The grand officers Connie Kelley and Mrs. Ann Kelley were presented behind the bow and to the East where they were given grand honors.

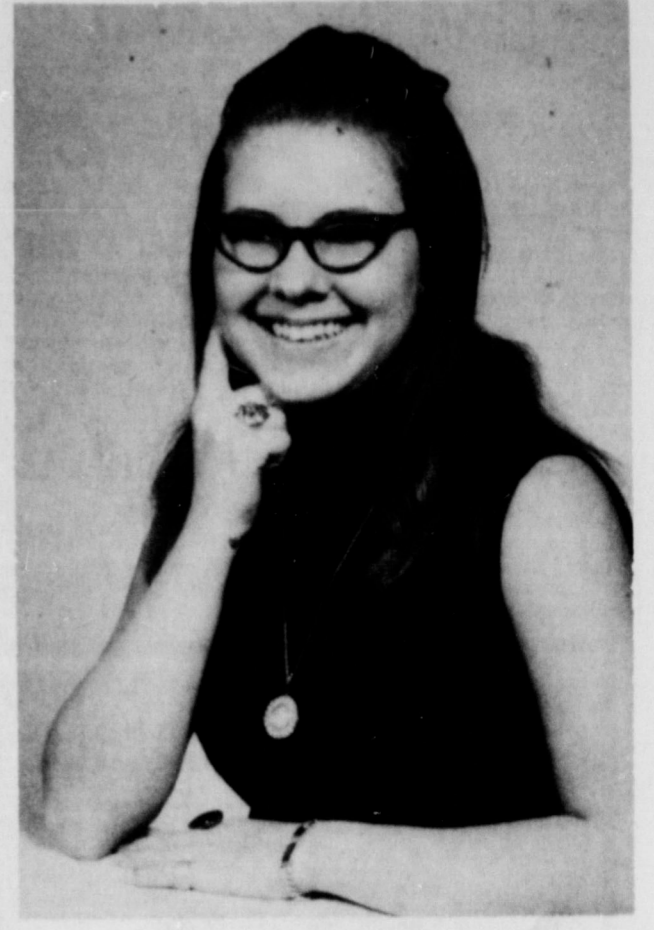

# Wolverines Take The Sting Out Of Hornets

The Wolverines kicked off district play Friday by defeating their longtime rival Sudan 21-7.

Sudan opened up the scoring in the first period after the Wolverines fumbled on the 12-yard line. From that point, the Hornet's top running back,

Gregory McNabb, scampered over for the TD. Kim Ingram kicked the extra point.

From that point on, the Wolverines dominated most of the game, holding the Hornets to one other first down and total yards gained 37.

The Wolverines had control most of the period in the period, scoring in the last minute of play.

The touchdown was scored by Hoyt Glascock from five yards out, and kicking the extra point, tying the game 7-7 before the end of the quarter.

In the second quarter, Sudan dominated play. A pass attempt by Glascock to Mike Cleavinger was incomplete, but Cleavinger was tackled and injured. He was taken to the hospital with a dislocated left elbow.

Sudan then took a Wolverine punt on their 34-yard line and marched 62 yards to the Wolverine four yard line. From there they ran for a TD only to have it called back on a penalty. In four downs they failed to go over for the TD and the Wolverines took over on downs.

At half, the score remained 7-7. In the third quarter, the Wolverines scored on a 7-yard pass from Glascock to Carl Sulzer. Glascock again kicked the extra point.

The quarter ended with the score Wolverines, 14, Hornets, 7.

In the fourth quarter, the Wolverines got the ball on their own 47 and on the second play, Eddie Alair, finding the going rough through the line, broke to the outside, shaking off three tackles and scored the final touchdown after scampering 48 yards. Glascock again kicked the extra point, making the final score, Wolverines 21, Sudan 7.

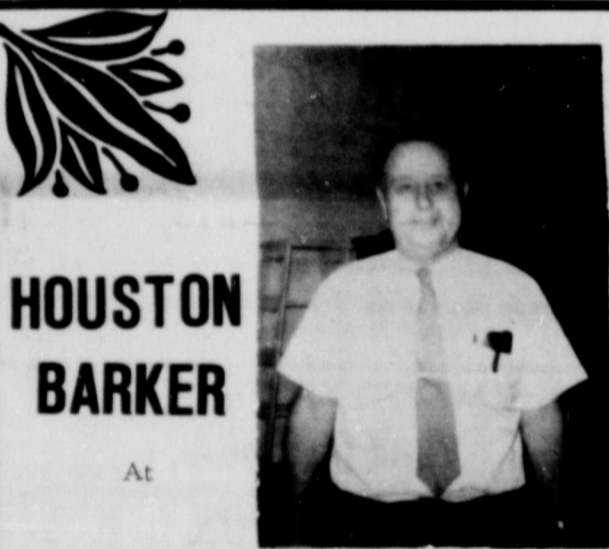

Scoutmaster Bill Morgan stated there was a good turnout at his meeting.

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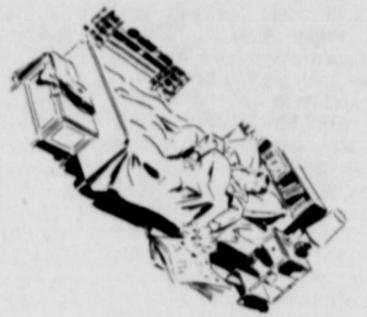
