I heard an interesting side-light the other day on Lubbock's pipeline worries. It seems that the Santa Fe railroad had originally agreed (for a consideration) to allow Lubbock to use its right of way for their pipeline from Bailey county into Lubbock.

On second thought, politically strong Lubbock decided to elbow over into Highway 84 and go on in free. But running into some litigation with persons who had executed deeds to the Highway department for right of way to be used for highway purposes ONLY, Lubbock, on third thought, decided to go back and pay John Santa Fe for pipeline toll charges into Lubbock.

In the mean time, several large elevator operators along the Santa Fe which contribute considerably to the economic get-a-long of Mr. Santa Fe, had been doing some thinking also. So they decided if Senior Santa Fe was going to help Lubbock transfer the waters from under the land that produced their livelihood (grain), then they would arrange with Santa Fe's arch competitor, Mr. Truckman to move their grain cargoes to terminal points.

In the last scene, we see both Mr. Lubbock and Senior Santa Fe scratching their bone heads trying to figure a way out of that one.

Earth's growth is still like the proverbial knot on a tree; no one knows exactly why or how it happened. However, the town's development has been nearly sensational in view of the fact that most of it occurred WITHOUT the assistance of any organized effort. Fair weather or foul — come what may — we just take whatever falls into our lap.

The Earth Sun has always been a militant and consistent crusader for anything we thought would be beneficial to the community. About a month ago, we led off with an editorial trying to stimulate interest in the proposed experiment station of the Texas Research Foundation which was supposed to be located in this general vicinity. Again we carried a news story of the organizational meeting in Muleshoe Tuesday night at which the location of such a station would be attempted. Everyone was urged attend.

The meeting was held. It was attended by farmers, businessmen and bankers, also by executives of railroads, utility companies and West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The meeting went on record as accepting and approving the objectives of the Foundation and its plan to locate an experiment station in the Panhandle. Officers and county chairmen were elected. The final resolution passed by the new organization called for the new experiment station to BE LOCATED IN THE EARTH VICINITY!

And now be it shamefully said to the everlasting discredit of Earth and its "knotty" development methods that NOT ONE SINGLE SOUL FROM THE EARTH COMMUNITY ATTENDED THIS MEETING! Frankly, this is a serious reflection upon our community in general and it is no laughing matter. The Southwestern Public Service Company alone has pledged \$10,000.00 to help provide this advanced service.

Where was the Earth Chamber of Commerce when all this was cooking? And, incidentally, what is our local chamber doing about the line of cooperating with Ronald Davis' big vegetable organization? We'd do well to adopt that boy as a citizen of the Earth Community. He lives inside our toll-free telephone system.

Experiment Station May Be Located In Earth Vicinity

An important area meeting was held Tuesday night in the District Court room in Muleshoe in the interest of establishing a branch experiment station of the Texas Research Foundation in this general vicinity of the Panhandle.

Dr. C. L. Lundell, head of the Foundation, set forth the objectives of the organization and explained its accomplishments in other parts of Texas. Dr. Tom Longnecker, head of agricultural research, and Huey Whitehurst, agronomist for the Foundation also spoke in the work being done by their organization.

Clyde W. Bray was elected temporary executive chairman. County chairmen elected for the surrounding counties were: Paul Lewis for Lamb County, Bill Millen, Bailey county, Allen Webb, Castro county and Gilbert Kaltwasser, Parmer County.

Out of town guests attending the meeting were J. C. Porter, Wichita Falls, executive of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; Mr. Turner, Amarillo, Agronomist for the Santa Fe Railroad; J. M. Collins, Division Manager for the Southwestern Public Service Company and Andy Coolidge of the same company.

Representatives of Muleshoe, Dimmitt, Littlefield, Friona and Bovina also attended.

Selection of a site for the experiment station was not made at the meeting Tuesday night but a tentative agreement was reached to try to locate it in this vicinity of Earth.

