Italian ryegrass does well in East Texas, the Gulf Coast region, and in the Blackland and Grand Prairie areas. Vetch, crimson clover, Hubam and Madrid sweetclover are among the legumes which can be grown successfully in combination with the grasses. Trew suggests contacting the local county agent for information on the best combination for a particular area.

The legumes seed should be inoculated before planting. The cost is small compared with the returns and benefits from good inoculation.

**Good Prospects**  
**For Fall And**  
**Winter Pastures**

Generally, moisture conditions are on the upgrade in most sections of the state and prospects for fall and winter pasture crops are good. This, says E. M. Trew Extension Pasture Specialist, should be all of the encouragement farmers and livestock producers need to get in a record acreage of winter crops.

Winter pastures, he says will help relieve the price cost squeeze which continues to get tighter. Too, they provide minerals, vitamins and needed protein! make possible a rest period for permanent pastures! supply the green grazing needed when summer pastures are dormant and probably most important, cut the cost of wintering livestock.

Too, from the standpoint of soil protection and improvement, winter pastures are a paying proposition. The cover protects the soil from wind and water erosion and the roots and residue add organic matter to the soil.

When planting time rolls around, Trew says, plant earlier. Earlier planting means earlier grazing even in the case of dry planting. The specialist recommends that soil samples be submitted to the soils testing lab from the fields to be planted and that the fer-

## ITS THE LAW in TEXAS...

### HAEBAS CORPUS — CORPUS DELICTI

Legal phrases which are probably more misunderstood and used by laymen than any other "haebas corpus" and "corpus delicti."

The words haebas corpus are for "you have the body." They are commonly used in the profession to describe a writ signed by judge directing the sheriff or jailer holding prisoner or to any person who physically detaining another, commanding him to produce body (alive) of the prisoner person detained) before the court. The purpose of such an writ is to allow the judge to determine whether the prisoner is being held lawfully or whether he should be set free.

vents law enforcement officers right of personal liberty and has been a jealously guarded privilege.

The words "corpus delicti" are latin, and liberally translated, mean the elements of the crime or wrong doing. Laymen incorrectly interpret corpus delicti as meaning literally "the body," as in a murder case.

Speaking technically in a legal sense, corpus delicti is that which must be proved in every criminal case. Such proof must show that an unlawful act has been committed by a human agency. The mere finding of a dead body or a burning building does not mean that there is murder on the one hand or arson on the other. To prove murder, it must be shown that the death was unlawfully caused by a human agency. Contrary to popular belief, murder can be proved even though the body cannot be found. In the case of the burning building, it must be shown that the building was un-

To sum up then, haebas corpus is a writ designed to prevent the unlawful detention or imprisonment of any person. Corpus delicti, on the other hand, literally means the body of the crime, or, in general, the substance of crime.

#### VACCINE SHIPMENT EXPECTED

Arrival of 50,828 shots of Salk polio vaccine was expected by the State Health Department this week.

This part of Texas allotment of 1,177,969 shots in addition to the vaccine given free to first and second grade school children.

Under the "volunteer control" plan adopted by the State Polio Vaccine Committee, 83 per cent will be allocated for commercial use, 17 per cent for public agencies.

This week's shipment was to come from the Wyeth Laboratories in Marietta, Pa.

Meanwhile, Health Department figures showed polio on the increase. Forty-five new cases were reported during the past week, bringing the 1955 total to 939.

Of the victims 45 had received Salk vaccine.

**CROP PROSPECTS IMPROVE**  
Against predictions for 1955 Texas farm production, though improved since early summer, fell below 1954 figures.

US Department of Agriculture forecast showed a probable cotton crop of 29 million bales—one per cent lower than 1954.

But the prospective 278-pound yield per acre is the highest since 1866. Improved soil moisture,

irrigation and new yield-increasing practices by growers are credited for the high figure.

Texas cotton acreage is nearly one million acres less than for 1954.

