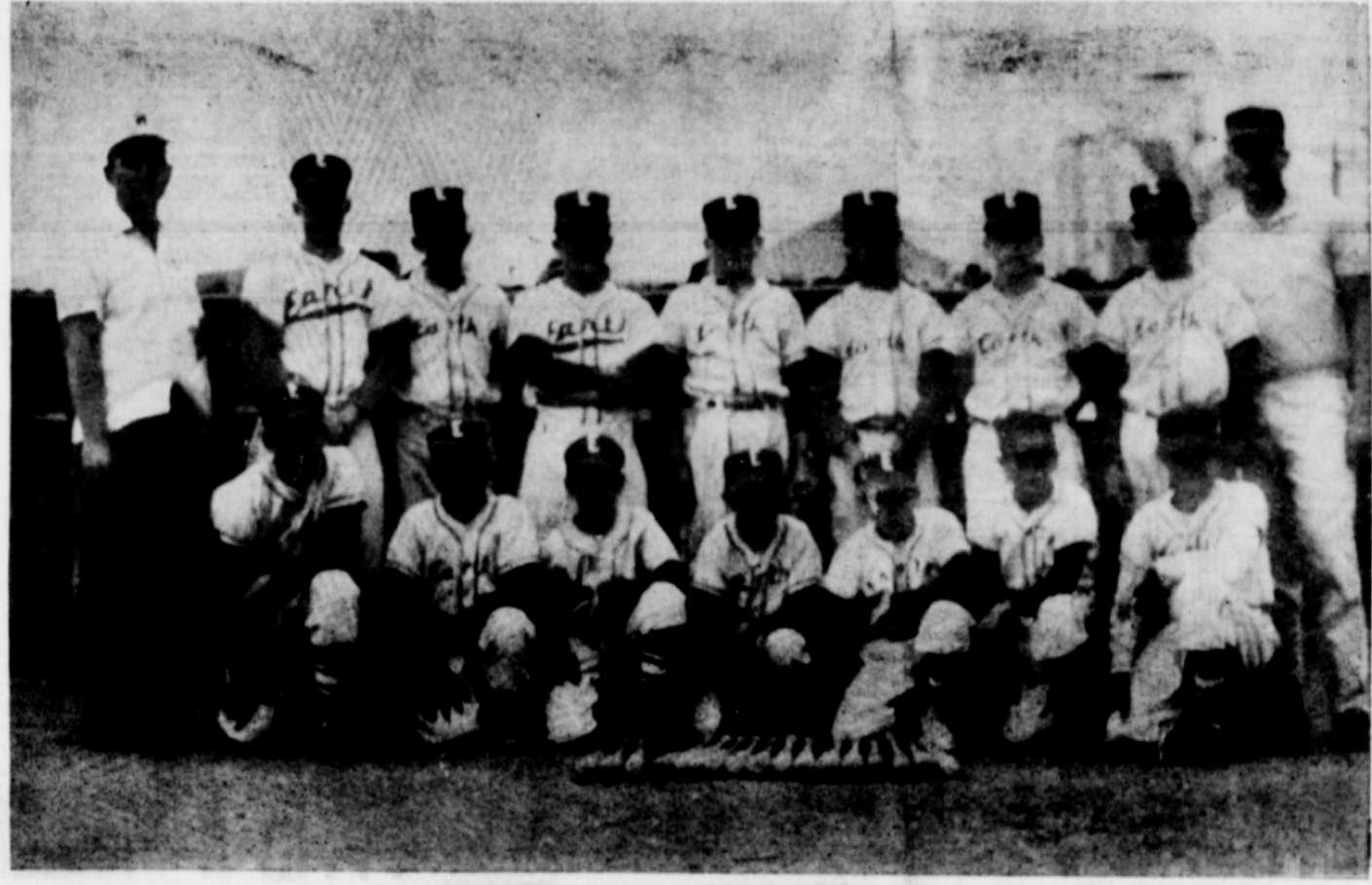

Rain-Hail Damages Area Crops Saturday

Heavy rains, hail and wind damaged area crops late Saturday afternoon, some crops being completely wiped out.

Six miles west of Earth on the Ted Robbins, Gene Templeton, Buddy Free and other farms in that vicinity damages up to 50 percent were reported and the farmers are busy this week replanting.

On further west a few miles Gene Burhman and others were completely rained and hailed out.

One tornado, four miles north of Sudan demolished a four room farm house. The occupants of the house had taken shelter one half mile away and no one was injured.

The hail in the Muleshoe area was brief and was reported to be large but no heavy damage was reported.

