


Baptist Youths Attend Rally



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Forage production has been limited on many pastures this fall, and livestock producers should pay close attention to the quality of hay used, advis-es Neal Pratt, Extension agronomist, Texas A&M University. Hay can furnish all or most of

the nutritive requirements of beef cattle if quality is at acceptable level, and amounts are in adequate supply, says Pratt. Beef cows without calves can obtain their daily requirements from hay of 9 to 10 percent crude protein, if sufficient amounts are available. For cows with calves, a crude protein content of 12 to 14 percent is needed, notes the speci-

Hay supplies in many areas of the state have been somewhat limited this fall, due to inadequate rainfall, says the agrono-mist. Although quality has been favorable the reduced supply should be fed to maximize its use, he adds.

In planning next year's hay production, Pratt suggests that livestock producers start early with a soil test and the ap stone for high-quality and high hay should be harvested before it matures. When hay crops mature, the quality declines


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
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



