

Two Thefts Reported In Earth Area

Two residential thefts in the Earth and Springlake Communities were reported to authorities during the past week.

A Springlake man, Refugio Lopez, returned home Thursday from a trip to Mexico to find his house had been broken into. Among the items missing were a 21-inch black and white Zenith television set, a Silverton record player, a new G. E. Radio, 10 records and three six-foot extension cords. The total value of the items has not been determined.

The Lamb County Sheriff's Department reported Wednesday that Alvin Pittman, Earth City Marshal had recovered the television set, but no other information was available for print.

The second robbery was reported earlier in the week by Morton Rosalez who lives three miles north and one mile west of Springlake. Earth School, Rosalez reported the theft of a portable Zenith television set and a record player valued at \$300.

Entrance into both of the houses was made through the doors. No other destructive damage to property was reported. This is the first time that items have been reported stolen from either of the residents.

Investigating both incidents was Elmer Gray, deputy of the Olton Sheriff's Department.

1970 License Plates Received At City Hall

The new 1970 license plates have been received at Earth City Hall and will go on sale February 1.

The '70 license plates have a new color scheme—light blue on a reflective white background.

Received at City Hall were 800 passenger car tags with numbers CDB 10-800; 300 commercial tags, numbers LM-9700-9999; and 350 farm license plates ranging from SE-6650-6999.

A new license renewal system is being instituted this year. Car owners need only take the "License Plate Renewal Application" form they received and the fee to the county tax office or a substitution. With the application, the clerk will need only to receive the fee, affix to the application a sticker showing the registration number and other data and hand over the 1970 plates.

With the application there will no longer be any need to present the certificate of title or the last year's registration receipt.

Persons who do not come in with the new application form will be required to present their title certificate and current license receipt before their plates will be issued.

Although owners can register their vehicles in person until April 1, there is a March 1 cut-off date for mail registration. This allows 30 days for delivery before 1970 plates must be displayed on vehicles.

If the vehicle owner wants his plates mailed to him, he should send his registration application to the county tax collector, with the registration fee plus \$1, which is the statutory charge for handling and postage. Vehicles weighing up to 3,500 pounds will cost the owner \$12.30; those weighing from 3,510 to 4,500 pounds, \$22.30; and those weighing from 4,501 to 6,000 will require a fee of \$30.30.

Voter Registration Period Nears January 31 Deadline

As the January 31 deadline for voters to register draws near, Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr., the state election officer, has issued a "last call" to those who are 21 or over.

Registration is at the county tax assessor-collector's office, but in many counties, deputies have been set up at convenient locations.

Under an old law, persons past 60 in small towns and rural areas did not have to register each year, but registration is now required every year. If they fail to register by January 31, they will not be able to vote in this year's important elections.

Dies also pointed out that young people who will become 21 during 1970 can register before their 21st birthday. The tax office will mark on their registration certificate the date on which they will become 21 and therefore eligible to vote.

In Lamb County 42.2 percent of the voter registration quota set by the Texas Democratic Party has been attained, leaving a great potential for increased voter registration.

There is still a short time left to register. The office in the Lamb County Courthouse will be closed January 31, so registrations should be made in person by closing time January 30, or applications must be post-marked by January 31 in order to meet qualifications.

County voters will be facing several elections during 1970. Are you among those who will be eligible to vote? If not register now!

Membership Meet For Water Inc., Set February 17

Lubbock--Two of the leaders in the field of water resource planning and development will address the third annual Water, Inc., membership meeting February 17, in Lubbock.

Keynote speaker for the day-long meeting slated at the Koko Palace will be James Smith, Washington, assistant Secretary of the Interior for Water and Power Development. The Bureau of Reclamation comes under the supervision of the assistant secretary.

Luncheon speaker for the membership meeting will be Lt. Gen. Frederick Clarke, also of Washington, Chief of the Corps of Engineers.

More than 800 persons are expected to be on hand for the membership meeting which will be climaxed with a business session. Those attending will select six directors-at-large to serve on the organization's 41-member board of directors. Major ballots for 14 district directors will also be tabulated, and the results announced at the session.

Following adjournment of the general business session, the board will convene to elect officers. K. B. "Tex" Watson of Amarillo, is the current president.

