always as a gentleman, one much loved by his patients although reviled by other members of the profession in McCamey.

Among those who were last to be heard by the board before it recessed were:

Walter Campbell, who served on a citizens committee which investigated Dr. Holt's dismissal from the McCamey Hospital staff.

Ed Thorp, an independent oil operator of McCamey and also a member of the citizens committee.

Ed McNally of McCamey, a member of the school board and citizens committee.

Howard Newton of McCamey, a member of the board which suspended Dr. Holt and then later renewed his hospital privileges.

G. H. Fisher, presiding judge of the Upton County Commissioners Court.

They appeared in a body before the board. Each summarized the problems surrounding Dr. Holt and each wound up saying he was a popular doctor in the town in spite of the troubles he seemed to have at the hospital.

Three nurses who had worked with Dr. Holt at McCamey testified as character witnesses. They were Mrs. Arthur C. Parsons, now of Olton; Mrs. Lillian Clark, now of Bloomington, and Mrs. Virginia Stastny, now director of nurses at Garland Clinic and Hospital.

Mrs. Stastny was director of nurses at Midland Memorial Hospital from 1954 to 1957. She knew Dr. Holt when he practiced in Midland and was on the staff of the hospital there.

She rejected vehemently suggestions made in earlier testimony that Dr. Holt was obscene, vulgar and overbearing. "Any suggestion that he was any of these things is ridiculous. I never saw him lose his temper. He certainly never was under the influence of narcotics. He always

## 1961 Cotton Allotment Raised In Lamb County

Lamb County farmers may plant 30,668 more acres in cotton next year under the Federal allotment plan than they planted this year according to word received from the ASC office in Littlefield Saturday after the official cotton allotment for 1961 was received.

The allotment for Lamb County in 1961 has been set at 211,496 acres as compared with 180,738 acres for 1960.

In the past farmers have had a choice of "A" or "B" plan of operation; however, next year the double system of operation will be eliminated. Next year all producers will be in the same category.

The increased allotment could result in an all time record crop next fall if the weather conditions are favorable throughout the year.

Individual farm allotments also are being announced, but the 1961 cotton parity price will not be set until early next year after a "percentage of parity" figure is worked out by the new Secretary of Agriculture. This announcement is expected to be made about January 31.

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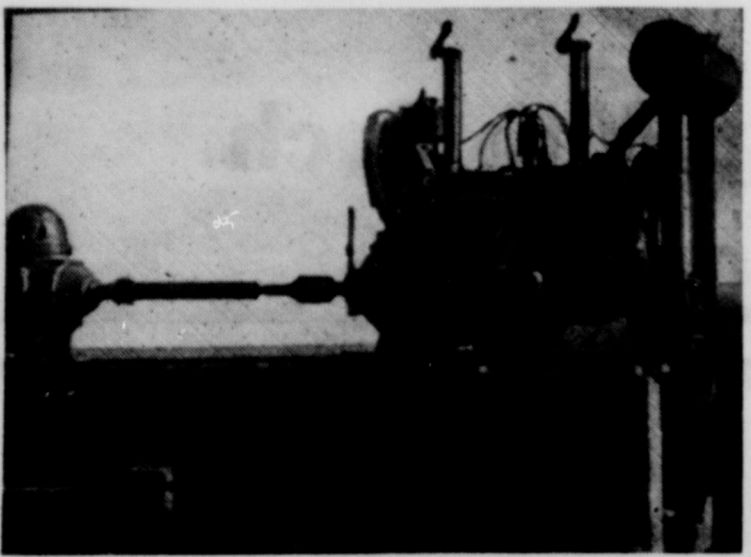

The band students began their candy sales Monday. Proceeds from the candy sales will also be applied to the instruments needed by the band students.

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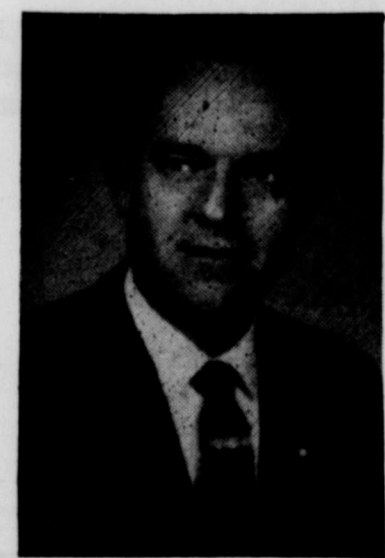

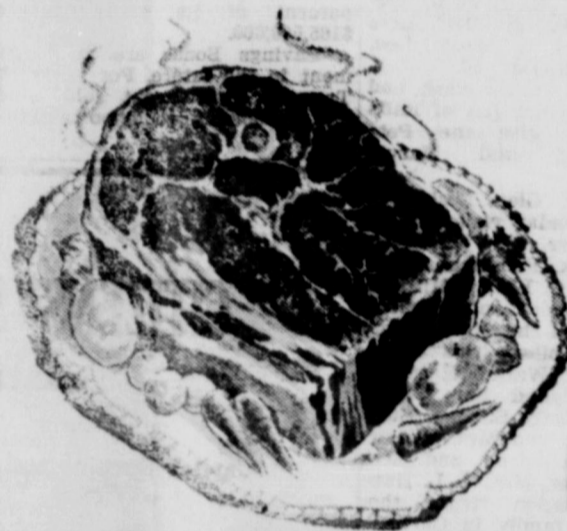
