Martin Brothers have moved to their new location one fourth mile north of Earth next to McBride and Sons Gin, from their old location in the south part of town.

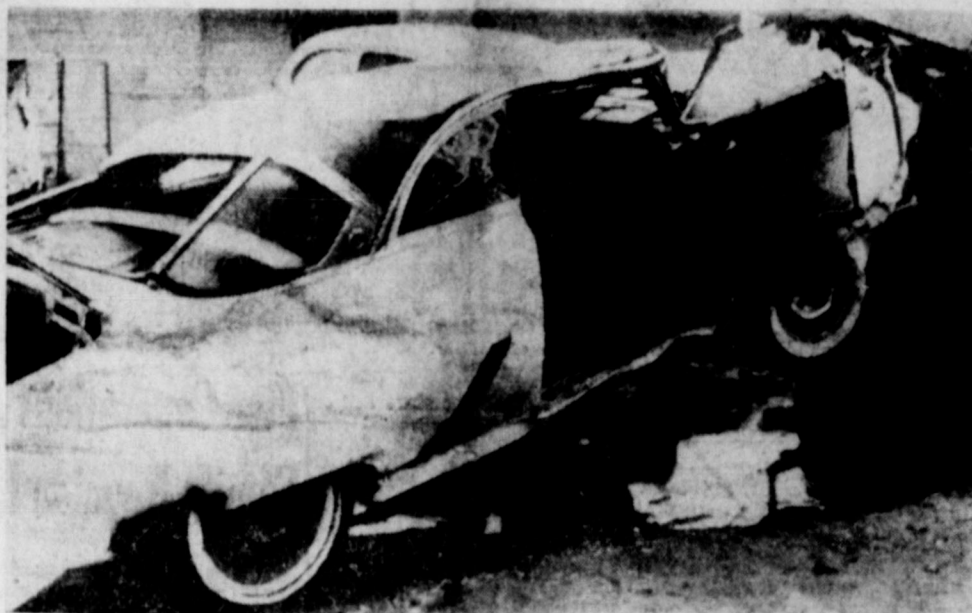
They announced they would be doing Minneapolis - Moline work for Stephens Hardware.

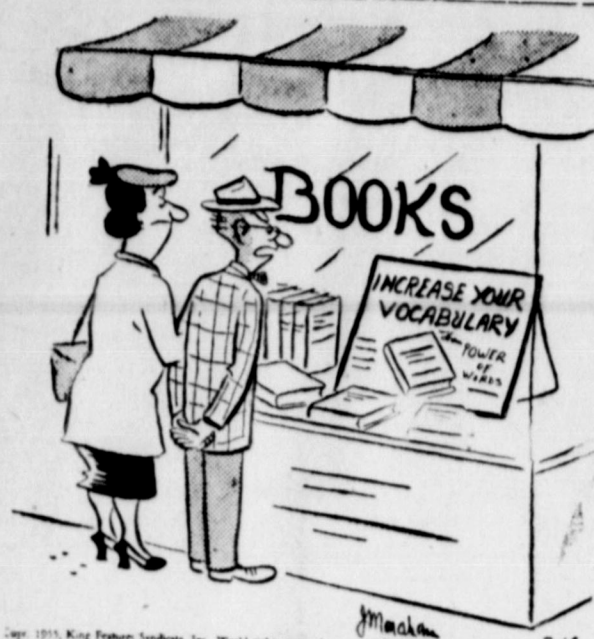

- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons chopped celery
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons olive oil or butter
- 2 pounds top round steak coarsely ground
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups beef stock
- 1/2 cup white raisins
- 1 cup sliced pimiento olives

Saute onion, celery, parsley and garlic in olive oil until golden color. Add beef; brown. Add salt, pepper and flour; blend well. Add beef stock and raisins. Cover; simmer one hour.

Just before serving add olives. Serve with large mound of fluffy white rice and a tossed green salad.

AUSTIN, Texas — Almost everyone is talking about farm prices.

In Austin before a meeting of 200 Texas Farm Bureau officials the Indiana Bureau's president predicted a "depression that will make the 'thirties look like a picnic."

At his Gillespie County ranch U.S. Senator Lydon B. Johnson said the Republican sliding scale of parity lets "prices slide down and mortgages slide up."

