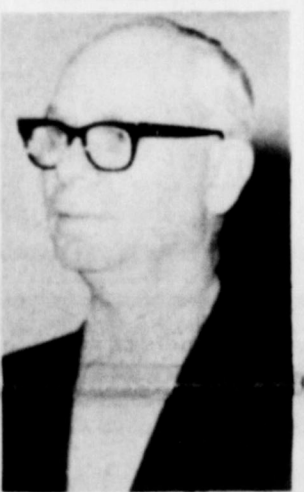

### Safety Program Held In School Assembly Wednesday

A "Safety Program" was held Wednesday in assembly at the Springlake High School with C.A. Dempsey, Safety Officer, Department of Public Service, Lubbock in charge. Stating Texas Motor Vehicle Law, 1963-64 Uniform Act; R. C. S., 6701 d-Article 13, Section 104, Regulating traffic on highways: (a) "Overtaking and passing school bus-The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children. . . You will notice the last part of Section 104 states that you must stop first, and then you may proceed with caution, not to exceed ten miles per hour. . . (c) The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway. . . The film, "A Day In Court" was also shown. Dempsey discussed the six types of attitudes involved in driving an automobile: The Grabber; Nervous Nellie; Hot Shot Noise Hot Rodder; Two Beers Benny; Nonchalant Desert Isle Daisy; and Arthur Average (Impatient). Questions were asked by some of the students, it was an informative and educational program.

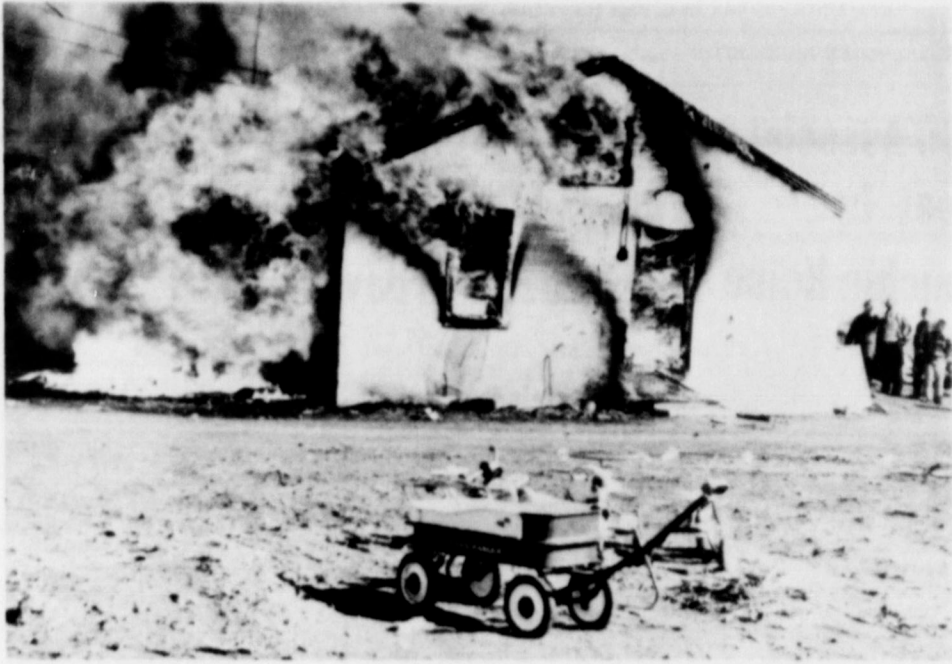

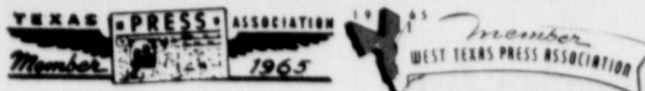
### Church Plans Busy Schedule Before Revival

