The consolidation of the two newspapers became effective Friday, October 12. The Earth News will now be called The Earth News Sun, combining the two names.

The Earth News was founded in 1928 by Mr. Orbie Dobbs, and his partners, Doug Poe, who was then publisher of the Littlefield papers, and Sam Williams, present Publisher of the Littlefield papers. Middleton bought their interest in the paper in January '55, when the first news plant was moved into Earth, and for the first time in Earth's history a paper was printed in its hometown plant. Prior to this both newspapers had been printed in towns nearby.

The Earth Sun was founded in 1928 by Mr. Orbie Dobbs, and the name and slogan was passed down through the years. The paper has had several different publishers, but has never had its own plant, continuing through the years to be printed in nearby print shops. Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Stephens have published the Earth Sun about three years after buying it from his father, Roy Neal.

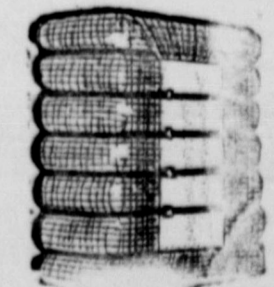
No changes have been made in the personnel of the Earth News-Sun, and its policies have been in the past.

Middleton said, "With the two newspapers consolidated he felt certain it would enable Earth to have a bigger and better paper and thus show the world there's no place on Earth like Earth" and with the circulation of both papers combined, Merchants could receive more for their advertising dollar."

LITTLEFIELD — (Special) Plans for the establishment of the first scholarship offered by the new Lubbock Christian College, have been announced by members of the 1935 Study Club of Sudan, the Amherst Study Club and the Woman's study Club of Littlefield. The scholarship will be offered in the name of Mrs. E. J. Stone of Sudan, and will be known as the Alice Elise Porter Stone Fellowship.

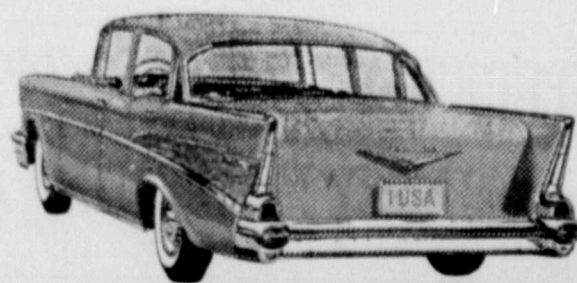

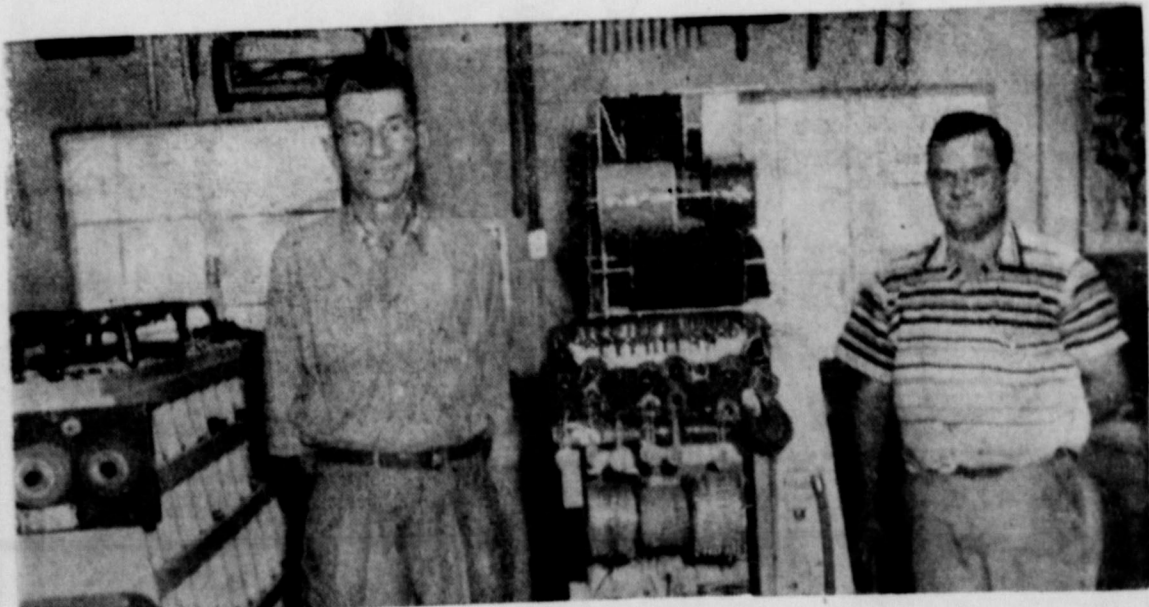

Recharge Well To Conserve Water, Prevent Waste And Reclaim Land

This practice shall be used to assist farmers in the conservation of recharging the underground reservoirs from which large quantities of water are being used.

