THE FARMERS ARE HAPPY IN EARTH.

"After a trip, it's always pretty nice to get back to Earth" said M. W. Messer, Mr. Messer is the Mayor of Earth, Texas, which is in northern Lamb County, near where the South Plains merges with the Panhandle and about 30 miles in board from the New Mexico line. As Mayor Messer suggested, Earth has much to recommend it. Besides the Chamber of Commerce signs on the outskirts of the town, urging the citizens to "Shop Earth First", there is also a legend which proclaims that this is the "Richest irrigated farm district on Earth."

It was a sparkling day of 75 degree sunshine when I visited Earth this week. Still sandstorms hit this town sometimes especially, in the Spring. For it is on that wind-polished plateau, Llano Estacado or the Staked Plain, and it is often town wind from some dunes called the sand crawl. It appears that Earth was named in honor of a sandstorm.

Certainly, Earth is an almost incredibly prosperous looking farm village. There are about 1,200 inhabitants, according to Mayor Messer. And my quick impression was that at least one third of the Earth people live in what the Dallas real estate advertisements might call \$25,000 to \$40,000 homes.

A rancher, W. E. Halseil, laid out Earth's townsite in the

## One Amendment Out Of Four Carries In The State

Texas voters overwhelmingly voted down the poll tax repeal Saturday, that would have abolished the states 61 year old poll tax with the unofficial report Tuesday showing defeat of the poll tax proposal by a 303,763 to 237,524.

The Welfare Amendment carried, unofficially in the State by almost a 2 to 1 margin in the state with 301,321 voting for the repeal and 177,525 against. Approval of Jefferson County pensions was voted down by a narrow margin in Texas, with 199,865 for and 234,777 against. Unofficial reports indicate State voters went half for and half against the veterans land fund amendment with 240,944 for and 249,104 against. Voting was tight in the Earth and Springlake area on the amendment election Saturday with only 117 voters, casting their ballots in Earth and 88 ballots cast on the two precincts at Springlake. Residents frowned heavily on the idea of abolishing the poll tax as a requisite for voting by a large margin of 184 against and 18 for the repeal in the Earth-Springlake precincts. The welfare issue was also a popular amendment to area voters with 85 voting for the repeal and 76 against, in these precincts. Area voters were against the Jefferson County Pensions proposal by a margin of 3 to 1. Votes cast were 105 against and 35 for the repeal. The constitutional amendment regarding the veteran land

fund was defeated 2 to 1. Out of the 295 ballots cast in Earth Springlake precincts 102 voted against to 54 for the repeal. Voters totaled 117 in precinct 2, voting at the Earth Community building, O. B. Whitford was election judge, assisted by L. T. Smith, Bob Armstrong, Minnie Armstrong and Ruby Anderson. Votes cast on the amendments were poll tax, 8 for 107 against, Welfare, 47 for 41 against, Jefferson County, 22 for 52 against and veterans land, 26 for to 57 against.

Precinct 17, west Springlake J. L. Hinson served as election judge, assisted by Donald Clagson and Duane Jones. Votes were cast as the fire station, 39 voted in this Precinct. Results were Poll tax, 4 for 35 against, Welfare, 13 for 20 against, Jefferson County, 5 for 25 against, veterans land 12 for and 20 against. The Springlake Community Building was the polling place of Precinct 15 with H. M. Cooper, election judge with Ernest Goforth and Sam Barden serving as clerks. A total of 49 votes were cast in this precinct. Poll tax, 6 for 42 against, Welfare, 25 for 15 against, Jefferson County, 8 for 28 against and veterans land, 16 for to 25 against. Complete County returns as tabulated in Littlefield Saturday night showed Poll tax repeal, 224 for, 1,338 against, Welfare Payments, 796 for, 599 against, Jefferson County 287 for 814 against, Veterans Fund, 618 for, 738 against.

## Local Scout Drive Nets \$1,135.75 First Day

A total of \$1,135.75 has been collected to date in the Boy Scout fund drive that got under way Thursday morning with a kick off breakfast at 7:00 in the Earth Community Building. Due to the untiring efforts of Carroll McDonald, chairman and all the willing workers, results in Thursday's collections totaled \$1,102.75. Compared to last years total for the first day of \$573.50 showing that contributors were more generous this year in their financial support of the Boy Scout Program.

