In one of Lamb County's biggest liquor law violations was a truck load of beer and whiskey brought in by Earth's Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith Jr. early Monday morning. The load consisted of 500 cases of beer and two cases of whiskey.

Sheriff Makes Chase Alone

Deputy Smith was alone when he overtook the 1959 G. M. C. truck, driven by a Latin American, six miles south of Earth at 1:30 a.m. Monday. Smith radioed for help, but found his radio was out. He then began a chase which lasted 15 miles on dirt road toward Littlefield. When Smith overtook the truck, the driver jumped from the truck and ran into farming and ranch land. Due to the darkness, the deputy was unable to find the driver of the truck. Smith guarded the truck and later received help.

The load was seized and turned over to the Lamb County Liquor Control board at Littlefield.

At press time Wednesday, Smith told the Earth News-Sun reporter that the driver of the truck had not been found, but following a check with New Mexico State officials the truck was owned by Juan Ysagua of Lubbock. Ysagua has been charged with several liquor law violations in Lubbock.

Smith said he had been trying for several months to find the route of the bootlegger and decided to make a late night and early morning check of dirt roads leading off the main roads.

Smith became deputy sheriff at Earth in November 1958.

Car Wreck Sends Car Down Sidewalk

A two car wreck at 9 a.m. Wednesday at an intersection on Main Street sent a 1959 Chevrolet, owned by Freddie Maxxy upon the curb and down the sidewalk coming to a stop in front of Gerald's Barber Shop and Thompson Chevrolet Co.

Joe Hood, negro was driving a 1957 Chevrolet 4-door car and rammed the Maxxy car from behind, trying to avoid hitting a pickup truck driven by W. C. Stout according to Jim Freeman of the State Highway Patrol of Muleshoe who investigated the wreck.

Maxxy's car was parked on Main Street at the Thompson Chevrolet Co. used car lot. The impact shot the car 85 feet between a pickup and an old model Ford car parked on the used car lot, that bystanders said would have been almost impossible to drive between only slightly damaging the bumper of the Ford car.

No injuries were reported to the four occupants of the 1957 Chevrolet which were two negro men and two negro women.

One ticket was issued to Hood for driving at an unsafe speed within the city limits.

