"Hello Mother" is indeed sweet words to any mother, but to a mother who is awakened at 1:10 a. m. in the night by the sweet voice of her first born son who is thousands and thousands of miles away in Vietnam, is perhaps an indescribable moment.

"Hello Mother," were the two magic words that reacted like an electrical shock awakening Mrs. Ervin Anderson Saturday at 1:10 a. m., when she had sleepily gone to answer the ringing of the telephone to be greeted by her son Johnny's voice from Saigon, Vietnam.

Needless to say took only one second to sound the alert that brought the entire family to the telephone, awaiting their turn at a word with Johnny.

His voice, so natural but far away awakened and erased from the Andersons any desire for sleep throughout the night.

Johnny told the family he was presently enjoying the rest and sights of Saigon, following several months in the combat zone. He went on to tell them, it was 3 p. m. Saturday afternoon in Saigon, and that he had been waiting in line to make his call since 8 a. m., that morning, and that his call would be limited to 5 minutes as a long line of servicemen were still waiting to make their calls home.

Johnny told the family he had just arrived in Saigon for three days of rest and relaxation following several weeks of combat duty, and that he was slated to return to combat duty in two weeks. . . . The happiest thing the family could discuss was, as Johnny put it, "If everything goes according to plan," he would start home March 25th, as his discharge was due April 1.

The conversation was spent in family fashion, speaking as little as possible about the war in Vietnam, but leaving it for later discussion "when Johnny comes marching home."

The family had planned the call from Vietnam since early in December, but were never sure when he would get his three day rest in Saigon, and have an opportunity to call home.

Johnny has been in Vietnam since September 19, 1965. His base camp is at Ben Cat. He recently informed them by letter that he had transferred from his old company, to become a chauffeur for the jeep of Lt. Col. Lober, who was at Ft. Riley, Kansas at the time Johnny was stationed there.

On December 30 his company went into combat within the Hoho Woods Region, Anderson said the jungle and thick forest left no roads or trails for transportation by jeep and that he was walking and carrying the Colonel's radio. The radio, according to Johnny, weighs 25 pounds, but after walking, running and getting through rough places the best you can, that radio feels like it weighs not an ounce less than 500 pounds.

Johnny has never commented extensively about the war in Vietnam, in his letters home, with the exception of a casual comment, like, "The mortar fire overhead makes you feel like you're getting hit over the head with a baseball bat."

In one letter he added a light bit of comedy saying, "I have all the comforts of home, I have a bunk, but I'm 50 miles away from it," and "Just think it will be only 25 more days until I can take a bath." According to his mother, his letters are usually about home and the folks in Earth.

He says it is very hot there, with temperatures averaging 90 to 100 degrees all the time. The country is pretty, tropical country, with thick forest. The people are small and dirty looking, but they are much stronger for their size than American people.

A couple from Lubbock whose son is also now in Viet Nam spent Sunday with us. Their "Buddy" and "Our Phil" started to kindergarten together in Ada, Oklahoma. Throughout the years, the two lads have remained close friends. Phil and I were at the airport in Lubbock to see Buddy off to Camp Pendleton, just prior to his leaving for Vietnam.

His letters they read to us Sunday were informative, but gave off an additional air of light comedy, aimed at doubtless

Danny Merck Bitten by Dog

Danny Merck, five year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dub Merck, was bitten by a dog Saturday afternoon as he was playing with a cat in the yard of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Brock.

The dog which was reported to belong to Guy Kelley, who resides next door to the Brocks, came over in the Brock yard and jumped on the lad and bit him.

He was rushed to the Littlefield Hospital where it required four stitches to close the wounds to his ear, and special medical attention to cuts and scratches around his mouth.

The dog had not received rabies shots prior to the attack on the lad. At present the dog is tied up and is under observation. As a precaution, Danny has been given five rabies shots. However, unless the dog shows signs of rabies in the next nine days, the doctor advised that the shots will be discontinued.

Vandals Destroy Liquid Fertilizer At Local Firm

Vandals were at work in Earth recently, destroying approximately six thousand and fifty gallons of 28-0-0 Urea liquid fertilizer from an Earth Oil and Gas Company storage tank, owned by M. H. "Dutch" Been, owner-manager of the local firm.