A trail of downed power lines, stripped trees, shattered well houses and outbuildings and damaged houses was reported throughout Lamb county.

In the Springlake area very little hail was reported and only one half inch of rain fell. Most of the small hail in the area fell south and southwest of town.

The Rocky Ford Baptist parsonage south of Springlake was damaged.

A dairy barn of concrete block was ripped apart near Amberst. The roof and one side was torn away and expensive electric milking equipment was left unscathed.

Three persons were injured, none seriously, in a car-pickup accident about 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday night of last week.

The accident occurred when daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Gregory, driving a 1958 model Ford, traveling east, became momentarily distracted and collided with a '56 model International pickup, by the White Auto Store and parked in front of their business, on main street.

Miss Gregory accompanied by Ladon Messer and Joanie Murrell, Springlake High School students was taken to Earth Medical Center by Parson's Ambulance, Olton which was summoned to the scene.

She lost two teeth as a result of the accident and also suffered chest bruises. She was released from the Medical Center the following morning. Miss Messer and Miss Murrell were not injured.

Two Latin Americans, Santo Garza, 15, and Ester Guana, 35 who were in front of the pickup were injured as the impact knocked the pickup into them.

Miss Garza was taken to West Plains Hospital, Muleshoe, by Singleton ambulance of Muleshoe, which was also summoned to the scene. She was released from the hospital Tuesday.

Ester Guana was treated and released.

James Freeman, Highway patrolman and Deputy V. L. Smith, Jr. investigated the accident.

Smith estimated damages to the car at three hundred fifty dollars and damages to the pickup two hundred dollars.

Polio Season Is Here Again

Since polio season is here again the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the American Academy of General Practice has issued pamphlets advising the public to protect its family through immunization.

"BABIES AND BREADWINNERS"—that's the theme of this year's anti-polio campaign sponsored jointly by the U. S. Public Health Service, the National Foundation, and the American Medical Association.

It is an apt phrase in 1960, these two segments of the family were hit most severely by paralytic polio. Almost half of those paralyzed by the disease were under five years, and young adults were among the most seriously paralyzed.

Paralytic polio in the United States declined from 6289 cases in 1959 to 2265 cases in 1960. This is great progress, but warns the USPHS, Americans cannot rest comfortably as long as 40 percent of the population is not fully vaccinated against polio. This figure includes—38 percent of children five years and under.

63 percent of men aged 20 to 49, 48 percent of women aged 20 to 49.

As long as "islands" of unvaccinated persons exist even in well vaccinated communities, polio epidemics remain a serious threat.

The USPHS recommends the following schedule of Salk vaccine shots for everyone except infants under six months:

The first shot, NOW.

The second shot to be given one month after the first.

The third shot, seven months after the second (or before the next polio season).

The fourth shot, one year later.

If you had not had all three polio shots, the U. S. Department of Health advises that you see your family doctor.

Springlake To Have New Post Office

The Post Office Department has announced they will advertise for bids and post them on June 20 for a new post office in Springlake according to George Vishon, Representative of this district.

The bids will be opened July 20. The new post office will be located within one block of the highway intersections in the center of town and will occupy about 1000 square feet with adequate parking and maneuvering space.

The office will have a five year lease and one five year renewal option.

Lamb County Grain Payments Reaches \$500,000

Approximately 1642 Lamb County grain producers have signed up on the new emergency feed grain program which was instituted in March by President Kennedy according to L. D. Aten, ASC director.

Lamb County feed grain producers have received \$582,681 in advance payment on the program. In addition to the advance payments already made the ASC office expects to pay out more in the initial phase.

Of the 240,000 acres in the county planted in feed grains in 1959-60, 184,884 have been placed in the program. A total of 57,951 acres have been diverted from feed grain production. Of this 57,951 acres, 356 acres will be placed in oil seed crops, Acala dated.

Under the terms of the emergency act, producers who enter the program are eligible for support prices of \$1.88 per hundred, and must divert at least 20 percent of their feed grain acreage. Producers who do not enter the program will have to sell their grains in the open market.