Widespread summer rains have upped the estimated wheat crop by more than two million bushels. In June the USDA forecast a total of 11,882,000 bushels; by August the figure was raised to 14,212,000.

Even with the improved outlook the 1955 crop will be less than half that in 1954.

High yields of hay also were foreseen as a result of showers. Sorghum, corn and peanuts were aided.

On the unfavorable side rains delayed insect control programs and created a critical problem in cotton fields.

#### BOOK LISTS MAILED

A list of 218 proposed public school textbooks has been mailed out to county and district superintendents.

Dr. J. W. Edgar, state commissioner of education, urged they be made available for public inspection.

Petitions and suggestions will be heard by the 15-member state textbook committee between September 15 and October 1. Its recommendations will be drawn up October 2-8.

Actual adoption will be by the commissioner and State Board of

Education. Texts chosen will be for use in September, 1956.

#### SCHOOLS SATISFY PARENTS

Seven out of eight parents either are satisfied with Texas public schools or are too uninformed to have an opinion.

That conclusion was drawn from study of 16,788 "parent reactionnaires" circulated in 59 school districts by the Texas Association of School Administrators.

Survey results were announced last week in Austin by Dr. Kenneth E. McIyre who coordinated tabulation.

Criticism, he said, was aimed more at high schools than lower grades. Also some parents felt the schools fell short in developing "good behavior."

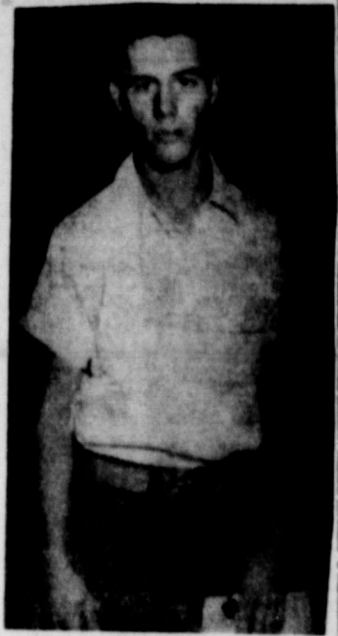

AUSTIN, Texas — Despite "go slow" warnings from top state officials, 28 of more Texas schools have announced plans for complete or partial racial integration.

Gov. Allan Shivers, in setting up a statewide advisory committee, cautioned against "hasty, ill-considered action." Earlier Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard had warned schools against "rushing headlong" into desegregation ahead of legislative action.

Though the Texas Education Agency makes no recommendations to schools it is keeping tab on locally decided policies. Its file of newspaper clippings from over the state shows that about 36 schools have definite plans, either pro or con.

In numerous other districts studies are being made by bi-racial committees. Questionnaires are measuring sentiment in some areas.

Texas citizens Councils, similar to an anti-integration organization

in Mississippi have sprung up in some East Texas areas. Dallas and Kilgore have councils pledged to "fight desegregation by every legal means."

Austin last week was the largest city with a high percentage of Negro students to plan integration this fall. It will begin in the top three grades which are 15 per cent Negro. A liberal transfer policy is expected to ease adjustment.

San Antonio, with 7.7 per cent Negro students, is the largest school system to plan immediate integration. All grades will be included here.

Other towns adopting immediate, across-the-board integration include Corpus Christi, Lubbock, San Angelo, El Paso, Crystal City, Carrizo Springs, La Feria, Mission and Brownsville.

More popular is a partial desegregation policy such as Austin's. It usually begins on the high school level with a staggered schedule for lower grades.

Cities favoring this include San Marcos, Robstown, Bishop, Port Lavaca, Brownwood, Kerrville, Weslaco, Harlingen, Sinton, Amarillo, Kingsville, Friona, Rockfort, Arkansas Pass, Karnes City, Kennedy and Runge.

When it hears of a school planning to desegregate, the Education Agency writes local officials for a blueprint of the plan. These are made available to undecided
