Julia Valencia, 15-year-old Springlake high school freshman, will serve as princess of the Mexican Independence celebration to be held in Lamesa on September 16-18.

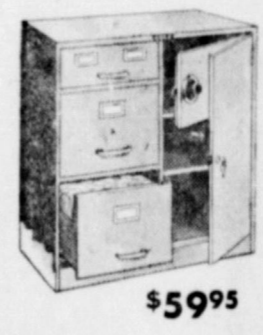

Cotton Men Discuss Harvest, Defoliation And Boll Worm

About 40 persons attended the cotton meeting at the Community Center Tuesday afternoon sponsored by the Cottonmill mill and the Lamb county Farm Bureau in cooperation with the Texas extension service.

Fred Elliott, cotton work specialist, told the group, "Cotton defoliation does not work as satisfactorily on the High Plains as in other parts of the state because of the short growing season. We need as many days as we can get for our cotton plant to mature out."

In applying defoliation he recommended that it be used two weeks prior to frost, (average frost date is Nov. 5) or when 80 to 90 percent of the bolls have opened. He stressed that there is no one material that will give satisfactory defoliation in all instances.

The three main types are: cyanamide which is a dust defoliation to be applied at from 25-40 pounds per acre; endothal and sodium pentaborate, which are both sprays and should be applied at rates of one to eight pounds per acre, mixed with 20-25 gallons of water. Defoliation guides are available in the office of County Agent Dave Eaton.

Freeman Fuller, entomologist, discussed the control of the bollworm and the red spider. He cautioned farmers to check the cotton patch every three to five days, particularly for the bollworm when it is very small and feeding on the terminal buds. When the farmer finds a few eggs plus four or five worms per 100 plants, the situation warrants control. In most instances, he said, unless both egg and worms are found, control might be a waste.

He cautioned that the cotton bollworm and the cotton leaf worm are both appearing in large numbers close by Tahoka. Over the weekend very heavy flights of cotton bollworms, cotton leaf worms and careless weed worms, or Millers, did show up in the south part

of Lamb county. However, Fuller said it is too early to tell if the county is going to get an infestation. He urged every farmer to keep a close check on the cotton.

Ed Burk, cotton gin specialist, said, "Because of the surplus of cotton, both our foreign and domestic trade buyers are becoming a little more particular as to the type of cotton bought. Instead of the mills buying on grade and staple as they had in the past, they are buying on grade, staple and maturity."

He said the micronair, an instrument which forces air through a sample of cotton giving an indication of the coarseness or fineness of the fiber which is determined by the stage of maturity of cotton, is being used. This year micronair reading will be on about 10 percent of the classing cards received by the farmer.

Burk cautioned farmers to use better harvesting practices than have been used in the past. Better practices will mean from five to ten dollars per bale difference in price.

Practices stressed were: 1. Use slatted side or wire side trailer rather than a solid sided trailer because cotton will undergo sweat while waiting on the gin yards and moisture will have an even distribution throughout the entire load, so air can circulate through it.

2. Do not tramp the cotton in trailers, but put it in loosely because tramping grinds up leaves and other trash in fine particles and gins can not clean the trash out.

3. If strippers are used and the farmer did not defoliate, he should wait until two weeks after frost to harvest because the green stems will go through the overhead cleaners and the saws will chip off particles of bark which will mix with lint. In case this happens there is no machinery in ex-

Christian Citizens

Lesson for September 12, 1954

SUPPOSE the dream of some scientists comes true and there is built a "space platform" buzzing around the earth, some thousand miles away, like a little moon? Suppose this thing is equipped with telescopic sights and atomic weapons? Such a thing—and it is now technically possible—would give its possessors power over the whole earth such as no conqueror has ever had. The question then would be: What kind of people are running the thing? Do they really take an interest in the human race, or suppose they didn't care, and started blasting away some fine morning just for fun? E. B. White's famous story, "The Morning of the Day They Did It," imagines what would happen then.



Learning to Belong That may not be true as prophecy—a continent, a planet, blown out of existence because two men who do not care anything about it, or anything else, take a notion to blast it. But it is quite true as a picture of human attitudes. Neither soldier nor senator nor common citizen will do anything to help a country or people for whom he feels no special attraction; and he may very easily injure or destroy it without much conscience. In war, this is a picture of how each nation looks at the enemy; in "peace," it is a picture of the lack of social responsibility which plagues every country in the world. "Do what you like with it—it isn't mine," may possibly be all right when you are talking about your neighbor's tomato-plant or automobile. But when you are talking about your neighbor's nation, you are talking about something that is just as much yours as his. We all begin life as little egotists, each of us the center of his little high-chair universe. By degrees we learn to say "we" about our family, our gang, maybe our town or high school or lodge. But it takes church members a long time—some of them—to say "we" about the church, and even longer for even Christian citizens to say "we" about their country. Having no special feeling for it, they don't care what happens to it, and may even take part in doing it harm, just because they have never learned to belong to it.

Christian Citizens Needed The Apostle Paul was a citizen of a great empire, and he was proud of the fact. He believed that every Christian, whether a citizen or not, had certain duties of obedience, responsibility and support, toward the Roman Empire. If this was true in those days, when the government was not Christian, corrupt and oppressive, when Christians had for the most part no chance whatever in sharing the responsibilities of government, how much more true it is in a democracy! With professed Christians numbering about half the total population, with the vote in our hands and our representatives no farther away than the nearest mail-box, we have even more reason and opportunity to make our presence and our ideas felt, as Christian citizens, than could have been possible in the time of Paul and Nero. Any Christian who is old enough to vote and educated enough to read and write, might well ask himself a few questions to see if he is much of a Christian.

Quiz for Christian Citizens Do you know the names of your senator, your congressman? Did you vote for them? Why? Do you know whether they are Christians by profession? Do you know how they have been voting on important questions? If so, do you find that they have been taking a Christian attitude as reflected in their votes? Have you ever taken the time and spent the money to write or wire your congressman or senator to let him know how you and your neighbors stand on important matters? Have you felt that international affairs were somehow beyond your scope, or have you realized that bad relationships between nations have always brought death to happy homes? Do you realize that our nation, and others, have developed weapons of such terrible force that to use them can destroy the race of man? Do you have any idea what your congressman and senator, your personal representatives, are thinking and doing?

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

By Mary Lee Taylor

Pineapple Meringue Cake

Broadcast: September 11, 1954

1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 cup sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup soft shortening
1/2 cup Per Evaporated Milk
1/2 cup water
2 eggs, separated
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup canned, crushed pineapple, well-drained
Sift into a 2-quart bowl the flour, 1/2 cup sugar, baking powder and salt. Add all at once the shortening, milk, water, egg yolks and vanilla. Beat hard 2 minutes with spoon, or electric beater at medium speed. Spread batter in a greased and floured 8-in. square cake pan. Bake in 375 oven on rack slightly above center about 30 minutes, or until cake pulls from sides of pan. About 5 minutes before cake is baked, beat egg whites until stiff. Beat in 1/4 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time. Fold in drained pineapple. Spread fruit mixture on top of baked cake in pan. Continue baking 5 minutes longer, or until meringue is light brown. Serve warm or cold.
