Word Assumes Duties As Earth Deputy Sheriff

W. O. Word, veteran of twelve years as a law enforcement officer, has taken over reins as deputy sheriff in Earth. Word succeeds Deputy Sheriff Clyde Atwood, who left the local sheriff's department recently.

Word came to Earth from Friona where he was serving as patrolman with the Friona Police Department when tapped for the Earth post. The 54 year-old officer was born in Willow, Oklahoma, Greer County, the son of a farmer. Reared in Floyd and Hale Counties, he attended school in Lockney. Word married the former Miss Vivian Baker of Floyd County in 1935. The couple have four daughters, Mrs. Leslie Mae Bingham, Spearman; Mrs. Gail Satterfield, Plainview; Mrs. Doris Huckabee, Wichita Falls and Mrs. Rita Saver, Plainview. The couple also have nine grandchildren.

Templeton, Sides and Wedel Named To GSP Board

Gene Templeton of Earth has been named to represent Lamb county to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. George Sides will represent Castro County and Jimmy Wedel will represent Bailey County.

He will join 28 other county representatives to form a 29 man advisory committee which will be making recommendations to the Board concerning problems which face the grain farmers in their county and projects they feel the Board should sponsor.

The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board was established in a referendum last October 6 for the purpose of developing research and promotional projects aimed at increasing the net profit to grain farmers. This work is financed by an assessment of five cents per ton paid by the producer which is collected at the first point of sale or processing.

TGSPB Chairman, K. B. Parish of Springlake, said, "This advisory committee will give each county representation to the Board and we are grateful that these men have agreed to serve as they will be a vital part of the Board's activities." Mr. Parish added, "We are indebted to the county agents and their Crop Committees for selecting such a fine slate of representative." The Board remained neutral in who was selected, only asking that they be grain farmers and leaders in their county.

The Board set insect and disease control as their primary goal, with special emphasis on green bug control. Project work will begin soon.

7,450 Register To Vote In Lamb County

The Lamb County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office was busy Saturday as would-be voters were faced with the January 31 deadline for qualifying to ballot in the 1970 elections which will feature candidates for local, state, and federal offices.

Business to be considered by the Chapter will include setting and approving the quotas for the Annual Fund Drive, and distributing the materials that will be needed for the drive.

Herbert Dunn of the Tax Office reported Wednesday that 7,450 persons in Lamb County registered to vote before the deadline. Figures in the individual precincts have as yet not been compiled.

This year's figure of 7,450 persons compares to last year's figure of 6,739 persons in Lamb County who qualified to vote.

Springlake Fire Department Awarded Check For Services

The Springlake Volunteer Fire Department was presented with a \$75 check Monday night when the Department met for its regular meeting.

The presentation was made by Ed Jennings of Littlefield who is a representative of the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies.

The presentation was made on the basis of services performed by the Springlake Fire Department when it answered an emergency call during the latter part of December. Jerry Don Sanders Drafted By Pros

Jerry Don Sanders, of Mrs. Hershel Sanders of Springlake became the third Red Raider picked off in the Wednesday, January 28, continuation of the pro grid draft.

Sanders, a kicking specialist, was pegged by the Cleveland Browns in the 12th round.

During his freshman year at Texas Tech Sanders looked promising in kicking several long field goals. His longest was 57 yards against Texas A&M and

in spring practice in '68 he booted one 59 yards.

Last season Sanders kicked 11 field goals to set a Southwest Conference record, surpassing the mark co-held by former Raiders Kenny Vinyard and Tony Crosby of Texas. Both had kicked nine in a season.

Sanders connected on 23 of 24 extra points, 11 of 16 field goals and punted 74 times for a 38.1 record, best by a Raider since Tech joined the Southwest Conference. He also was Tech's

leading scorer, tallying 56 points with his kicking.

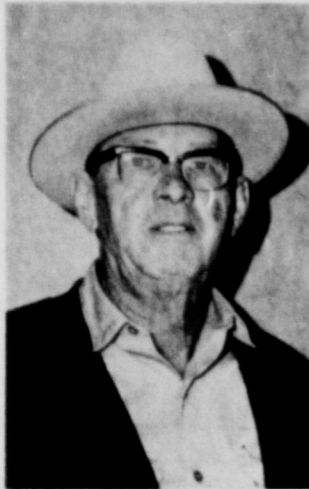
Sanders, 5-9, 184, has the unique distinction of having the smallest foot on the Raider squad. He wears a 6 kicking shoe and a 6 1/2 punting shoe.

Did you know that there wasn't genuine paper money in this country until 1861?

Many people confuse various forms of early currency and notes as paper money like we know it today. This isn't the case.

