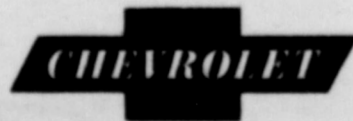

Gibson and Derrick said they then drove Tuttle to the Dimmitt hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Tuttle is survived by his wife and a daughter. Arrangements are pending with Dennis Funeral Home.

In addition to the Toronado, the public will see two other Oldsmobile models for the first time: the Cutlass Supreme, a new F-85 four-door hardtop sedan and a convertible in the Delta 88 series.

Disclosing details of the new Oldsmobiles Brock quoted Harold N. Metzger, Oldsmobile general manager and vice president of General Motors. Mechanically, all 1966 Oldsmobiles, including the F-85's, Vista-Cruisers, Jetstar, Dynamic and Delta 88's and the 98's, have undergone significant mechanical changes to improve ride and handling, performance, comfort and safety.

In discussing the new Toronado, Metzger described it as "an American original." He said it is a car designed for those who want the unconventional, the newest, in whatever product they buy. "The Toronado will set new standards for the industry in styling, handling and roadability, and its appearance dramatically strengthens Oldsmobile's world-wide reputation for automotive engineering leadership," Metzger said.

"The Toronado displays styling like that of no other car on the road today. Its flat floor provides for extra interior room and full six-passenger comfort, and with front wheel drive its driving traction and handling characteristics are outstanding."

All driving components of the Toronado are combined into an integrated unit under the hood. The specially-modified 385 h. p. 425 cubic-inch Toronado V-8 engine is mounted slightly to the right of center. The transmission's torque converter is attached conventionally to the rear of the engine. But the remaining section of the Turbo Hydra-Matic is mounted along the left side of the engine, facing forward. A silent-operating link chain transfers power from the converter to the transmission gear box. A planetary differential feeds torque through two drive axle shafts to the front wheels.

The Starfire coupe has undergone even more extensive exterior changes, giving it extra flair and distinction. New "Strato" bucket seats are standard with

the full width "Strato" bench seat optional. Restyled instrument panels, interior trims, fabrics and appointments add to the beauty and comfort of all full-size Oldsmobiles.

Basic styling of the new F-85's provides these cars with a smoother, longer, and younger look. For the first time, Oldsmobile is offering a four-door hardtop in the F-85 lineup. "The Cutlass Supreme, with its optional vinyl roof and extra-luxurious interior, may well become one of the top young-family prestige cars," Metzger said.

Oldsmobile continues to offer its 300-cubic-inch Jetfire Rocket on F-85 and Jetstar 88 models. All Oldsmobile V-8 engines are equipped with a new heat valve for longer life and improved durability, a new sealed, higher capacity fuel pump, and a new rocker arm mechanism for improved durability.

Four-barrel Oldsmobile engines, including the 425-cubic-inch Super Rocket which powers the Dynamic and Delta 88's, and the 98's, utilize the new Quadrajet 4-barrel carburetor developed for Oldsmobile by Rochester Products Division of General Motors. This new carburetor results in increased engine output, better performance, improved economy of operation, and better idle characteristics.

## '66 Buick Showing October 14 at Brock Motor Co.

The new '66 Buick will be shown Thursday, October 14, at Brock Motor Company in Muleshoe. Mr. Brock and his personnel invites everyone in the area to stop in and see the completely new Riviera sport coupe, featuring the highest innovation in body ventilation in 32 years--the elimination of window vents, was introduced today by Buick Motor Division.

The new "second generation" Riviera has a 119-inch wheelbase, two inches longer than last year, and a four-inch wider tread for improved ride and handling, and features a longer hood and fenders, a more sloping windshield and a modified fastback roof and rear deck.

For the first time the Riviera will be available in a six-passenger model with a bench seat in front.

Both the Riviera and the Riviera Gran Sport are powered by Buick's 425 cubic inch V-8 engine.

A new ventilation system--Circularaire--makes window vents unnecessary. Fresh air is taken into the car through a grille in the rear window ledge, passing under the window to an exterior grille in the rear deck. Elimination of the window vents reduces wind noise in the front compartment.

Inside the car, the air is circulated at two levels, through vents on each side of the passenger compartment at the lower level

and through three vents in the instrument panel at the upper level.

Engineering tests show that this system of ventilation will keep the interior of the car comfortable in 70-degree plus temperatures without opening the windows.

In keeping with the disappearing headlamp feature inaugurated in 1965, the 1966 Riviera headlamps are concealed in the radiator grill, beneath the hood. When the headlight switch is turned on, the lamps drop into position. Parking lamps and turn signals form a curvature between the front fenders and the extreme ends of the grille.

Standard interior trim includes bench-type seats, front and rear, or bucket seats and console in front. Rivieras ordered with bench-type front seat will have no console. A new front "strato bench" seat with notch down center arm rest has been designed specifically as a Riviera option.

All gauges and instruments have been re-grouped to a position directly in front of the driver. The speedometer, a new concept in speed indication, is a drum-type cylinder which revolves vertically. As speed is changed, the easy-to-read numbers roll down into view. Oil, temperature, and generator gauges are equipped with pointers instead of warning

## Consumers Are Featured In 1965 Yearbook Of Agriculture

The American consumer is spotlighted in the 1965 Yearbook of Agriculture, Consumers All, just off the press. Consumer subjects covered in the 496-page volume include

buying and using food, clothing, household furnishings, and equipment, managing money, caring for yards, lawns, gardens and houses, staying healthy, improving communities and using leisure time.

Food is given major attention, including diets for weight-watchers, savings in buying food, and suggestions for preparing meat, vegetables, dairy products, bread, beverages, and other areas.

The first section of the volume deals with choosing, buying, renting, heating, cooling, lighting, painting and protecting houses. Another section describes how to plan and equip kitchens, dining rooms, bathrooms, living rooms, bedrooms, children's rooms, laundry and workrooms. Details on how to select and care for floors, walls, furniture, fireplaces, curtains, and carpets are given in later chapters.

A new cruciform frame to accommodate the two-inch longer wheelbase and four-inch wider tread has been designed. The wider tread improves cornering stability and permits a shorter turn. The longer wheelbase affords greater directional stability, more interior seat room, and gives better weight distribution by increasing weight on rear wheels. 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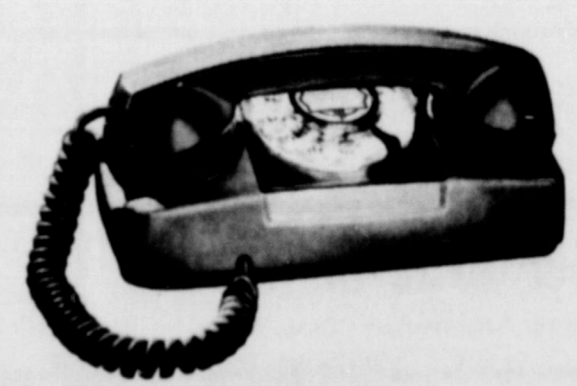

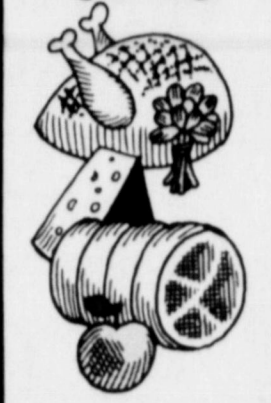
