### SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE

To Kiss Or Not To Kiss?

"When all is said and done, what is a kiss?" If Cyrano de Bergerac could have looked through Dr. Arthur H. Bryan's microscope, he might

never have asked.

Judging from Dr. Bryan's unchivalrous but rigidly scientific studies, a kiss is a good way to transmit everything from cold

sores through vi-rus "X" and pneumonia. Even fatal infections along by "prolonged o s c u l ati o n s," he says.

At City College

in Baltimore, the biologist directed women to plant kisses on micro-scope slides and laboratory gelatine. He discovered the number of germs transferred from the lips is directly proportional to the length of a single kiss.

"A regulation Hollywood ten-

second kiss transferred almost twice as many germs as a short two-second affair," the scientist reported in Drug and Cosmetic Industry.
Dr. Bryan's work underscores

that the mouth is a natural trap not only for germs, but for dust, dirt, pollen, chemicals and anything else that happens to be in the air. Considering that we breathe about 13 pints of air a minute, it's a wonder that all this microscopic flotsam and jetsam usually causes little more than an occasional scratchy throat — and that can be soothed with troches or the newer flavored antibiotic

or the newer flavored antibiotic lozenges like Candettes.

But Dr. Bryan did not put the kiss of death on romance. Happily for courting couples, more than 95 percent of germs on the lips are harmless, he said. "Kissing can be not only a pleasant, but a harmless pastime" if ordinary hygiene is practiced. practiced.



Aerial map of the site of the Texas Research Foundation's High Pains Station at Halfway.

The half section is bounded by U.S. Highway 70 on the north, with the cemetary marking its east corner and the Baptist Church in Halfway marking the west corner.

The west quarter section is being held by the Green Machinery Co. until funds can be raised for its purchase. The east quarter is being held by the Harvest Queen Foundation, and will be made available free of charge for perpetual use.

In this picture the farm has been divided acording to soil characteristics, as indicated by the Soil Conservation Service. The key is:

1. This large section of the farm is deep, fine textured, slowly permeable Pullman clay loam soil with no to one per cent slope and no to slight ero-

2. This small area of the proposed site are the same as No. 1, except they have one to three per cent slope.

3. This small area on the west side of the half section, which includes the irrigation well, has deep medium textured slowly permeable Amarillo clay loam soil with no to one per cent slope and little or no erosion.

4. This area is the same as No. 3 except that the slope is one to three per cent.

Diagnostics-Drugs That "Measure" Health

Most persons who have heart attacks can lead long and useful lives because medical scientists have developed a treatment to lessen the likelihood of another attack. Since an attack is caused by a clot forming in an artery that feeds the heart muscle, an anti-clotting drug is given to "thin" the blood.

In a study at the Ford hospital in Detroit, doctors found that the

death rate among patients who went on taking anti-clotting drugs after a heart attack was only one-third to one-half of what it was among those who were taken off

the drug.

The dosage of the anti-clotting drug, however, must be carefully regulated because over-dosage can cause the blood to lose its clotting power entirely and even the slightest cut may lead to death. The doctor has to make frequent tests to be sure that the blood still has a safe margin of elections tower.

safe margin of clotting power.

The tests determine the exact clotting time of a patient's blood, which varies with each individual. Once this time is known, the doctor can prescribe the correct dosage of can prescribe the correct dosage of anti-clotting drugs. Possibly the simplest, fastest, and safest chem-ical used in such tests is a sub-stance called Simplastin. At one time, the tests could be made only in hospitals with elaborate equip-ment. Simplastin, however, requires only a small centrifuge which most doctors have. As a result, anti-clotting treatment may be carried out safely in rural areas and small towns as well as large

Known as a diagnostic, Simplas-tin was developed by scientists at the Warner-Chilcott Research Laboratories, which is celebrating its centennial this year. Simplastin is just one of a variety of sub-stances the Warner-Chilcott researchers have developed to help the doctor make accurate on-the-spot tests in the treatment of many different conditions and

emergencies.

Many lives, for example, have been saved by Evans Blue, a diagnostic perfected in the Warner-Chilcott Laboratories. With Evans Blue, a doctor can accurately de-termine the blood volume of a per-on who has been wounded in the injured in an accident, or



Before the development of the Evans Blue test, a person could bleed to death or die from shock due to the loss of blood. Now, a doctor can tell just how much blood is needed by transfusion to maintain life.

Another Warner-Chilcott diagnostic, Inulin, that measures excess water in body tissues is used to diagnose certain kidney and heart ailments. Recently it was employed in a unique experiment conducted in the Sahara desert by a team of United States scientists. These researchers used Inulin to determine how camels store water,

in the hope of discovering methods whereby humans can live comfortably in desert areas.

The tests made with Simplastin, Evans Blue, and Inulin are just a few examples of the great progress that this branch of medical science has made. Although the first diagnostic was discovered only forty years ago, the number only forty years ago, the number of tests is now so great that their definitions alone occupy forty-seven pages in a medical dictionary. And there are accurate tests for almost every disease, ranging from anemia to syphilis.

TRUST ARRANGEMENTS EXPLAINED

When property is placed in trust is turned over to a trustee who will see to it is properly managed for the benefit of a person or persons you name as beneficiaries. It is a method of disposing of your property and may be used in con-

Trusts have many advantages. A trust may be used to provide income for persons unable to support themselves, to provide funds for a child's education, as a means of establishing an annuity, or to provide a gift for a charitable institution.

In these days of high taxes, a trust may be utilized to minimize the tax bunden. If carefully planned, a trust may decrease income and inheritance taxes.

A trust arrangement works rougly in this manner. A person who desires to create a trust is called a grantor The grantor chooses a trustee. The trustee may be a bank an individual or a trust company. The grantor through a trust instrument tells the trustee how to
