Local Youths To Attend Farm Electrification Workshop

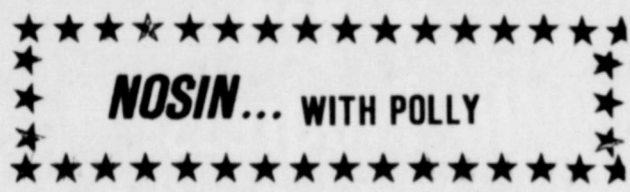
Kent Coker and Monte Winders, Future Farmers of America members from Springlake High School, will attend the seventh annual Farm Electrification Workshop at the Episcopal Church Conference Center, north of Amarillo, on June 16, 17 and 18.

100 FFA members from the High Plains area are expected to attend the workshop, sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company. 13 hours of training in one of four subjects, farm wiring, electrical controls, motors and heating-lighting,

will be offered to the participants.

The five top students at the workshop, two in wiring and one from each of the other subjects, will be awarded trips to the national FFA Convention for their accomplishments. Two alternates will also be selected in each section, in the event that the winner is unable to attend the convention.

Each participant who successfully completes the course for which he is enrolled will be given an FFA Farm and Home Electrification Medal.

The explosion was over, and just seconds had passed, both death and uncertainty had come. Two men escaped from a hole in the elevator and were taken to the hospital, but the third must be found.

Work to uncover this man was a prayerful, undaunted and people gathered to do anything they could.

Life is sweet and short but the memory one leaves will live in the hearts of those who knew and loved them.

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Explosion Rips Through Lazbuddie Elevator

A fiery explosion ripped through the Shereley-Anderson grain elevator in Lazbuddie at 1:55 p. m. Friday June 7.

The body of Cloys Stanberry, 31 was not recovered from under the grain until six hours later.

The explosion was apparently touched off when Stanberry threw what was believed to be a faulty electrical switch in the boot pit of the elevator. Air in the elevator was filled with highly combustible grain dust and a spark from the switch evidently triggered the explosion.

One side of the 300 foot elevator was hurled a considerable distance from the elevator site. Debris was cast into the side of a nearby house which is owned by Joe C. Moore, manager of the elevator, who was vacationing in Oklahoma at the time.

Stanberry, the elevator superintendent, was inside on the workroom floor at the time of the explosion. The concrete floor, about 16 inches thick, crumbled beneath Stanberry, causing him to fall 18 feet down into a storage shaft. The grain then covered him up. His body was recovered by workers at 6:55 p. m.

Fire departments from Muleshoe and Friona along with a helicopter from Cannon Air Base in Clovis were summoned to fight the blaze caused by the explosion. The fire was brought under control and firemen then joined in the search for Stanberry.

Ted Treider, a witness to the explosion, said that the ground shook at the school which is one-half mile away. Windows of nearby residences were broken. Treider also stated that he had taken a group of Ft. Worth teenagers to the top of the elevator the day before and remembered Stanberry commenting about the heavy grain dust in the elevator.

Wayne Webb, manager of the Shereley-Anderson Elevator in Lariat and uncle of Stanberry, said that the grain dust was worse than TNT if conditions were right.

Also injured in the explosion were Jesse Martinez, 41, with first and second degree burns, and Ascension Borjas, 50 who suffered burns and a fractured leg. Both were taken to Muleshoe's West Plains Hospital for treatment. Borjas was later transferred to Methodist hospital in Lubbock where he was reported in serious condition.

Stanberry, a native of Danville, Arkansas, had lived in Lazbuddie seven years at the time of his death. He had previously lived in Bovina.

Survivors include his wife, Carolyn, two daughter, Deborah and Kay, both of the home, two sons, Terry and Robbie, both of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thogal Stanberry, of Bovina; four brothers, Buford, Harold, Dean, and Danny, all of Bovina; a sister, Miss Brenda Stanberry of Bovina, and his grandfather, W. A. McCormick of Bovina.

Last Rites Read For Brother Of Local Resident

Funeral Services for Harold Odell Wedel, 44, who died while working in Springfield, Mo., June 6, were held Monday June 9 at 10:30 a. m. in the Chapel of First United Methodist Church in Littlefield.

