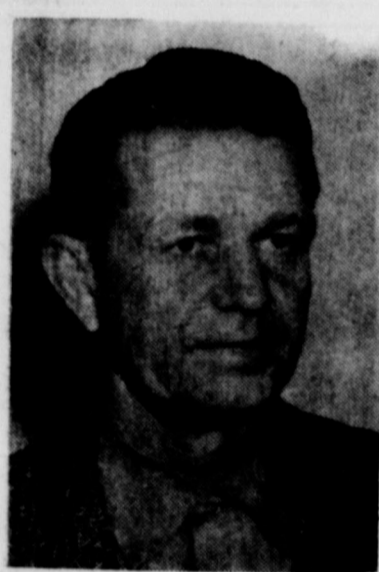

Sandhill Water Rites Sold To Lubbock and S. W. Public

The City of Lubbock and the Southwestern Public Service Company purchased all the remaining water rights owned by Ewell Halsell and family in Lamb and Bailey Counties, Monday, with the purchase of 37,000 acres of land at \$35 per acre, for approximately \$1,300,000.

In addition, Lubbock purchased 13,000 acres from John McMurtry of West Bailey County for \$35 an acre, bringing the cost to Lubbock to nearly a million dollars. The City of Muleshoe contracted for 5,000 acres for \$35 an acre, also from McMurtry.

More than 40,000 acres of Lamb County water rights are now owned by Southwestern Public Service, with the purchase of the

land from Halsell. Lubbock also purchased 5,000 acres of land north of Sudan and the Public Service Company bought 21,575 acres in the north central and the northeast part of the county. These transactions brought a halt to plans of farmers south of Sudan for an irrigation project of 25,000 acres of dry land.

According to Halsell spokesman the transactions will be completed as soon as the land can be surveyed and legal work completed.

Last summer Lamb County voters turned down an opportunity to buy 24,000 acres when they defeated an election creating a water district which would have had authority to vote bonds and purchase water rights.

Officers of Local Clubs Invited To Participate in Program Plans Clinic

LUBBOCK — Newly-elected officers and program chairmen of PTA's, study clubs, mental health groups, civic and service clubs and church groups are invited to participate in a Program Planning Clinic sponsored by Sudan in co-operation with the Adult Education Program at Texas Tech.

The meeting will be held from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on April 11, 1957 at the Sudan High School Auditorium.

One of a dozen such clinics being conducted around the West Texas region, the local area meeting will also bring together new leaders of community groups from Earth, Sudan, Muleshoe, Littlefield and Norton.

A program planning clinic, like a health clinic, is designed to meet the specific problems and needs of the people coming to it, according to G. H. Peters, field representative for the Adult Education Program.

He pointed out that, "Newly-elected officers and program chairmen always have certain problems. How do we plan ahead for the coming year? What subjects shall we deal with? How can we present the programs so that the members will be interested and attend regularly?"

The program planning clinic deals with both techniques of effective presentation and suggests program ideas and sources of materials, Peters stated.

"As in the building of a house, members of each family must determine how many rooms they need, the activities which are to be accommodated, the general style they desire, and how much they are able to pay for it. 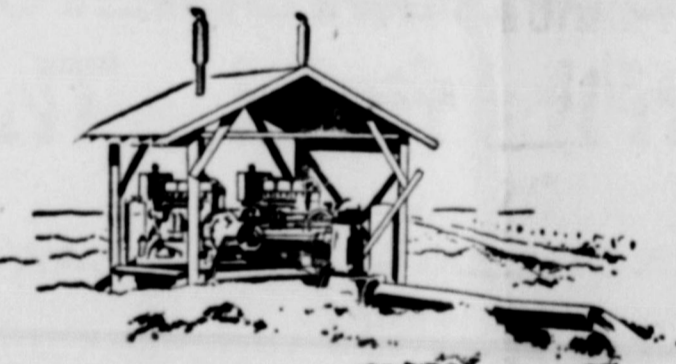

Crops to be tested are: Grain Sorghum — 49 leading varieties and hybrids will be tested in 2 row plots 100 feet long replicated 4 times. 100 experimental varieties and hybrids will be planted in 10-15 acre field sized plots for comparison.

Cotton — 25 varieties of cotton will be planted in 4 row plots 100 feet long with 4 replications. Advanced strains test of strains from seed breeders to observe characteristics and production of strains which these breeders are developing for this area. 7 leading varieties will be planted in field sized areas of 8-10 acres to compare them on this larger scale.

Sesame — 50 strains of sesame including 5 direct harvest or non-shattering types will be compared in small plots. Renner No. 15, a non-shattering type, will be planted in a seed production field.

Corn — 100 varieties and hybrids will be tested in small plots to determine adaptability in this area. Seed of T. R. F. No. 9, a white hybrid developed at Renner for the milling industry, will be produced in a seed production block.

Soybeans — 10 leading varieties will be tested in replicated 2 row 100 foot plots. 50 varieties and strains will be planted in a production and observation test.

Castor Beans — 12 varieties of castor beans will be grown in a test to determine best variety for this area. Test to solve the volunteer problem will be initiated.

Sunflowers — 40 strains of sunflowers will be tested in replicated tests.

Grasses — 21 different grasses will be planted to study their place in this area.

Many of the tests listed above will be duplicated on dry land to determine the productivity of these

crops without irrigation.

In addition to the tests outlined here, Dr. Davis stated that Dr. Longnecker, Head of the High Plains Station would be conducting fertilizer and other soils tests with these crops.

Dr. Earl Collier, Head of the Plant Sciences Department, Ralph Andrews, Business Manager and Controller and Huey Whitehurst, Administrative Assistant to the Director, from the Texas Research Foundation spent 3 days at the High Plains Station and Plainview

confering with officers of the Regional Council and the staff at the Station.

The conference concerned the coordination of administrative activities of the Station and the research material available and the location of seed production areas away from the Station for various crops available for increase.