There are approximately 100 youth in the Cub Scout and Boy Scout organization in Earth. It takes \$14.00 per year for each Scout. This amount is used for training and leadership at summer camps, merit badges, etc. Therefore the amount collected so far is still short of the amount needed to support the number of Scouts in the Earth Troops. Larger towns support the Boy Scout fund through the United Fund Program.



## Bill Clayton Appointed To House Committee

House Speaker Byron Tunnell has announced the appointment of Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake to the interim Committee on Protection and Development of Soil and Water Resources.

The three man committee, provided for in a Resolution authored by Rep. Clayton, is directed to study the problems incurring as a result of the growing shortage of water in the state with the responsibility of offering new methods of protecting the vital natural resources of both water and soil with in Texas.

In making the appointment, Tunnell commented, "Rep. Clayton, in this his first session in the Legislature, distinguished himself in his service as a member of the Committee on Conservation and Reclamation. His keen interest in problems of conservation should promote valuable action from this committee."

President Bob Phipps called the Springlake chapter of the Future Farmers of America to order at 7:30 Thursday night November 7th at the school cafeteria. After the opening ceremony given by the officers the secretary report was given to the chapter by secretary Ken Dawson and was accepted. Then the treasurer report was given by treasurer Lonnie English and also accepted. After this Ken Kindred introduced the speaker for the evening, L. K. Anderson manager of the local Co-op-gins. He presented the chapter with a very interesting speech on the production of cotton and how it is ginned. Next new business was discussed by the group. This consisted of the discussion of sending a pig chain of quilts to the Mexico FFA Chapter. This was decided against by the group. Next a committee was appointed to raise bids for the slave labor auction sale to be held this Saturday. The constitution was amended, and the boys decided to donate money to Boys Ranch Christmas Fund. The group also decided to sell rat poison to raise money for the chapter fund. The motion to adjourn was received and seconded and passed. The group then adjourned and enjoyed refreshments of soda-pop provided by the refreshment committee.

The public is invited, and attendance is expected from four counties, since the meeting is being co-sponsored by the District and County Attorneys of Bailey, Cochran, Lamb, and Farmer counties.

Discussion will cover ways to prevent accepting worthless checks and ways to collect on returned checks. Expert advice will be given by Joel Teasdale Chief, Identification and Criminal Records Division, Texas Department of Public Safety and Alonzo Miller, District Check Collection Specialist, Piggly-Wiggly Grocery Stores Lubbock. A question and answer period will follow their presentations. ## Cotton Classed To Date In Lubbock Totals 136,300 Bales

The Lubbock U.S. Department of Agriculture Cotton Classing Office handled 53,300 samples last week to bring the season's total to 136,000 bales, according to W. K. Palmer, chairman at Lubbock. Mr. Palmer went on to say that at the close of business Friday, the Lubbock office had a carry-over of 12,000 bales.

Joe Brevard, Chairman for the Lamesa office, reports 22,700 samples classed with a carry-over of 3,000 bales. The season's total for Lamesa is 69,000 bales.

At Brownfield, Wilburn Reeves stated that 9,700 samples had been classed for that area this week and they had a carry over of 2,000 bales. To date 26,900 samples have been classed in Brownfield.

All three offices have classed 236,100 bales thus far. Last year on November 8th, 216,000 samples had been classed and there was a carry over of 10,000 bales.

Average grades showed little change from a week earlier. Middling was the predominant grade classed in Lubbock, Middling Light spotted was the main grade classed in Lamesa and Brownfield.

The percentages for the cotton classed in Lubbock were: 37 percent strict low middling, 18 percent middling light spotted, and 6 percent strict low Middling Light Spotted. The other 14

percent consisted of grades ranging from strict Middling to strict Low Middling Spotted. The average staple ranged from 29.7 thirty-seconds of an inch at Lamesa to 30.2 at Lubbock. In Lubbock 15/16 inch was the predominant staple with 56 percent. Fourteen percent was 29/32 inch and 31/32 inch accounted for 23 percent. Six percent was 1 inch or longer. Micronaire readings were excellent with 84 percent 3.5 and above at Brownfield, 87 percent at Lubbock and 98 percent at Lamesa.

Market activity has been slow. The best demand was for light spotted grades of staple lengths ranging from 29/32 inch to 31/32 inch. Prices were quoted in the local markets at 25 to 50 points above the loan value. Middling 1 inch was still quoted at 32.50 cents per pound in the Lubbock market. Other prices were Middling Light Spotted 15/16 inch 30.10, Middling Light Spotted 31/32 inch 30.55, strict low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 inch 29.25.

