## Springlake Telephone Rates To Increase December 28

G. F. Kehoe, district manager for General Telephone announced an increase in rates for Springlake telephone users effective December 28.

This is the first increase the company has required since 1960. Increase in the cost of material and labor during recent years has lowered the rate of return below acceptable levels.

The increase will be on primary service both residential and business. There will not be any change in the telephone extension rate.

Kehoe said business telephones in the city will increase to \$13.00 and in the rural area, the increase will be to \$19.50. Residence service in the city will increase to \$6.50, and in the rural area to \$6.25. Rural customers in Zone 2 will continue to pay the additional dollar per month.

Kehoe stated, "It is always regrettable when increases are necessary, and that the company will continue in its effort to provide good telephone service at the lowest possible rates."

## 1969 Cotton Harvest Reported Half Over

At the peak of the 1969 cotton harvest, thirty gins in Lamb County have reported 36,820 bales of cotton have crossed over the scales.

It appears that the 1969 cotton harvest is approximately two-thirds through, with the only thing slowing down the harvest is a lack of cotton trailers. Some gin yards are full of loaded trailers waiting to be emptied so farmers can go for another load.

In Lamb County low grades seem to be the trend with most grade returns showing strict low middling spots or tinges to be low grades, and grades reduced because of bawls.

Staple lengths are down a little averaging a little better than 15/16 for all gins reporting.

Micronaire reading have also dropped with most returns "miking" in the lower thirds compared with higher thirds at the last report.

The combination grade, staple and mike is selling from 10 to 15 cents per pound.

Olton gins were leading Friday in a report of the season ginning in the county with 11,878 weighed in at the five gins. Two-thirds to three-fourths of the

cotton has been harvested and gin yards are crowded with ginning one or two days behind.

Earth area gins had received 11,164 bales, with harvest in the Earth and Springlake areas one-half to two-thirds complete. Three Springlake gins had processed 3,038 green tags.

Feldton-Hart Camp gins have weighed in 3,227 bales with grades averaging 5.3 with a 3.4 mike and 15/16 staple length for an average price of 14 or 15 cents per pound. Amherst gins have received 2,683 bales. In this area where heavy hail was received, mike, staple, and grades are low with below grades, bawls, and micronaire readings down to 2.6 and 2.7.

Littlefield gins and gins at Lunt's Chapel and Baner Switch have received 2,526 bales. Grading is approximately 5.3, mikes averaging about 3.3, and stapling 15/16 for about 14 cents per pound.

Sudan gins are about two-thirds through with 1,528 bales crossing the scales and bringing from 10 to 13 cents with below grades. Spade gins report 777 bales received from their cotton area.

## Farmers And Fishermen Get Tax Forms Early

About three million 1969 Federal income tax forms for America's farmers and fishermen will be sent to them around December 1, a month earlier than usual, the Internal Revenue Service announced today.

A first for Internal Revenue, the early mailing is an attempt to assist the farmers and fishermen in taking advantage of options open to them in filing returns and paying their tax, IRS officials said.

Estimated Tax forms, in a separate package, will reach farmers and fishermen about the same date. In previous years, the estimated tax forms were included in the income tax packages.

Farmers and fishermen have a choice of filing dates; they may elect to file and pay in full an estimated tax declaration by January 15, 1970, and file an income tax return by the April 15 deadline, or they may elect to file only an income tax return by February 16 and pay the tax due with the return.

Like the other 77 million tax-

payers expected to file tax returns for 1969, farmers and fishermen will be using the new income tax form 1040.

The form, which replaces both the old form 1040 and the 1040A, is a one-page, basic form to which separate schedules can be added to cover any tax situation.

## Lottery Monday Tells Draft Story

Monday night was the date of the first draft lottery held in the United States in 27 years. The lottery sent men born on September 14 to the top of the line for 1970 draft calls.

Men second in line for the draft call next year will be those born April 24.

The third birthday drawn was December 30, followed by February 14 and October 15. Others will be called in the order in which their birthdays were drawn until the nation wide local boards fill their 1970 draft quotas.

Only those classified 1-A or 1-A-0 will actually be called. Men now exempt from the draft or deferred will, however, retain their place in this order of call should they later become 1-A or 1-A-0.

The list Monday night applied to all men between 19 and 26 years of age as of the end of this year.

In the lottery Monday night, 366 blue plastic capsules containing gummed slips of paper bearing the dates for the 356 days of the year, plus one for Leap Year's extra day February 29, were drawn. The dates were then placed on a board displaying a list of numbers from one to 366. Each date drawn was placed in its respective place on the board.

To determine his place in line for the draft next year, each draft-age man in the nation has only to find his birthday among the scrambled list of dates, and take note of the number next to it.

Starting in January, each draft board will begin calling men for military service on the basis of that list.

The first ones called will be the men with birthdays matching the date next to number one. Next come those whose birthday matches number two, and so on.

By the time most draft boards have worked their way half way through the list into the middle or upper 100's they will probably have all the men they need for their 1970 quotas.

Men with birth dates drawn early in the list can be almost sure of receiving a draft notice next year; men with middle-range numbers may have to wait all year to see if they are drafted; men whose birthdays are drawn late in the list, next to numbers in the 200's or 300's, probably will not be drafted.