In Houston Secretary of Agriculture Elra Taft Benson reported in a speech before Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers, Dem-

ocrats, he said, left him a neat package of carefully fused bombs — falling prices and accumulating surpluses.

Substantial progress has been made nevertheless, Benson said. Major strategy to help low-income farmers, he promised, is in the offing.

### Drought Aid Announced

Farmers in 22 South Texas counties are eligible to buy surplus feed grain at lower prices, the counties as drought disaster areas at the request of Gov. Allan Shivers.

Applications for relief grain will be taken through October 15. Distribution through supervised retail outlets will continue until November 15.

### Insurance Overcharge Hit

A Texas Insurance Commission report claiming "millions of dollars" in excess charges collected by a New York automobile insurance company may touch off a nationwide investigation.

Commr. J. Byron Saunders reported Texas' findings at a zone meeting of insurance commissioners from six states. All indicated they would start inquiries.

Service Fire Insurance Company of New York overcharged, Saunders said, by putting policyholders in a higher rate bracket than necessary. He reported that so far the company had refunded \$89,000 on the policies checked by the commission.

Attorneys for the company said that if there were excess insurance charges, they were offset by an undercharge on financing.

Service Fire Insurance Company handles policies for Universal C. I. T., finance company with which it is affiliated.

### Vaccine Priority Changed

Texas children under five have been added to the priority group for Salk polio vaccine. In other states only five to nine-year-olds are eligible.

State Health Department officials obtained special approval from federal authorities, as some 44 per cent of paralytic polio in Texas hits tots under five.

### School Inquiries Set

Federal authorities do not intend to interfere with Texas policing of racial problems. Such assurance was sent by an assistant U. S. Attorney general to Texas' Attorney General John Ben Shepherd.

A Houston Negro organization

had requested U. S. Attorney General Herbert Brownell to investigate the Texas Citizens Council. Shepperd sent a telegram advising that Texas enforcement agencies are able to take care of any Texas situation.

### WATER PROBLEMS STUDIED

Inform the people about Texas' water problems and money to solve it will be forth coming. Max Starkie, manager of the Lower Colorado River Authority, so advised more than 100 experts at a Water for Texas Conference at College Station.

It will be a lengthy, costly proposition, he said.

### LAND BUYERS CLEARED

Honest deals sought under the veterans land program are gradually being cleared. A suspense order, invoked when investigators began, has been moved from 111 accounts. They were "made in good faith" according to Land Commissioner J. Earl Rudder.

Another 1,400 accounts representing a \$3 million investment, still are being checked.

### PLAQUE FOR EARLY NEWSPAPER

National Newspaper Week in Texas will open Oct. 1 with a ceremony in Houston commemorating the role of the Telegraph and Texas Register in the Texas Revolution.

Russell W. Bryant, Italy News Herald, president of the Texas Press Association, will present a bronze plaque to be used as a permanent historic marker.

Recipient of the plaque will be Roy Mac Rosser of Austin, president of the Texas Association of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity. The plaque will be placed in the museum to be erected at Washington on the Brazos.

### SHORT SNORTS

A. C. Turner, director of rehabilitation for the Texas Prison system has resigned to become a member of the State Board of Pardons and Paroles. He will serve out the six year term of the late Lyle C. Harris. Burton G. Hackney of Brownfield will succeed Hubert T. Johnson of Waco on the State Board of Public Welfare. Charles A. Rowe of Houston is the new member of the Texas Aeronautics Commission. A new law prohibits the drinking or possession of liquor at "public school" athletic events.

### We Hereby Pledge To Improve Ourselves

By now the Department of Commerce lists at least 258 special days, weeks, or months during the year. Among them are O-100s Decoration Week, National Turn of Tea Week, Pancake Day, Child Foot Health Month, and Save the Horse Week. The house judiciary Committee, which considers whether to recognize these observances formally. Constantly gets new suggestions. Two recent ones are National Holstein, Friesian Day and Cleaner Air Week.

Small wonder that newspapers spoof these special observances. It is different though, when National Newspaper Week comes along. Then the newspapers beat their breasts, shout "Freedom of the Press" three times and thank God that they are not as others are. They assure the public that it is pretty lucky to be served by so noble an institution as the American press.

Perhaps for once, then, it would be a good idea if newspapers used Newspaper Week, which this year runs October 1 to 8, to dwell not on their virtues but their shortcomings.

