



Early Tuesday night, it seemed that voters had turned down the liquor-by-the-drink referendum But in the wee hours of the morning, Wednesday, the picture changed. The strong vote from such cities as Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Ft, Worth pushed the plan ahead and it appeared as though the referendum had passed.

Also a late hour, the vote count showed voters firmly defeated an amendment to tax farm land on the basis of profit. and results showed two other proposed constitutional amendments in trouble -- that of easier road bonds passage and consolidation of local offices,

Did you know the term "dollar" is not American? In a sense it isn't even British,

Jochim's Dale, a mining dis-trict in Bohemia, is where the term originated. There the silver from the mines was minted into a coin called a "Joachimsthaler". The first minting was in 1516

Within two years the coin gained widespread popularity. It appeared all over Europe and even in Britian. For semantic convenience the name was short-

ened to "thaler".
The British, however, found this term difficult to pronounce, So as they've done with other Continental terms, they revised the revision. The "thaler" became the "dollar" and eventu-
