

Controlling wind erosion has been a problem since early settlers moved westward across the Plains. West of the 100th meridian ecially has this been encountered. It has not been limited to any particular type soil or area, and alternate drought and good years have aggravated the problem even

Nature itself cannot fully protect the land from wind erosion as there were active sand dunes white man came. But aside from these very deep sands, the balance of the country was stabilized by cover. Cover in the form of grass, shinnery, sage and what-have-you, but never-the-less, cov-This cover reduced the veloc ity of the wind on the ground, covered up the soil, and in turn prevented blowing of soil particles. It also cushioned the impact of the raindrop, permitted more to enter the ground, which resulted in more cover to protect the soil.

In this manner weeds are killed, topsoil is prepared for planting and the residue remains on the surface where it does the most good. In many cases, the residue is dense enough to interfere with planting operations the following spring. If this is the case, a rotary shredder or even a stalk cutter will chop up these a stalk cutter will chop up these and cultivation problems the following spring. Soft ground type listers handle residues without clogging experienced with conventional listers. Knives run under the residuse when they are on the surface, clog and drag when they are mixed througoutt he soil.
