

Damages Estimated At Approximately \$115,000

Early Morning Fire Destroys Two Earth Firms

The City of Earth was awakened in the wee hours of the morning Wednesday, to the sound of the city fire siren, calling together its alert local Volunteer Fire Department to fight a fire which completely destroyed two firms in Earth, causing an approximate damage of from \$100,000 to \$115,000, before being brought under control.

The early morning fire, the largest in the history of downtown Earth, was fought tirelessly by firemen from Earth, Springlake, Littlefield, Muleshoe, Olton, Sudan and Amherst who answered the summons to help, but efforts to save the two firms were fruitless, as the fire was too advanced when the alarm was sounded shortly after 3 A.M. The fire alarm was sounded by Smitty Weaver after he was awakened by the cans of oil exploding inside the tire shop. Weaver lives about a block from the fire.

The fire fighting of the seven fire departments working together as a unit, perhaps prevented a major portion of the city of Earth from going up in flames, by holding the fire to a minimum.

Flames from the fire leaped a

hundred feet high at intervals and tar roofing compound crackled under the heat and sent particles of the roof high into the sky, falling in some instances two blocks away.

Jimmy Bitner, owner-manager of the Bitner tire and supply, where the fire originated, said the estimate of overall damages could not be exact at such an early date. However his complete stock was destroyed along with his building.

Fire Chief, Bud Matlock said the fire originated in the mid-section of the tire company building. A.R. Kirby owner-manager of the Earth Locker Plant, was busy Wednesday aiding patrons in clearing their meat from the freezer storage before it could ruin. Wading in approximately 12 inches of water area customers of the plant were working together to save their food supply. Nothing else in the building could be salvaged. All equipment and building was a total loss.

C.O. Taylor, owner-manager of Taylor Furniture was asked to clear the appliances along the wall adjoining the Earth Locker. Firemen and Citizens of the area were working to save further property damages.

Taylor who is owner of the Locker Building estimated damages of the Locker Building to be approximately \$15,000.

Firemen from the seven Fire Departments worked approximately four hours. Eight pumpers were working pumping out approximately 1700 gallons of water per minute.

During the height of the fire a highline pole caught fire and electrical lines were popping, threatening to give way. The volunteer firemen, using their know-how, used the hose to fan the poles to put out the fires to prevent snapping the highline wires. Dave Cavitt, Southwestern Public Service Manager, was on hand to direct the handling of any electrical problem.

Starkey Steak House and the Wolverine Drive In provided coffee for the firemen.

Following the fire, Mr. and Mrs. Glen McGath the owners of the Wolverine Drive Inn were joined by Mrs. L.H. Dent, Mr. and Mrs. Leon Dent and C.O. Taylor in preparing and serving breakfast to over a hundred firemen.

Many local firemen were still on duty at noon Wednesday lending a helping hand to their unfortunate neighbors.

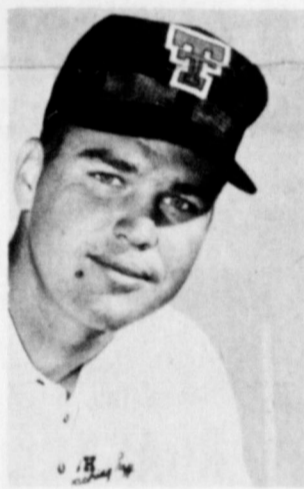
The honored guests will be the current athletes of Springlake-Earth School and Springlake-Earth graduates now playing college ball on a scholarship.

soon as he graduates.

While Wilson was completing work on his degree during the fall of '66, he was a student assistant, charged directly with working with Tech's quarterbacks, Wilson is given much of the credit for John Scovell's development as a passer and field general last fall.

Wilson, most valuable player at Corsicana High School in both basketball and football, was considered as a college prospect too short for the former, too light for the latter. Nevertheless, he had quarterbacked Jim Acree's Lions to the state finals, making all-district en route.

As a sophomore, Wilson played only sparingly. But he was moved ahead of more experienced quarterbacks as a junior and quickly lived up to King's confidence in him.

Wilson connected on his passes so well that his name appears

in the Tech record books in some 14 different places. In the Southwest Conference book, Wilson's name replaced some of the most storied tossers of the past.

Briefly, Wilson in his career, attempted 413 passes and completed 241 for 2,932 yards and 23 touchdowns.

