Plans provide for leasing of the building and equipment to the group of doctors who will operate the hospital.

The committee is confident of the support of the people in the community, and feel assured there will be no task to raising the necessary capital to finance the hospital.

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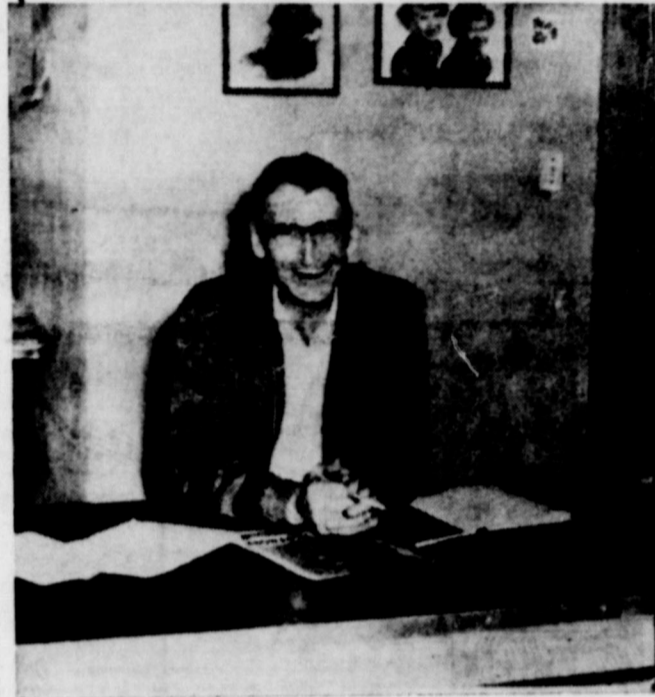

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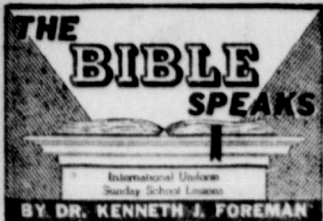

Faith and Action

Lesson for May 1, 1955

THE church is not the state and the state is not the church. When either one tries to be the other, or to run the other, there is trouble. Church and state are separate; that is a deep-rooted American principle. But that does not mean that a wall should be run up between the state and religion. That does not mean that the state can afford to be indifferent to religion. You are not I and I am not you; but that does not mean there ought to be a stone wall standing high between us. It does not mean that either of us should be indifferent to the other. The church can help the state, and vice versa.

Executive's Religion

Most American churches, including those denominations (both large and small) sponsor this column, believe that the state ought not to help the church by direct "establishment" of any church by public law. No Presbyterian, Methodist or Baptist, for instance, and still less a Quaker or a Pentecostal Christian, wants his own church given government support, by money grants or any other way. Nevertheless, Christians of every label rejoice when a President or other leader professes his faith openly. We all feel, quite rightly, that we shall be better off when our leaders in state and society are genuinely religious men and women. There is an interesting and instructive illustration of this in the Bible. In the course of the history of Judah we come on the administration of a king named Jehoshaphat. He was a good king and he left his country far better than he found it. Now we hear very little about this king's beliefs. He was no more nor less orthodox than kings before or after him.

He was not a better king because he could pass a better examination in theology. He was better because he put his beliefs into action. A creed that can't get light and air and exercise turns sour, and it sours those who hold it.

Beginning on the Ground Floor

Now many acts of a high executive may not seem to be religious or to have anything to do with religion, and yet they may affect religion strongly. For example, there was Jehoshaphat, a king whose first recorded act was one for the public defense. He fortified his border garrisons and he developed a well-organized and well-equipped army. Religion cannot be upheld on the points of bayonets, that is all true; but the fact remains that in the time of Jehoshaphat there was real danger from invasion, and a successful invasion meant that the true religion would have to go underground. Korean Christians know this today perhaps better than anybody. What South Korean Christians want is the U. N. forces to go home? So, even so seemingly non-religious a business as reorganizing an army for greater effectiveness, may have notable religious effects too.