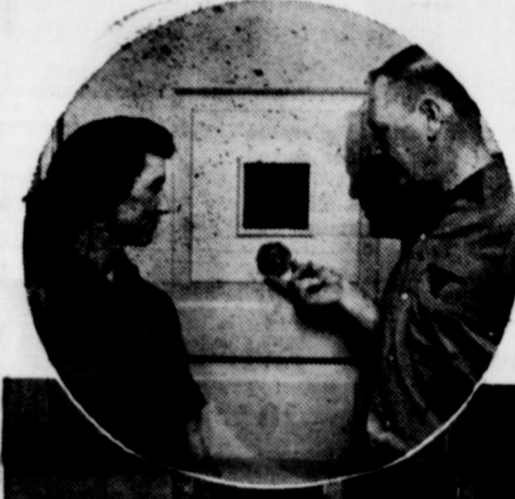

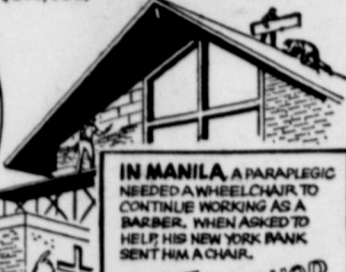

Lightening Rods Can Save You Money

College Station — A metal covered building without adequate grounding is not protected against lightning. W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer, says that proper grounding of such buildings, especially metal roofed structures, will prevent many fires.

Lightning protection is very inexpensive and easy to provide, Allen continues. All buildings with metal roofs or sides can be protected by grounding the roof at all four corners. This can be done by flattening the end of a piece of one half or three fourth inch galvanized iron or steel pipe and bending it so that it may be attached by bolts to the drip edge of the roof. For support, galvanized steel screw hooks should be placed on the side of the building and bent shut over the pipe.

After the pipe has been firmly attached to the roof, it may then be attached by galvanized wire rope clamps to a one half or three fourth inch pipe driven eight to ten feet into the ground. This ground pipe should be placed as close as possible to the building's foundation, Allen explains.

These lightning rods may not be as fancy as those of grandpa's day, but they serve the same purpose of property protection and fire prevention. Their installation could save you a great deal of money by preventing lightning damage, Allen concludes.

Quality Cotton Is Long Range Goal

Lubbock — Special — Consistency in better quality cotton is one of the long-range goals of cotton producers on the Texas High Plains and proof that this is underway and that progress is being made is evident in the 1960 cotton Quality Survey recently released by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Cotton on the High Plains in 1961 showed an average grade of Middling Plus in the white cotton and a full Middling grade in the Light Spotted cotton. These two groups account for about 86 percent of the 1960 crop, George W. Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice President, explained.

The remaining 14 percent of the 1960 crop did include some 7 percent spotted cotton and wastes totaled 4 and one half percent, and all others such as grays, tinges and light gray totaled 2 and one half percent.

Average staple length of the 1960 crop on the High Plains was 32.7 thirty-seconds inch with more than half of the crop, 52 percent, measuring 31-32-inch or longer.

The micronaire average of the 1960 crop was 3.7 with two thirds of the cotton testing 3.5 or better. Pressley fiber strength averaged 77,000 pounds per square inch with two thirds of the crop testing above 75,000 pounds.

In 1959 on the High Plains white cotton average only Strict Low Middling plus in grade and Light Spots averaged Middling. In that year 61 percent of the cotton was graded as White cotton and about 34 percent Light Spotted. Average staple length in 1959 was 30.5 thirty-seconds inch with about 45 percent measuring 31-32-inch or longer. Micronaire was only 3.4 with about 45 percent above 2.5 and Pressley fiber strength average

was 75,000 pounds with about 47 percent 75,000 and above.

In 1958, the all-time record high in production on the High Plains when 2,925,000 bales were produced, White cotton that year averaged Strict Low Middling in grade and Light Spots averaged Middling. A whopping 71 percent of the crop that year was White cotton and about 26 percent Light Spots and 2 and one half Full Spots. Average staple length was 30.9 thirty-seconds inch with some 63 percent measuring 31-32 inch and longer. Micronaire average that year was 4.9 with 81 percent 2.5 or above and Pressley fiber strength was 74,000 pounds with about 47 percent testing 75,000 and above.

Statistics from the Area Farm Management Specialist John Seibert of the Texas Extension Service, show that High Plains farmers had a yield of about 430 pounds of lint off of cotton in 1960 which produced an approximate net return per acre of some \$40.13 for an approximate cost to produce a pound of lint of 18.7 cents.

The 1960 cotton crop was produced off of 2,152,245 harvested acres for a total yield of approximately 1,942,787 bales in the 23 member counties of the High Plains.

Prospects continue to look as good in 1961 since additional acreage is available and farmers will have 2,442,627 allotted acres available for planting. At present planting operations are from 80 to 85 percent complete.

