The Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employ-ment and unemployment in this area during the week of June 14, Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Bureau's regional office in Denver announced today.

The households to be interviewed here are part of a sci-entifically designed sample that is representative of the entire U. S. population. The employment and unemployment statistics are collected monthly by the Bureau for the U. S. Department of Labor to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation as a whole and of its major regions. Questions on employment similar to those in the sample survey were asked of the entire population in the 1970 decennial census, now being completed. Bureau officials point out, however, that the monthly survey is es-