The loss was discovered Monday morning by Bobby Dupler, employee at the local firm when he went down to the warehouse and fertilizer storage department located about three blocks south of Earth to see if they were going to have any drainage problems Monday due to the cold weather, and to check the pumps to see if they were frozen and bursted. As he arrived, he noticed the fertilizer on the ground.

Returning to the Earth Oil and Gas Company, he notified Been, who in turn called in Deputy Sheriff Clarence Hazlett and City Marshal Troy Coon to work on the case.

The first estimate of the cost of the fertilizer drained out on the ground was over \$8,000. However, a further examination of the tank, with a capacity of 10,000 gallons, showed that approximately 600 gallons remained in the tank as a result of the fertilizer flat gauge which caused the fertilizer to stop flowing when it reached the low mark.

Been said nothing was messed up at the scene, except the plug had been removed from the tank allowing the expensive loss of fertilizer. Hazlett was unavailable for details on the case.

Poll Tax Receipts Sold In County Total 4142

Poll tax receipts sold in Lamb County totaled 4,142 according to Herbert Dunn, Lamb County Tax Assessor Collector.

The 4,142 is a considerable decrease from the 1964 totals, the last year in which national, state and county races were scheduled.

In addition to those paying their poll tax, persons who were 60 years of age before January 1, 1965 will be eligible to vote without the necessity of purchasing a poll tax receipt or obtaining an exemption as under state law if there are no cities in Lamb County with over 10,000 population.

Dunn also stated that persons who have become 21 since January 1, 1965 need not purchase a poll tax but they must get a poll tax exemption 30 days prior to voting. These are at no cost to the individual.

Local Students To Participate In Oratorical Contest

An oratorical contest is scheduled to be held on February 22 at Muleshoe between the semi-finalists, competing in an all-expense paid Government-in-action youth tour, June 2 through 14 to Washington D. C. The Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association is sponsoring this contest, which is held annually.

Jo Ann Bray, Muleshoe, recently spoke to the students at Springlake-Earth school explaining to them that this contest is open to any boy or girl at least 16 years of age, but not 18 years, prior to September 1, 1966. WEAKENED BEYOND REPAIR

Governor Love of Colorado says: "If we demonstrate by community and state action that problems can be handled outside Washington--that federal control is not necessary--that the vacuum of community and state action does not exist-- then we've cut the federal planners off at the pockets, and made a great and substantial contribution to the future of our country."
In other words, if the nonfederal governments of this country show, by action and not just words, that they are capable of taking care of their own problems, demand for and acceptance of federal intervention at the local level will wither. There is no doubt that many of these governments have taken a "Let George do it" attitude, George being the federal agencies. Thus they have contributed, wittingly or not, to a seemingly endless extension of federal power that has gravely undermined the rights, responsibilities and obligations of the states and the communities. And when that happens, the individual becomes more and more of a statistic, with little or nothing effective to say about his destiny.
A continuation of the trend of late years can lead to only one result--that is, to make state and local governments little more than meaningless institutions. If that happens, the real strength of this nation, and with it our freedoms, will be weakened beyond repair.

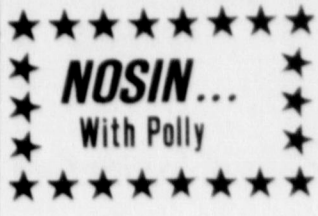

Draft Quota Slightly Lower

State draft boards are scheduled to induct 1,372 men into the armed forces in February, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

This compares with a quota of 1,475 in January and 1,523 in December. The February quota of 1,372 is the Texas share of a national call for 29,400 men, 26,400 for the Army and 3,000 for the Marine Corps.
Colonel Schwartz also announced that 8,640 men will be forwarded to examining and entrance stations during February to undergo the draft physical and mental examination.
Local board quotas for both induction and examination already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards. The February quota for induction will be filled with single and childless married men, 19 through 25 years old, and volunteers who have not attained the age of 26.
Unmarried men with children, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the February call.
"Draft boards must have the information about children, of course," Colonel Schwartz said, "and an unborn child must be certified by a physician. Otherwise, a young husband and father may find himself selected."