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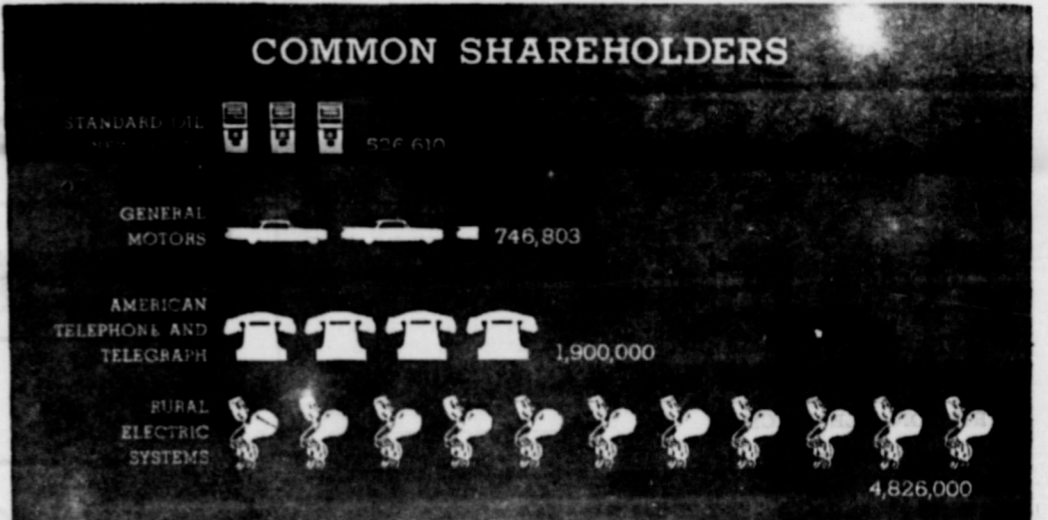

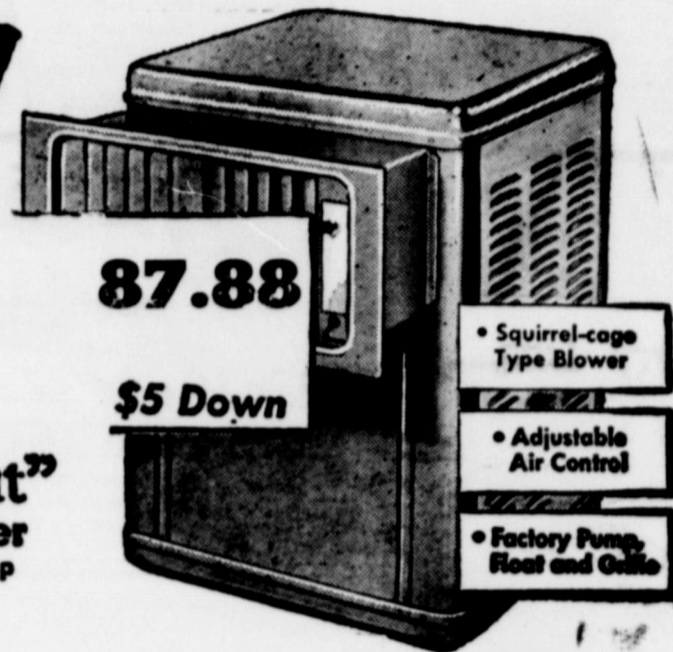

Lamb County Ranks 3rd On Plains In Income - Retail Sales

A report from Standard Rate and Data Service, Inc., a nationally recognized authority on marketing and advertising, shows Lamb County ranked an average of third on the South Plains for income and retail sales for 1960.

The report showed that the 20-county area composing the South Plains had a gross farm income of \$627,233,000 and retail sales of \$536,714,000.

The South Plains topped the state of Texas in consumer spendable income per household with an average of \$6,172 as compared to \$5,869 for the state and in retail sales with \$4,321 per household as compared to the Texas average of \$4,208 per household.

The national average per household in consumer spendable income is slightly higher than the area - \$6,417 but the national average of retail sales per household - \$4,130 - below the area figure.

Spendable income per household for Lamb County was \$6,480 or slightly higher than the national average, and the retail sales per household was \$4,902, or considerably higher than the national average.

Castro County's spendable income per household of \$11,173 is tops in the entire nation.

Standard Rate and Data gave the population of Lamb County as 22,100 with 6,400 households. Total spendable income for the county was set at \$41,473,000 with retail sales of \$31,371,000. The last two figures were exceeded only by Lubbock and Hale Counties.

The report showed a total of 8,560 passenger cars in the county and a farm population of 8,509 with a total gross farm income of \$68,710. Farm income was again topped by Lubbock and Hale Counties. Hale County led the state in farm income, Lubbock second, Lamb County was fourth in the state.

Totals for the entire South Plains area show it to be the richest area in the state.