Wilson's passing played a major factor in Donny Anderson's breaking virtually all of Tech's receiving marks, even those compiled by David Parks, who has set a torrid pace for National Football League pass catchers.

As for field generalship, Wilson's play calling and execution enabled the Red Raiders to show the way offensively as they pioneered the tandem I formation in the Southwest. His coolness under fire resulted in the Red Raiders snatching victory from defeat in the final two minutes of three games as they marched to an 8-2 record and a second place tie in the Southwest Conference in 1966.

King calls Wilson "one of the most dedicated players we have ever had here, and I have no

reason to believe he won't show that same dedication as a coach."

Wilson has this philosophy concerning athletics: "Sports can change your life completely. You have to learn discipline—in training and in keeping up your grades. Also, athletics will bring to the front leadership qualities that might not otherwise be discovered."

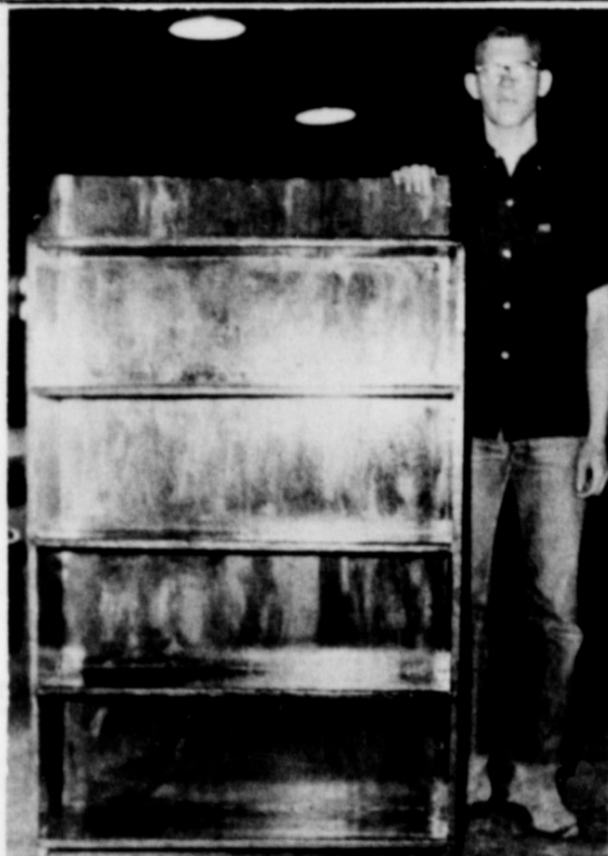

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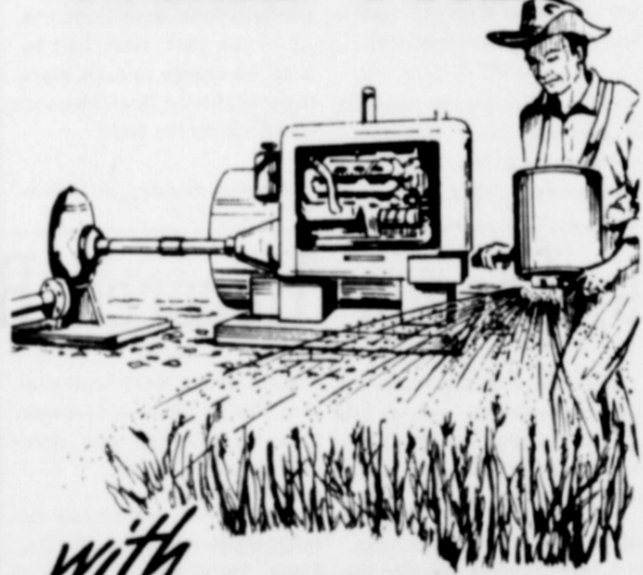
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








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Bridge, 42 Tournament Scheduled In Olton

