It is actual film, some captured from the Germans during and after World War II and some processed by the Army Department of the United States. It is *Trial At Nuremberg* and it pulls no punches.

It is a study in personality. It is also a study in man's inhumanity to man and anyone that could see the film and come away without deep emotional feelings is simply lacking in soul.

It could also, though doubtful, awaken these anti-this and anti-that type people in our country and make them realize it is a good, free, and God-fearing nation. It might just possibly arouse them from their policies of detrimental actions and get them on OUR side for a change. It could even awaken the lethargic from their stupors and cause them to realize there is reason behind our actions in fighting the enemies of liberty and freedom. It could also make us all more tolerant of our neighbors.

To describe the film is beyond my scope. One would necessarily have to see it to understand what I am trying to say and even after seeing it, there would be an air of disbelief and doubt and awe. One could not help but think it really

didn't happen after all. But it did happen. It unfolds before your very eyes and it is very hard indeed not to believe what you see. And in believing what is shown, I am very hopeful it will get (at least most of them) students to thinking about how very great this nation is. It should make them think before complaining and griping about rules, policies, and any petty issues with which they are confronted daily. It should make us all take a new approach and have a new outlook toward the problems this country now faces.

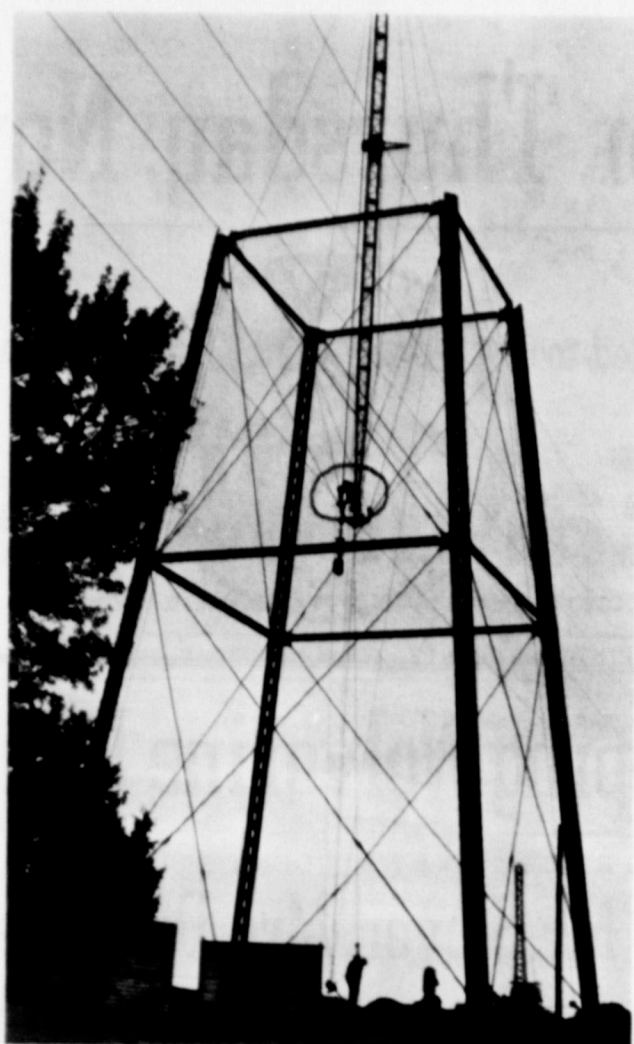

Wildlife Department to issue and sell general obligation bonds and the amount of \$75 Million to finance acquisition and development of lands for state parks and recreational areas.

6. Permitting non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective positions under the state or United States government where there is no conflict of interest and where the state will benefit.

The two bond proposals probably will carry the most interest. The veterans land program extension will be making its third trek since 1963 to the voters. It was defeated the two previous times.

The park revenue bond proposal was recommended by Connally to double the present park system and create a web of scenic, recreational and historic sites throughout the state. The \$75 Million in bonds would be repaid through the charge of an entrance fee at state parks.

