After the Cardinals scored, the mighty Wolverines really came to life and made two quick touchdowns and two extra points with the score at the end of the half 14-6 in favor of the Springlake Wolverines.

Both of the Sanel twins did an extra good job during the last half. Ronald Sanel ran a 65 yard plunge in the third quarter. Later in the game Ronald Sanel scored again on a 13 yard run.

Jerry Tunnell added a score for the Wolverines when he crossed the line from a 4 yard plunge.

The Cardinals failed to make any score against the powerful Wolverines after the first quarter.

The score at the end of the game was 38-6. This victory gives Springlake the best record on the South Plains with 7 wins and no defeats. The Wolverines' defense has also had fewer points scored upon them than any team on the plains.



Rudder stressed that all requests received before October 31, 1955 will not be honored, and will be returned.

Rudder continued that the requests received the five day period of the first week, beginning October 31, will be placed in a locked box, and then be drawn and numbered. A limited number will be mailed application forms immediately. The remainder will be notified of their relative position, for application forms will be numbered consecutively as received.

Rudder cautioned veterans on the following matters: (1) Old application forms will not be honored since entirely new forms have been written under the amended veterans' land act. These application forms can be obtained by written request to the Veterans' Land Board ONLY.