The recharge well must be drilled to the "redbed" or cretaceous rocks and cased with 1-4 in. or 1 1/2 in. casing or larger. The well shall be screened or the casing perforated opposite the water-bearing well. The pump and pump equipment must be permanent fixtures.

The well must be located near the edge of a lake basin which has a drainage area of 300 acres or more.

The well must be located so as to drain the basin by gravity flow into the underground reservoir through the well casing. The drilling and installation shall be supervised by Soil conservation service. This practice shall observe the requirements of water districts in counties where water districts have been set up.

This suggested Federal cost-share to be \$6.00 per foot and not to exceed \$2,000.

This is a proven practice for the High Plains and will help solve our water problem.

I would like to recommend this practice be adopted under Special Conservation Practice to meet special county water conservation needs.

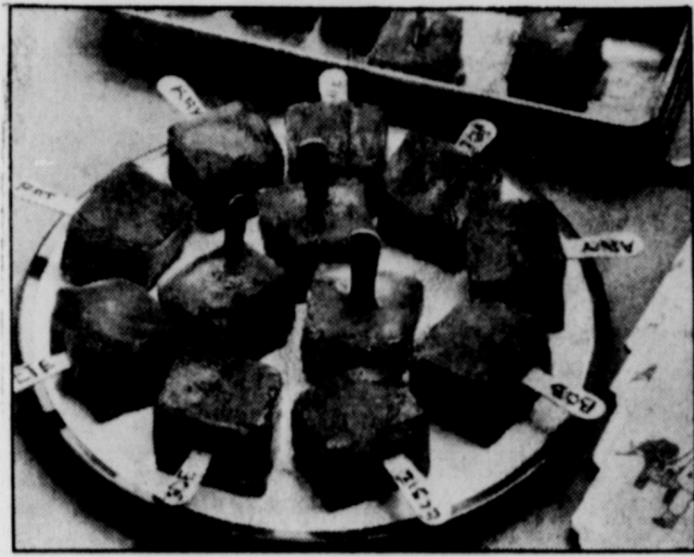

IT'S THE LAW in TEXAS

WHO HAS THE RIGHT OF WAY

Possibly the most mystifying of all traffic rules to the average driver are those relating to "Right of Way" at an intersection. In reality, however, these rules are quite simple.

regulating intersecting traffic, it is best to start off with the premise that all streets are of equal dignity, legally speaking. Traffic signs and signals may vary this rule somewhat, but when in doubt it is safest to assume that all drivers crossing your path have a claim to the right of way equal to your own.

Obviously, however, in many cases one driver or the other will be legally entitled to the right of way. When it becomes necessary to determine right of way in a particular situation, the driver who reaches the intersection first, or who is going to get there first, is ordinarily favored.

But when two automobiles are an equal distance from the intersection, that one approaching from the other drivers right normally has the right of way.

Some intersections are known as "courtesy corners", having a stop sign or a flashing red signal facing each direction of approach. The first driver reaching the corner and coming to a complete stop will normally have the right of way over other vehicles not already in the intersection. However, don't depend too much on the other fellow's courtesy, and be sure to keep a "proper look-out" and your car under "proper control" as explained in a previous column.

At intersections involving one through street and another street having a stop sign a driver approaching the stop sign and coming to a full stop is ordinarily said to have the right of way over vehicles approaching on the through street but not already in the intersection.

However, this rule must be qualified by saying that you should not proceed, cross or turn onto the through street until you can do so without interfering with oncoming traffic. In other words if an approaching car will give within the intersection before you are completely clear, wait at a little longer. The same rule applies to entering a highway on a side road containing a stop sign.

