10 Pound Loss Recorded By TOPS

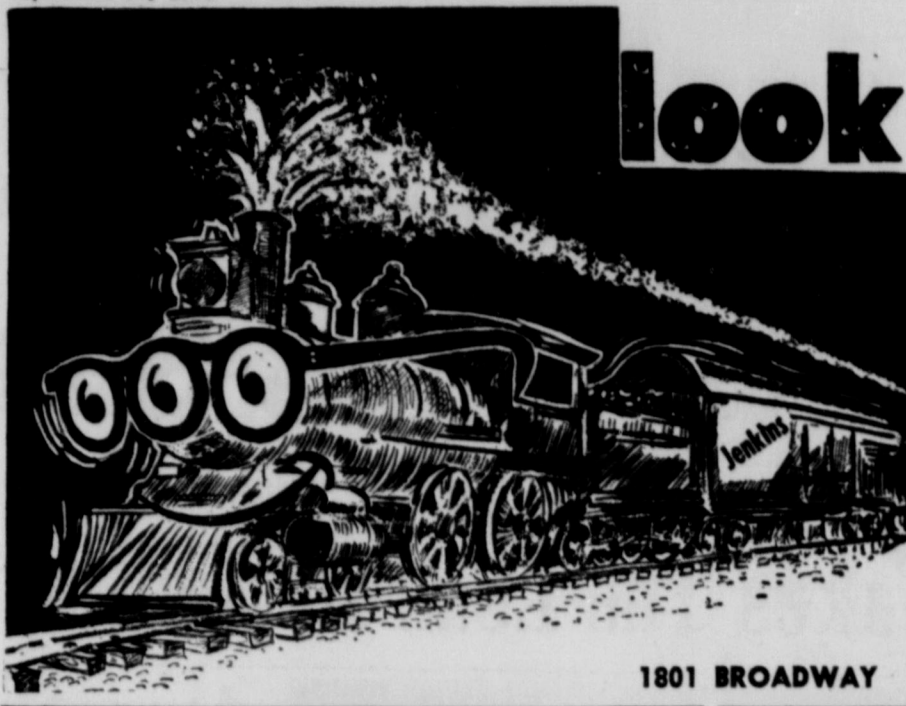

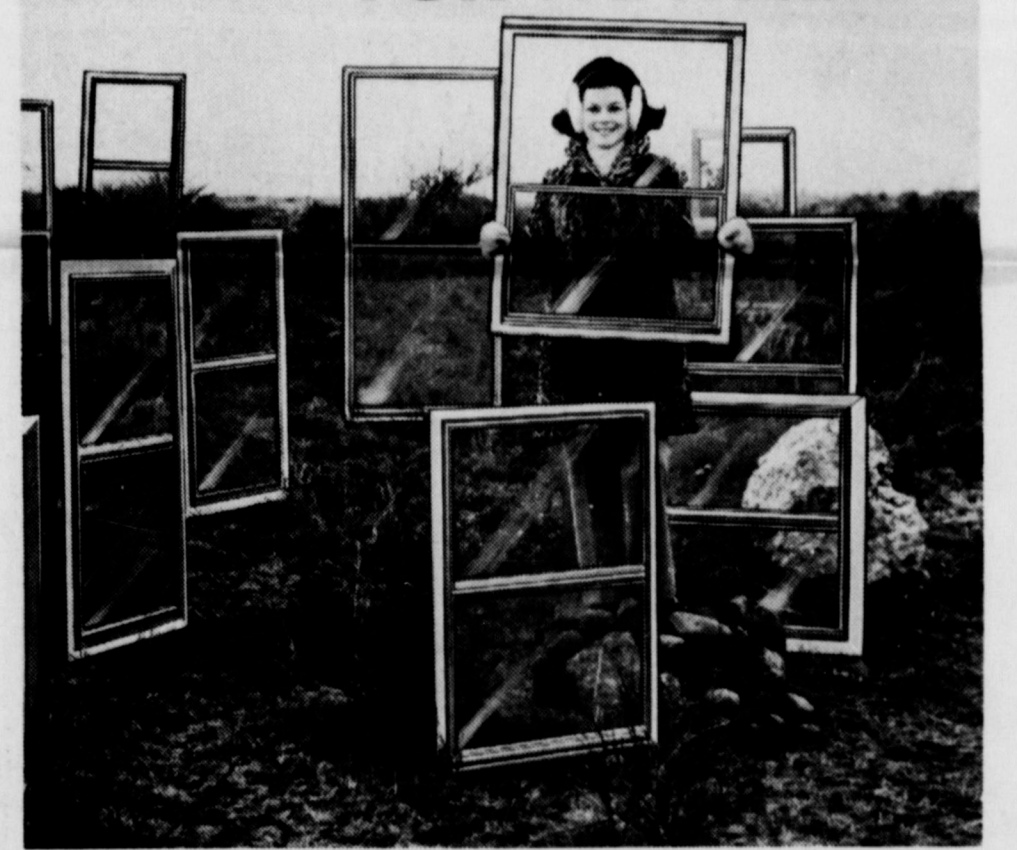

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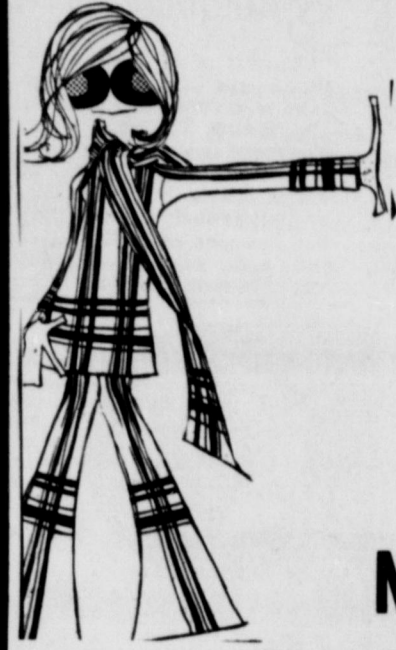

Did you know the word "cash" originated over 2,000 years ago?

The Orient is responsible for this term and also for one of the first uses of round coins.

At the time, Oriental rulers had representative money made. Miniature models of spades, chisels and even shirts and knives were used instead of the actual articles.

The model of the knife was called a "tao" at first. As more "taos" were made it was necessary to reduce their size for easy handling. Eventually only the top of the knife with a hole in it, or a round shaped coin, was left.

The Orientals took pride in this round coin because they said money should roll from

place to place to help trade. They also gave it a new name which would far outlive the coin. They called it "cash."