In addition to the two key speakers, the program line-up reads "like a Who's Who" in water resource planning and development. The list includes Judge Orha Dent of Austin, chairman of the Texas Water Rights Commission; Howard

Boswell of Austin, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board; Hugh C. Yantis Jr., executive director of the Texas Water Quality Board; J. R. Singleton of Austin, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department; Josiah Wheat of Woodville, a member of the National Water Commission and president of the Texas State Bar; Col. R. S. Kristoferson of Fort Worth, district engineer, Corps of Engineers; Harry Burleigh of Austin, area engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation; Dr. Ernest Gloyna of Austin, director of the Water Resources Center, University of Texas; and Dr. Herb Grubb, a special assistant in the governor's office.

The meeting marks the first time the annual meeting has been held in Lubbock. Water, Inc., was formed at a meeting in Lubbock in mid-1967. Last year the meeting was conducted in Amarillo, and the first annual session was convened in Plainview.

Water, Inc., is a membership-based, non-profit organization working in the field of water resource planning, development and conservation. It lists more than 2,000 members in West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and in the Oklahoma Panhandle.

What's Really Important About Young Drivers

Dallas - What is the real problem when a youngster starts to drive? His safety? Concern for others? The cost of auto insurance?

Insurance companies hear much about auto insurance rates for the young driver, the Insurance Information Institute says, but these rates recognize and encourage safe driving in a situation where there isn't enough of it.

Although only 20.9 per cent of the nation's motoring population is under age 25, drivers age 24 and younger were involved in 34.6 per cent of all reported accidents and 33.9 per cent of fatal accidents in this country in 1968.

the average rate of 67 for all group, according to the National Safety Council. Because younger drivers tend to have more frequent and more serious accidents, they run up a bigger accident bill and auto insurance rates are higher for those in this group.

However, steps can be taken to limit the extent of the premium increase when a young person starts driving the family car. A premium discount offered by most insurance companies for youthful motorists who have satisfactorily completed a recognized driver education course offered by high schools and colleges.

Also, many insurers offer a premium discount ranging up to 15 per cent for young drivers who maintain good grades in school, the Institute said, reflecting the fact that generally good students also have good driving records.

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Services For Area Columnist Held Saturday

Services for O. C. McBride Jr. were held Saturday at 10 a. m. in the Crescent Park Church of Christ, Bob Wear, minister, and Rev. Joe James, pastor of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church, officiated.

McBride was found dead in the garage of his home in Littlefield at about 4 p. m. Thursday, when his wife returned from a visit with friends. He had apparently been working on his car. The motor was running and the door was closed. The hood had been raised and there were tools scattered on the floor and the fender. Justice of the Peace J. W. Bowen said his inquest ruling would be accidental death by asphyxiation.

McBride was known to people throughout the South Plains and much of the nation as "Turnrow Tunkel." McBride's humorous column had appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal and had been syndicated for nationwide distribution. His quips, quirks, and quotes dealt heavy blows to all areas of life, from the home to business and from the city to national affairs.

McBride was a native of Rule and had attended schools in southwestern Oklahoma. He moved to Littlefield 15 years ago from Lamesa. He operated a cotton gin near Lazbuddie, was a cotton farmer, and a veter-

eran of World War II. McBride is survived by his wife, Ethel; four daughters, Marcia and Jane, both students at the University of Texas, and Cathy and Barbara of the home, a brother, Bill of Corpus Christi; and a sister, Mrs. Chem Terry of Fort Worth.