Rev. Wallace H. Kirby, pastor of the church and Rev. J. Wald Griffin, pastor of the First United Methodist Church at Muleshoe officiated.

Burial was in the Littlefield Cemetery under the Direction of Singleton Funeral Home of Muleshoe.

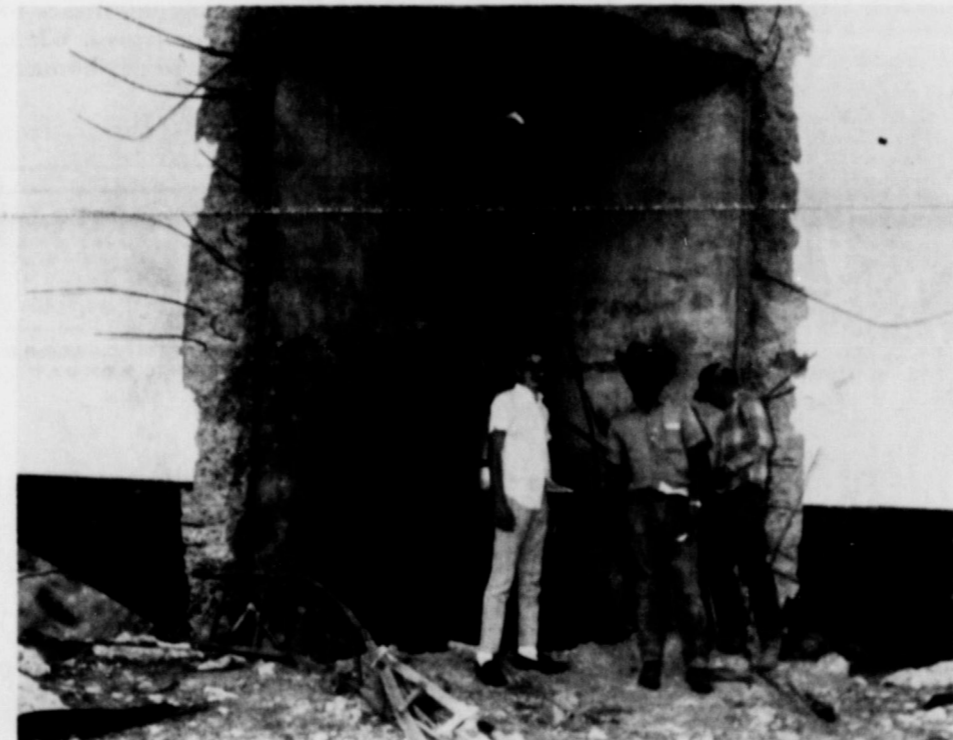
Wedel was born in Woodson, Texas and had lived in Littlefield since 1928. He was a farmer.

Plans were made for the organizational meeting during the regular session of the Lamb County Historical Survey Committee held Thursday afternoon at the Reddy Room in Littlefield.

Mrs. S. D. Hay, Sudan, chairman of the Lamb County Historical Survey Committee, sponsoring organization for the Lamb County Museum Association, pointed out a successful museum in Lamb County will need the support of Lamb Countians. The project will preserve our County historical heritage.

Mrs. Hay emphasized the small museum is the "museum of today" and statistics are proving this point in Texas. In 1964 there were only 90 museums of this type opened to the public; today there are 280 open to the public; and 120 are now in the planning stage.

Organizations in each county town are asked to have representatives present for this meeting. An invitation is extended to anyone interested in assisting with the establishing of the museum. Antique collectors, in any field, are especially urged to be present and make suggestions concerning their particular field of interest. There will be special displays other than articles used strictly by the Lamb County Pioneers.

One of the great advantages of the small county museum, Mrs. Hay pointed out, is that many who will not take their children to the larger institutions will bring them to the smaller museum because they do not have to cope with traffic problems and other disadvantages.

The museum will serve as a visual history program for children of the county; and the site for the museum will be selected from a standpoint of parking space; room for school room classes to move through freely; economy; as well as a tourist attraction.

Mrs. Roy McQuatters of Spade is chairman of the museum planning committee and at a recent meeting of the group, by-laws were prepared to be presented at the organizational meeting. Other activities will be the election of officers and naming those to serve on the Board of Trustees.

