Sheats In Debate

The debate was sponsored by the Go-dessans, an Odessa citizens group held at the Inn of the Golden West.


Each candidate was given 20 minutes for his presentation and then fielded questions from the more than 40 persons in attendance. Sheats presented issues such as the Panama Canal, energy, and agriculture in he prepared remarks.

During questions and answers, Sheats was asked if he felt there was truly an energy shortage in the country today. "I don't think there is an energy shortage in the United States at this time," Sheats explained, "but what we do have is a production shortage." He emphasized that the energy industry needs more incentive to produce and fewer restrictions on their ability to do business.

Sheats stressed that he feels there needs to be a "man of character" elected to Congress from the 19th district to succeed Rep. George Mahon. "We need a man of substance in Washington to help stem the tide of the doctrine of appeasement," he emphasized. He explained that this doctrine seems to be prevalent in the Congress at this time and that countries such as Vietnam, Angola, and Panama have been recent recipients. "I feel that we need to be firm and not 'give in' to every country that disagrees with us," he stressed.

Sheats told the group that he feels very strongly that the United States needs a strong national defense and needs to show the world that we know how to use our power correctly," he concluded.

Dawson died at 1:30 p.m. Saturday in a Houston hospital where he had been since November 3.

The Eastland native

came to Swisher County in 1919 and settled on land nine miles east of Tulia that was purchased by his family. Dawson was a farmer and stockman, a member of the First Baptist Church and a 4-H Club leader. Dawson had served on the Elkins Community School Board and had been superintendent of the Swisher County Sheep Show and of the Amarillo Fat Stock

He was a charter member and a director of Swisher Electric Cooperative. Dawson married Gussie Brashears December 27, 1920 in Eastland. She died March 27, 1974. He married Valentine Niver January 2, 1976 in Pampa.
