Santos Garcia, 32 year old Latin American was the driver of the other car and was also hospitalized.

The Odens and Garcia was taken to the Faust Clinic in Earth for emergency treatment and were hospitalized in the Amherst Hospital. Mr. Oden is much improved, and may be dismissed after a few days. Mrs. Oden driver of the car at the time of the accident is reported to be in fair condition, but will require hospitalization for several weeks yet.

Monday's bad weather was said to be the cause of the two car collision, Garcia who was going east toward Springlake, was pulling a trailer at the time, said his trailer kept sliding on the cold wet pavement and pulled his car out in front of the oncoming Oden car. The Odens had arrived in Springlake and visited with their son, Houston, who is employed at the Busby Motor Company and were on their way to Earth to visit with Oden's family when the accident occurred.

Both cars were estimated to be total losses according to deputy sheriff Joe Eberling.

Mr. Lowe was unable to determine the origin of the fire, but said it could have been from the hot water heater in the bathroom.

Burton Breaks Arm In Gin Accident

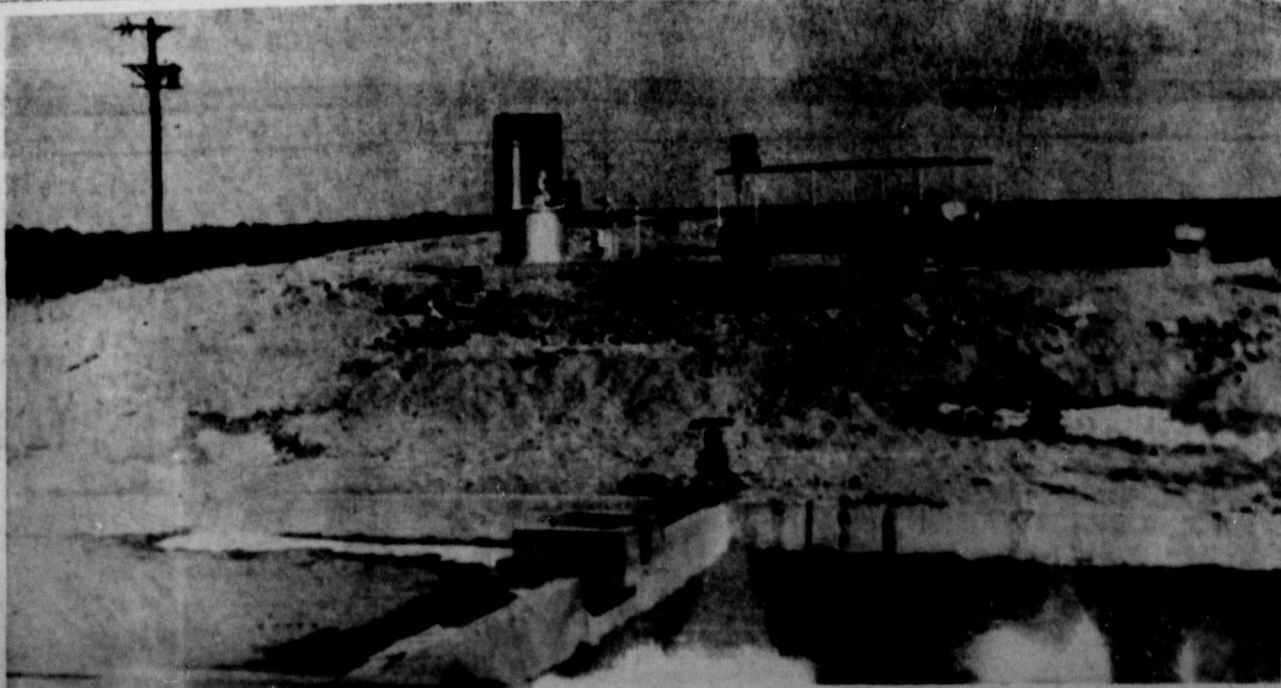
A. D. Burton of the Pleasant Valley community received a broken arm recently.

The accident occurred as he was unloading cotton at the Pleasant Valley Gin where he is employed.

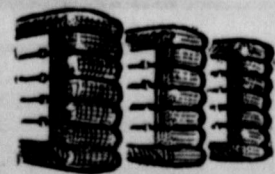
A. L. CODY INJURED IN FOOTBALL GAME

Attending the National Safety Congress each October, in Chicago, is one of the highlights of my "traveling year." During the Congress I have the honor to present the Carol Lane Awards for Traffic Safety to the six top winners in behalf of the National Safety Council and the Shell Oil Company. I present the awards to three individual women and three women's or parents' groups who have made significant contributions to traffic safety. It's a thrill to help recognize work done by winners like these:

The top individual award went to Mrs. P. W. Hodges of Tucson, Arizona, for helping groups throughout the state focus attention on traffic safety. As a result of her efforts, safety "work-shops" were established, local safety programs quadrupled, and the Arizona Safety Belles were originated.

First award in the group classification was won by the Women's Division of the Greater Minneapolis Safety Council. Their "No-Accidents" traffic award program, recognizing careful teen-age motorists was an outstanding program for high-school students.

