

One way to assure peace in the family when serving a pork roast to eliminate the carving problem while retaining the possibilities of serving up a tasty stuffing. Many a husband fumes when confronted with the problem of using a good carving knife to sever the rib bone-particularly at table before witnesses. Here's a recipe that permits you to let the butcher do the chopping—while skewers hold the chops together to flavor the stuffing properly.

For eight servings, here are the ingredients: 1 clove garlic, chopped fine

8 loin pork chops, center cut
1½ cups chopped onions (2-3

3 tablespoons of butter or 3 teaspoons salt

1 pkg, frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained

Prepare your dressing while the chops are browning on both sides in a heavy skillet. Sauté onions in butter till tender and transparent but not brown; add parsley flakes, frozen spinach, seasonings and garlic. 