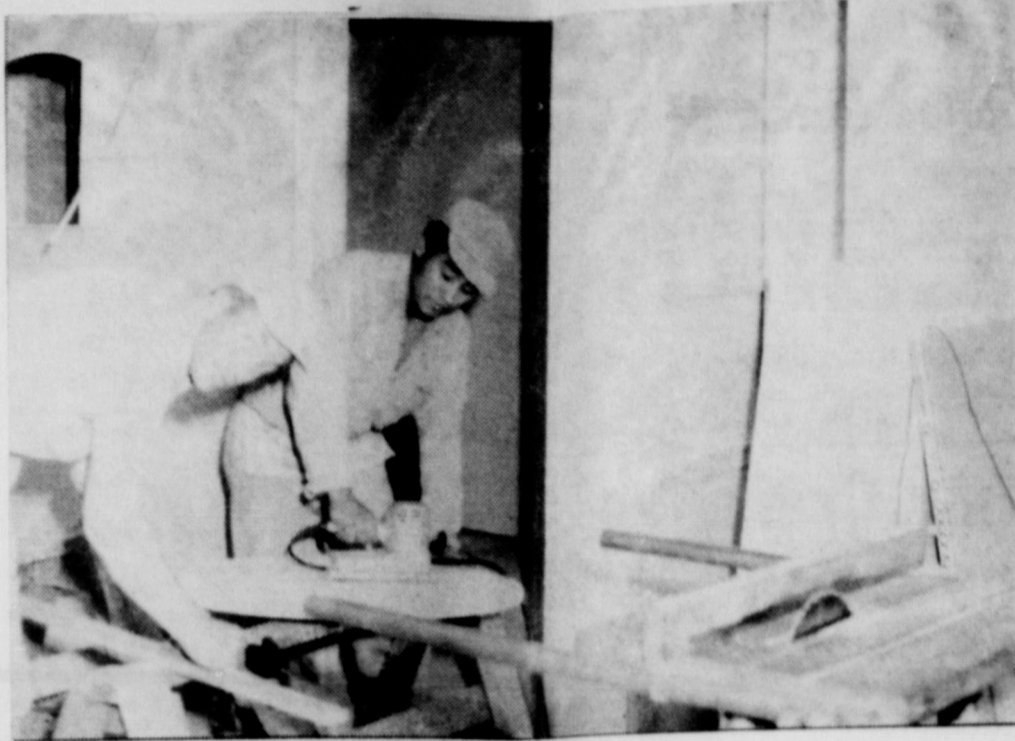

Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, in an effort to focus the motoring public's attention on increased dangers of highway travel during the Fourth of July weekend.

Musick pointed out that since the Fourth falls on a Saturday, this year, many Texans will receive a holiday on Friday or Monday. This will give families a chance to take short vacation trips.


"Weekend travel is normally dangerous enough," he said, "but when you couple it with a holiday it literally becomes murderous."

For those who plan to make a trip, Musick had these words of safety advice: "There is a common saying which states that 'Accident is just another word until one happens to YOU!' Any motorists will do well to remember this slogan before he gets behind the steering wheel. He should remember, too, that the most tragic accident is not necessarily the one in which HE might be killed. If there is any doubt about this, ask the person who has been in an accident in which others were killed or one in which he lost his eyesight or was, perhaps, permanently crippled.

"There are many people who live an accident every day of their life, through mental anguish and

