Cotton is averaging a grade lower than before the rain with a consequent loss of about \$1.25 per bale. But ginners say the crop is still believed to be the highest in quality and in yield per acre ever grown here. Grain is running a little high on moisture content still, but coming down every day. A shortage of at least 1000 worers is slowing the cotton harvest in the Earth and Springlake area and a few farmers have begun to defoli




