Pre-School Day April 12th

C. P. Martin, Grade School Principal, announced Tuesday that Pre-School day has been set for Tuesday, April 12, for all children who will be six before September of the next school term.

The pre-school day will be held in the afternoon so first grade classes will be conducted as usual that morning. Parents of first grade student may pick the children up at noon if they wish to do so, but if not, they will be taken care of.

Mr. Martin emphasized that they would like for the pre-schoolers to be at the school at 11:30 a. m. in order to eat lunch at the cafeteria. He also urged that the mothers do not stay at the school with their children as they would like for that day to be as much like a regular day as possible.

Parents are urged to register their children at the school anytime before April 12, if possible and a duplicate birth certificate will be needed. Mr. Martin said that a photostatic or certified copy would be fine and can be obtained at the County Clerk's office for a small fee. The school does not want the original birth certificate.

After a short business session, Judy Bartlett and Judith Chester taught the girls a new folk dance, "Captain Jinks".

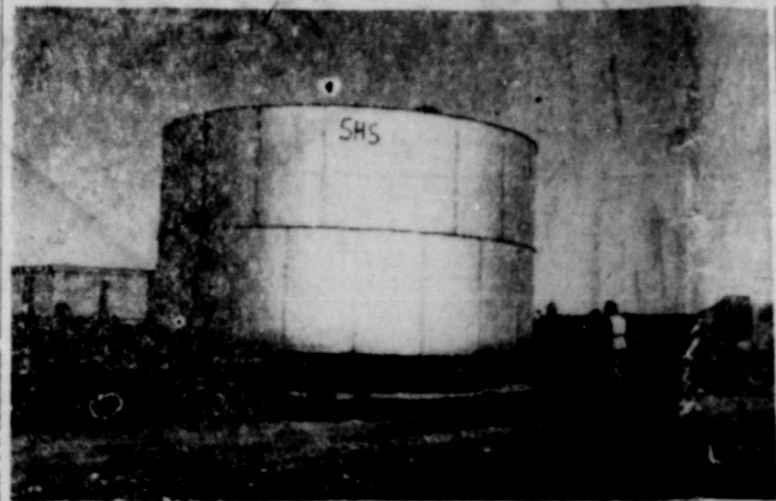

Other irrigated division winners, pounds of cotton produced, and awards received are: Royce Turner, Lamb County, 5,666 pounds, \$100; Jack Carney, Bailey County, 5,028 pounds, \$85; Billy Countess, Lubbock County, 4,933 pounds, \$75; Larry West, Briscoe County, 4,830 pounds, \$65; and David Alton Cates, Cochran County, 4,882 pounds, \$50.

Awards were the same for dryland winners as for irrigated winners.

Other winners in the dryland contest are: Marion Duncan, Terry County, 1,987 pounds; Lonnie Gene Peel, Garza County, 1,912; John R. Taylor, Crosby County, 1,886 pounds; W. B. Snodgrass, Cochran County, 1,897 pounds; and Freddy Bernes, Lubbock County, 1,394.

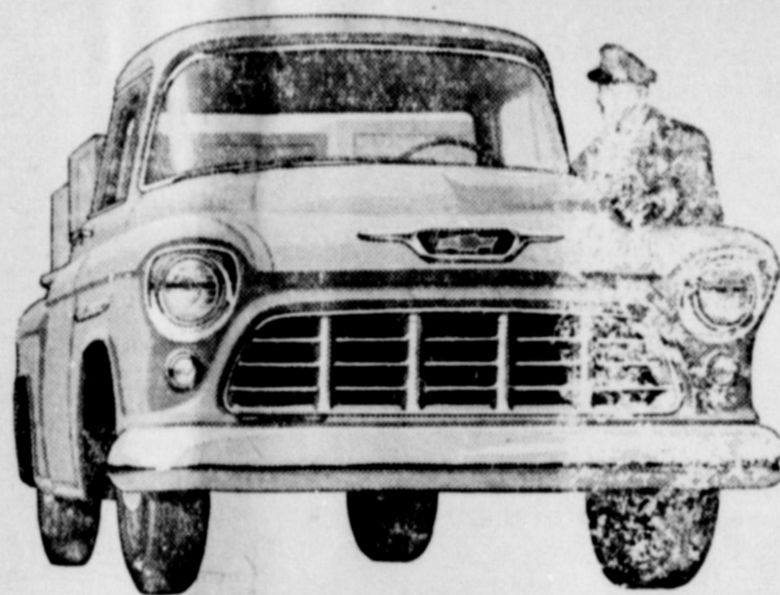

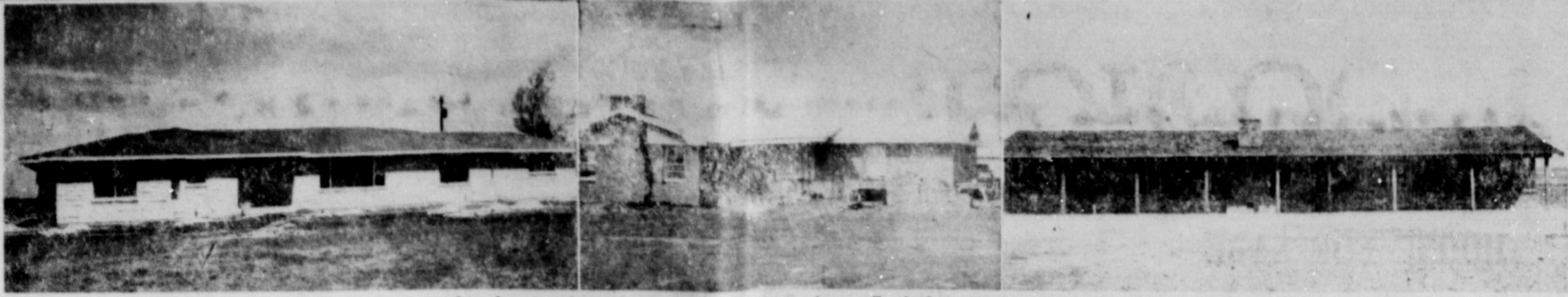

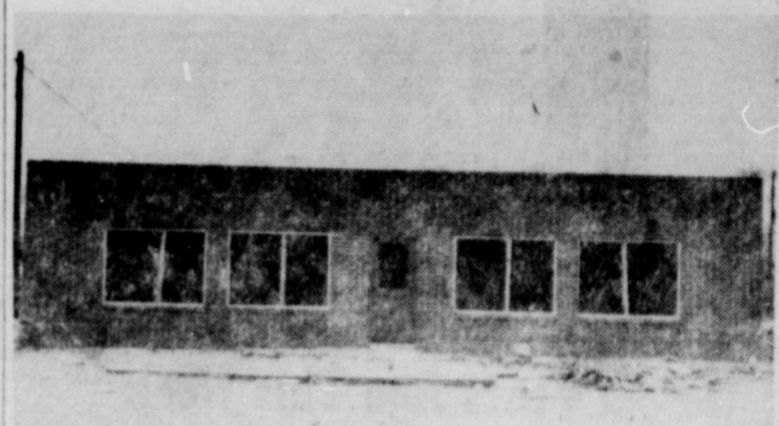