Getting the Message to the People

Before Billy Graham visited Denmark, it was said, the preachers in that country, who were men of high education, preached so far over the heads of the people that churches had dimly small congregations. It is the people's business to rise to our level, said the preachers, not for us to sink to theirs. Then Billy Graham came along and showed what would happen if preachers really got down where the people are. Since that time, it is reported, the ministers have taken the hint and the churches are getting more people interested. You can put religion in a beautiful ivory tower, or gothic cathedral for that matter, and people may admire it but that's all. Religion has got to be put within reach of the people. King Jehoshaphat did this by putting his "teaching priests" on the road, taking the Law of God to the people, the Law which had so much to say about everyday living. In our country, on the contrary, though the one place where you can reach all the people is in the public schools and state colleges, the law generally permits any subject at all to be taught—except the Bible, which cannot even be legally read aloud!

Bible Comment:

Gospel Teaches Strength of Life in Christ

IN many places in the New Testament there are verses or passages that stand out superbly. They offer a great fact, a great experience, an exhortation to righteousness and Christian living, or an inspirational incentive of encouragement and uplifting power.

One, in particular, expresses all the reality and power of the Gospel experience, the fact of what belief in Christ and the acceptance of His message of salvation can do for man. It is found in II Corinthians: "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature; old things are passed away; behold all things are become new."

What does it mean to be "in Christ?" Scholars say it is as if it referred to the place in which one lives. Christ is the environment of the new man in precisely that sense. "If you love Me," said Jesus, "keep My commandments." To live in Christ is to seek the guidance of His spirit and to follow His example.

This passage, too, contains the clear, effective expression of the nature and meaning of salvation. Too often, salvation is made a matter of safety and redemption in some experience beyond this life, without much reference to moral and spiritual reality.

But here the implication and meaning are plain. Salvation is a matter of new life in Christ. It is a moral and spiritual experience of regeneration. God's will and God's provision in Christ and the Gospels is that here and now, for each of us, there may be a new life and a new creation.

FALCON SITE CLEARED FOR DOVE HABITAT

AUSTIN — Tee Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Texas Game and Fish Commission said formal approval has been granted to develop a site along the Falcon Lake for white-wing dove nesting.

He said authority came from the International Boundary and water commission, comprising both United States and Mexican representatives, for a thirty-year management license on a shoreline area stretching from Zapata village to Falcon Dam.

This project was first approved

by the Commission at its last meeting in Ft. Worth. Another move taken at that time designed to help restore the fleet white-wing dove involved an effort, still under way, to buy land in Hidalgo and Starr Counties for nesting habitat development.

The Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration said the tract along Falcon, in the upper valley, follows an irregular line along the north shore of the lake and ranges in width from ten feet to three-quarters of a mile.

"Subject to working out final details, we will assign technicians to study whitewings in this area

Ham and Chicken Get Along Beautifully in This Casserole

BOTH ham and chicken are plentiful and economically priced at this time. So it's the right time to try this tasty combination of the two. It is prepared with economical nonfat dry milk, which provides real milk nourishment without fat. Rich in protein, calcium, riboflavin and lactose, a one-pound package, with a protective foil lining, yields five full quarts of nonfat milk.

Ham and Chicken Casserole (Makes 6 to 8 servings)

One and one-half cups water, 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 package (1/4 pound sharp process cheese slices, cubed), 2 cups cooked rice (1/2 cup uncooked), 1 cup diced cooked ham, 1 cup diced cooked chicken, 1 1/2 cups cooked lima beans, 1 can (8-ounces) mushrooms, drained; 2 tablespoons diced pimento.

Pour water into top of double boiler. Sprinkle nonfat dry milk powder, flour, salt and pepper over surface; add Worcestershire sauce. Beat with rotary beater until smooth; add cheese.

Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened. Combine remaining ingredients in 2-quart casserole. Pour cheese sauce over mixture; stir until just blended. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.), about 30 minutes, or until mixture begins to bubble.

Ham and Baked Beans (Yield: 12 servings)

Four cups (2 pounds) dried beans, cold water, 2 medium onions, sliced; 4 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup catsup, 1/2 cup unsulphured molasses, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon Tabasco, 2 teaspoons dry mustard, one 4-pound ham shank.

Wash beans. Cover generously with cold water; soak overnight. Add onions and salt. If necessary, add additional water to cover beans; bring to boiling point in covered saucepan. Simmer 1 hour. Drain and save 3 cups bean liquid, adding water to make 3 cups if necessary. Mix bean liquid with catsup, unsulphured molasses, vinegar, Tabasco and dry mustard.

Place ham in pan or large earthenware casserole which can be

covered. Put beans around ham; add liquid mixture. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees F.) 1 hour and 20 minutes. Uncover; remove ham.

Remove rind from ham, cut into medium size pieces; reserve. Bake beans uncovered 1 hour and 40 minutes longer.

Add ham pieces during last 30 minutes of baking.

Planting schedule of Albert C. Burrage's week-end garden.

Albert C. Burrage, engineer by profession and amateur gardener by avocation has written a book of which its publishers, D. Van Nostrand Company say: "There has never before been a connoisseur's book on vegetables."

Mr. Burrage's estate, Candewood, Ipswich, Mass., has long contributed blue ribbon exhibits to the Massachusetts Horticultural Society's flower shows.

His theme is: "There is nothing like home grown vegetables. Until you have eaten these wonderful delicacies you cannot believe that they actually exist."

The only way to get such vegetables at their best, he asserts, is to grow them in your own garden near your kitchen so they can be cooked garden fresh and served at the peak of their flavor.

While holding that the cost of such superlative food is secondary, Mr. Burrage keeps careful records of his garden's cost and yield. He gives figures which demonstrate that a hobby gardener who enjoys the work can earn high wages, paid by the reduction of his food bill, while he supplies his family with "vegetables of superb taste which just cannot be bought in the market."

Last summer the Burrage week-end "minimum effort" garden 25x51 feet produced the following totals of fresh young vegetables: 533 pounds of beans, broccoli, cabbage, peas, spinach, tomatoes, squash and root crops; 180 ears of sweet corn, and 60 heads of lettuce. All this was produced by 26 1/2 hours work, which included preparation and final clean-up, but not the harvesting.

So far as practical, he says, the garden site should have no shade at all, good drainage, soil free from roots of trees and shrubs. It should be as small as practical for the production desired and as near as possible to the house. Since vegetables should always be harvested when young and tender, it is better to sow them in short rows.

The vegetable gardener, Mr. Burrage demonstrates, has many problems to solve in the selection of top quality varieties and the arrangement of planting schedules so that when one sowing of a variety passes the peak of quality, another young and tender crop is ready to supply the table. But to the hobby gardener these problems will increase the interest of his specialty, and provide satisfaction in solving them.

To grow fine vegetables is just as much fun as to grow fine flowers and the pride of achievement as great when ribbons are won at the community flower show. To quote from Richardson Wright's foreword to the Burrage book: "The gastronomic gardener is the finest flower of family life. . . Only amid a circle of off-spring and friends can he truly display his taste and the fruits of his horticultural skill."

"Today," he will say, "we make it a day of restlessness rather than a day of rest. Christ is even now saying to all of us, 'Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy.' He may be saying to you, 'You are anxious and worried about many things. But one thing is all - important. Remember to worship regularly and sincerely.'"

MINNOW TRADE FACES RISKS

bait minnows: Each hatchery pond must be provided with a separate water intake and outlet. Some minnows spawn in still water as provided by a pond; other minnows spawn in running water as provided by a stream, river or creek.