Gin yard prices for cotton seed are generally \$52.00 to \$55.00 per ton. Sacked cotton seed meal ranged from \$75.00 to \$78.00 per ton. Bulk cotton seed hulls ranged from \$22.00 to \$25.00 per ton.

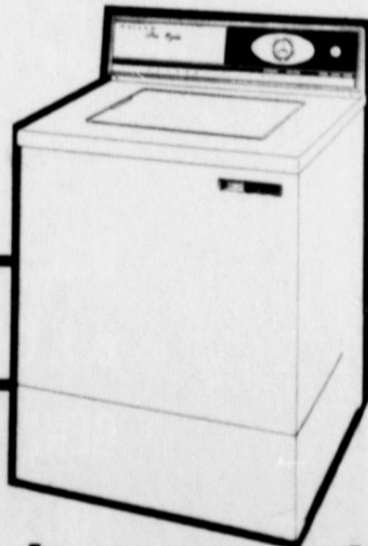

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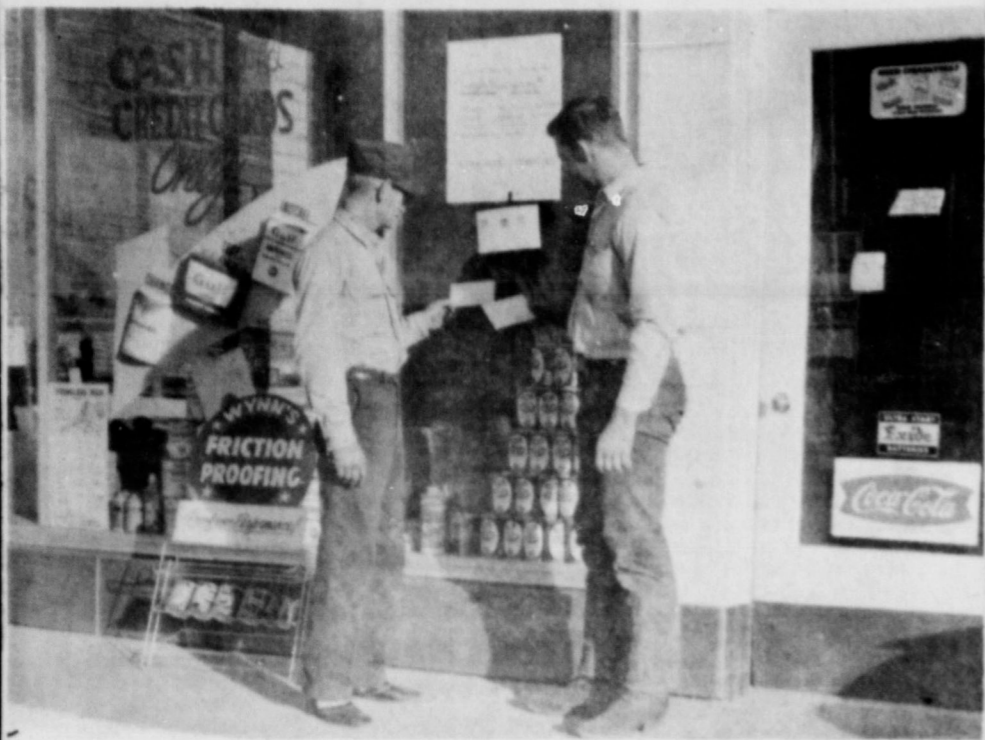