physical suffering." The safety expert emphasized that travelers should not undertake journeys of a greater distance than can be driven at a leisurely pace, with allowance for heavy traffic and other delays. 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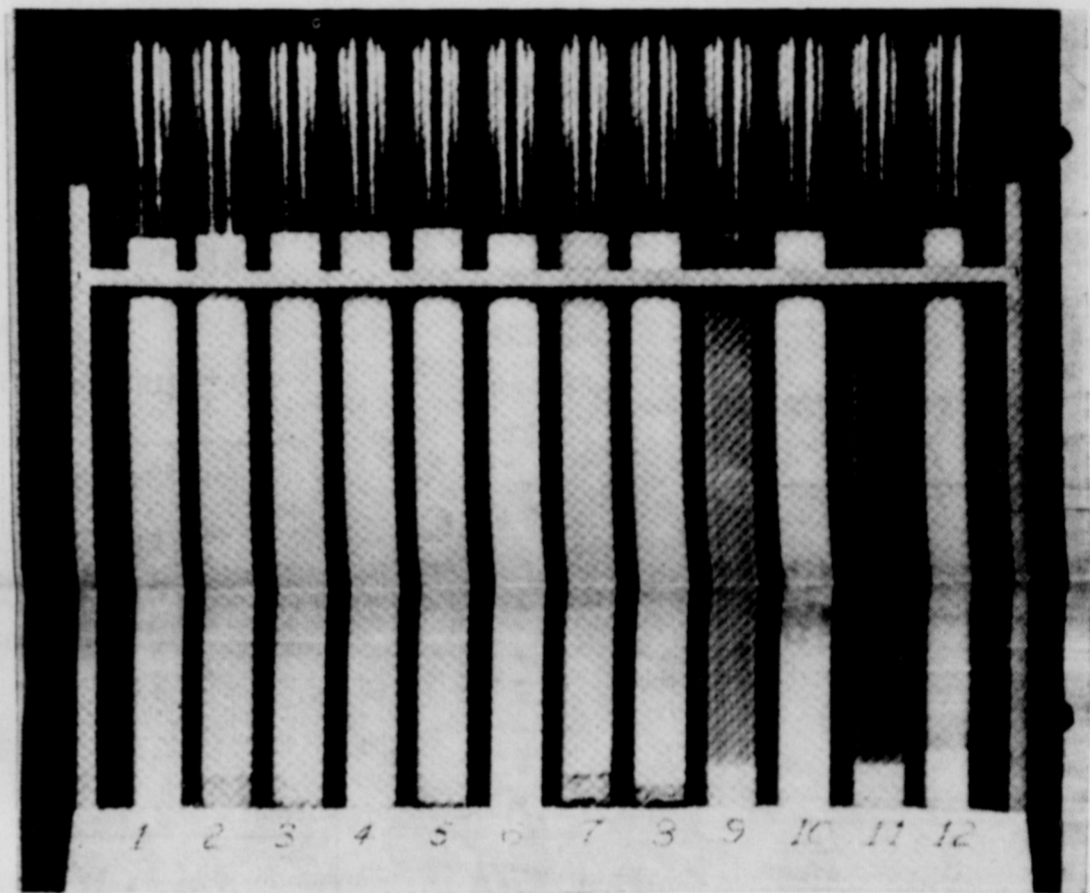
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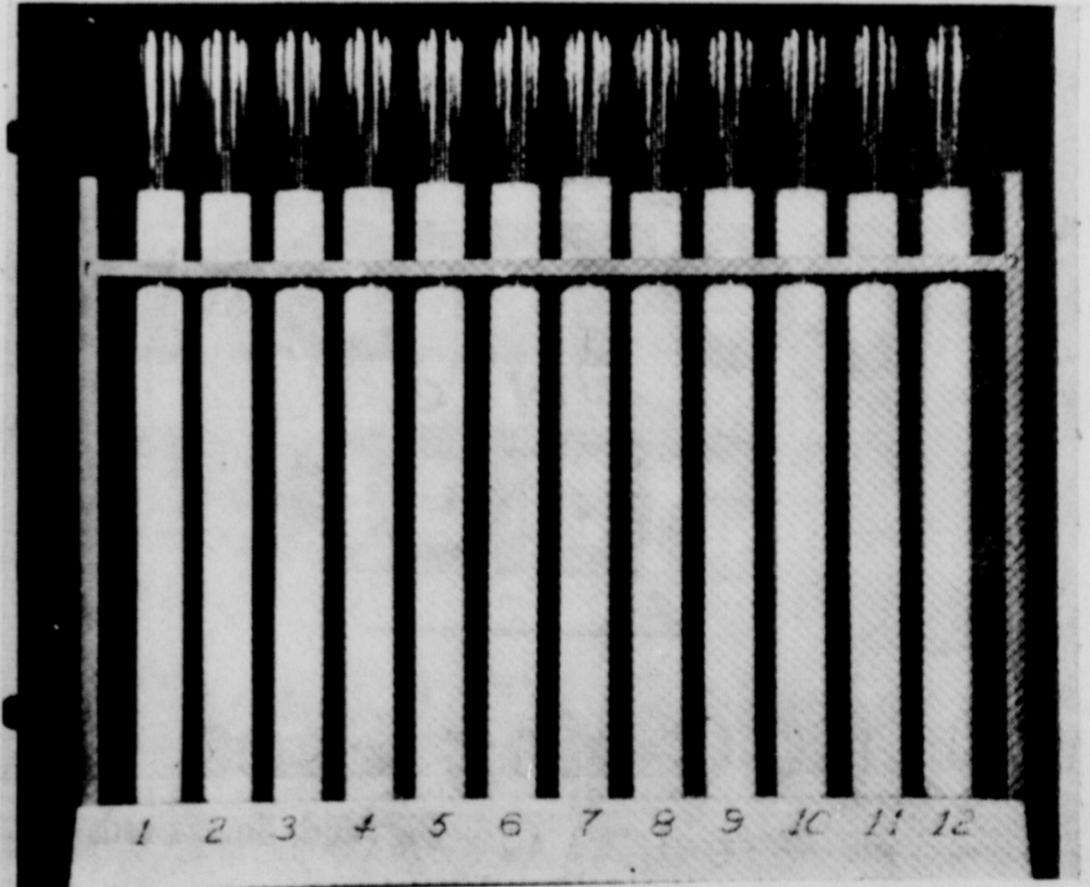