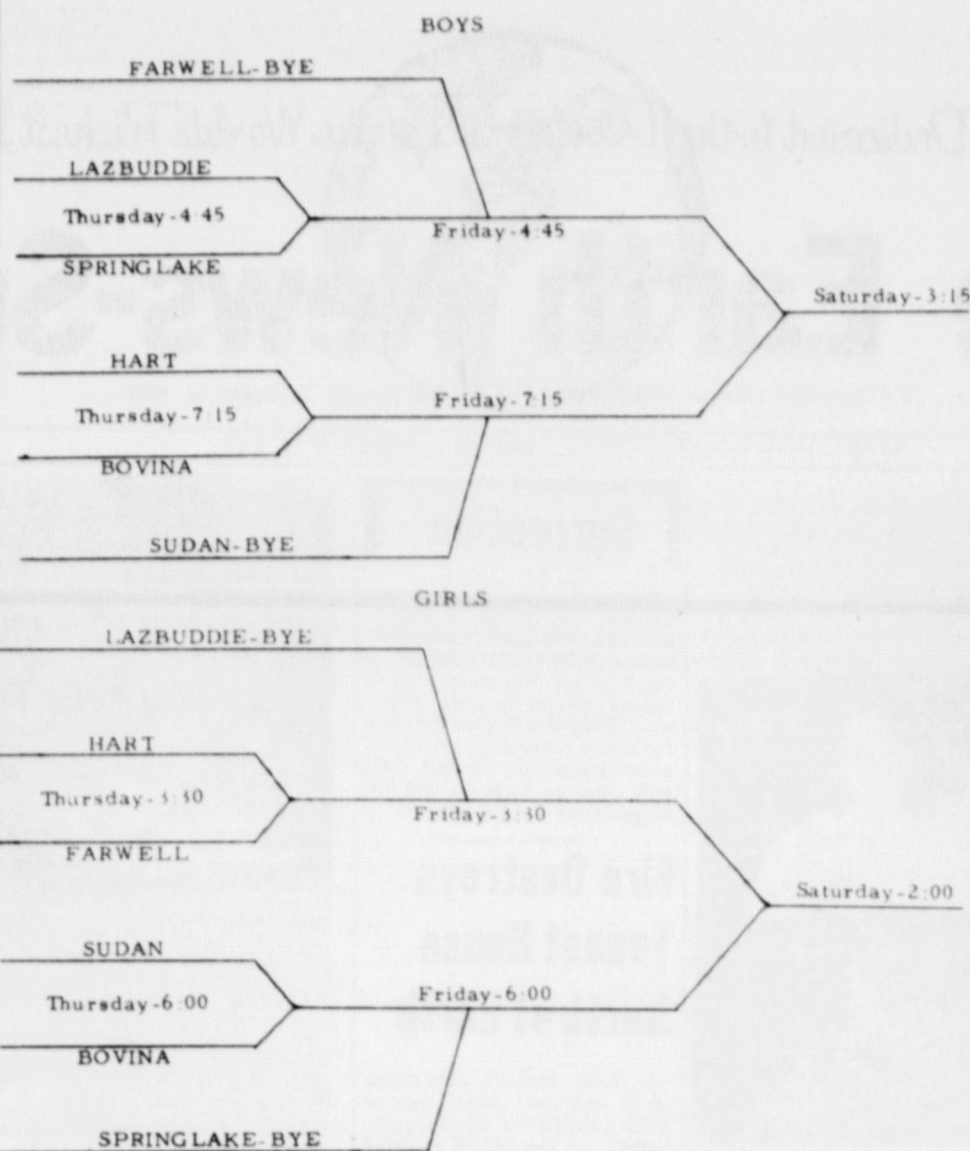

The challenge is ours to make of it what we can through labor and God's help. Our forefathers set the example for us to follow, and through their hard work and sacrifices life has been made much easier. They fought and died for the country they loved and for the one thing that helped make our country great. They believed in agriculture, and they believed in our American Heritage.

### Phosphorus Responses Discussed By Agronomist

By: W. F. Bill Bennett

This past year has generally been a good year for phosphate response. I would like to list some of the responses that have been obtained by some farmers in the area.