Many drivers violate the rules of right of way cover left-hand turns at an intersection. When turning left, you should always be on the inside (or curb) lane, displaying the proper signal. You must allow cars coming from the opposite direction, already in the intersection, to pass through before coming to the turn. Even when the intersection is cleared, do not proceed unless other oncoming traffic far enough away to be able to see your signal and slow down to allow you

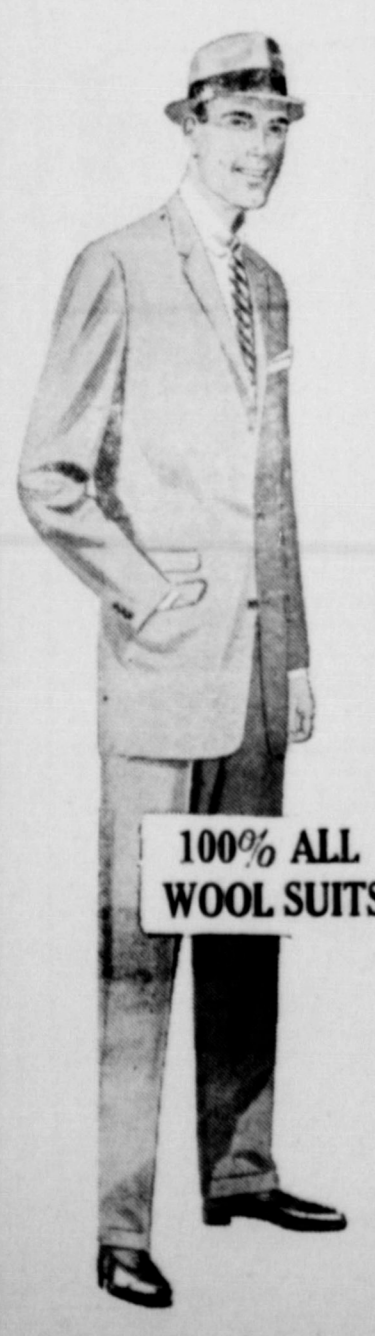

The "Mad Scramble" (ten wild Brahma bulls loosed at the same time) and the Wild Horse race packed the arena with action from one end to the other.

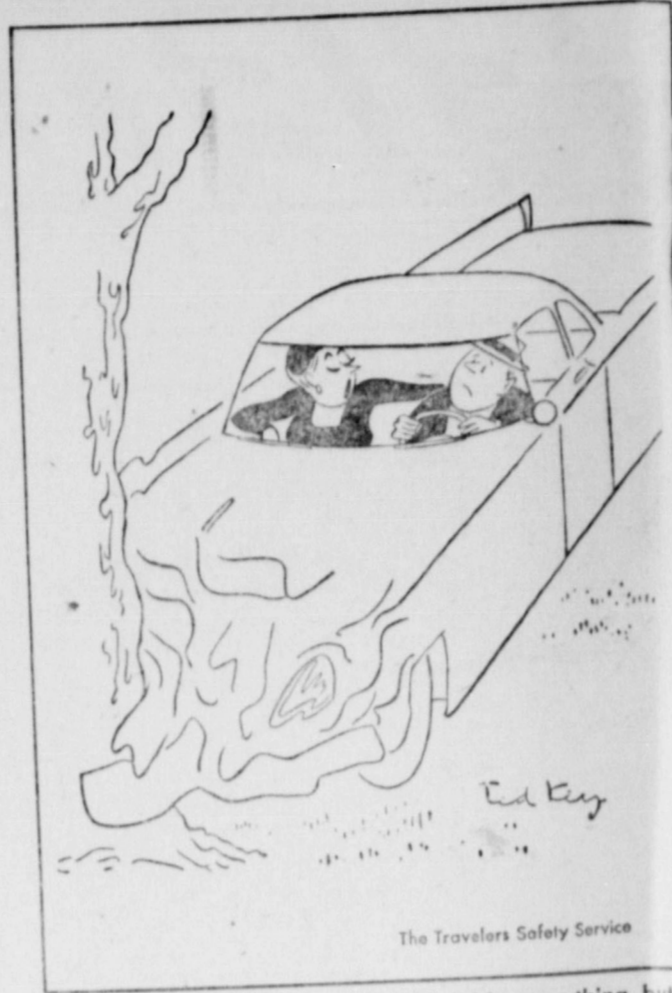

Texas Congress Of Parent - Teachers Award Scholarships

For the past seven years the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers has been granting scholarships of \$200 each to young people planning to enter the teaching profession. The project was started in the fall of 1949, and a sum of \$11,000 has been expended in this way.

