# Grain Crop Brings \$2,356,795 Into Local Area

This year's tremendous grain crop brought in approximately 2,356,795,00 into the Earth Springlake area, according to the nine grain buyers in the Earth, Springlake, Dodd, and including one elevator in the Sunnyside community. These elevators have taken in

over 1,384 car loads of grain weighing approximately 138,

This year can be marked down from the grain grower's stand-point, especially in North Lamb County, as one of the best years in the history for area grain growers as far as the yield per acre is concerned.

This year's crop, although the acreage has been cut down as much as 20 to 25 percent in the past 15 years, can be rated as one of the best in the area because of the over-all average yield of approximately 6,500 to 7,000 pounds an acre, in comparism with 3,000 to 4,000 pounds an acre yield 15 years

According to grain buyers in the area, a grain grower can grow approximately as much on a 50 acre plot today as he could in early 1950 on a 70 acre plot. These increased yields are a result of improved seed, fertilization, and the farmers increasing knowledge over the years about when and how much to irrigate grain. These advanced improved combinations have brought yields up 60 percent in the past 15 years, which have resulted in this over whelming amount of grain grown in this

# **Wolverine Squad And Coaches** Wonder Who? What? Why?