R. Young, who farms north of Dimmitt in Castro County, applied 140# of ammonia plus 40# P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub> as 200# 7-21-0 per acre as a dual application on grain sorghum. He left the 7-21-0 off of 16 rows and harvested these rows separately. Without 7-21-0 his yield was 4510# per acre. This was an increase of 1340#

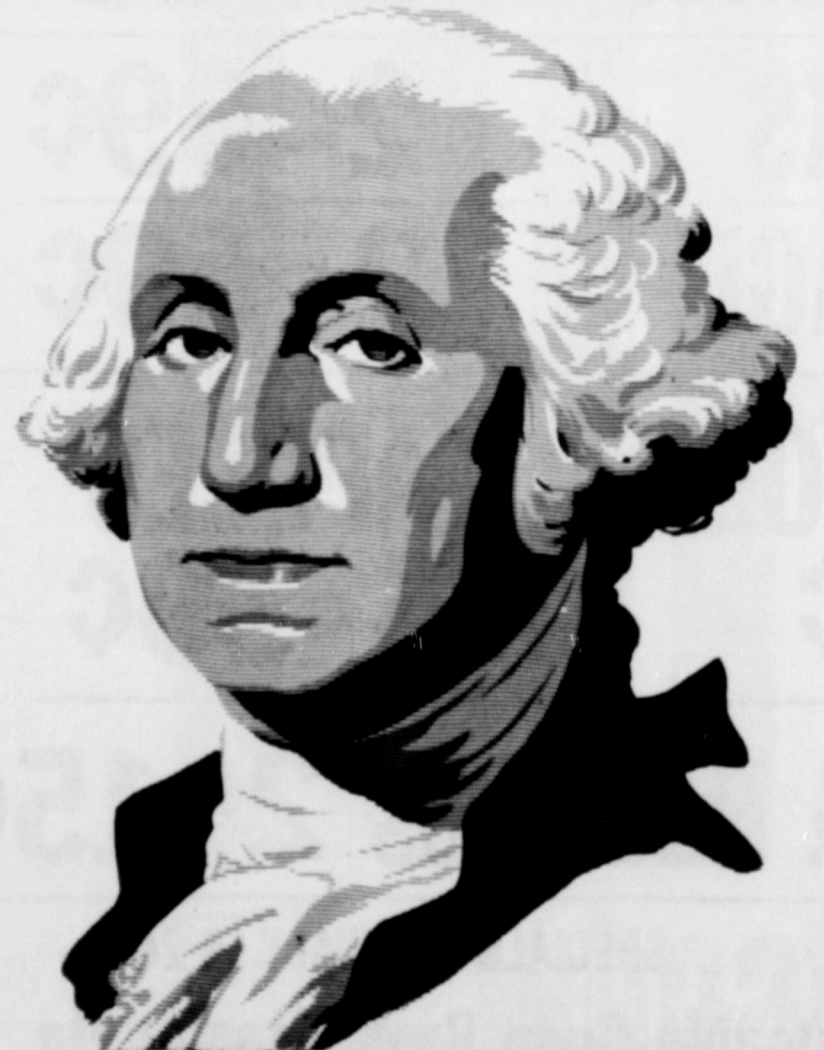
grain per acre. At \$1.75 for grain sorghum, this was a return of \$23.45 per acre for an investment of \$6.30.

Another example of phosphate response on two different types of soil comes from Thurman Atchely who farms northeast of Friona in Parmer County. Atchely applied 150# of ammonia plus 50# P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub> as 240# 7-21-0 on grain sorghum. In two of his fields, Mr. Atchely left a check strip and harvested each area separately. On his good deep soil which received four waterings, his yield with ammonia

alone was 6300# grain per acre with 57# test weight. With both ammonia and 7-21-0, he harvested 7200# grain per acre with a 59# test weight. On a shallow, highly calcareous soil which received only two waterings, he harvested 3200# grain per acre. This low test weight was due to an investment of about \$7.50 per acre. Atchely applied the ammonia and 7-21-0 as a dual application in the sides of the bed in April.

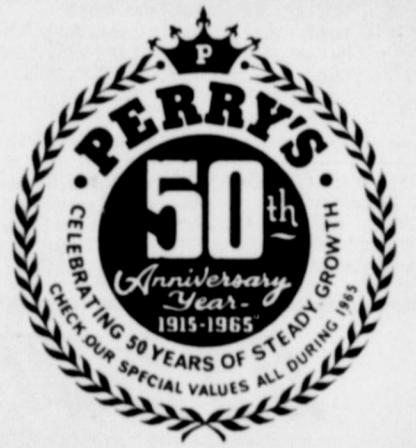