Farm Bureau Against Potato Check-Off Bill

Texas Farm Bureau president, Sidney Dean, has asked members of the Texas delegation in Congress to vote against a potato check-off bill when it comes up for vote.

Dean said the defeat of H. R. 2777 is vital to the interest of food producers. The bill, which provides for a check-off to finance promotion of potatoes, is expected to be up for vote in the House in the near future.

"This would be the first time for the federal government to be involved in collecting money for a program where one specific commodity would be competing with producers of other food items," Dean said. He explained that the cotton and wool promotion programs, which are under government jurisdiction, are designed to compete with man-made, non agricultural commodities.

The T. F. B. President said also that the potato bill, if enacted, could bring on other similar check-off programs for other commodities.

"This could result in a producer having a deduction made for each of his food crops--with the result that he would be competing against himself," the state farm leader pointed out. Dean said Farm Bureau supports sound promotion and research programs for potatoes and other agricultural commodities.

"Such programs can be carried out successfully without involving the federal government," he said. "It is being done this way in livestock, dairy, poultry, and other commodities.

FLAG DAY 1969--

Of the thousands of words written about the flag some stand through the ages:

Woodrow Wilson, in 1912: "I cannot look upon the flag without imagining that it consists of alternate stripes of parchment upon which are written the fundamental rights of man, alternating with the streams of blood by which those rights have been vindicated and validated."

And five years later in 1917 Theodore Roosevelt: "We can have no 'fifty-fifty' allegiance in this country. Either a man is an American and nothing else, or he is not an American at all. We are akin by blood and descent to most of the nations of Europe; but we are separate from all of them . . . and we are bound always to give our wholehearted and undivided loyalty to our own flag, and in any international crisis to treat each and every foreign nation purely according to its conduct in that crisis."

Over the years, the American flag continues to have profound meaning for most Americans. When we celebrate Flag Day on June 14, let us pay homage to the flag of freedom. Let's fly it proudly!

Deadline For Recording Claims Set September 1 By Water Commission

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced today that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the State must record his claim by September 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement. Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. Affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible. Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act then he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Former Resident To Attend NTSU Summer Institute

J.J. Barlow, former, Earth resident, was recently named Coordinator of Economics Education for the Levelland School system. Barlow will attend the second of two Summer Institutes in economics at North Texas State University beginning June 13 and continuing through August 26.

Directed by Dr. William A. Luker, head of the NTSU Center for Economic Education, the institute is designed to qualify participants to conduct in-service training programs throughout the state of Texas.

Barlow, who is social studies teacher at Levelland High School is among 30 participants selected from all over the area.

Teachers fill out applications and are selected according to their qualifications. Barlow has just completed his 14th year with the Levelland Schools.

The NTSU Center for Economic Education has been commissioned by the Texas Education Agency to develop a series of audio-visual tapes for use in such training programs for elementary school teachers, and the participants in the NTSU institute will learn how to interpret the material for other teachers.

Another institute, funded by a \$33,210 grant from the National Science Foundation, will be conducted three days in June for 27 high school teachers ec-

onomics instructors from 13 different states.

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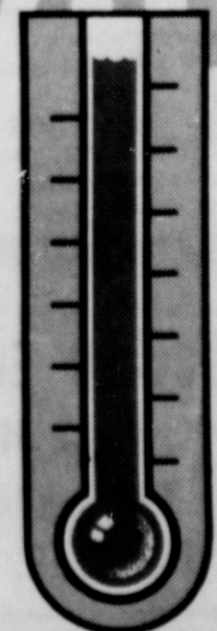

Helicopter To Aid Officers In Combating Crime

Lubbock: A new era in law enforcement techniques has been initiated this week by the addition of a state owned helicopter to aid local officers in combating crime.

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that the new craft was now fully operational and in use daily in this Region of the DPS. "The DPS is very desirous of expanding its services to the people of this area and to the city police departments and sheriff's departments," Bell said. "We feel this is a splendid opportunity to provide them with better and more versatile service. All any city or county official has to do to obtain the service of the helicopter is request it."