Senator Rogers Elected President of Pro Tempore

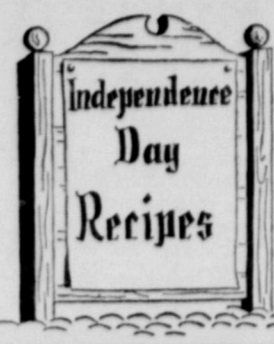
26 Auto Fatalities in Texas Predicted This Holiday Weekend

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety forecast recently 26 persons will be killed in traffic accidents this weekend when the Fourth of July holiday creates one of the most deadly three-day driving periods of the year.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director, issued the grim prediction along with an urgent plea to motorists to "prove we have overestimated by maintaining unusual alertness to the added dangers of holiday traffic."

He noted that the prediction of 26 traffic fatalities is more than the 25 victims counted in a similar three-day Fourth of July period last year, he said, because of a definite upward trend in motor-rides.

"Therefore, it can be said that the streets and highways of Texas will be potentially more dangerous during the celebration of independence Day this year," Garrison said.

Whether you are planning a picnic, patio party or what have you—here are some culinary "tips" that will fit in fine for your Fourth of July celebration. Try 'em!

Creamy Berry Sauce
(Makes about 2 cups of sauce for cake, cottage pudding or gingerbread)
½ cup (½ 15-oz. can) Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk

3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup sliced strawberries or fresh raspberries
Cold water

Combine sweetened condensed milk and lemon juice. Stir until mixture thickens. Add fruit. Blend well. Add water by tablespoons until of desired consistency.

Patio Creamy Dressing

¾ cup light cream
3 tablespoons vinegar
¼ cup Corn Oil
2 teaspoons sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon paprika
Few grains pepper
1 small clove garlic

Measure light cream, vinegar and Corn Oil into a bottle or jar. Add sugar, salt, paprika, pepper and small clove of garlic. Cover and shake well. Chill several hours. Shake thoroughly before serving. Makes 1 cup. Serve with tossed greens or vegetables or with slices of avocado, grapefruit and onion.

The Public Safety Director announced that "Operation Holiday" will be in effect starting at 12:01 a.m. Friday, July 3, until midnight Sunday, July 5. During this period all radar units available will be in operation, and the Highway Patrol force will be expanded

by some 125 additional patrolmen from the License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection divisions.

"We will do everything in our power to stem the tide of motor-rides this weekend," he said, "but the main job belongs to the driving public, who must guard against dangerous driving factors such as speed to fast for conditions, drinking and driving, fatigue and just general inattention."

Garrison reminded also: "The fatality list, already nearing the 1,000 mark at mid-year, is shocking. But in addition we must remember the untold suffering of thousands of persons who are injured in highway wrecks in addition to the tremendous economic loss involved."

He pointed out that traffic deaths are up about 10 per cent over last year, with approximately 100 more victims counted to date.

This factor was taken into consideration by N. K. Woerner, Manager of the Statistical Services Section, in arriving at the estimate of 26 motor-rides for the three-day holiday. Woerner reported that by coincidence, the average Fourth of July traffic death toll over the last eight years was 26. The highest toll for the three-day period was in 1954, when 33 persons were killed in traffic.

"In addition to the greater traffic hazard, July Fourth celebrations involve swimming, boating, picnicking and fireworks," Woerner noted. "Drownings, food poisonings and burns are of high frequency during this period. To protect life and property, the public should be extra cautious in all their activities."

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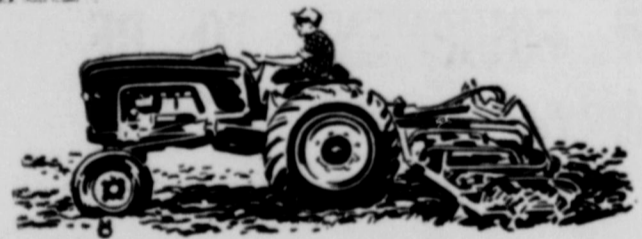
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