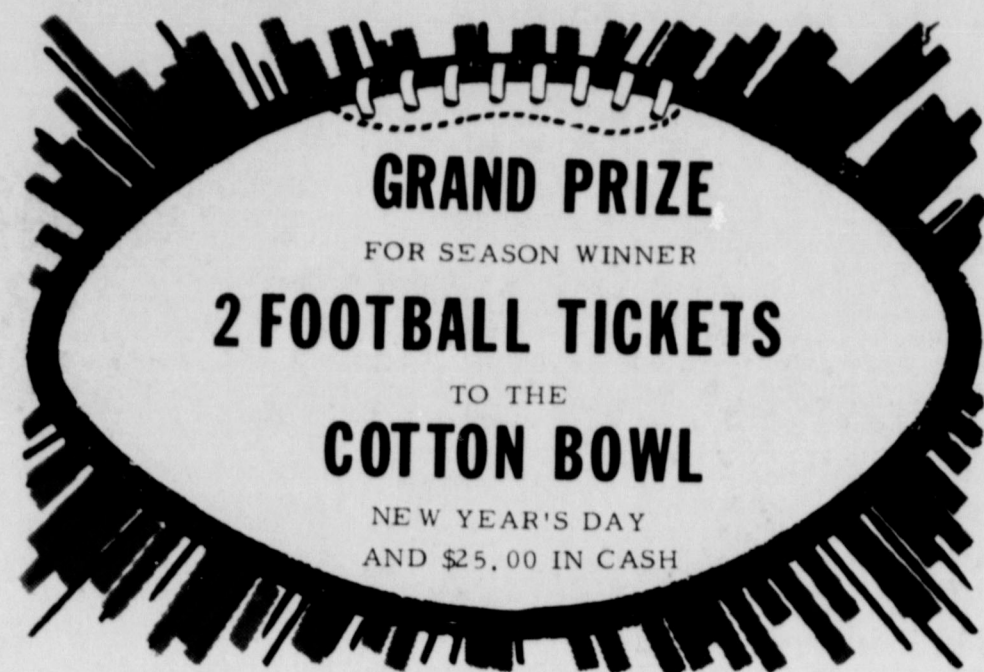

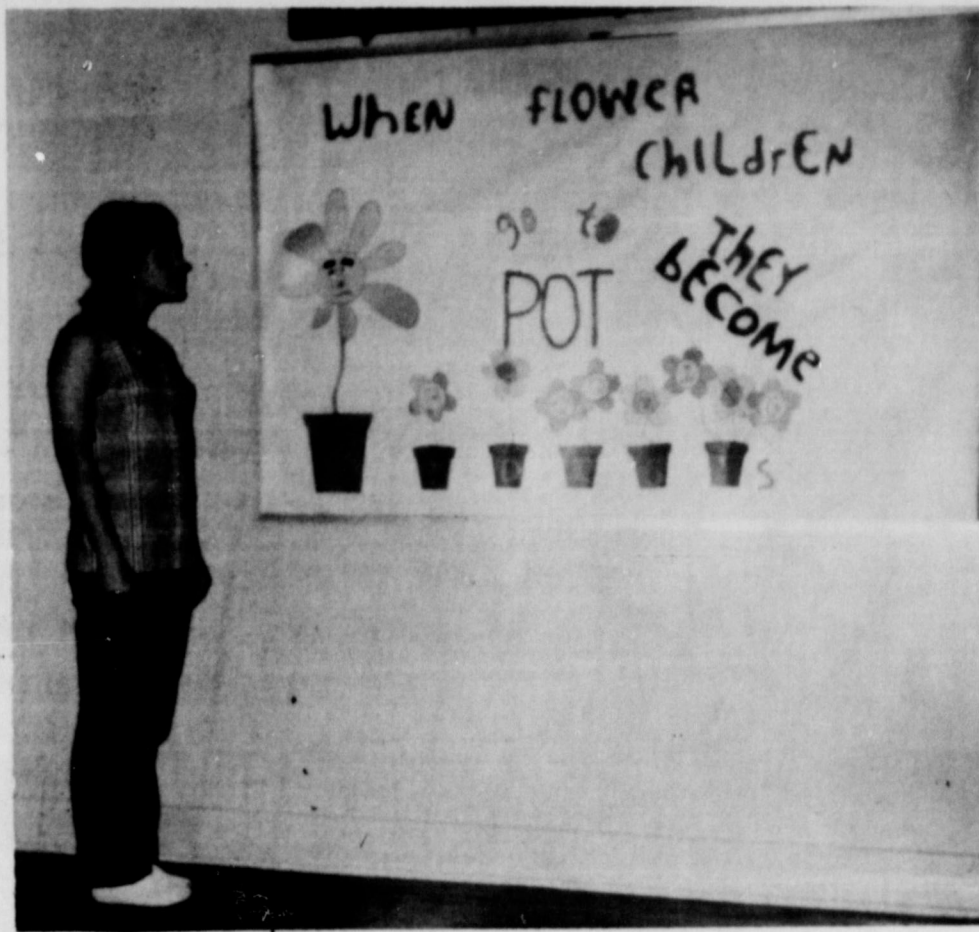

The Springlake-Earth Wolverines opened the 1970 football season Friday night by giving fans a thrill in defeating the Amherst Bulldogs 26-0. The squad took to the field and literally controlled the ball all the way. Approximately 200 Wolverine fans were present to observe their favorite team in action in this opening game of a brand new season.

Scoring for the Wolverines were Tony Barton, 6; Ricky Enloe, 6; Hoyt Glasscock, 8; and Mike Cleavinger, 6.

Tony Barton, who was injured during the game, racked up 150 yards rushing and scored the Wolverines first touchdown.
