





When Columbus landed in America, he never realized that he had discovered a continent so vast and so full of riches. Riches in terms of raw materials, minerals, and millions of acres of fertile soil. The future of agriculture will be in the hands of the youth of our nation, and it will be up to us to strive for improvement in every phase of agriculture The challenge is ours to make of it what we can through labor and God's help. Our forefathers set the example for us to follow, and through their hard work and sacrifices life has been made much easier. They fought and died for the country they loved and for the one thing that helped make our country great. They believed in agriculture, and they believed in our Amer-



R. Young, who farms north of Dimmitt in Castro County, applied 140# of ammonia plus 40# P2O5 as 200# 7-21-0 per acre as a dual application on grain sorghum. He left the 7-21-0 off of 16 rows and harvested these rows separately. Without 7-21-0 in yield was 4510# per acre.