Excise Tax Cuts, If You Get To Keep Them, Will Mount Up

How much will Lamb County residents save on their purchases of goods and services this year under the new excise tax rates that are now in effect?
What will the saving amount to if the cuts on telephone service and car purchases are rescinded?
As of Jan. 1, these so-called "nuisance taxes," which Uncle Sam has been collecting on a host of consumer products, were slashed considerably or eliminated outright.

If Congress approves the proposal made by the President in his State of the Union message, however, the auto and telephone cuts will be shelved temporarily and the saving will be smaller.

The new cuts represent the second round of reductions provided for in the bill enacted last spring. Further cuts are scheduled for 1967, 1968 and 1969.

Just how much these excise taxes amount to per year is revealed in a report released

by the Internal Revenue Service.

It shows that they totaled \$14.8 billion in the past fiscal year and that \$710,940,000 of it came from the State of Texas.
A breakdown indicates that approximately \$1,347,000 of it was contributed by residents of Lamb County.

As a result of the new reductions that went into effect this year, local residents will no longer be paying a Federal tax when they go to the movies or to sporting events. Nor will they be paying a 10 per cent tax on electrical light bulbs or an eight per cent tax on automotive parts and accessories.

Other items affected range from chewing tobacco to transfers of stocks and bonds.

Even without the tax cuts on automobiles and telephones, Lamb County residents will be better off this year by an estimated \$67,000.

If they are continued, however, the local saving will be approximately \$164,000.

But the time the final batch of excise tax reductions go into effect, the nation's consumers will be paying \$4.6 billion less than they did a year ago.

For the average Lamb County family, based on its normal spending pattern, it will represent a saving of close to \$63 a year.

Farmer Home Administration Notified Of Loan Curtailment

The Lamb County Farmer's Home Administration office has been notified of a curtailment of funds for loans to county farmers.

Truman J. Jones, head of the FHA office here stated that at present the only loans his office can make are of the emergency type for certain farmers who have done business with the FHA in previous years.
"The directions we received Thursday prohibits us from either making initial loans of any type or making loans to farmers for the purpose of their buying farm equipment," stated Jones.

"At present the only type of loan we can still make to the farmer in the county is called an emergency type loan and we can only make this loan to farmers who had a similar type loan in 1965 or previous years and that loan re-paid in full. The emergency loan can only be used for operation of the farm or purchase of replacements for absolutely needed farm equipment," continued Jones.

"This type loan is a revolving type loan and has to be re-paid in full within a year while other type loans the farmer may have up to three years to re-pay," Jones said.

"With the directions we received Thursday at present


there is a good probability that we will not receive any additional funds for either regular type initial loans for loans for purchase of equipment until after the start of the new fiscal year in July 1966," Jones said.
"However, we have sent in a request to Washington for an additional type of emergency loans."

"This request, which has been approved by our state office and is now in Washington, is for money so that the FHA here can grant emergency loans to farmers who have not previously borrowed from the FHA. These loans could be used for operating expenses only," stated Jones.

"I submitted this request on January 19 after talking to all but one of the banks throughout the county, all of whom were in agreement with me that a request of this type should be made," Jones said.

When asked the cause of the curtailment, Jones stated that several reasons are behind it. "Six to eight years ago we could set up a farmer in business on approximately \$10,000 and now a similar operation would cost between \$20 and 25 thousand dollars. Then we have had an increase in the number of application for loans this year."

Less Drop Outs From School Than Ever Before

COLLEGE STATION, --More children are staying in school longer now than ever before, according to a recent report from the U. S. Office of Education, says Mrs. Patsy Yates, Extension family life education specialist at Texas A&M University.

Nationwide, for every 1,000 children in the fifth grade in 1957-58, an estimated 710 graduated from high school in 1965. Increases in staying power have been steady, Mrs. Yates emphasizes.

For example, there were 621 graduates in 1960 compared with 505 in 1950, and 455 in 1940 for each 1,000 pupils in the fifth grade eight years earlier.

The increase in college attendance is even more striking: 38 percent of our former fifth-graders now go on to college, as compared with only 16 percent 25 years earlier. If these trends should continue, about one-half of the students who enter college for the first time this fall will earn four-year (bachelor's) degrees.

"This trend is favorable for the future economic and social development of Texas. With 4,024,000 children under 18, Texas ranks third in the nation in numbers of children eligible for enrollment in school," Mrs. Yates says.