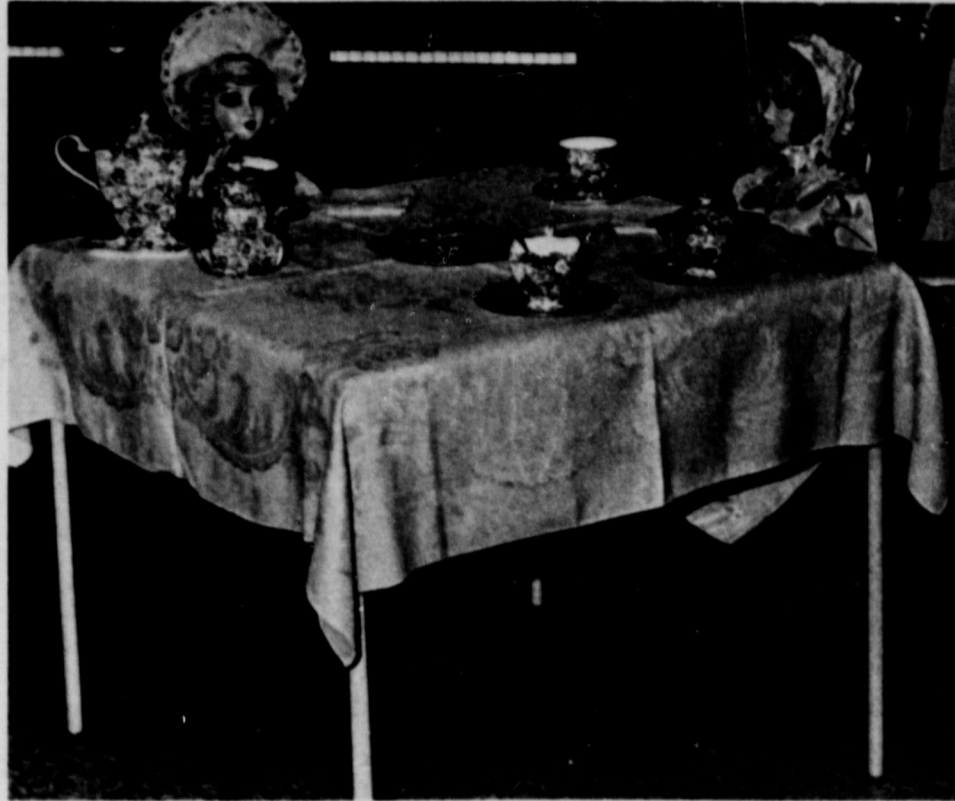

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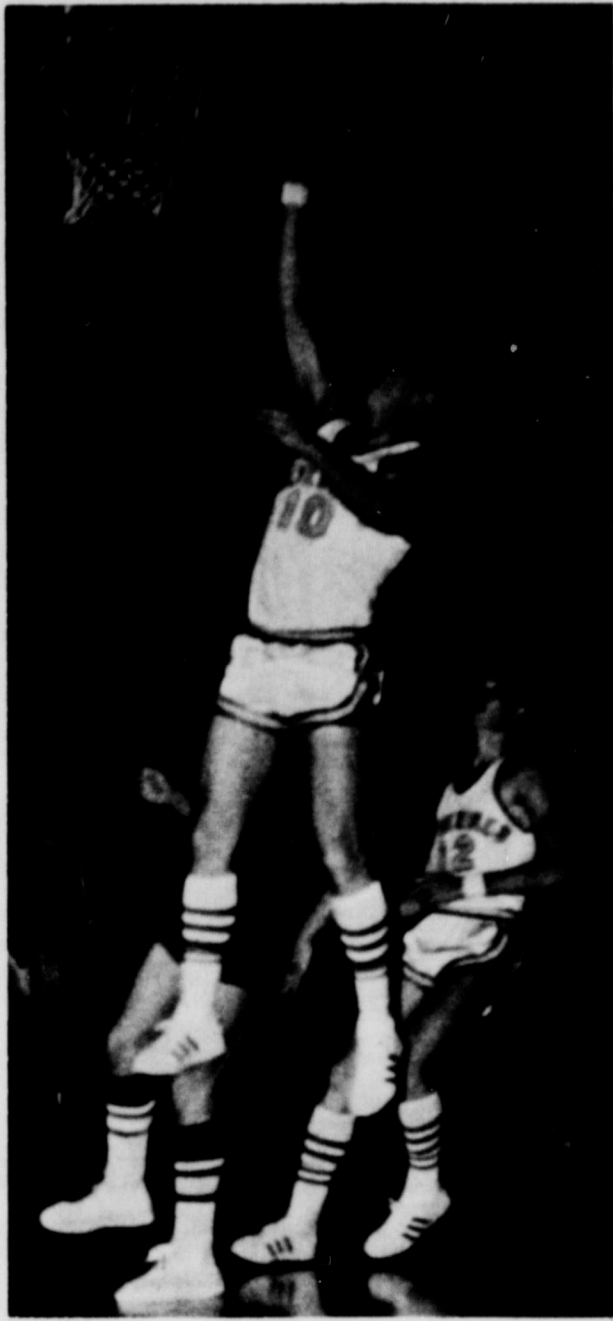
In boys varsity basketball action Friday and Tuesday nights, the Springlake-Earth Wolverines defeated the varsity teams of Bovina and Sudan.