After the Declaration of Independence, paper currency was issued by the Continental Congress to help finance the war. This money was not issued by the United States government as formed by the Constitution.

Between the time our government was formed and 1861, there was no actual national paper money issued, only coins.

During times of financial crisis and war, however, the Government has issued Treasury Notes to meet the drain on our finances. These notes were not paper money as such, but only promissory notes that bore in-

terest and were redeemed by the Treasury as quickly as possible.

Tuesday night on the home court the Wolverettes downed the opposing team of Farwell 68-46.

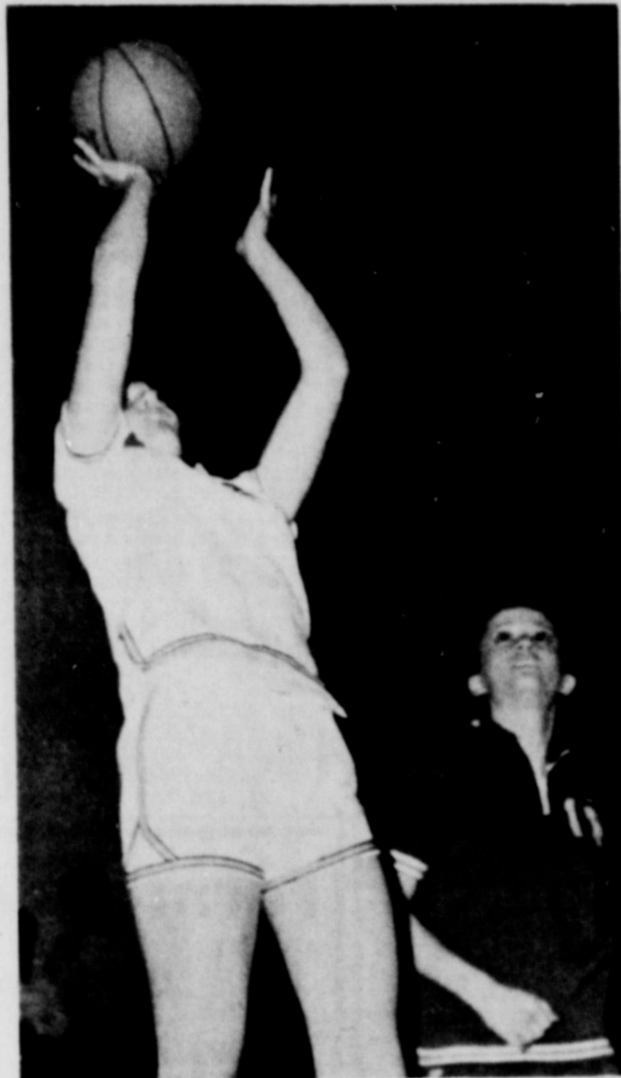
By the end of the third quarter the Wolverettes were leading 60-31. The local team scored eight points during the final period of play bringing their total points to 68.

High point man for the Wolverines was Willie Wilborn with

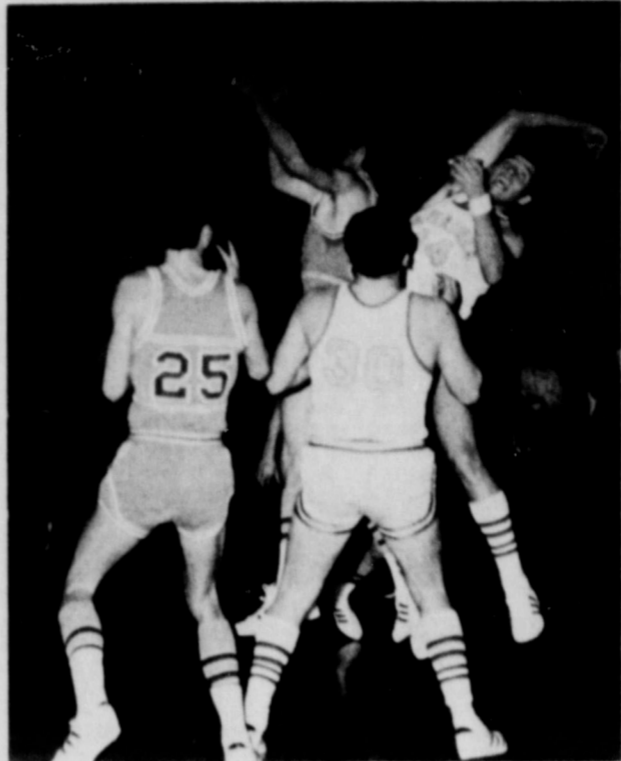
17 points. Willie was followed closely by Hoyt Glasscock who sunk 16 points for the Wolverines.