The Office of Education bases its retention rates on fifth-grade enrollment because of the high rate of retardation in the early grades. Compulsory attendance laws keep most children in school at least until the fifth grade, the specialist adds.

Lamb County Junior Livestock Show Set for February 18-19

The Lamb County Jr. Livestock Show has been set for February 18-19 by the show board of directors.

All Lamb County 4-H, FFA and FFA members residing at a attending school in Lamb County as of January 1, 1966, will be eligible to participate.

A boy or girl must own steers by September 15, 1965, and must own pigs and lamb 90 days before the date of the show, February 18, 1966.

Advance entries must be in by February 11, 1966 accompanied by entry fee of \$2.50 per steer and \$1.25 each for lambs and barrows.

There will be a division for steers, barrows and wether lambs. All animals must be in the barn by 11:00 a. m. Friday February 18.

Sifting will begin at 1:30 p. m. Friday, February 18.

Lamb judging will start at 5:30 p. m. Friday, February 18, 1966. Judging of barrows will begin at 9:00 a. m. Saturday, February 19. Steer judging will start at 1:00 p. m. Saturday, February 19.

Approximately \$750.00 will be distributed as premiums. Also the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion steer, swine and the 4 lamb champions will receive trophies.

Each exhibitor may enter 4 barrows but can only show two in any class, and each exhibitor will be limited to 3 steers and can show two in any class, and each exhibitor may enter 3 lambs and can show two in any class.

Weight limit for each division is as follows: Steers-600-1200

lbs.; Lambs-70 to 120 lbs. and barrows- 170 to 240 lbs.

In the swine division, there will be classes for Berkshires, crosses and all others, Hamshires, Chester Whites, Durocs and Poland Chinas. There will be two classes of steers, Angus and other beef breeds and Herefords. There will be 4 classes of lambs; (1) fine wool (2) medium wool, (3) Southdown and animals showing evidence of Southdown breeding and Shropshires will show in this class. The fourth class is Crossbred finewool and medium wool lambs.

Judges for the show are: Steers-Chile Smith of Tulsa; Lambs-Tom Neeley of Lubbock and Barrows-Larry Tackitt of Happy.

Christian Worker's School Scheduled February 14-17

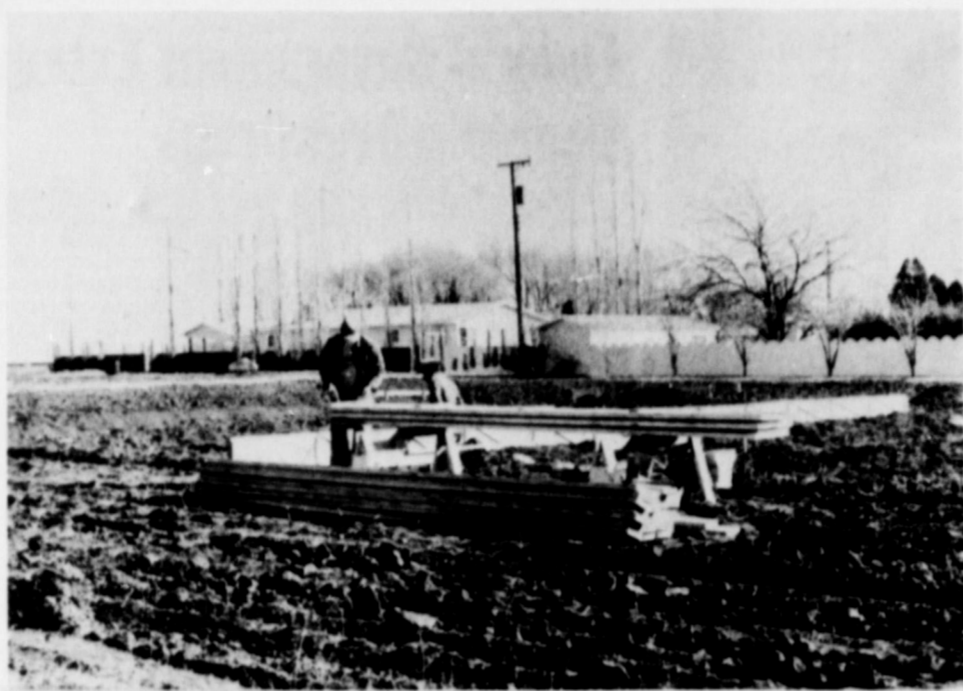

State Water Development Board Will Provide Info For Landowners Tax Deducts

The Texas Water Development Board will provide information for landowners to claim income tax deductions for depletion of ground water in the southern High Plains if landowners want the service, Joe G. Moore, Jr., executive director of the Texas Water Development Board, said Tuesday.