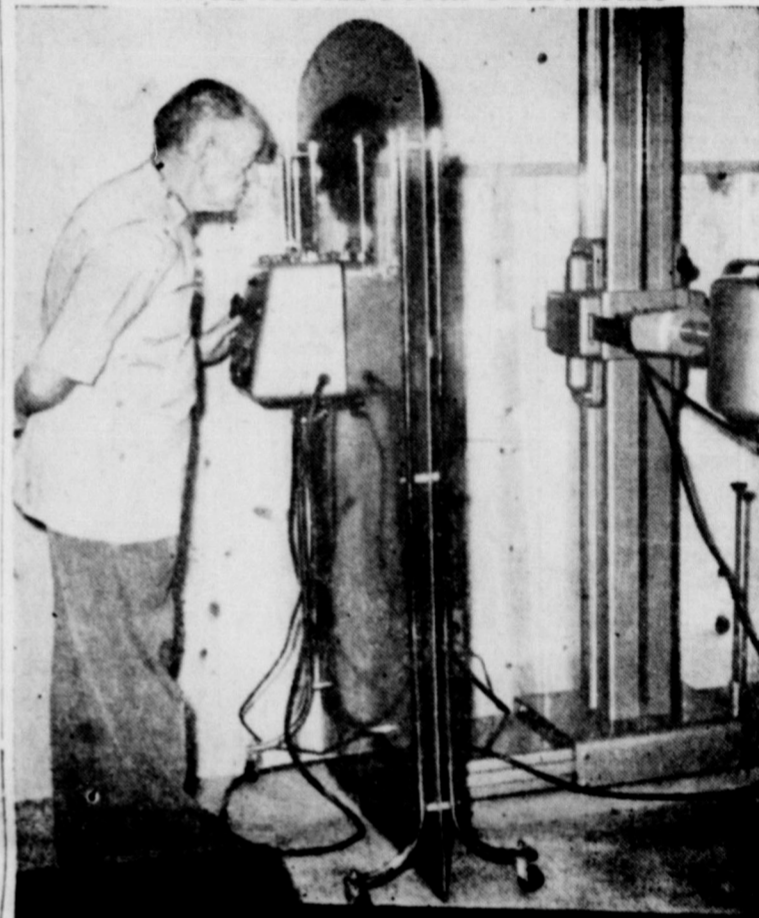

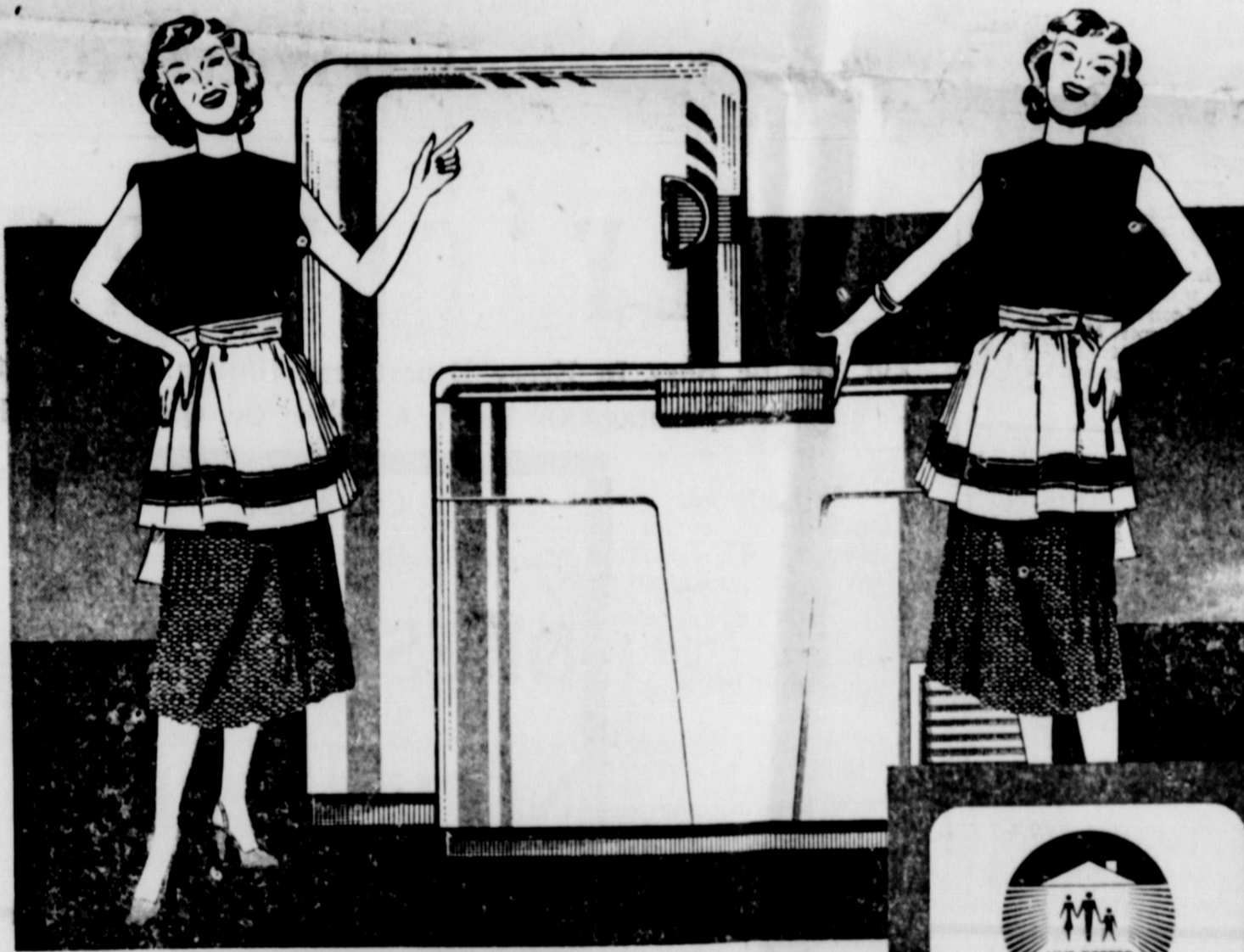

A Safe Time . . . A Good Time

WILL YOU be writing the folks back home about the swell vacation you're having? Or will they be writing you "get well" notes?

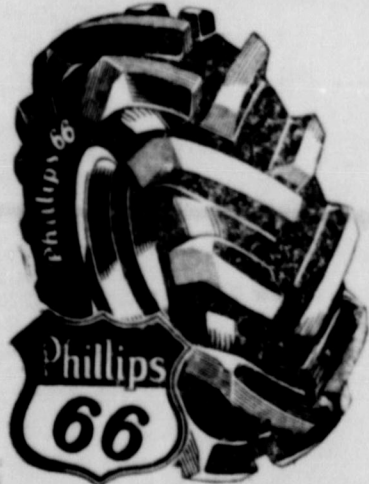
To be sure of having a good time, the National Safety Council asks that you make safety part of your planning. Here is a list of the Council's suggestions:

1. Before leaving, have your car checked in the service department of your local dealer. Are brakes, lights and wheels OK?
2. Start off on the right foot. Use a light foot on the gas.
3. Slow down in bad weather, in bad traffic, on bad roads and when visibility is limited.
4. Make a check list. Take along a flashlight, extra car keys, first aid kit, road maps, sunglasses, flares or flashers, tools, rope — and safe, courteous driving habits.