Some species of minnows can be seined from a pond successfully, but during warm weather golden shiners that are seined will be killed or will shortly die. Golden shiners, therefore, should be dipped or trapped.

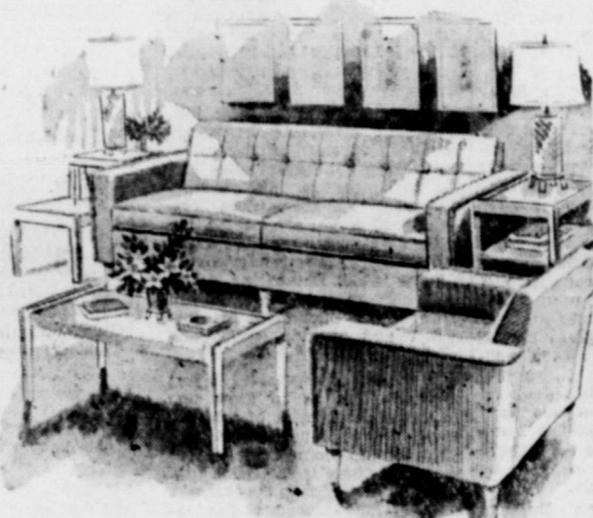

The modern ranch and farm has become a place where top production through efficient operation and management is the goal. In increasing numbers, farm and ranch managers are applying electricity to get desired results. Electricity can do for farm production what it has done for industry — produce more for less.

Mr. L. R. "Buck" Miller, of Pampa, Texas, is manager of the Schafer Ranch, and is proud of the savings that his ranch foreman, Ray Roles, is able to realize with his electric farm shop. Mr. Miller is equally proud of the choice Aberdeen Angus cattle that are raised on the ranch.

"My shop is a money maker the year round", Mr. Roles explains. "During the summer season we repair machinery on the spot, saving time and money. During the winter months we repair all our machinery and have it ready for the busy season, thereby eliminating costly last minute repairs."

An electric welder, a 3/4 hp electric drill, and an electrically operated air compressor comprise the major electric tools in the Schafer Ranch shop. Evidence of this well equipped shop and Mr. Roles' skill is present at every turn on this modern ranch.

Mr. Roles has used his skill in putting the equipment and buildings at the Schafer Ranch in number one condition. If he needs a piece of equipment, and can't buy it, he builds it. Through the ingenious use of his electric welder and other shop tools, the foreman has built several machines to make the ranch operations more efficient.

A well equipped electric farm shop offers the farm operator the opportunity to cut his repair bills considerably and realize an even greater profit in time saved by making repairs on the spot. Additional profits are realized when all of the farm machinery is put in A-1 condition during the winter months when other work is not pressing. Caution Children To Always Be Alert Near Traffic

"Watchful eyes get no surprize in traffic."

Mr. E. C. McFadden of Dallas, vice president, Employers' Casualty Company, and president, Texas Safety Association, Inc. used this slogan today to caution children to be always on the alert near traffic. Mr. McFadden was speaking in connection with the child pedestrian and bicycle safety program being sponsored this month in Texas by the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety Council and the National Safety Council.

"I know it is hard for active youngsters always to remember to be careful, and never run into the

street," Mr. McFadden said. "But if children are to avoid serious accidents in today's traffic, they must do their best to follow the rules of safety."

Mr. McFadden pointed out that traffic accidents involving child pedestrians occur most often to children who are crossing streets between intersections, coming in to the street from between parked cars and playing in the roadway.

The safety rules for children stressed by Mr. McFadden were:

1. Obey all traffic officers, school patrols, traffic signs and signals and pavement markings.
2. Use roller skates, tricycles, wagons and scooters on the sidewalk only.
3. Practice the rules learned in school about crossing streets and playing only in safe places.
4. Always take the safest route

between school and home.

5. Walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic, if there are no sidewalks.