The Internal Revenue Service has requested the State agency to explore underground water depletion in the Ogallala aquifer south of the Canadian River so that cost-depletion income tax refund claims may be supported. Moore said the Texas Water Development Board will make the study if enough landowners want the service. He estimated the total cost of providing the basic data for this area would be \$105,000 between now and February, 1967. The cost to an individual landowner will depend upon the number desiring the water depletion information.

It is estimated that 10,000 landowners live in the area to be covered by the proposed study. Eligible taxpayers are due an estimated \$1,000,000 in refunds.

Veterans to Receive First Payments of '66 Dividends

World War II veterans have just a year and a half left to obtain GI guaranteed or insured loans, Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, pointed out today.

Deadline for World War II eligibility is July 25, 1967, he said. Eligibility has been expiring for World War II veterans according to a formula that adds ten years to the date of their last discharge from active wartime service plus one year for each 90 days of that service. The date reached by this formula is the individual deadline date for each veteran.

Thus eligibility has already expired for many World War II veterans but the July 25, 1967, deadline terminates the program for all of them, even though the formula would give longer period of eligibility.

Veterans who were discharged for a service-connected disability will be eligible until the final termination date of July 25, 1967; this also applies to widows of veterans who died of service-connected disabilities. Those eligible may obtain a

guaranteed loan to purchase a home, a farm or to buy or start a business.

The formula for determining the length of time Korean Conflict veterans will be eligible for GI loans is the same as for World War II veterans. However, Korean Conflict entitlement did not begin to expire until January 31, 1965, and the final deadline date is January 31, 1975, Coker said.

Korean Conflict veterans discharged for service-connected disabilities and widows of Korean Conflict veterans who died from such disabilities may take advantage of the final 1975 deadline, the VA manager added.

He pointed out that a veteran's loan cannot be guaranteed unless the loan application is received by the VA before the veteran's eligibility expires. Loan applications are ordinarily sent to the VA by lenders. The veteran, therefore, should see that his loan application reaches the VA before his entitlement expires.

An application for a Certificate of Eligibility is not a loan application, Coker warned.