Freedom of the press is of course priceless. It doesn't mean that a newspaper is free to do what it pleases, but that no government or other authority shall control the news. Only if this is so does the public have a chance to get an accurate picture of what is going on. Freedom of the press, then, is a right of the people rather than of the press.

Freedom of information, well described by its other name of the people's right to know, is the same fight in modern dress. This is a battle that has constantly to be fought harder, as government grows more complicated. For it is an occupational disease of those in government, local, state or federal, to feel they can do their jobs best if they are the ones who decide what shall be made public and what not.

If these and other freedoms are threatened, the American people will fight for them. That was at bottom the reason for our going into World War I and World War II, and it is a basic reason for the cold war and the cautiousness of coexistence now. But within this country the people take press freedom in their stride. They are not particularly impressed when, in and out of Newspaper Week, the papers repeat the historic battle cries of the fight for freedom in the 17th and 18th centuries.

So it might be a good idea if today all our newspapers resolved to try, during the coming year to make a better use than before of their freedoms, and that includes the Earth News.

### Let Us Reason Together

MEN and BRETHERN, WHAT SHALL WE DO?

In the second chapter of Acts we have the record of the first gospel sermon being preached under the great commission given by our Lord to the apostles. Peter is the speaker on this occasion. Acts 2:14, and he refers to his hearers as ones with "cruel and wicked" hands crucified the Savior. He completes his sermon with these words in verse 36: "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ."

What was the reaction of this sermon on the hearers? In the next verse, 37, the record tells us they were convinced this man they have killed was truly the Son of God as he affirmed, and they now realized they had sinned before God. Thus, in agony, realizing their predicament, they asked "What may we do?" in the next verse, 38, Peter answers, "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."

Was that the answer you received when you realized you were in sin. Or did someone tell you to believe ONLY and you would be saved? Or perhaps you were told to repent and believe ONLY and you would be saved? Remember, Peter was speaking by inspiration of the Holy Spirit and therefore he could not have been wrong. Also he was speaking to people who were sinners, who had heard the gospel and believed it, evidenced by the fact they were pricked in their heart and made to ask, "what must we do?"

Listen to Peter's answer again: "Repent ye and be baptized... Now if baptism is not in order to receive remission of sins neither is repentance. For Peter connects both verbs with conjunction and, which places as much importance on one as the other. If baptism is not for remission of sins, neither is repentance. If repentance is for remission of sins, so is baptism.

Neighbor, let us go to the Bible for the answer to the question, What must I do?

**Spotlight on HEALTH**  
Science Features  
**Deaths Rise with the Mercury**  
A sudden spell of hot weather brings a sharp increase in deaths, especially among the aged and the chronically ill, and increases the need for special care for such persons.  
When, in early July in New York City, temperatures for six days of one week ran above 87 degrees—and on four successive days above 90 with a high of 96—deaths rose 29.7 per cent over those for the comparable week in 1954. The 1954 temperature averaged 71.1 degrees, with a high of 83.  
Deaths from high blood pressure increased most—by 115 per cent. Vascular lesions accounted for an increase of 61.1 per cent and arteriosclerotic heart disease for 32.7 per cent. Cancer deaths increased by 31.6 per cent in the 1954 hot week over the figures for the 1954 week of moderate temperature.  
As the numbers of persons past 65 in our population increase, the fatal effects of heat may be expected to become a matter of ever-growing concern. There are approximately 14 millions in that age group today and, by 1960, the number will have increased to about 16 millions.  
Although diseases involving the heart and blood vessels are still seasonal causes of death among the elderly, new scientific developments are producing drugs to combat them. For the painful heart condition known as angina pectoris, a new drug called Peritrate, a first cousin of the explosive nitroglycerin—has been established as the most effective in preventing angina attacks.  
For high blood pressure, there is a new drug, hexamethonium chloride, taken by mouth. It has been adjudged the most valuable agent for the control of runaway pressures. Its original oral form

has recently been combined with reserpine, the "tranquilizing agent" derived from the root Rauwolfia which Indian physicians have been using for hundreds of years. Studies have shown that the combination relieves symptoms of high blood pressure with small doses.  
Heat is becoming less of a hazard to life and health as a result of medical discoveries, of new temperature controlling devices, and new advances in engineering. Single-room air conditioning units are now commonplace and the promise is made by heating engineers that year-around heating-cooling units, run by nuclear power, may be available for private homes in less than a decade.