"In the past seldom a day passed that we did not receive a request for assistance in some incident in which a helicopter could have been a very useful tool. Now if the local officers need this assistance, such as looking for lost persons, rescue operations and any other type of law enforcement effort, we will be able to assist them immediately."

The helicopter has two portable stretchers for quick installation inside the machine, and is equipped with a resuscitator for in-flight use. The craft will be used in all types of emergency missions such as the rapid transfer of injured persons, when feasible, from limited treatment centers to hospitals with more sophisticated facilities. "Medical authorities have known for some time that many lives are lost each year throughout the nation because accident victims do not receive adequate attention early enough to save them," Bell said.

In some cases, he added, it may well be that the use of a helicopter in rushing a traffic accident victim from the scene of a remotely located accident to a hospital will be the difference between life and death. The copters also will be used for such things as searches, rescue operations, jailbreaks, disaster relief, apprehension of felons, riot control and mob violence, traffic surveys-any type of emergency work deemed practical.

The DPS helicopter is a jet-powered "Jet Ranger" which can be altered in minutes to accom-

modate two stretcher patients. The Regional Commander said the usefulness and versatility of helicopters in law enforcement has been demonstrated numerous times in the past. Major Bell stated that he hoped law enforcement officers as well as city and county officials and civil defense directors would take advantage of the availability of this type tool to aid them in performing their duties and rendering a better service to the public.

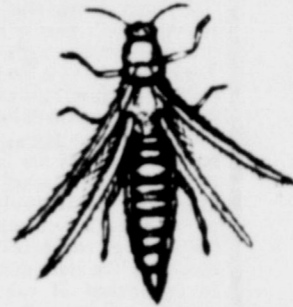

Damage is heavy if silvering of leaves is readily noticeable, terminal buds show injury, plant is ragged and deformed, and thrips are numerous.

Curiosity Can Kill A Cat Or A Child

You've heard it said that curiosity can kill a cat. It also can kill a child and is doing so thousands of times each year in this country, according to the Texas State Department of Health.

Curiosity is a trait all parents want their children to have since it leads to learning. But it can get a youngster into trouble. A child learns by exploring and shouldn't be discouraged from investigating his surroundings. However, it is the parent's duty to see that the environment is free from hazards.

More than a half-million children will swallow some type of poison this year, and a great number of these will be youngsters under the age of five. Sadly, virtually all of these poisonings are preventable.

In Texas during 1968 there were 183 fatal poisonings listed as accidental. Thirty-five of these were under the age of five-six of them in the first year of life.

In figures released for 1967, the National Safety Council says there were 4,000 fatal poisonings in the United States. Of this total 3,100 occurred at home.

The reason behind this extremely high percentage of home accidents is simple. Common household products--those used for housekeeping and medicinal purpose--represent the greatest potential poisoning hazards. Among these are detergents used in automatic dishwashers, furniture polishes and waxes, drain and blow cleaners, lighters and penicils. Add to this list all the medicines kept in your medicine cabinet--from aspirin to tranquilizers.

Poison-proofing the home should be the aim of every parent. Here are some common sense steps to take.

- Store all medicines and household products in locked

BUY SELL

cabins away from food storage areas.

- Clean out medicine cabinets regularly, discarding unusables down the drain and washing empty containers thoroughly before putting them into the trash.
- Store hazardous products only in their original containers, never in soft drink bottles, unlabeled containers or cans, and keep fuel oil, chemicals and pesticides out of a child's reach.
- Be especially careful about aspirin and other medicine. Never leave them in a child's room. Make certain all medicine bottles have labels.
- If you repaint toys, furniture and interior woodwork, don't use paint intended for outdoor painting since it may contain lead or harmful chemicals.
- And, don't leave hazardous products just "sitting around."

College Station,--Enzymes in concentrated form--such as those present in some laundry products--may have an irritating effect on the skin.

Although the enzyme concentration in the laundry products is low, some people may be hypersensitive to the enzymes and develop an allergy when exposed either to enzymatic detergent solutions or to clothes washed in them reports Linda Jacobsen, Extension home management specialist.

If such a problem develops, she suggests you see your dermatologist and revert to a non-enzymic detergent.