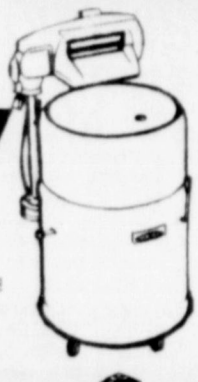

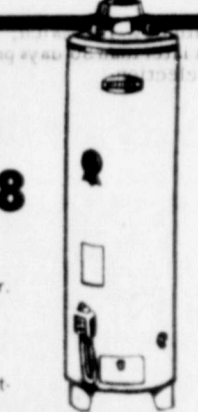

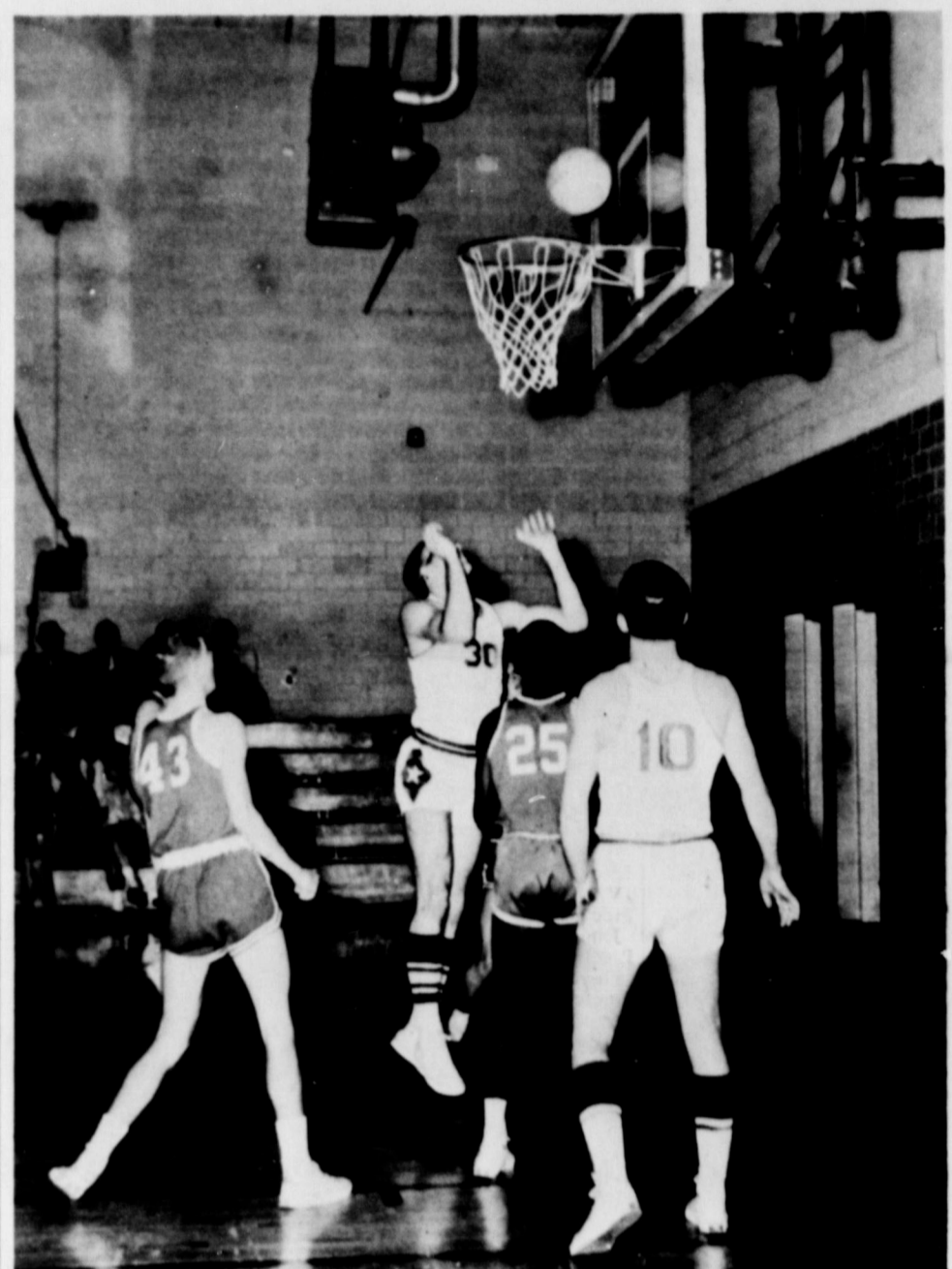

Chemical weed control will be the topic of a presentation by Agricultural Engineer, Elmer Hudspeth, of the South Plains Research and Extension Center.

Hudspeth is a well known person on the South Plains for his

Bill Lyle, Extension irrigation specialist from Lubbock will talk on water conservation. Lyle, a native of Falls, will discuss methods which stretch and conserve water.

Agricultural outlook and use of fertilizer will be discussed by two Extension specialists from Texas A&M University. Economist John McHaney will talk on the agricultural outlook for the coming year and Agronomist John Box will talk on the use of fertilizer.

McNutt said every local farmer who attends can expect to get new information that could help to improve management and profits on his farm.

Cattle Quarantine In Effect For Portion Of County

The Administrator of the Agricultural Research Service, Animal Health Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on January 14, 1966, issued a Federal quarantine restricting the movement of all cattle from certain portions of five Texas Counties (Castro, Lamb, Hale, Swisher and Floyd.) This applies to cattle being offered for shipment to points out of the state of Texas, only. Such quarantine will appear in the Federal Register. The two Federal Cattle Scabies Quarantine.

The portion of Castro, Swisher, Hale and Lamb Counties surrounding Hart in Castro County, Texas, lying within the area bounded by a line beginning at a point in Dimmitt where State Highway 86 intersects U. S. Highway 385; thence running in a southerly direction along Highway 385 for a distance of approximately 22 miles to U. S. Highway 70; thence running in a easterly direction along Highway 70 for a distance of approximately 25 miles to Farm Road 1424; thence running in a northerly direction along Road 1424 for a distance of approximately 24 miles to State Highway 86; thence run-

ning in a westerly direction along State Highway 86 for a distance of approximately 22 miles to point beginning in the town of Dimmitt.