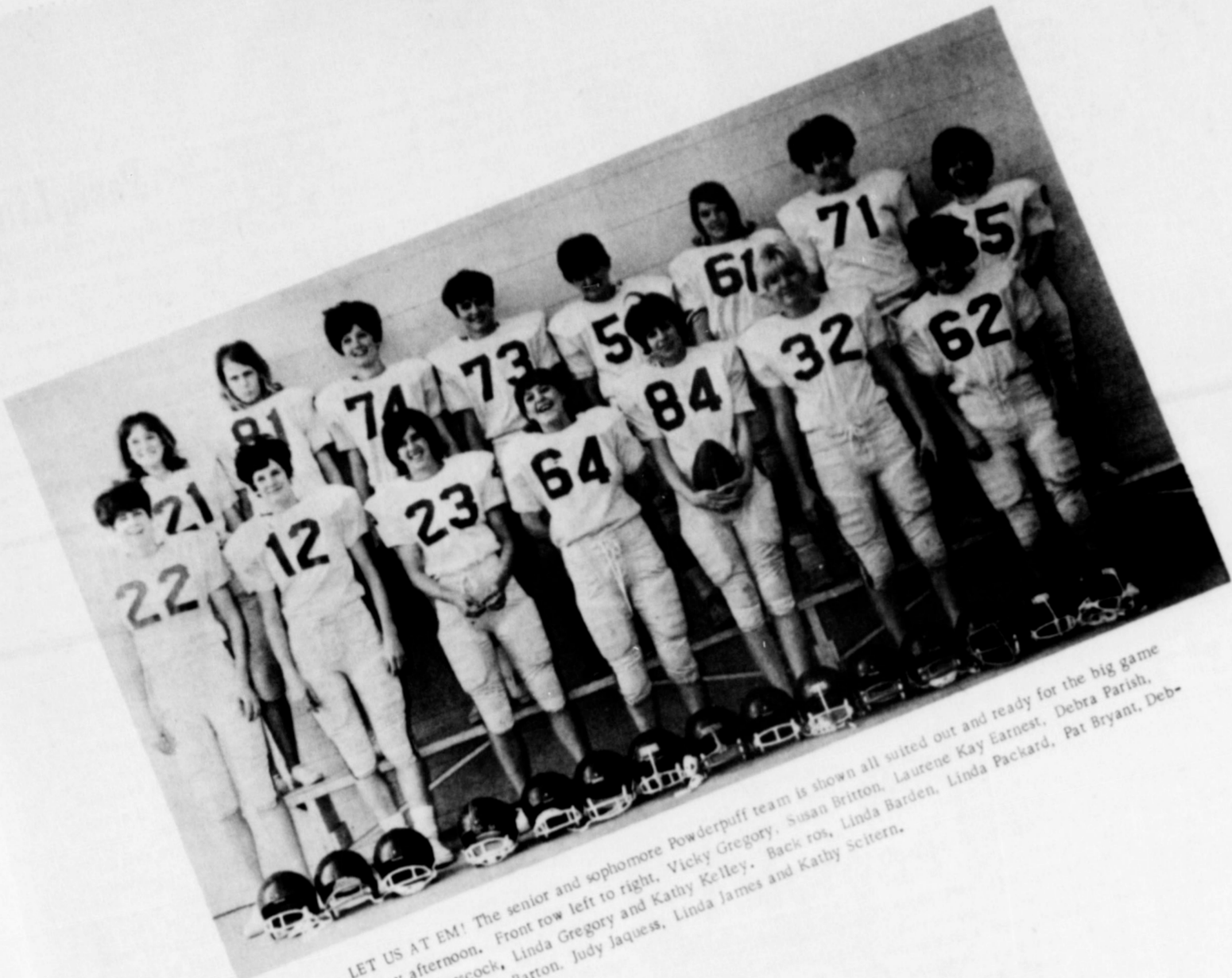

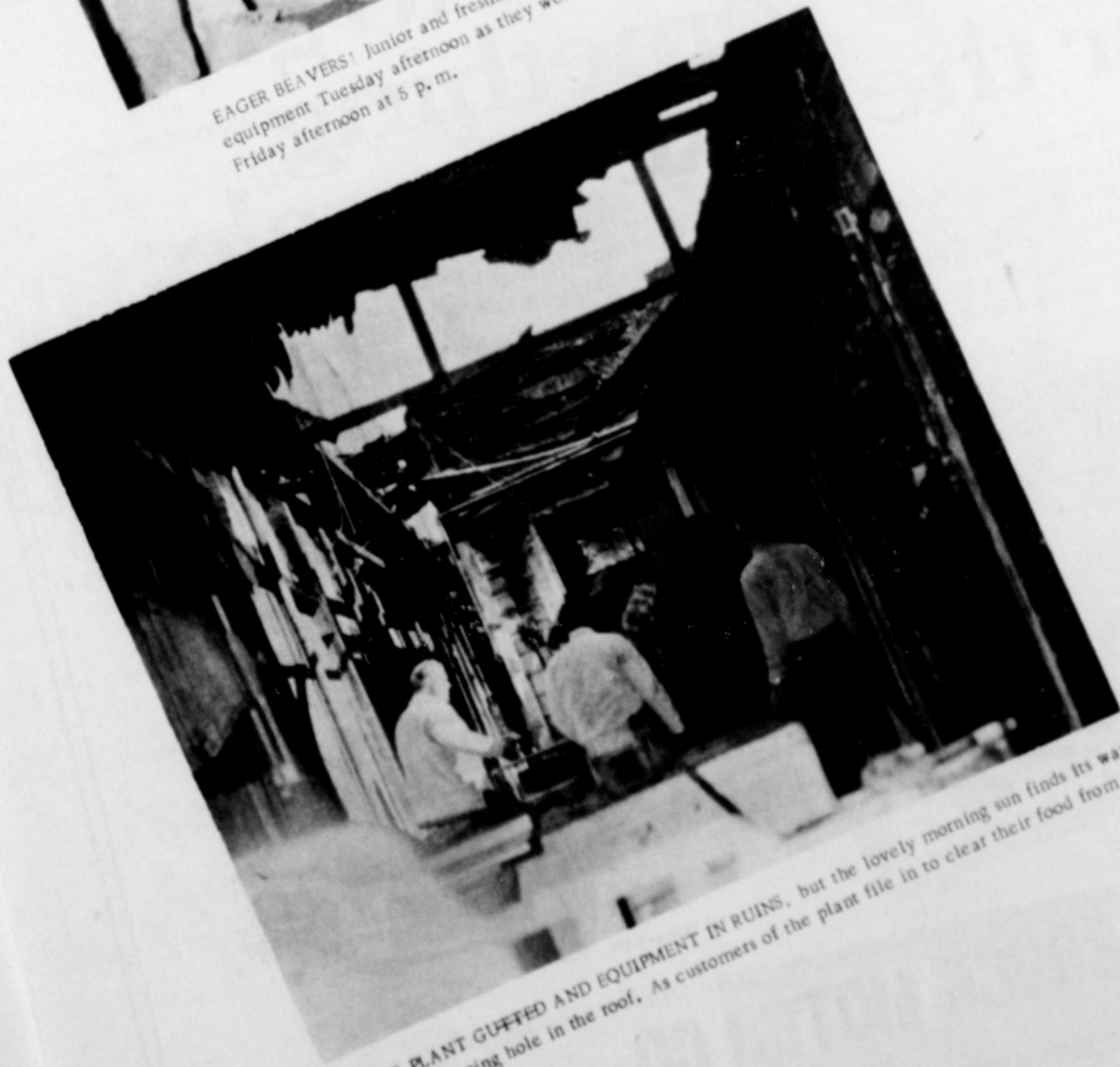

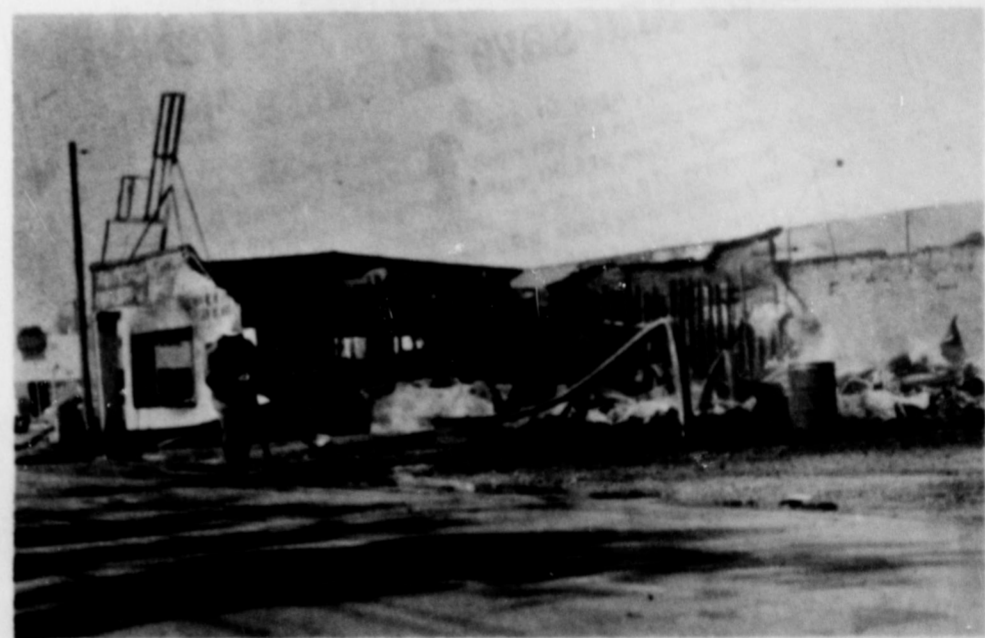

\$6,308,000 Taxes Paid To Uncle By Countians

Uncle Sam has got it figured that he will get about \$6,308,000 more from Lamb County for 1967 earnings than he did for 1966 earnings.

The Treasury Department expects it will be even more than this, this April. It counts on the bigger incomes that most families received during 1967 to produce proportionately more in the way of taxes this year.

Last April Uncle Sam collected approximately \$5,729,000 in personal taxes in the area, based upon 1966 earnings.

The Government's prediction nationally is that personal income taxes will be almost \$6.2 billion greater than before. This is indicated in the new budget, which estimates current revenue at \$67.7 billion as compared with \$61.5 billion a year ago.

Lamb County's share of the tax load was determined by a breakdown of the returns received from taxpayers throughout the State of Texas as a whole.

The statewide total, including taxes collected via the withholding process, came to \$2,604,000,000, the Treasury Department reports.

An estimated 6.22 percent of that total, or \$5,729,000, was

turned in by residents of the local area.

Because of the economic gains made by them since that time, their returns this year, based on preliminary earnings reports, are expected to be about \$6,308,000, or \$579,000 more than before.