5. Don't swim alone, too far, or after dark. Know the depth of the water, tide conditions, and under-water obstacles, if any.
6. Don't let the heat knock you cold. Take less sun the first few days. Don't overdo sports and exercise.
7. Rest after eating. And don't eat excessively in hot weather. It can be dangerous.
8. Watch out for other people when fishing. Be careful of hooks. Learn proper casting techniques.
9. Be alert to any special vacation hazards such as poison ivy or snakes.
10. Select boats carefully. No standing, overloading or horseplay. Stay ashore in bad weather. Always carry life preservers. If the boat overturns, stay with it!
11. Wear protective clothing when camping. Watch out for impure drinking water. If in doubt, boil it. Be careful with cigarets and matches. Keep fires small and guarded. To make sure it's out, cover fire with sand or dirt.

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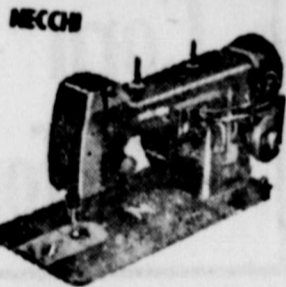

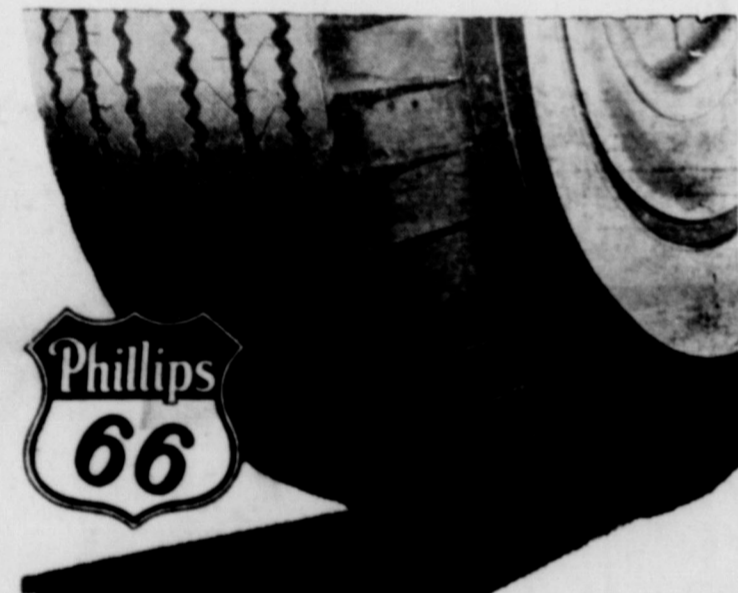