Qualifications are that the student be of college junior or senior rank, a resident of Texas, with high moral and social standards, a good scholastic record, an apti-

IT'S THE LAW in TEXAS

EARNST MONEY CONTRACT NO CASUAL MATTER

The signing of a contract of sale is an extremely important step in the purchase of a home. Once a buyer and seller have signed, they are bound by the provisions of the contract. Their respective legal rights in the transaction are thereby set and determined. If the contract is poorly and haphazardly drawn, a harvest of regret may be reaped at a later date.

Sales contracts are often called by other names such as earnest money contracts, binders, receipts, etc. All of them are for the same purpose and almost without exception involve the deposit of money by the buyer. Some require the seller to put up a good faith deposit. The fact that such deposited sums are usually to be forfeited in event the depositor later fails to go through with his specified contractual obligations lends additional weight to the often stated admonition that no contract should be signed without complete understanding as to its terms.

But many home purchasers (and sellers) rush to sign a hastily prepared contract with very little knowledge of its contents. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the casual appearance of the contract, and perhaps the fact that a particularly printed form is used may contribute in causing the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many are lulled into a lapse of good business judgement.

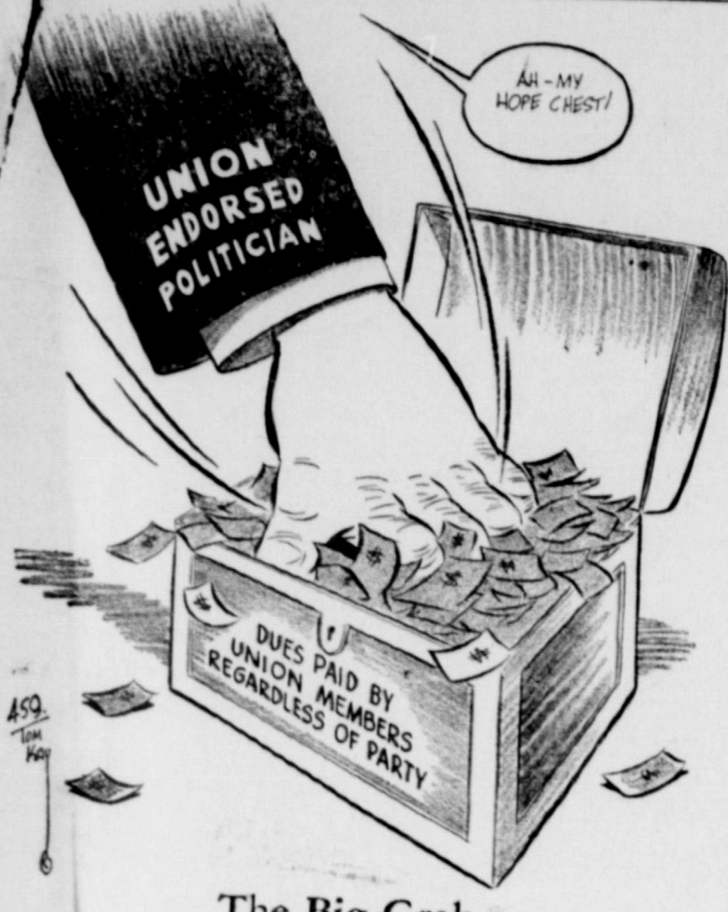
Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixtures being sold should be clearly described. A complete description of the property by lot and block, or by metes and bounds is a must, the street number being inadequate by itself.

Articles and fixtures included in the sale but not always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this category are such items as venetian blinds, removable floor coverings, draperies, air conditioning units and others. In purchasing property under construction, complete plans and specifications form an essential part of the agreement.

The price to be paid must, of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. If a certain sized loan is prerequisite to the buyer's ability to complete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through, his contract requiring payment of the entire consideration is cash.

The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished.

The Big Grab

The buyer's individual circumstances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. All too often people try to squeeze a sales contract to the type of printed form or leave it to the contractor or forget a oral agreement many vital provisions. Do not fall into the "pitfall of the printed form." Too many unfortunate entanglements have been announced by clients to lawyers with the words, "I have just signed a receipt for a house on Blank Street. Will you take over now and see that everything is O.K.?"