Every man in the country who

reaches the age of 19 but not 26 by December 31, 1969, will have a place-in-line number determined by Monday night's drawing.

But only men classified 1-A - "available for service" - will be subject to draft call in 1970.

Men granted deferment or exemption by their local draft boards will not be called while their deferments or exemptions continue.

But the place-in-line number they draw in Monday night's lottery will stay with them; and if they lose their deferments or exemptions and become 1-A, they will fall back into line with other draftable men in exactly the same place they would have occupied if they had not been deferred or exempt.

In other words, if a man now deferred stands third on Monday night's list, he would become third on the list to be drafted in any future year should he become 1-A.

Each year, while the lottery system continues, a new drawing will be held, assigning place-in-line numbers to a brand new group of men - those who reach the age of 19 during that year.

That group will be the draft's prime target for the following year, while the men who have already faced the draft, in 1-A classification, for one year without actually receiving their draft notice will move into a safer category.

They could, legally, still be drafted - but only if the draft uses up all the new group of 19-year-olds first. And the White House says that is unlikely.

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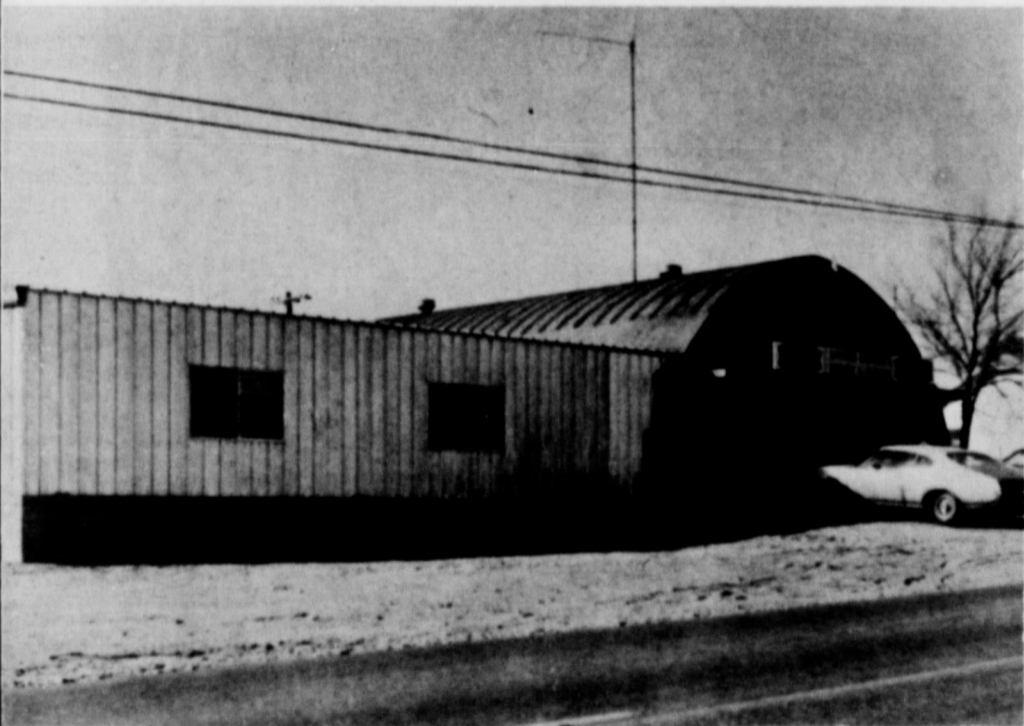
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## Mr. & Mrs. Barden Honored On 50th Anniversary

Before checks reach the clearinghouse they must be sorted. The checks are separated according to the banks on which they are drawn.

Sorting is done electronically by means of magnetic numbers. There are two sets of numbers along the lower part of each check. The first set is used by the Federal Reserve Collection System.

The second set is the individual code allotted to bank customers. There are no two checking account codes alike.

After sorting according to banks, the amounts are totaled. These totals are recorded on slips and attached to each check bundle. Messengers from each bank go to the clearinghouse with packages of checks. Packages are then exchanged. Thus each

messenger receives checks drawn on his own bank. When differences are computed, settlements are made.

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

## Use Caution In Grazing Cotton Field

Farmers in Lamb County should proceed with caution when considering to turn their livestock out on harvested cotton fields, states County Agricultural Agent Buddy C. Logsdon.

If the crop has been sprayed with a defoliant, desiccant, insecticide or herbicide during the past season, it's best to keep livestock out of the field. Some of these chemicals are highly toxic to animals and death can occur when treated fields are grazed.

Besides causing direct death of animals, chemical residues obtained from grazing treated fields may also contaminate meat or milk, points out Logsdon.

The best guide to follow in determining whether or not to graze a particular crop is to read all directions of any pesticides or other chemicals applied and to be familiar with their restrictions and limitations. In fact, this decision should be made early in the spring when planning various insect and weed control programs.

Logsdon emphasizes that it is the producer's responsibility to adhere to all restrictions on grazing fields that have been chemically treated. If any doubt exists concerning the use of certain chemicals and grazing restrictions, contact the county Extension office, adds the County Agent.