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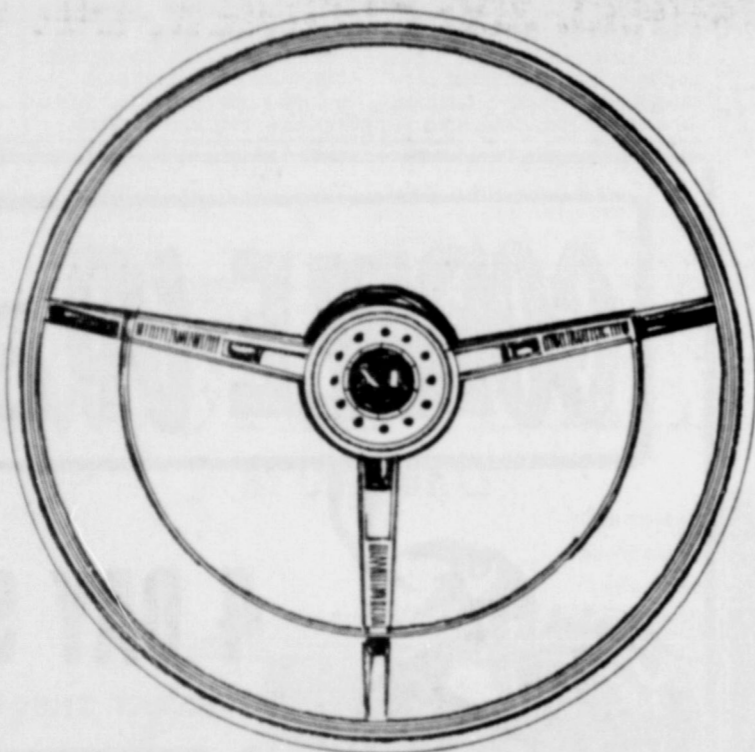

## More Power For Attorney General

The civil rights of all Americans are guaranteed by the Constitution. But recent studies show that President Kennedy's civil rights bill may give the Attorney General powers apparently prohibited by the Constitution. This strong shift in the thrust of federal power is especially notable in the matter of voting rights. It destroys more civil rights of more citizens than it protects.

Everyone agrees that only the individual states can set the qualifications of voters. It is the duty of each state to protect its citizens against those who are incapable of casting a democratic vote.

As recently as 1959, the U.S. Supreme Court held that the plain words of the Constitution require voters in federal elections to meet the standards set in each state. And in the question of the poll tax, many state legislatures have agreed that only a Constitutional amendment can set it aside as a qualification in federal elections.

But the President's civil rights bill attempts to set aside the poll tax at a time when no Constitutional amendment has been passed. The Attorney General could file suit to ignore one of the qualifications which the citizens of a state have set up under the guarantees of the U.S. Constitution.

In a second provision, the President also seeks to give the Attorney General power to ignore a state's literacy test in case where a voter applicant has completed six years of school. It is important to note that this infringement of the rights of the citizens in each state is not based on race. A few weeks ago, the President indicated that the problem of illiteracy was widespread. He said that one-fourth of all the young men who took selective service examinations failed the mental test. Even though nearly every state has eight to ten years of compulsory education, one man out of four could not fulfill his civic duties because he could not read or do simple arithmetic.

would allow the Attorney General to bring suit to force many of these same men on the voting rolls. The President would do this even though the Constitution and the Supreme Court have explicitly left this power to the states, which are in a better position to guard their citizens against an illiterate electorate.

In still a third provision, the President directs his brother to intervene in any state or federal election he chooses. The Attorney General is empowered to set aside the local officials. He need only allege to a federal court that less than 15 per cent of the prospective qualified voters of any race have not been registered in that district.

Without taking evidence or making any finding, the court must immediately appoint temporary federal voting referees. The federal referees will then interpret the qualifications of applicants as they see fit. And then the election will be held. After the election has been

decided, the court will proceed to take evidence on the Attorney General's allegation. It is found to be weak or in error, it will be dismissed, and the unqualified voters removed from the rolls.

But whatever the final outcome of the complaint, the election is valid.

Civil rights experts have concluded that this procedure violates the due process of law which is guaranteed to all citizens by the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution. Due process requires that no matter be decided until after hearings and a fair trial. But the method chosen by the President allows the Attorney General to attain his desired end before the case is decided.

For these reasons, more and more observers feel that this extension of the Attorney General's power into the every day lives of citizens is a disturbing prospect. They feel that the President's civil rights bill consists of 90 per cent federal power and 10 per cent civil rights.

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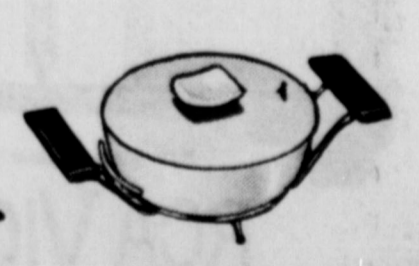

## Agricultural Field Attracting More Students

There is a saying going around now that the farmer must not only be a producer of food and fiber but also a market analyst, salesman and business man.

The state, national and international situation demands those last three characteristics and has had considerable influence on the phenomenal growth of the Texas A&M University Department of Agricultural Economics.

More and more agricultural students today recognize that raising a crop is one thing; processing, distributing and selling it is something else.

