Ed Haley and son Brad Earth have been accepted for mem-bership in the American-International Charolais Assn., Houston, Texas, the nation's fourth largest and fastest-growing beef breed, announces J. Scott Henderson, executive secretary.

Originating in France more than 200 years ago, Charolais has become well established in this country because of the breed's greater weight-for-age, greater feeding efficiency and improved carcass values that produce a greater ratio of quality lean meat to fat then other

Registrations of purebred Charolais during the past year to-talled 22,191 animals, a 39% increase above year earlier figures, Transfers of cattle also rose 3% as more and more new breeders enter the production picture. Mambership increased to 7,372 members, a 38% increase over new members the previous year.

Activities by junior breeders also showed a sharp increase during 1968, with 380 new mem-40% more than the number of new junior breeders added to the roster a year earlier, There are now approximately 82,091 purebred and 231,094 recorded animals in the Assoclation's herd book and append-

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





For instance: "Pay to Frank's garage only if motor is in good condition. It must be as good as it was before the wreck. Naturally the teller cannot honor such conditional endorse-

When a payee's name is misspelled the payee must take two endorsements. First - the way the name was spelled despite being wrong. Second-the payee's name correctly spelled.

Most banks certify checks, However, banks are not required by law to certify a customer's check.

Tellers will not cash post-dat-ed or "stale" checks, A post-

dated check has an advanced date. Most banks regard a check "stale" if it is 30 days old.

One of the major registration problems of the assessor-collctors stems from the tendency the voting public to put off gistration until the closing s of the period. Your paper

would be rendering a valuable public service if you would give continuing publicity to the registration period and urge voters to register before the big

rush begins in January. In 1968 Texas had the highest percentage of registered voters in its history, and yet only about 65 percent of the persons eligible to register were on the registration rolls and only 49 percent voted in the president-ial election. You would be performing an even greater public service if you joined in an effort to induce greater participation in government through registration and voting. Enclosed is a memorandum

etting out the essential informich is intended to serve as the basis for news stories. It should e supplemented by specific inormation on registration procedures in your county, which can be obtained from the tax assessor-collector, Iam asking ou to cooperate with him in publicizing registration in your county. In many counties the assessor-collectors are mailing out voter registration applicatand the date for the the initial publicity in each county should probably be coordinated with the date of the mailing in that county. For that reason I am suggesting that you check with the assessor-collector to find out what date would best fit in with his plans for conducting the registartion. A copy of this letter is being sent to the assessor-collector.

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