Producers and shippers offering cattle for movement to other states from the quarantined areas are required to secure the services of a Federal Livestock Inspector prior to moving such cattle. Relocation of cattle to avoid such inspection is prohibited. Producers anticipating sale of cattle into a market which offers cattle for movement to other states should request Federal inspection prior to movement from any premise lying within the quarantined areas. All requests for Federal inspection should be routed through inspector V. H. Holland, Congress Inn, Plainview, Texas.

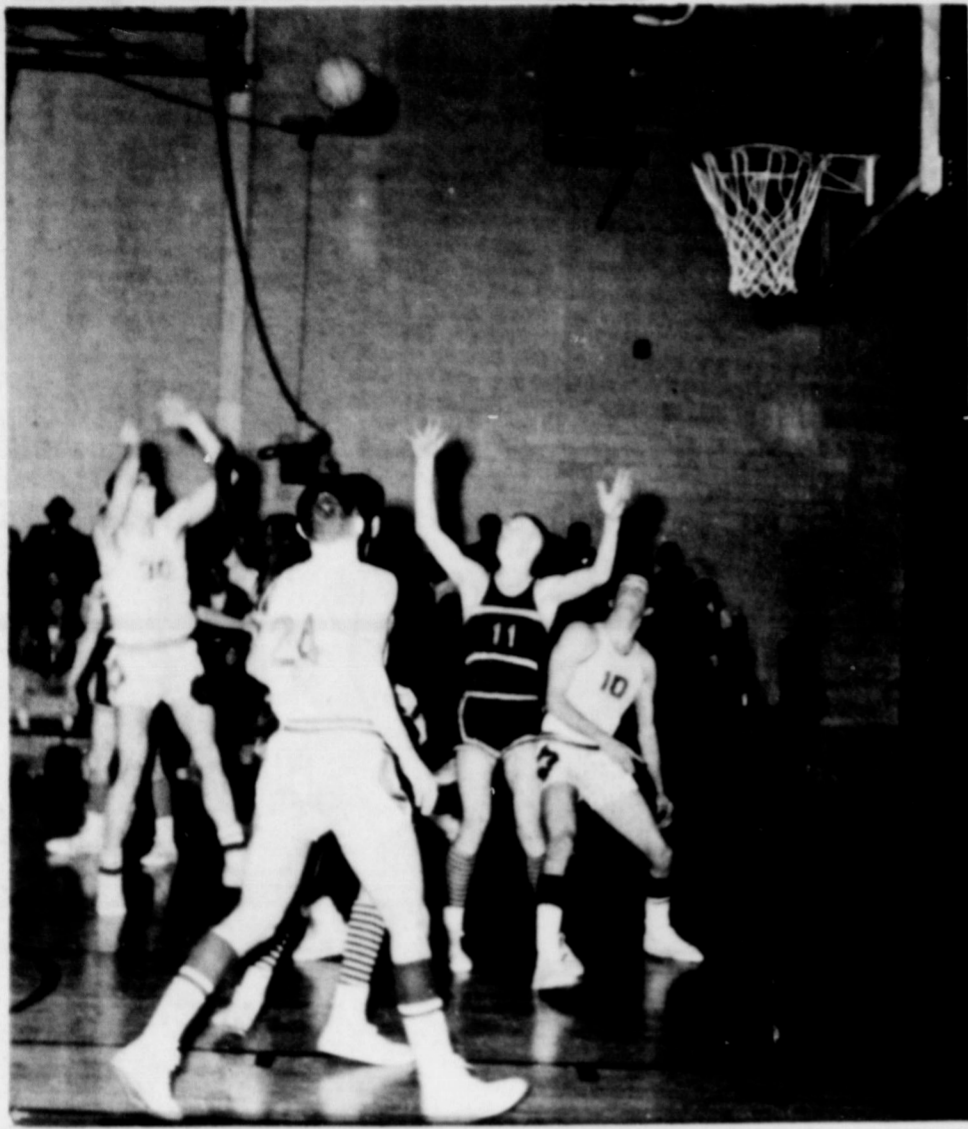
