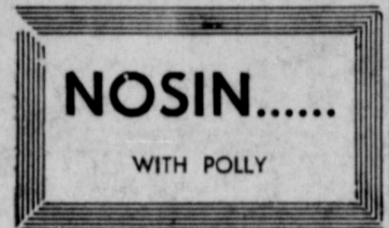




Town Improvements Discussed At Merchant Planning Clinic

Social Security Representative To Be At Earth Postoffice, September 4th

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Earth on September 4 at 11:00 a.m. at the Post Office and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

If you intend to retire this month and file a claim at the Social Security District Office for retirement benefits, you should bring the W-2 which you received from your employer, or a copy of your 1956 income tax return, according to John G. Hutton, manager of that office.

The W-2 can be used to verify your 1956 earnings if you worked for someone else. The income tax return, plus a carefully completed Schedule C, Profit or Loss from Business, is essential if you were in business for yourself in 1956. Cancelled check or other evidence of payment of the social security tax should also be available if you were self-employed in 1956.

Mr. Hutton points out that the social security amendments of 1956, which brought new groups under the program, reduced the retirement age for women, and provided benefits for the severely disabled worker age 50 to 65, are responsible for the sharp increase in the work in his office.

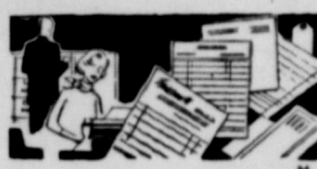

Class 8: "Natures Bewitching Beauty" — Living plant arrangement — plants with roots combined with cut flowers, berried shrubs or greenery in suitable containers, mass or line arrangement.

Class 9: "Horn of Plenty" — Fruits, vegetables, nuts, fresh or dried materials — ornamental fruit, (cornucopia container).

Class 10: "Frost On the Pumpkin" — (a) all dried materials in suitable container — wood or rock, (b) dried and live materials, (c) dried material combined with fresh

fruit or vegetables, or both — basket container.

Class 11: "Holiday Delight" — (a) mantel arrangements — suitable material and accessories, (b) Table arrangement — evergreens, fruits, berries, candles, including snow scene, (c) church arrangement — all white accessories.

Class 12: "Green Hills" — All green arrangement, container and flowers.

SECTION B HORTICULTURE GENERAL RULES

1. Only one entry in each class may be made by exhibitor.

ITS THE LAW in TEXAS

HERE'S HOW STATE DIVIDES ESTATES WHEN THERE IS NO WILL

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children, and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and the descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father.

Cooking For Two Presents Problems

College Station — Cooking for two presents problems whether you are newly weds or alone after the grown family is gone. The problem of what-to-serve is complicated by leftovers that accumulate.

Advance planning is just as important when cooking for two as it is for a large family, according to extension foods and nutrition specialists. Plan the week's menu ahead of time, but make flexible enough for changes. If you decide on the main course the rest of the meal falls easily into place. The Texas Food Standard is the recommended guide for meal planning.

Meat is usually the main item to consider. When possible, choose a meat that does double duty, such as a roast that can be served for Sunday dinner and used later in the week as cold roast beef slices for supper.

Space your menu well, so that you will not be eating the same kind of meat for three days in a row. Keep cooked meat covered tightly or wrap in waxed paper or foil and store in the refrigerator. Do not handle it again until you are ready to use it.

Desserts need not be a problem when preparing meals for two. Fruit and cheese, ice cream and sherbert are favorites and easily adaptable for meals for two. Individual pie shells and the already-cooked pie fillings on the market today may be the answer to dessert problems.

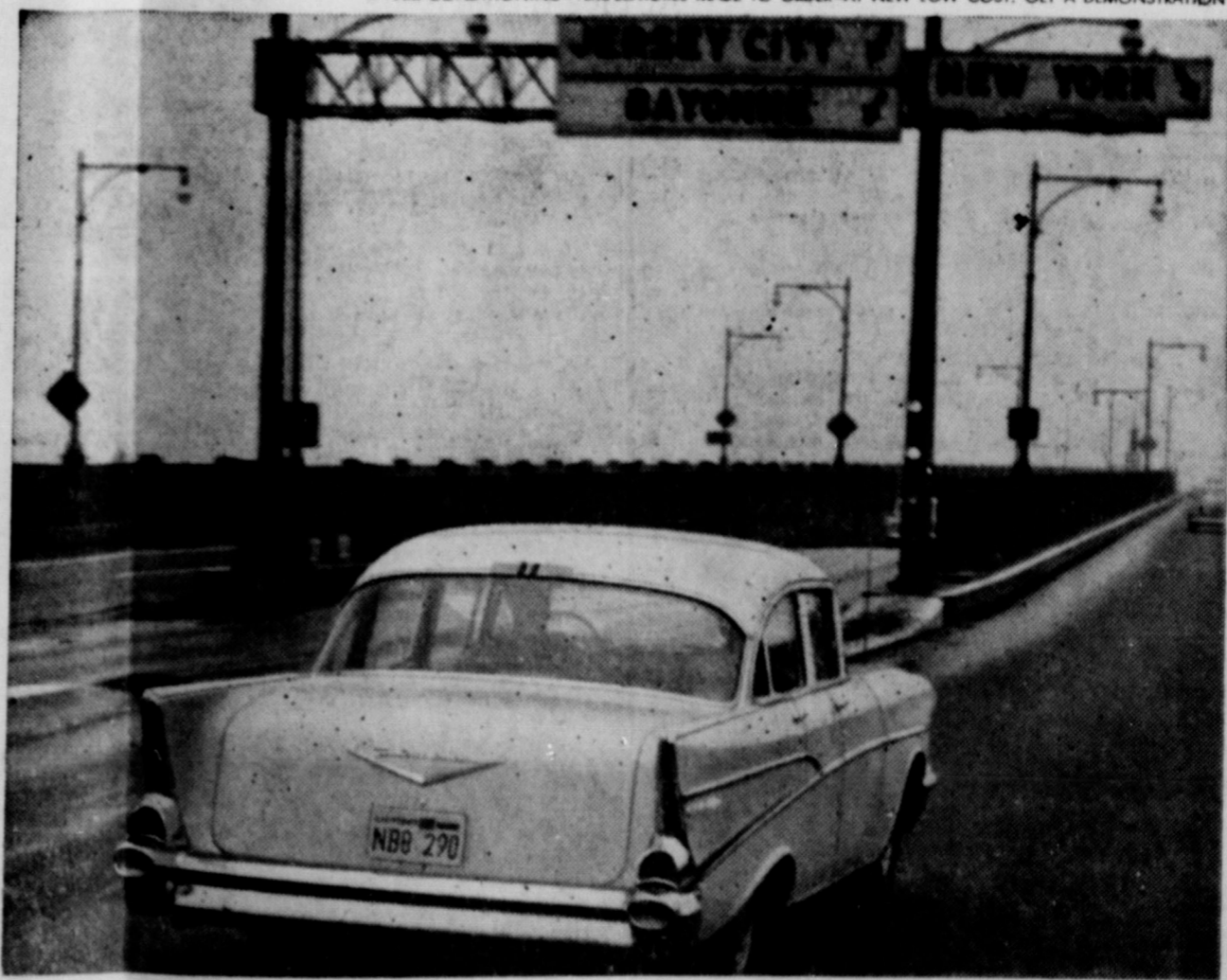