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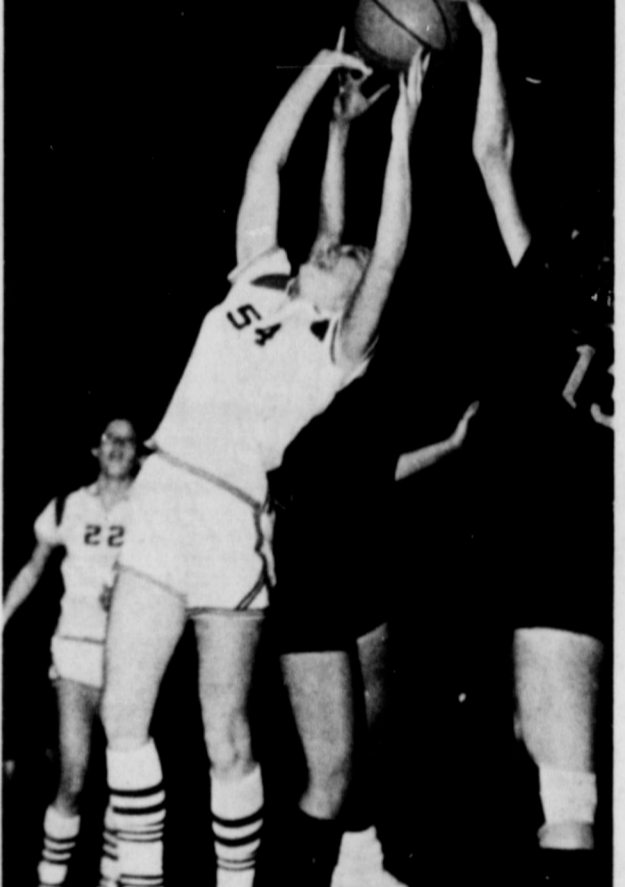

HD Agent Views Day Care Center

There are 2 types of Day Care Centers.

Family Day Care homes are family homes in which children (who lack the care and guidance of their parents during the day) are placed for daytime care. These homes are selected, developed and supervised by child welfare or other social agencies concerned with children.

Day Care Centers provide group care to children usually 3 years of age or over, who need care during the day. They cannot meet all the problems that beset children and they do not make up for lacks in financial assistance.

Day care homes and centers must be licensed by the State licensing authority. In a few places, this responsibility rests with a local department of government.

Parents participate in the cost of the day care center to extent they are able to pay. Funds are available through State and local public welfare agencies.

Austin--The Texas Department of Public Safety today issued a special public appeal for any kind of information which might lead to the apprehension of a hit-and-run driver whose car struck and killed a young highway patrolman on US 80 east of Weatherford, Parker County, at 2:42 a.m. Sunday, December 7.

Patrolman Douglas Thompson, 26, married and the father of a five-year-old son, was killed by the hit-and-run car while standing at the side of the road interviewing a traffic violator. The car sped on at a high rate of speed after the impact without any sign of hesitation.

Specifically, the DPS is seeking information that might help locate the silver car which has been identified as a white, 1960 model Ford "Fairlane" or "Fair-

lane 500" four-door with damage to the front right side. The damage included the loss of the right front fender ornament, which was found at the scene, along with a 43-inch long chrome strip from the right front door. Also found at the scene were the first two letters - "Fa" - which had been knocked off the "Fairlane" emblem on the side of the right front fender.

Reason for the renewed appeal for assistance in locating this car, said Col. Wilson E. Spelt, DPS Director, is the belief that several reported "leads" which didn't prove out may have led people to think the death car had been located.

"We again earnestly solicit the help of anyone who might recall having seen such a vehicle in the past four or five weeks on the road, or perhaps being repaired at a repair shop, backyard garage, or some seemingly inconspicuous place," Spelt explained.

"We are determined to continue the search for this vehicle and its driver whose wanton act of lawlessness in leaving the death scene should be dealt with accordingly."