This is why the agricultural economics field is attracting more students, as shown in figures compiled by Dr. T. R. Timm, head of the department at Texas A&M.

"We may well have, judging from available information, the largest single senior class in agricultural economics in the U.S. with 70 students," he pointed out. "Furthermore we have the biggest department of its kind in the state, and among the largest in the nation."

Ten years ago, the department had 50 undergraduates and 10 students in graduate work. This fall, 180 undergraduates and 50 graduates are in the department, Timm said.

In the graduate category this year, about half are studying toward master of science degrees, while the other half is working on doctorates. A decade ago, most graduates were interested only in a masters.

In 1954, most of the department's graduate students were Texans. Today they are from Florida, Georgia, Kansas, Tennessee, Arizona, Illinois and New Jersey. They also are attracted from foreign countries like Argentina, Costa Rica, Mexico, Philippines, Formosa, Pakistan and India.

Some of the undergraduate students, Timm noted, hail from Washington, Illinois, Colorado, Louisiana and Arizona.

"This wide representation from other states and countries I think, is a measure of the department's worth and reputation," he said.

The same trend had been underway with the department professional staff members, Timm added. Ten years ago there were 13. Now there are 53 members, and most of the teachers are researchers as well.

He said department staff members recognize that Texas agriculture has much at stake in world trade. A third of the nation's cotton is produced in Texas, for example, and much of the fiber goes into world trade channels.

"For this reason, we encourage our staff to accept foreign assignments from time to time so they can learn the world trade situation first hand," Timm explained. "Thirteen of our men have been on foreign assignments, and at present we have members in Syria and Tunisia. Arrangements are being made to send men to Pakistan and Argentina."

Two department members, he emphasized, made an extensive study of the European Common Market last year. Why this sudden surge in the

department growth? Timm has a ready answer for that one.

"The department's expansion reflects importance of the national the international situation's impact on Texas agriculture, and the department emphasizes this impact in its instruction of students," he said.

Back came a letter from Washington: "The earth seems to move in your country. You will call the postoffice Earth. Earth is between Muleshoe and Plainview on state Highway 70. The highway is the Main Street and the western reaches of the town has the business houses, with much new farm machinery and irrigation equipment on display. On the east side of the town are many splendid residences, some of them with the irrigated fields coming up to the backyards and there is a big cluch of luxury homes, many with high picket fences and well-kept lawns.

