

Here is a man bewildered by the mystery of his own being. He has somehow become aware that there are regions of his personality which he has never explored. There are forces at work within him which have never been brought under conscious control. He has "secret faults," by which we are to understand, not faults well-known to himself and carefully screened from others, but faults of which he himself is abysmally ignorant. This man has discovered that he does not properly or adequately know himself, yet the little that he does know is sufficient to fill him with misgiving and apprehension. This man is everyman. The question he raises we all do well to raise. The prayer he offers should be a universal prayer.