Mrs. Glen Rabb, principal of the W. J. Wheeler Elementary School, Commerce, Texas, received the second place award for individuals, because of the extensive traffic safety program she conducted in the school and the community. The Parent-Teacher Council of Provo, Utah, placed second among the groups for its executed "Safety on Streets" bicycle safety program.

For organizing the women's groups in Maryland into an effective force for traffic safety, Mrs. John S. Gardiner, Baltimore, received the third place individual award. The Black Mountain woman's Club, Black Mountain, North Carolina, won third group award for its continuous community-wide traffic safety program.

AUSTIN, Tex. — One thousand education-minded Texans meeting in Austin, selected "No federal aid, no federal control" as the theme they will take to the White House Conference on Education Nov. 28 - Dec. 1.

state and local education conferences. Gov. Allan Shivers told the delegates to the conference that Texas as did not seek federal aid to education. Further aid to the school system, he said, should come from the state, but without strings to control from the state level upon the local districts.

Rather than federal aid, one leader suggested "relief from the stupendous federal tax burden" to allow states more latitude for school financing. A re-examining of the state's total tax structure in search of additional school revenue was proposed.

Other problems on which the Texas Conference on Education exchanged ideas were: 12-month-a-year or six-days-a-week use of buildings; attracting and holding good teachers; keeping curricula up-to-date.

A consensus of their findings will be compiled into a report to

be taken to the White House conference.

COURT RE-CONSIDERS
Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is for the second time, pondering the legality of the Duval County grand jury which returned 104 indictments against county officials.

This time it also is considering charges by Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd that it "misrepresented facts" on its October 5 decision nullifying the grand jury's action.

In a vigorous argument for reversal, Shepperd contended the majority opinion reflected on the "propriety and motives" of himself and Judge A. S. Broadfoot. He referred specifically to statements concerning alleged collusion between himself and Broadfoot.

Judge Broadfoot dismissed one grand jury in Duval County and made arrangements for a new one, which the high court held illegal. Shepperd's office assisted the South Texas investigation.

MASTER PLAN OUTLINED
Visitors to Austin will have new sights to see in the Capitol area before long.

Guiding factors for the creation of a new "state government center," with the Capitol building at the core, have been outlined by a professional planning firm.

A new state courts building and a state office building are to be constructed in the area soon. In locating them the planning specialists suggested:

- 1. That none should tower over the capitol dome.
- 2. That off-street parking be provided.
- 3. That easy pedestrian access be provided for all buildings.
- 4. That further commercial development in the capitol area be controlled.

LAND SALES REOPENED
Requests from over 3,000 veterans were included in a drawing which officially reopened the Texas land program last week.

The first 300 drawn were to receive application forms immediately. The remainder will receive notices of where they stand in line and will receive their application forms at a later date.

Land Commissioner J. Earl Rudder looked on as Charles L. Downey, department commander of the American Legion, drew the name of Olin Talley of Buffalo Gap as the first on the application list.

Rudder said careful measures are being taken to prevent favoritism. This was one of the factors revealed in the investigations which caused the program to be shut down last November.

SKELTON ELECTED

In electing him chairman of the Texas Democratic Advisory Committee, Byron Skelton of Temple told the DAC they had, in effect, made him chairman of the Democratic Party in Texas.

A resolution at the DAC meeting in Waco, to leave the national committeeman post vacant until the May convention was rejected. In its place, the committee adopted a resolution setting forth "prime qualifications" for a national committeeman and committee woman.

No direct reference was made

to the choice of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, recently named committeeman. Ramsey's appointment had the approval of Speaker Sam Rayburn, who organized the DAC to fill the place of national committeeman after Wright Morrow was ousted from the post.

JOHNSON DINNER PLANNED

If plans materialize, a testimonial dinner for U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson will be given in Austin in December.

Meantime, there have been suggestions to name Johnson Texas' "favorite son" candidate for pres-

ident. Johnson said he had no intention of being proposed as a candidate. He said he had every hope of forming a legislative program in Congress which can be carried to the people. "If we do our job in Congress right, the election will take care of itself."

TEXAS SCHOOLS PRAISED

A letter to Governor Shivers from Maj. Gen. John G. Van Houten at Fort Carson, Colorado praised Texas' public school system.

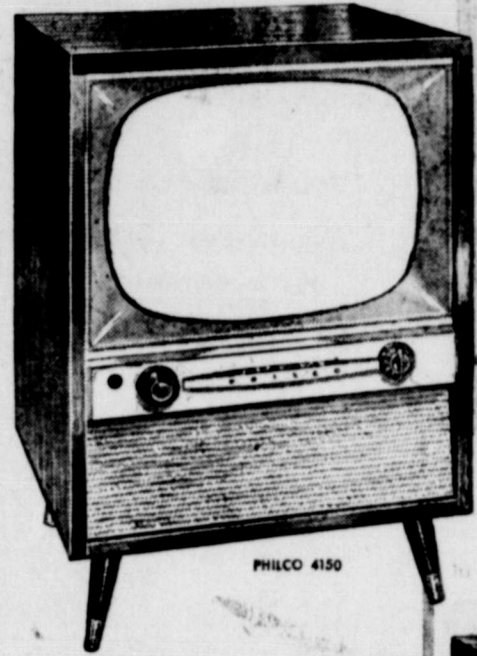