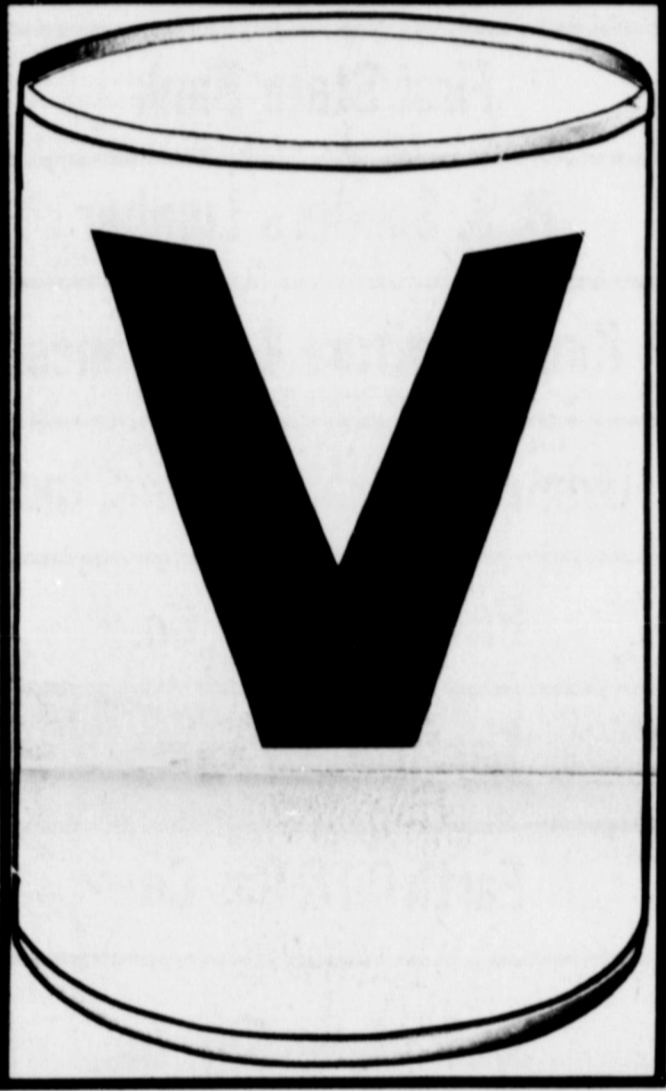

## Pioneer Natural Gas Division Wins Safety Honors

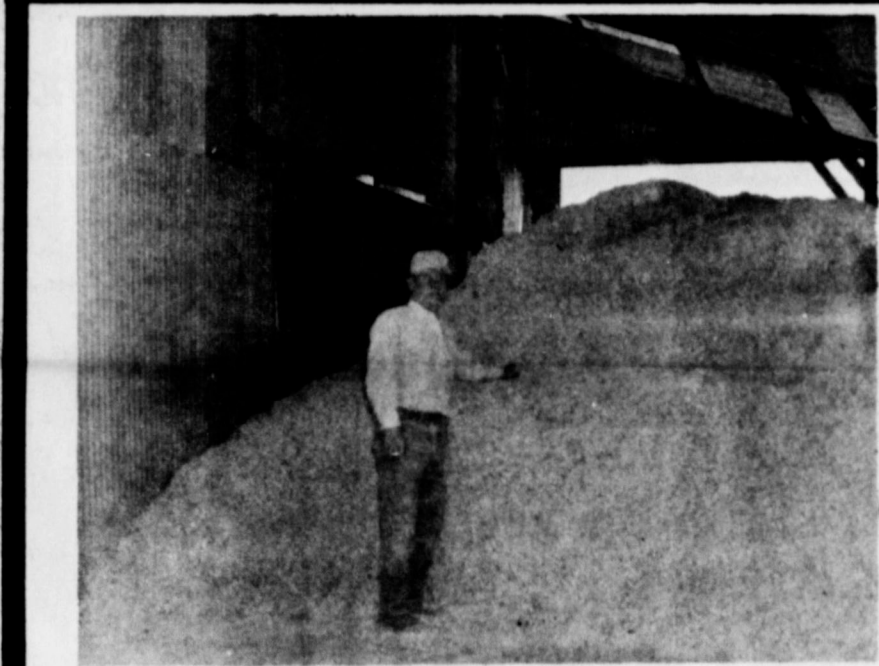
National honors for outstanding driver safety performance were won by Pioneer Natural Gas Company in the Gas Industry Division of the 32nd National Fleet Safety Contest conducted by the National Safety Council and sponsored by the American Gas Ass. The Pioneer Natural Gas Co. fleet, consisting of 464 vehicles, was awarded third place here today in the Gas Industry Division of the contest at ceremonies held in conjunction with the 51st National Safety Congress and Exposition. The award is based on the company's fleet safety performance from July, 1962 through June, 1963. During the period the firm's drivers operated 7, 521,800 miles and had 8, 1 accidents per 1,000,000 vehicle miles of operation. All accidents were counted in the contest except those occurring when a company vehicle was properly parked. Winners were determined after inspection of their records by an auditor appointed by the National Fleet Safety Contest Committee. A total of 114 fleets competed in the Gas Industry Division of the Contest. They operated 39,784 vehicles and traveled

480,815,000 vehicle miles with a frequency rate of 12.58 accidents per 1,000,000 vehicle miles. The rate is 3 per cent reduction below last year rate.