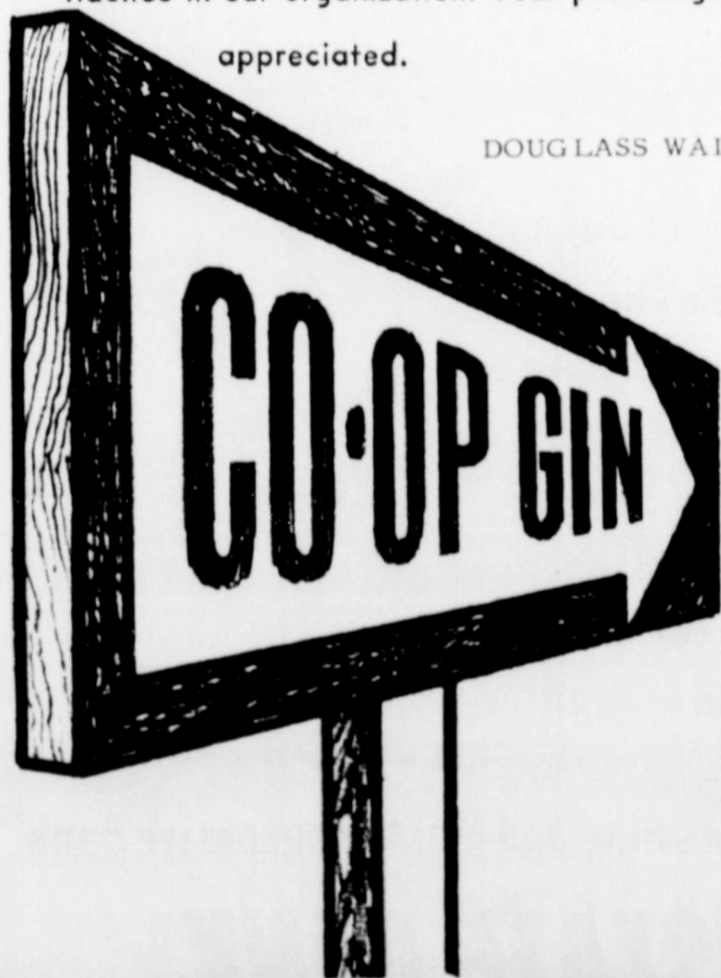

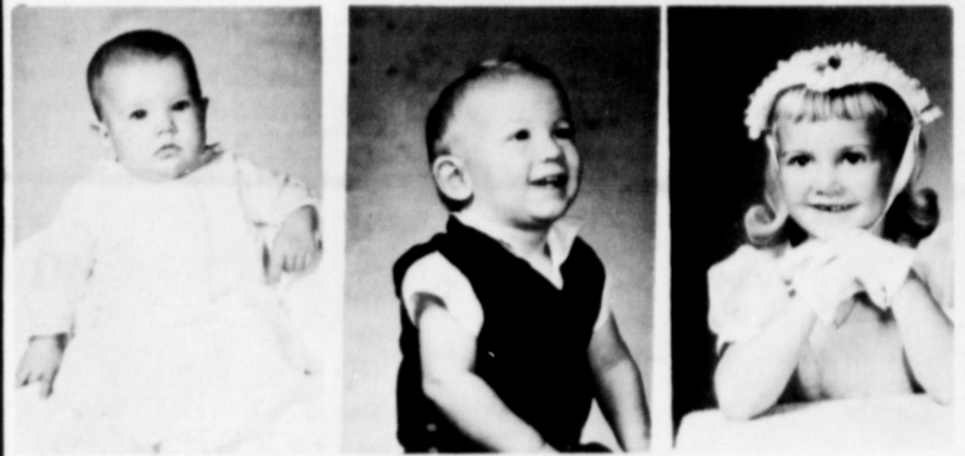

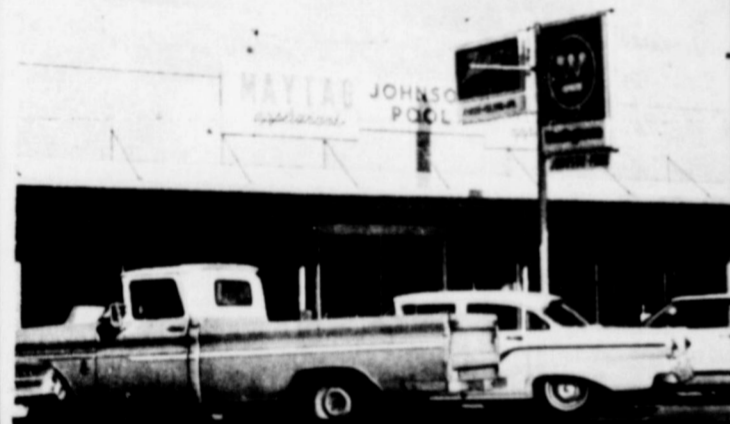