There is an uncertainty as to how long taxes will remain at the present level. Should Congress approve the Administration request for a surcharge of 10 per cent on personal taxes, local residents would have to pay that much more.

As for the coming fiscal year, the huge budget presented by the Administration calls for individual income taxes of \$80.9 billion, payable in 1969. This assumes approval of the proposed surtax.

For Lamb County residents to be able to carry such a tax load and, at the same time, maintain their present standard of living, their incomes would have to rise about by 19 percent during 1968.

A variety of styles are available in redwood outdoor furniture ranging from Spanish to country or ranch to French to traditional styling. Some barbecue sets come complete with umbrellas and canopies of bright summery colors and patterns.

Earth Officer On NATO Exercise

Degree from Oklahoma Christian College in Oklahoma City, Okla. in 1967.

Dr. Kay was selected by the National Association of Manufacturers as one of ten representatives from ten colleges and universities throughout America to attend a six weeks special seminar in Economics conducted at Claremont Men's College in Claremont, California. He has held many important positions, these include Head of the Department of Religion at West Texas State College, Canyon, Texas from 1954 to 1957. Professor of History and Government of Lubbock Christian College in 1957. Dean of students at Lubbock Christian College in 1957, Dean of Student Life at Lubbock Christian College in 1959. Vice president, public affairs at Lubbock Christian College in 1960 thru 1966, and assistant president of Lubbock Christian College in 1966.

He is an active member of the Chamber of Commerce and West Texas Chamber of Commerce and presently serves on two committees, the Governmental Affairs Committee and the National Affairs Committee.

For two years Dr. Kay was author of a weekly column titled, "The Spirit of America" and directed a weekly radio program entitled "Awakening to Freedom."

He has made over 2,000 addresses at different banquets and organizations in the last five years.

On April 8, 1966 he was the recipient of the "Liberty Bell" Award at the annual awards banquet of the Lubbock County Junior Bar Association for "outstanding service rendered in the administration of justice and who has made an important

Nationally Dr. Kay has received over thirty citations and awards among which were: "The George Washington Medal of Honor" in 1961 presented by the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge for his speech entitled; "The Battle Ahead," and

"The George Washington Medal of Honor in 1962 presented by the same foundation for his speech "Freedom Is on Trial."

On April 29, 1964 Dr. Kay received a special citation from former President of the United States, General Dwight D. Eisenhower. The citation read as follows: Honoring Casey L. Kay, "for outstanding service to the Nation in propagation of the American Credo." Only four people throughout America were selected for this special citation.