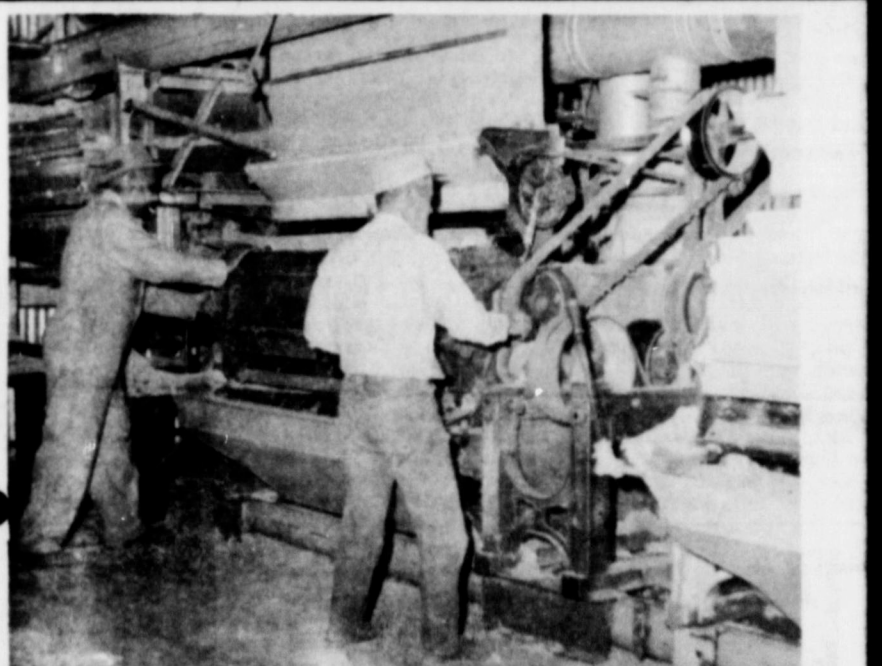

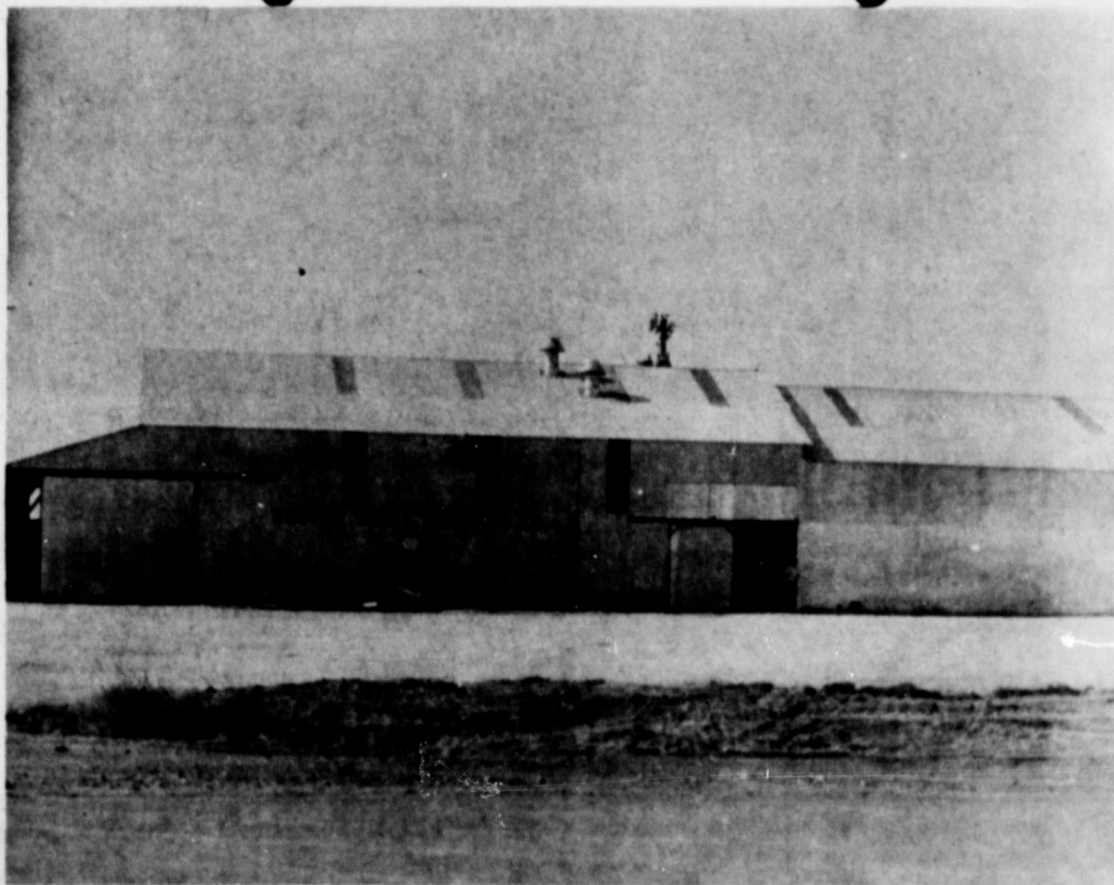

## General Telephone President Expresses Concern Over Long Period Negotiations

E. H. Danner, president of General Telephone Company of the Southwest today expressed concern regarding the long period already spent in negotiations between General of the Communications Workers of America, Negotiations between General of the Southwest and CWA began June 20 and went into an indefinite recess Tuesday (October 20) when the union suggested the recess to await developments of a current strike by CWA against the Southwest's sister company, General Telephone of California.

Danner said that each year, the company has increased its wage rates, added to its employment benefits and improved working conditions as circumstances permitted. This year is no different. The Company has made a wage offer approximately equal to increases granted in previous years and offered a breakthrough in health insurance coverage and a decided improvement in extraordinary medical expense

coverage. In addition the company has indicated a willingness to improve pension benefits substantially and to better the vacation plan. The union has rejected these company offers as inadequate, because they do not follow the industry pattern.

The company president stated that "We are not negotiating for an industry contract but a contract solely for General Telephone of the Southwest. He emphasized that any sharing of the benefits of the company progress must be on an equitable basis between the employees, the customers and the shareowners.

## Five Persons Killed In County In '62

During 1962 death stalked the streets and highways of Texas for a record of 2,421 human lives in traffic mishaps an increase of 107 over 1961. Another 144, 943 were sent to doctors and hospitals, an increase of 12,373 over 1961, some of these injured being maimed for life. Some 400,000 automobiles were damaged or demolished. Our economic loss came to an astounding figure of \$387,843,000, an increase of \$31,731,000 over 1961. Our liability and collision insurance premiums came to a sum over two hundred and seventy five million dollars.

Lamb County's contribution to the 1962 Texas traffic cost was 5 killed, 117 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$111,355.00. If the 2,421 dead traffic victims were stacked in a pile, the dimensions would be about 2 3/5 miles in length, or 3/4 of a mile in width, or 4/10 of a mile in height. The dimensions for the 144,943 injured would be 158 miles in length, or 46 miles in width,

or 23 miles in height. The dimensions of the some 400,000 damaged or demolished vehicles would be 1,330 miles in length, or 500 miles in width, or 379 miles in height.

Now for a descriptive look at the three hundred and eighty seven million dollars cost of the traffic accidents. The playing area of a football field measured 300 feet by 160 feet or 48,000 square feet. United States currency measures about 25/8 inches by 6 1/8 inches. If a football field was completely covered with one dollar bills, then a layer of two dollar bills, then a layer of five dollar bills, then a layer of ten dollar bills, then a layer of twenty dollar bills, then a layer of fifty dollar bills then a layer of one hundred dollar bills, then a layer of five hundred dollar bills and on top of these eight layers of paper money, dump 2,707 tons of silver dollars, this would represent the economic loss we suffered in Texas for the year

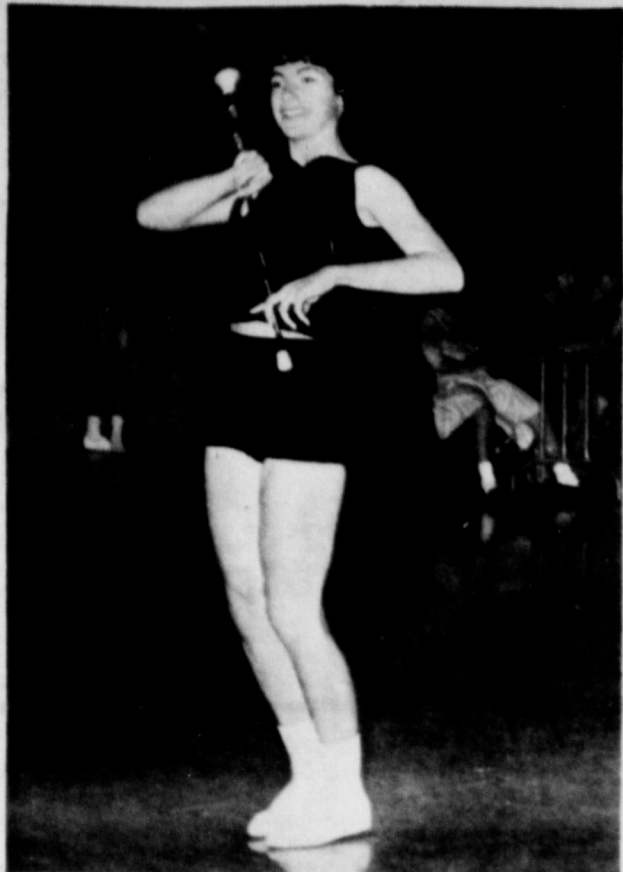
